



WHY CAMPAIGN AGAINST TRAFFICKING OF FILIPINO WOMEN AND CHILDREN?

- An estimated 20 million people, 90% women and children, are in the global sex trade
- The Philippines is the world's top exporter of women. In 2005, 750,000 women were exported to over 203 countries. 30% of the women being exported from the Philippines end up in the sex trade.
- While both Filipinos and Filipinas work overseas, the women stay abroad longer as their job contracts are more open-ended and their work continuing.
- Roughly 60% of Filipinas who leave for overseas become domestic labor– cleaning, cooking, taking care of the children of families who can afford servants.
- The second largest most probable

work for Filipinas who go abroad is in the sex trade.

- More than half-million Filipina adults and children are in the sex trade in the Philippines, catering to tourists, American GIs on R & R, and local males.
- One-hundred fifty-thousand (150,000) Filipinas work in brothel houses, strip joints, bars and nightclubs in Japan, under the control of the Yakuza. When this practice started, the women were sold at \$2,400-\$8,000--an amount the women have to pay back to the owner.
- The Philippine government does little or nothing about these facts because part of the annual \$8 billion remitted to the archipelago comes from prostituting these women.

Launched on February 14, 1999, the Purple Rose Campaign is an international mass campaign aimed at expressing and creating a ground swell of opposition to capital's assault on the bodies of women and children.

IN THE UNITED STATES

- From the 1980's on, around 5,000 Filipinas are married to American men annually through the so-called mail-order bride agencies or the international match-making agencies. These agencies comprise a multi-million dollar business.
- Wife battery and control are usual features of these marriages, where the divorce rate is estimated at 70%.
- The fiancé/husband/male client usually believes he has been taken advantaged of when the Filipina tries to divorce or leave him. His retaliation runs the gamut of mild (maxing out credit cards and making sure the court divides the debt between him and his to-beex-wife) to killing her, as what happened in a Seattle courtroom.
- Several young Filipinas were married to psychopaths and/or serial killers. Estelita Villa Reeves in Texas disappeared and the police discovered that her husband had married two others--a Latina and a Vietnamese--before her, both died mysteriously.
- An estimated 25,000 Filipinas have been brought into the US to work at brothel houses, bars, nightclubs and illegal sex farms in various states and in the vicinity of US military bases and camps.
- Some 25 sex tour operators in the

US each send 15-25 men each month to the Philippines to engage in sex tourism. A Philippine Adventure Tour, for instance, costs \$1,645 including RT airfare, hotel and guided tours to the bars where women are purchased for sex for as low as \$24.

 Neither the Philippine embassy and its consulates nor the US government has any adequate program to deal with the problem. US legislators of Philippine ancestry focus largely on whether the women should be called "mailorder brides," the agencies "mailorder bride agencies," or some other term which would effectively hide the fact that women are being sold.



THE GENERAL RESPONSE OF THE ORGANIZED WOMEN'S MOVEMENT IN THE US

- To ignore the problem because it is an "international" issue and not a domestic one... until trafficking, particularly the mail-order bride practice, started affecting white Eastern European women.
- To treat the issue as a philosophical question, arguing whether it is a matter of "choice" on the part of the individual women or not, whether prostitution is "work" or not, whether unionization is the answer or not.
- To ignore the function of the International Monetary Fund/World Bank and the World Trade Organization in warping the economies of countries like the Philippines, so that poverty becomes endemic and an endless supply of poor and desperate women are created, for the global sex trade and the international labor market.
- Outrage becomes visible only when a battered mail-order bride turns out to be a white woman from Russia or Eastern Europe; deafening silence when the Seattle women and Estelita Reeves were killed.
- Individual feminists and progressive women have joined and continue to join GABRIELA Network in opposing this greatest crime of the last 50 years.

GABNET'S POSITION

- So long as there are gender inequities in work, education and social opportunities, "choice" does not even enter the equation regarding the sex trade.
- So long as powerful nations oppress poor nations, there is no such thing as "choice."
- Sex for sale is not a component of the Filipino world view. It is so alien to the native philosophy that no term exists in the 150 Philippine languages for prostitution or prostitute.
- The sex trade is the nodal point where class, race and gender oppression come together, to create the worst possible

exploitation. Its large scale use of Filipinas comes from an aberrant cultural development, artificially induced by global forces, which compel the transfer of the family's economic survival from a traditionally male responsibility. This transfer impacts not only women but men as well, infantilizing them by making them dependent. This, in turn, exacerbates gender tension.

 Every man and woman has a responsibility and an obligation to oppose and destroy the structures which create labor export, the sex trade and the mail-order bride business.

THE COMPONENTS OF THE PURPLE ROSE CAMPAIGN

- The **Pledge Card**. Each individual in agreement with GABRIELA Network's position on the sex trade signs a pledge card, committing himself/ herself to opposing the traffic of women and children. This pledge is actively expressed by speaking out against trafficking, wearing the purple rose pin and never patronizing the sex trade.
- The **Purple Rose**. The icon of the purple rose was selected because this flower was artificially created and exoticized, for no other purpose than to satisfy desire. It is no different from other roses and yet remains apart, because it does not exist in nature and was not a product of evolution. So are the women in the sex trade: artificially created and exoticized and willed to be apart and different to satisfy desire and to be sold for profit. Pins are \$5.
- The **Committee of One-Hundred**. Each country takes up the Purple Rose Campaign creates a Committee of One Hundred respected men and women, who work to make sure that the issue of the traffic of women, particularly Filipinas, remain in the public eye.
- **Raising Funds for GABRIELA Philippines**. GABRIELA is the largest and only multi-sectoral women's alliance in the archipelago. It works for constantly improved working and living conditions, equal opportunities and equal participation in society for women, gender equality and the



WORLD AIDS

The World AIDS Campaign connects and strengthens AIDS campaigns from around the world. Through a collaborative approach, the campaign brings together diverse voices with the goal of holding world leaders and governments to account for their promises on AIDS. One of the most visible aspects of the campaign is World AIDS Day - a day of shared global action and awareness held annually on December 1st.

The World AIDS Campaign was founded in 1997 by UNAIDS, the Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS. The campaign is now administered by an independent World AIDS Campaign Support Team, governed by representatives of the world's largest campaigning networks, and has offices in The Netherlands and South Africa.

THE WORLD AIDS DAY THEME : LEADERSHIP

Building on from last year's theme of accountability, the 2007 and 2008 World AIDS Day theme is leadership. The ongoing campaigning slogan of the World AIDS Campaign is "Stop AIDS. Keep the Promise."

The pandemic hit record levels in 2006 with 4.3 million people becoming infected with HIV. more than in any previous year. Despite efforts to hold leaders accountable, progress in halting HIV is still falling far short of targets. All our efforts are simply not delivering at the speed and scale required. Many political promises, including those made in the United Nations General Assembly Special Session on AIDS in 2001, are not being kept. A lack of leadership at all levels is the main reason these promises are not being

In the past, significant advances in the response to HIV have been achieved through strong and committed leadership. Leaders are distinguished by their innovation. vision and action. They are characterised by the personal example they set for others and their perseverance in the face of obstacles. But, leaders are not always those in high office. In order to get ahead of the AIDS

pandemic, leadership must be demonstrated at every level – by individuals, in schools, within families, in places of work and worship, in countries and internationally. Making leadership the theme of the 2007 and 2008 World AIDS Days will help encourage this leadership and inspire champions within a range of different settings from across society.

KEY MESSAGES : LIVING THE THEME

World AIDS Day is a day when people from around the world come together within a single effort to raise awareness about HIV and to express global solidarity in the face of the pandemic. Individuals, groups and organisations can use the leadership theme and the 'Stop AIDS. Keep the Promise' slogan to enhance their work. The leadership theme provides an opportunity to influence policymakers and the media. Individuals, local businesses, media, governments and a variety of institutions embrace World AIDS Day and the theme that accompanies it as an

opportunity to demonstrate commitment and action on HIV. While the theme is global in nature, World AIDS Day messages and campaigns are best shaped at local and national levels. Campaigners can tailor the theme towards their specific needs or sector. For instance, campaigns that are politically orientated aimed at governments could use the slogan "Leadership on treatment now: we are still dying. Stop AIDS. Keep the Promise." Campaigns could also be designed to mobilise a certain sector within a common slogan, for example "Textile workers, lead the fight against AIDS in the workplace." Leadership could also take a simple form, such as an individual informing others about AIDS in Africa.

The theme of leadership is designed to be as flexible as possible to accommodate a range of campaigning needs. It can be used to challenge and criticise leaders who are not meeting their promises on AIDS or celebrate leaders who are taking initiative and acting on their promises. The theme could be used to encourage and inspire those around the world to take a leadership role themselves in fighting the pandemic.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

Below are some general ideas for inspiration as you create World AIDS Day activities around the different aspects of leadership.

TAKE THE "LEADERSHIP PLEDGE"

The World AIDS Campaign Support Team has created a "leadership pledge". Through the World AIDS Campaign website, via partner organisations or on the form below, people can sign up - or pledge - to take the lead by demanding universal access to HIV prevention, treatment, care and support. It is a simple process that asks for your name, email address, country and leadership pledge and includes an option to add a personal image. We will provide you with an optional pledge or you can add your own.

The names and photos gathered will then be used to inspire decision-makers to take action and show leadership on AIDS. Together our voices can have a greater effect. Please visit **www.worldaidscampaign.org** to find out how you can get involved or fill-in the "Take the lead" form below.

RALLIES OR PROTESTS

You can organise a rally or a protest in a city square, in front of embassies or at political headquarters, demanding greater leadership in fighting AIDS. We can provide you with graphics or visuals from the "leadership pledge" for petitions, banners or other materials. Be sure to check the legal requirements and implications of rallies or protests in your area.

LETTER WRITING

Coordinate a letter writing or email campaign to local or national leaders that demands their leadership in fighting HIV.

EVENTS

Organise an event around the topic of leadership or celebrate leaders who are already setting a good example. Give out awards or hold a competition that recognises leadership.

FORUMS

Work with organisations in your area to hold forums on leadership.

VIDEOS, POSTERS, IMAGES OR OTHER AWARENESS RAISING DISPLAYS

Images and videos can inspire many to take action. The World AIDS Campaign Support Team is distributing a World AIDS Day tool kit which includes posters and a CD Rom that can be used for campaigning and at events.

BE A LEADER

Inspire others to help fight AIDS through your own actions: pass out World AIDS Day flyers, design a website, create and lead an e-forum discussion, coordinate a World AIDS Day seminar, host an event to raise money for local AIDS organisations, or discuss AIDS with family and friends to raise awareness of the issue.








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OBJECTIVES

Three theoretical teachings frame the Institute: A Social Change Model for Leadership Development, the Cycle of Socialization and the Cycle of Liberation. At the end of the Chancellors Undergraduate Diversity Leadership Institute, participants will able to:

- Articulate their own consciousness of self in relation to diversity and community at UCSD
- Understand the need for congruence in leadership
- Understand the necessary commitment to be an active participant in social change at UCSD
- Articulate the value of collaboration in leadership initiatives
- Understand the broader common purpose that link all social justice movements
- Be able to discuss and debate controversial issues while valuing civility
- Be civically engaged at the UCSD Campus Community Centers, UCSD and the broader San Diego Community

COMMITMENT

<u>Class Participation</u>: Participants will meet twice a week on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 3:30 to 4:50pm quarterly. Attendance and participation at these sessions are required for successful completion of the Institute.

Weekly assignments: Each week participants will present on a current issue and on readings that relate to that week's topic or theme. Participants will also keep a journal in which they record their observations in class, experiences during their Social Change Action Project, and feelings about the Institute. Journals will be submitted each week, and will be between 150 and 250 words.

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Social Change Action Project: During Winter and early Spring, the students receive a grant of up to \$100 to implement a Social Change Action Project of their design.

Proposal: At the end of fall quarter students will be responsible for a Social Change Action Project Proposal, which will provide an analysis of the learning that has occurred to that point, and an outline for an action project or social change item that will be implemented in the winter or early spring quarter. The paper will be no fewer that 3 pages.

<u>Co-curricular activities</u>: Participants will attend one co-curricular event per quarter and turn in a brief, one page summary of each.

organized to commemorate the lives and mourn the losses of those killed due to anti-transgender violence.




