

Anzaldúa was born in the Rio Grande Valley of south Texas on September 26, 1942 to Urbano and Amalia Anzaldúa. At 11, her family relocated to Hargill, Texas. Despite the racism, sexism, and other forms of oppression she experienced growing up as a sixth-generation tejana and the death of her father when she was 14, Anzaldúa succeeded in getting a

Unmarked: A Series of Conversations

Thursday, April 26th, 2007•2-3pm Friday, May 11th, 2007•1-2pm Friday, May 25th, 2007•3-4pm college education. She received her B.A. from Pan American University, and her M.A. from University of Texas at Austin.

As an adult, she worked for a few years as a schoolteacher before going to Austin to obtain her M.A. and complete the course work for a doctorate in comparative literature at the University of Texas, Austin. In 1977 she relocated to California where she supported herself through her writing, lectures, and occasional teaching stints at San Francisco State University; the University of California, Santa Cruz; Florida Atlantic University, and elsewhere. She is most famous for coediting This Bridge Called My Back: Writings by Radical Women of Color (1981) with Cherrie Moraga, editing Making Face, Making Soul/Haciendo Caras: Creative and Critical Perspectives by Women of Color (1990), and coediting This Bridge We Call Home: Radical Visions for Transformation (2002). She also wrote Borderlands/La Frontera: The New Mestiza (1987). Her children's books include Prietita Has a Friend (1991), Friends from the Other Side - Amigos del Otro Lado (1993), and Prietita y La Llorona (1996). She has also authored many fictional and poetic works. Her works weave English and Spanish together as one language, an idea stemming from her position in the "borderlands", a position of multiple identities. Her autobiographical essay, "La prieta," was published in (mostly) English in This Bridge Called My Back, and in (mostly) Spanish in Esta puente, mi Voces de mujeres espalda: tercermundistas en los Estados Unidos.

She has made contributions to the definition of "feminism" and has contributed to the field of cultural theory/chicana and queer theory. One such contribution was her introduction to United States academic audiences of the term mestizaje, meaning a state of being beyond binary ("eitheror")conception, into academic writing and discussion. In her theoretical works, Anzaldúa calls for a "new mestiza," which she describes as an individual aware of her conflicting and meshing identities and uses these "new angles of vision" to challenge binary thinking in the Western world. The "new mestiza" way of thinking is illustrated in postcolonial feminism.

What you need to know about the PULSE Referendum and SPACES:

In the Spring of 2008, UCSD will be opening its first retention and access center named S.P.A.C.E.S. (Student Promoted Access Center for Education and Service). The center was not allocated the funding it needs to demolish unnecessary walls, have a full-time staff member, purchase furniture, computers, office supplies, and all other materials essential to implementing an active retention and access center.

UCSD students have taken the initiative to get SPACES funded. P.U.L.S.E.

(Promoting Understanding and Learning through Service and Education) is a referendum recently approved by AS that will get SPACES the funding it needs. The referendum will cost students \$7 per quarter starting fall quarter of 2007 and would be distributed as such: a lock in amount of \$1 to ASP, \$1 to SIORC, \$3 for S.P.A.C.E.S and \$2 back to Financial Aid (a University requirement).

If PULSE passes, two AS programs, the Academic Success

1950s Connecticut, the film takes on the visual tone and style of a 1950s period piece, yet openly concerns dramatic issues — race, sexuality, and class among them.

Moore plays Cathy Whitaker, a housewife in 1950s Connecticut whose seemingly idyllic life slowly falls apart. Her husband, Frank (Quaid) is a closet homosexual and alcoholic who tries to deny and overcome his sexuality, but eventually leaves her for another man. Meanwhile, she befriends her black gardener, Raymond Deagan (Haysbert), despite the racist disapproval of the townspeople. Ryan Ward plays the Whitakers' son.

Haynes later said he meant Far From Heaven as homage to the films of Douglas Sirk, especially Program (ASP) & the Student Initiated Outreach and Recruitment Commission (SIORC) will be housed in the new center. The purpose of SPACES is to provide services for the retention and leadership development of UCSD students and equal education access for K-12 students in the community. SPACES will be a center whose resources could be utilized by all students and organizations on campus.



Loving in the War Years by Cherrie L. Moraga

Cherrie Moraga has added a new generational perspective to her classic

collection of essays and poetry, Loving in the War Years. The four new essays in this expanded edition are written in a voice nearly a generation older than that which echoes off the pages Moraga first wrote in the late 1970s and early 1980s. The original section of Loving paints a vivid portrait of Moraga's comingof-age as a Chicana and a lesbian at a time when the political merging of those two identities was severely censured. The new section is testimony to the complexity of identity politics in the time of the Right, as Leftists of all stripes aimed to harness their hard-won selfknowledge and safe territory in the struggle to build power across their constituencies. Maintaining her focus on issues of race, sexuality, ideology, and political power, Moraga's posture is now closer to that of a zen warrior than a street-fighter, but her passionate engagement with life remains as intimate, insightful, and controversial as ever.

Weaving together poetry and prose, Spanish and English, family history and political theory, Loving in the War Years has been a classic in the feminist and Chicano canon since its 1983 release. The war years continue, and loving still resides in the uncensored word. The silenced sentence—lo que nunca pasó por sus labios—once spoken, inspires insurrection.






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Roderick Ferguson: "The Relevance of Race for the Study of Sexuality"

Roderick Ferguson is Associate Professor in the Departick Ferguson is Associate Professor in the Department of American Studies at University of Minnesota-Twin Cities, and an affiliated faculty in Women's Studies and African American Studies. Ferguson is an interdisciplinary scholar

best known for his theoretical work on the intersection of race and sexuality within U.S. modernity. He is the author of Aberrations in Black: Toward a Queer of Color Critique (University of Minnesota, 2003), a work that analyzes the relationship between the construction of African Americans in the canonical sociology of Gunnar Myrdal, Ernest Burgess, Robert Park, Daniel Patrick Moynihan and William Julius Wilson, and in African American literature by Richard Wright, Ralph Ellison, James Baldwin, Audre Lorde and Toni Morrison. He is currently working on a book about the uses of rationality in the post-civil rights academy. His article, "The Parvenue Baldwin and the Other Side of Redemption: Modernity, Race, Sexuality and the Cold War," received the Modern Language Association Crompton-Noll Award in 2000.

"Keith Boykin is one of the most dynamic new voices in American media, politics and literature. He is a host of the BET television show "My Two Cents," a New York Times best-selling author of three books, and a regular commentator on CNN's "Paula Zahn Now."

A former White House aide to President Clinton, Keith was once the highest-ranking openly gay person in the Clinton White House. He also helped to organize and participated in the nation's first ever meeting between a sitting U.S. president and leaders of the gay community.

Educated at Dartmouth and Harvard, Keith attended law school with U.S. Senator Barack Obama, and in his work and travel across the globe, he has met with everyone from Bill Clinton to Nelson Mandela.

Each of Keith's three books has been nominated for a Lambda Literary Award, including his most recent book, Beyond the Down Low: Sex, Lies and Denial in Black America. Keith won the Lambda Literary Award for his second book, Respecting The Soul, while his first book, One More River to Cross, is taught in colleges and universities throughout the country.

A founder and the first board president of the National Black Justice Coalition, Keith has been actively involved in progressive causes since he worked on his first congressional campaign while still a student in high school. A veteran of six political campaigns, including two presidential campaigns, Keith was named one of the top instructors when he taught political science at American University in Washington. He has traveled extensively from Africa to Europe to North America and South America, and in 1997. President Clinton appointed him to the U.S. presidential trade delegation to Zimbabwe, along with Rev. Jesse Jackson, Coretta Scott King and Transportation Secretary Rodney Slater.

He serves as Affiliated Faculty with the Ethnic Studies Department, Critical Gender Studies Program, and Center for Comparative Immigration Studies.

"The Imperial Logic of Sexuality"

Chris Guzaitis is finishing her Ph.D. in Cultural Studies through the Literature Department at UCSD. Her dissertation, "The Imperial Logic of Sexuality: Homosexual Subject Formation and U.S. Empire Building, 1898-1952," examines the impact of U.S. imperial aggression on the history of gay/lesbian/queer subjectivity. Looking at the late nineteenth century and the rise of sexology, gay cultural expression in New York during the 1920s and 30s, and the development of the homophile movement following WWII, she reinterprets these events through the concurrent imperial projects of the U.S. war with Spain in 1898, subsequent annexation projects, the military occupation of Haiti from 1915-1934, and the post-WWII occupation of Japan.


The 2nd Annual Queer People of Color Summit Saturday, May 5th, 2007 10-6pm @ UCBerkeley

Born in 1894, Bessie developed her own act in Atlanta after working for the Moses Stokes Company. Signed by Columbia Records, her biggest hit was "Down Hearted Blues." She became the highest paid Black entertainer of her day. She was married but very open about her bisexuality and affairs with women.

Smith was described as a "large masculine lady" by Langston Hughes and was acclaimed for her gender performances. In 1937, doctors had to amputate her arm, following a car accident. She never regained consciousness and died the next morning. Rumors claim that she was first taken to a White hospital and was refused treatment, which contributed to her death.

Queering the Color Line by Siobhan B. Somerville

Queering the Color Line transforms previous

understandings of how homosexuality was "invented" as a category of identity in the United States beginning in the late nineteenth century.

Analyzing a range of sources, including sexology texts, early cinema, and African American literature, Siobhan B. Somerville argues that the emerging understanding of homosexuality depended on the context of the black/white "color line", the dominant system of racial distinction during this period. This book thus critiques and revises tendencies to treat race and sexuality as unrelated categories of analysis, showing instead that race has historically been central to the cultural production of homosexuality.

At about the same time that the 1896 Supreme Court Plessy v. Ferguson decision hardened the racialized boundary between black and white, prominent trials were drawing the public's attention to emerging categories of sexual identity.

Somerville argues that these concurrent developments were not merely parallel but in fact inextricably interrelated and that the discourses of racial and "deviance" were sexual used to reinforce each other's terms. She


