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Third College - A bed of Roses or A Crown of Thorns?

The non-implementation of the majority decision of the March 8 General Assembly is rocking the already sorry state of affairs in Third College. The faculty voted to recall faculty representatives from the Board of Directors and standing the committees; the "Others" have followed suit, and the Chicanos and Blacks have not yet made their position clear. This move is felt to have been precipitated by the lack of concern shown by the Provost for the stated wishes of the majority in our community. Many feel that the Provost is not committed to meeting the needs of the general college community, and that the Provost sees the constituency to whom he is responsible as the Chancellor and the Regents.

Differences have been many and varied, but the bitter area where friction between the Provost and the majority in our community is particularly evident, is faculty recruitment and appointment. In some cases, the Provost has even gone against "consensus" (unanimous) decisions in which he has joined in the Board (Waldron, Dolbeare).

The withdrawal from participation is a serious move, for participation is the life blood of Third committed to fulfilling its original ideals. Every member of the college community has a stake in the positive resolution of these problems, and an obligation to future students from their home communities.

What is the status of faculty and student recruiting for next year? How is program planning progressing? What relevancy has faculty, student recruiting and program planning to do with the program you are planning for next year? What does growth and success of Third College have to do with establishing nation wide centers of education for significant numbers of minority students?

What are the alternatives left open -- a restructuring of the College by replacing participation with a hierarchical bureaucracy? -- resignation of the Provost? -- installation of a new board? -- or a commitment by the Third College community as well as the Provost to meet the needs of the majority? Resolutions must be made, SOON!!

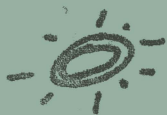
