**The Blacker the Berry...
by Wallace Thurman**

"One of the most widely read and controversial works of the Harlem Renaissance, *The Blacker the Berry...* was the first novel to openly explore prejudice within the Black community. This pioneering novel found a way beyond the bondage of Blackness in American life to a new meaning in truth and beauty.

Emma Lou Brown's dark complexion is a source of sorrow and humiliation -- not only to herself, but to her lighter-skinned family and friends and to the white community of Boise, Idaho, her home-town. As a young woman, Emma travels to New York's Harlem, hoping to find a safe haven in the Black Mecca of the 1920s. Wallace Thurman re-creates this legendary time and place in rich detail, describing Emma's visits to nightclubs and dance halls and house-rent parties, her sex life and her catastrophic love affairs, her dreams and her disillusion -- and the momentous decision she makes in order to survive.

A lost classic of Black American literature, *The Blacker the Berry...* is a compelling portrait of the destructive depth of racial bias in this country. A new introduction by Shirlee Taylor Haizlip, author of *The Sweeter the Juice*, highlights the timelessness of the issues of

Following an extremely successful inaugural event in Fall 2006, Dialogues in Sexuality Studies continues to bring together UCSD faculty members and graduate students from across campus interested in the growing interdisciplinary field of Sexuality Studies. The two short presentations, including the screening of Elyse Montague's new film, will be followed by open discussion over an informal buffet dinner.

David Serlin is Associate Professor of Communication and Science Studies at UCSD. His research interests include nineteenth- and twentieth-century cultural studies of medicine and health; gender/sexuality studies and queer theory; and disability studies.

His books include *Replaceable You: Engineering the Body in Postwar America* (University of Chicago Press, 2004), winner of the 2005 Alan Bray Book Prize from the Modern Language Association, as well as two co-edited collections, including *Policing Public Sex: Queer Politics and the Future of AIDS Activism* (South End Press, 1996), winner of the 1997 Gustav Meyers Center Award for a Book on the Subject of Human Rights in North America. He has edited the collection *Imagining Illness: Public Health and Visual Culture* forthcoming from University of Minnesota Press.

Elyse Montague is an MFA Candidate in UCSD's Department of Visual Arts. He will be screening and discussing his new film, *Well Dressed*, which explores converging representations of bodies in transition: the cruising body, the transgender body, and the pregnant body.

Come watch the Emmy-nominated musical episode of Buffy the Vampire Slayer called "Once More with Feeling". There will also be a second episode picked by the audience!

"Sunnydale is alive with the sound of music as a mysterious force causes everyone in town to burst into full musical numbers, revealing their innermost secrets as they do. But some townsfolk are dancing so much that they simply burst into flames, and it becomes clear that maybe living in a musical isn't so great after all. The scene featuring Tara's [Amber Benson] musical number, "Under Your Spell", featured heavily-implied sex between two females, and was edited out during the episode's first broadcast in conservative countries like the Philippines and China."

Creator and writer Joss Whedon says he developed Buffy to invert the Hollywood formula of "the little blonde girl who goes into a dark alley and gets killed in every horror movie." Whedon wanted "to subvert that idea and create someone who was a hero." He explained: "The very first mission statement of the show, is the joy of female power: having it, using it, sharing it." Episodes include a deeper meaning or metaphor as well. Whedon explained, "We think very carefully about what we're trying to say emotionally, politically, and even philosophically while we're writing it... it really is, apart from being a pop-culture phenomenon, something that is deeply layered

textually episode by episode." [52] Academics Wilcox and Lavery provide examples of how a few episodes deal with real life issues turned into supernatural metaphors: "In the world of Buffy the problems that teenagers face become literal monsters. A mother can take over her daughter's life ("Witch"); a strict stepfather-to-be really is a heartless machine ("Ted"); a young lesbian fears that her nature is demonic ("Goodbye Iowa" and "Family"); a girl who has sex with even the nicest-seeming guy may discover that he afterwards becomes a monster ("Innocence").

Female Masculinity by Judith Halberstam

Masculinity without men. Halberstam takes aim at the protected status of male masculinity and shows that female masculinity has offered a distinct alternative to it for well over two hundred years. Providing the first full-length study on this subject, Halberstam catalogs the diversity of gender expressions among masculine women from nineteenth-century pre-lesbian practices to contemporary drag king performances.

Through detailed textual readings as well as empirical research, Halberstam uncovers a hidden history of female masculinities while arguing for a more nuanced understanding of gender categories that would incorporate rather than pathologize them. She rereads Anne Lister's diaries and Radclyffe Hall's *The Well of Loneliness* as foundational assertions of female masculine identity. She considers the enigma of the stone butch and the politics surrounding butch/femme roles within lesbian communities. She also explores issues of transsexuality among "transgender dykes"--lesbians who pass as men--and female-to-

Halberstam also tackles such topics as women and boxing, butches in Hollywood and independent cinema, and the phenomenon of male impersonators. As Halberstam clearly demonstrates, female masculinity is not some bad imitation of virility, but a lively and dramatic staging of hybrid and minority genders. Illustrated with nearly forty photographs, including portraits, film stills, and drag king performance shots, this book provides an extensive record of the wide range of female masculinities.

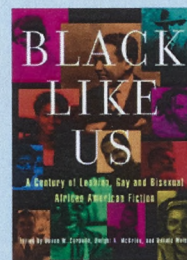

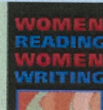

Tough Girls: Women Warriors and Wonder Women in Popular Culture
by Sherrie A. Inness

From the back cover...

"Tough girls are everywhere these days. Whether it is Ripley battling a swarm of monsters in the Aliens trilogy or Captain Janeway piloting the starship Voyager through space in the continuing Star Trek saga, women strong in both body and mind have become increasingly popular in the films, television series, advertisements, and comic books of recent decades.

In Tough Girls, Sherrie A. Inness explores the changing representations of women in all forms of popular media and what those representations suggest about shifting social mores. She begins her examination of tough women in American popular culture with three popular television shows of the 1960s and '70s—The Avengers, Charlie's Angels, and The Bionic Woman—and continues through such contemporary pieces as a recent ad for Calvin Klein jeans and current television series such as The X-files and Xena: Warrior Princess. Although all these portrayals show women who can take care of themselves in ways that have historically been seen as uniquely male, they also variously undercut women's toughness. She argues that even some of the strongest depictions of women have perpetuated women's subordinate status, using toughness in complicated
