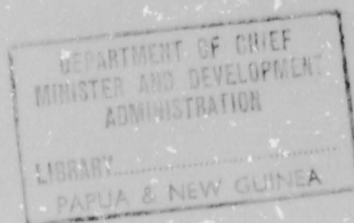

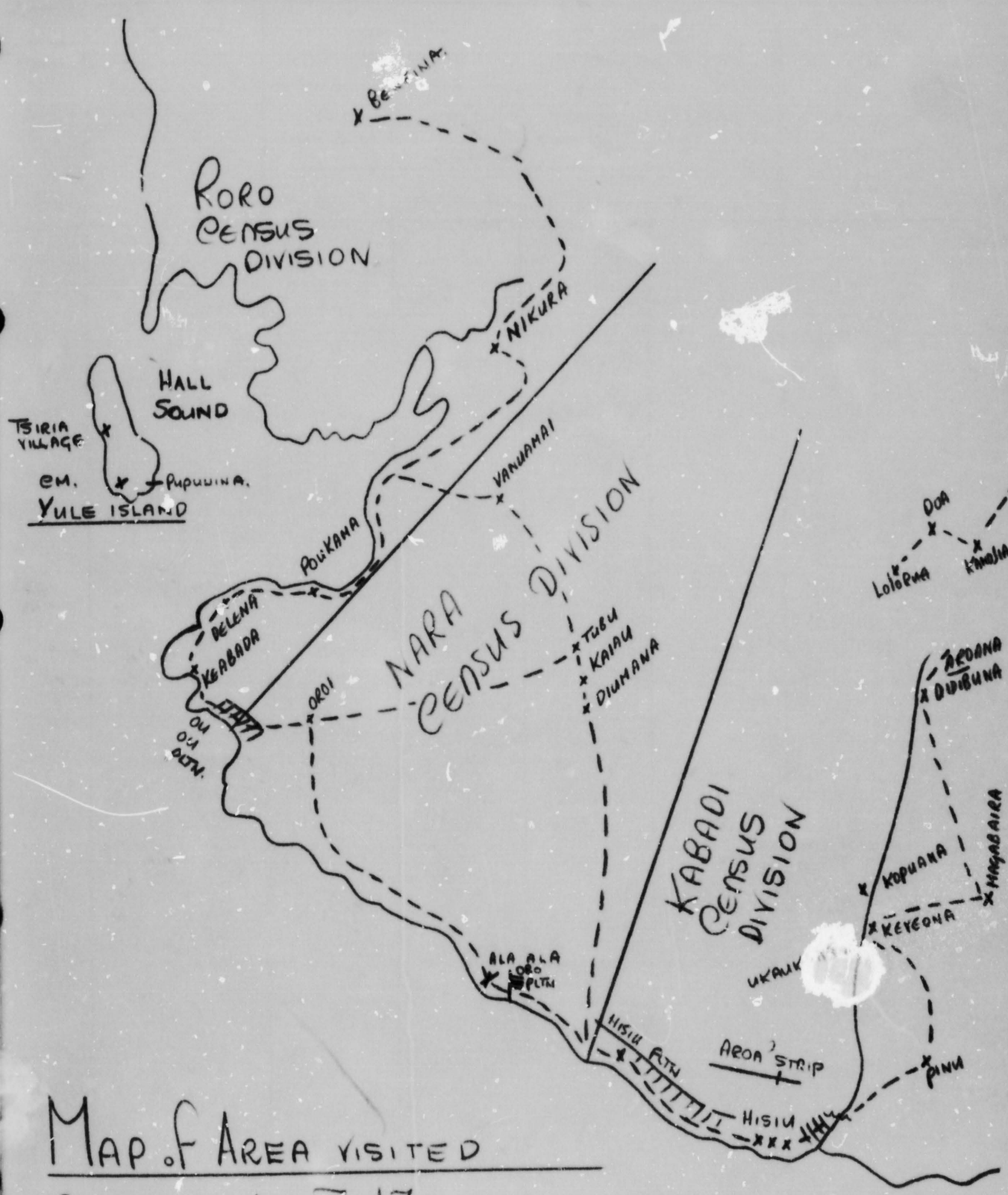
I acknowledge with thanks receipt of Situation Report 1 arising out of the above patrol of part of the RORO, NARA and KABADI Census Divisions, together with the appropriate assessments, as submitted by Mr. A. Hayward, Patrol Officer.

There does not appear to have been any attempt made to ascertain or analyse the reasons for so many exemptions being granted; accordingly the observation that tax exemptions were "given out like confetti" may or may not be a pertinent and logical assessment. It should be remembered that compared to western industrialized society the Papua New Guinea social structure is based upon an entirely different set of social values and obligations. It is these concepts which influence the tax review committees and which give a legitimate basis for the issuing of tax exemptions.

The abolishment of tax patrols and the declaration of a three month period in which to pay tax at the Council offices may work for nearby villages but it would surely place an unjust imposition on taxpayers living in more distant villages, e.g. those of the Kabadi Census Division. For these villages I cannot see any reasonable alternative to the tax collection patrol.

I would have thought it would have been an integral part of the Adviser's duties to undertake some form of in-service training of Councillors in their powers and responsibilities within the village framework.



Introduction

1. The patrol was of a purely routine nature with the main aim being revision of census together with the routine Administration that normally accompanies such an exercise.
2. Parts of the area were being visited for the first time by the writer and so the patrol was considered valuable from the point of view of familiarization.
3. Vehicular roads in the area are at present in good condition and an Administration vehicle was utilized throughout - with the obvious advantages of comfort and speed of travel.

Political

4. Although discussions were held on matters of a political nature it was found to be almost universally impossible to generate any great interest in other than parochial issues.
5. This lack of interest (and lack of knowledge) I put down to lack of communication and I feel that to attempt political education as an ancillary to routine patrols occurring once or twice a year is virtually a waste of time.
6. In comparing these areas which receive no radio communication in the form of Administration radio broadcasts with those areas that do (from my own experience the East Sepik) it is obvious that this is one of the most important factors in disseminating information and generating interest. I think that the need for an Administration radio station in the Central District has long been realized and hopefully

it may eventually become a reality.

7. Discussions on aspects of Council Administration generally became directed towards criticism of council projects - particularly water supplies. Criticism is in many cases certainly justified and can be directed at the failure by the Council to carry out routine maintenance on and/or to improve existing water wells etc.

8. The 10,000 gallon fibreglass tank at Vanuasi was constructed using sealer that had either gone off or had been incorrectly mixed, and consequently the tank is useless. New sealer has been ordered and the Administrative Adviser will personally supervise the repair of this tank.

Since the completion of the patrol cement liners have been transported to Ala'Ala to complete the well and to replace the collapsed fibreglass liners in the Pinu well.

9. Unfortunately the Councillors themselves often fail to take action by notifying the Council when these installations require repair or maintenance.

Economic

10. There are no obvious new trends in rural economic development in these areas - apart from an interest by the Minor Forest Products Section of Forestry in sandalwood. Quite a large amount was exported in the early part of the century and a pilot shipment is presently being prepared in an endeavour to establish the feasibility for the export of this product.

11. As mentioned in Patrol Report No.1 of 72-73 the coastal road (Aropokina - Delena - Hisiu) has been re-opened utilizing an R.D.F. grant and F.W.D. road maintenance funds and equipment - as well as the grader and truck belonging to Mr. M. Henry a private contractor. Unfortunately the cut back in PWD maintenance funds and the failure of the Kairuku L.G. Council to "score" the R.D.F. funds applied for on this

road means that work has to be halted. The failure to complete essential surfacing means that the road will have to be closed during the wet season.

12. The situation regarding the Hiritano Highway which will pass through these areas is well known. The survey will be completed in a week or so and we can only hope the Asian Development Bank will provide the loan requested for this road.

13. Construction of the bridge over the Area River is proceeding rapidly and even though there is little likelihood of the Highway being completed within the next 12 months we should see a considerable amount of road traffic between the Sub-District and Port Moresby during the next dry season.

14. Although there are large areas in the Nara and Kabadi C/D's suitable for cattle there has been nil development in this field. Although there has been ample encouragement from D.A.S.F. there is at this stage an obvious lack of interest. Hopefully this will change with the coming of the Hiritano Highway.

Social

15. Consistent with the whole of the Sub-District large numbers of people were found to be residing permanently in other areas, in many cases over 40%. This does not however appear to create any social problems as in many cases the absensees comprise family units rather than individuals. What is not shown in the census figures however are the numbers temporarily absent in Port Moresby. Although no record was kept the numbers were quite astounding and in most cases they were said to be staying with relatives etc permanently employed.

It is no wonder that the Port Moresby workers associations pressing for higher salaries. The number of transient months the wage earners have to feed must be phenomenal.

16. Aid Post coverage is I consider quite good although the standard of MPO's does leave a little to be desired.

17. Whilst there are a number of land disputes existing through the area they appear to be at the dormant stage at present and those brought to the patrol were of a minor nature. The Uksukana - Kopuana dispute which erupted when the Uksukana people made an agreement with Mono Industries (through the owners indigenous wife) for the timber rights on land claimed by the them was discussed but all seems to be well at this stage and there is no sign of any activity by Mono.

18. It was necessary however to adjudicate at a dispute between Vanumai and Nikura villages over who owned a particular area of land the Hiritano Highway survey track was passing through. The problem concerned employment of local labour by Comworks with each group claiming that it was their land and therefore they should be employed. It transpired that neither group was able to identify claimed boundaries and finally they agreed amicably to each village supplying half the required number of labourers.

19. A problem which may arise in the future concerns Kanosis estates abandoned plantation in the vicinity of Rogers airstrip. Apparently Kanosis have announced their intention to introduce cattle to this area and there are already indications that the local people intend trying to claim ownership - possibly because having used the area for hunting they can foresee the loss of these rights should cattle be introduced. Naturally they have done nothing to develop their own considerable lands much of which is also very suitable for cattle.


Conclusion

20. The ease of accessibility to and within this area now that the coastal road is usable convinces me that the most important single requirement for this area is the completion of the upgrading of this road to an all weather standard. With the completion of the Hiritano Highway this road will still be required as an access road and for this reason will increase in importance even more.

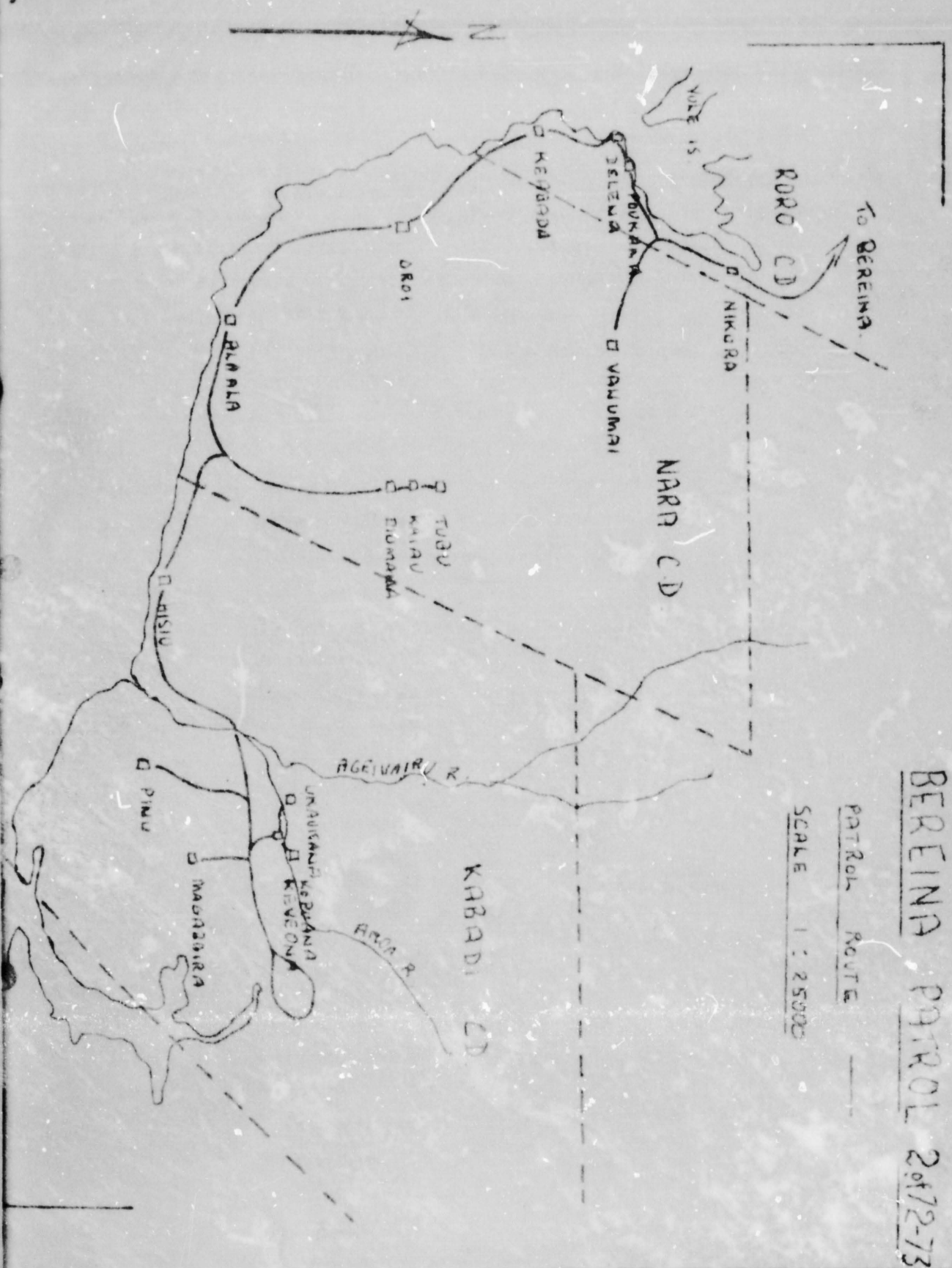
21. The Re-registration of any shotguns that were due for renewal was

carried out. Although this is normally a Police function it was agreed that to effect the re-registrations on patrol would save the people concerned considerable inconvenience in travelling to Bereina and that there was no objection to myself attending to this matter.


3. The writer conducted the elections initially in the Waimea census division and then moved to the Roro census division,the elections in both areas covered a period from the 8th of August to the 19th of August.

4. During the election period two Poll clerks were employed,one for each area patrolled,their names were as follows:-----

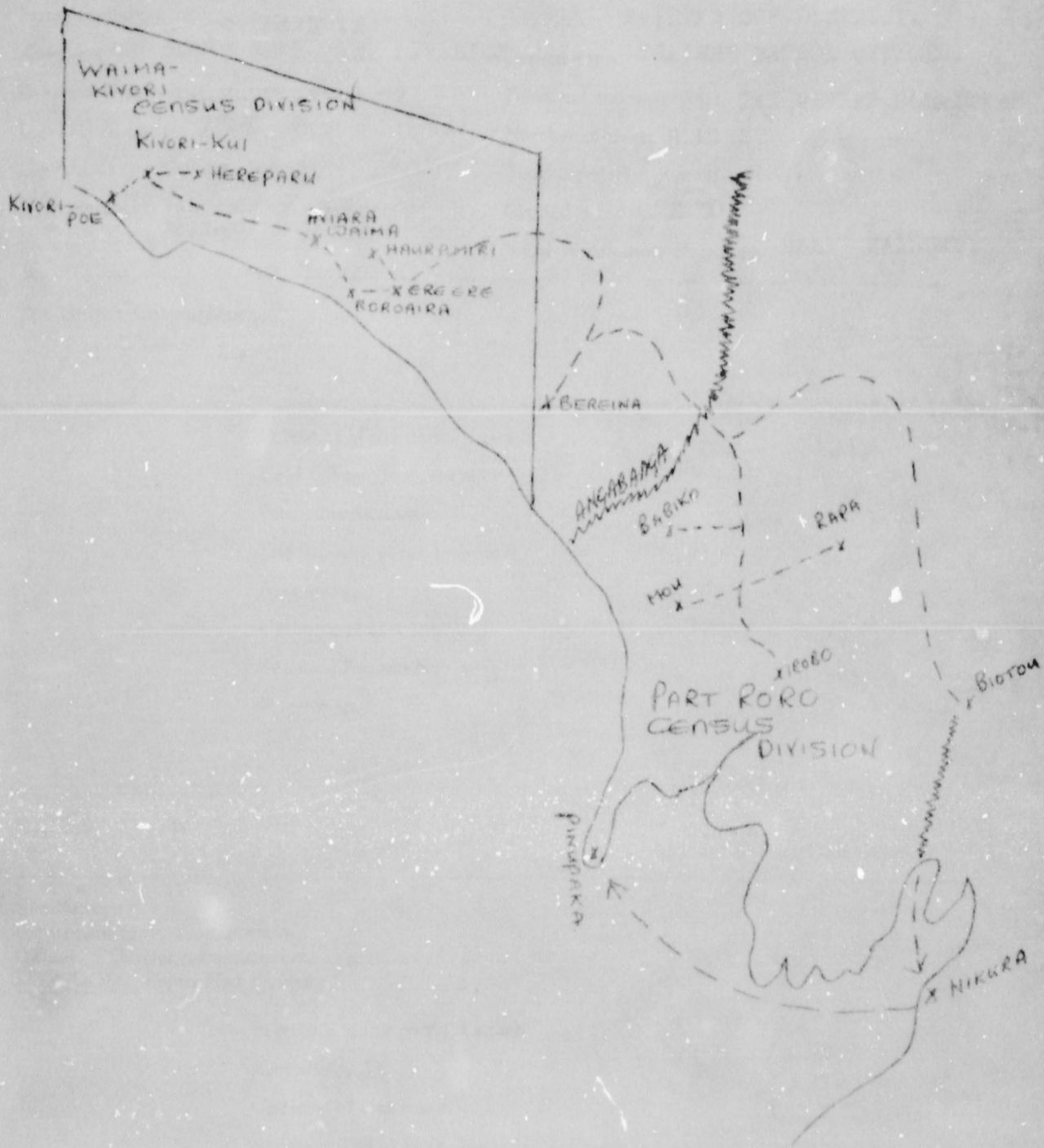
Michael Ume,Kivori Poe village and

2. In this his first solo patrol the patrolling officer has acquitted himself quite favourably and it is gratifying to note that he was well received by the village people.
3. The leniency of the Tax Review Committee with regard to Tax Exemptions has been quite noticeable with respect to both Councils during this years collection. Unfortunately in spite of prior "indoctrination" by the Council advisers the Committee members still succumb to pressure and/or any hard luck story put forward by those seeking exemptions.
4. It is pleasing to note that, unlike the villages in the North Mekeo Census Division, the villages in the North Mekeo are relatively free to pigs.
5. Whilst it should not as a rule be necessary for a D.D.A. Officer to accompany a tax collection patrol it was felt that in this case neither the Collector nor the Review Committee had the experience to effectively carry out the collection unaccompanied.



2. Your duties will be practically identical to those carried out by Mr. Hayward and yourself on your patrol to the Nara and Kabadi Census Divisions in which you assisted the Kairuku L.G. Council Tax Collection Team.
3. As already advised you are to liase with Mr. J. Clark P.O. regarding your role in supervising the Tax Collecting. As well whilst on patrol please attend to any matters of a general nature that are brought to your notice and make yourself available to hear minor complaints enquiries etc.
4. You should also carry out village inspections in company with the Councillors whose ultimate task is to enforce any recommended improvements.

Introduction

1. This patrol was carried out during the period from 7-8-72 - 17-8-72 in the North Mekeo Census Division.
 2. The main purpose of the patrol was to collect as much Tax money as soon as possible, so that the Mekeo Council, may know how much money it will have to spend. The writer as a supervisor of the Tax team also did routine Administration duties on the patrol.
 3. For the first two days the patrol moved on Administration vehicle. The rest of the patrol moved on village canoes and used walking tracks from village to village, using carriers to transport patrol gears.
 4. In addition to above purposes medical duties were also carried out by the Aid Post Orderly JOSEPH PARAHA, minor complaints heard by the writer and informal meetings held.
 5. The patrol consisted of Tax Review committee as follow:-
 IKE AME (Tax Collector) EBOA Councillor
 AME AME INWABUI Councillor
 KEAIKE Aipeana Councillor
 KEPE Babanongo Councillor
 OWAI Inawaia Councillor

6. The Mekeo council had two tax teams. Tax team one collected the tax in the West Mekeo Division while the tax team two collected tax in the North Mekeo Division.

Tax Collection in General

7. The writer happened to find out on patrol that the ~~tax~~ collection from the North Mekeo Census Division was much ^{greater} ~~more~~ and more tax money collected, compared to some of the previous collections.

8. However, it was found that many Councillors from some of the villages for example Beipa and Babanongo Piunga and Engefa, failed to warn their villages about the current tax rate of \$10-00 for everyone in the Census Division, except for the council village committees to pay the sum of \$9-00. This failure made it hard for the tax team to explain and warn the people about the rate on the spot. However, most thinking that the rate was \$8-00 were prepared and they just borrowed \$2-00 to make it up to \$10-00. However some villages paid well because they had in mind that the Mekeo council had done something in their villages and also were afraid of going to court eg the villages of Maipa Ioi and Piunga.

9. To the writers opinion the tax review committee was not very hard on people, giving tax Exemptions. It was already explained by council Supervisor and the writer to the committee that exemptions are given when a person is very sick and old to work ~~to~~ earn money or when a person is crippled, but the team even gave out exemption to people who were strong and young enough to earn money to pay tax. So the writer comments that in future tax collection patrols, the tax review committee should be a hard one and should be efficient to read and write because the tickets were not eligible enough to ^{be} read.

10. According to the writer the tax committee collected approximate over a 1,000 dollars from the people of the North Mekeo Census Division. Approximately over 50 tax exemption given out and over \$50.00 Back Tax collected. This collection according to the Tax review committee was larger than the average Tax collected from this area.

General

11. In the general Administration routine part of the patrol, the patrol leader carried out village inspection in every village visited by the patrol. The patrol happens to find that most of the villages were kept clean and tidy as usual, with the exception of Inaukina village where people are mostly scattered living out from their village. The writer found that the village is nearly covered by thick Kunai grass and undergrowth. When told the village of Inaukina; the writer learnt that the people are not bothering about the cleanliness of this village. However the writer ordered the villages that by the next Administration patrol the village must be tidy and clean and that all the grass and undergrowth to be cut. So the writer comments that in future patrols the leader must take note about the people in the village.

12. Village water supplies were also inspected. However as most of the villages are situated near the rivers, water for the household use and other uses is taken from the river. Villages like Piunga, Inaukina, Engefa were council water Projects have been built, are not working well because of the present dry season.

13. The people in most of this villages are also carrying out their Mekeo Local Governments pig rule, as the writer happens to find that village pigs are ^{often} kept away from the village. In some villages like Ameiaka and Ioi villages, their councillor even told the people to get rid of their pigs and as a result of this, the two villages were the cleanest according to the writer's village inspections.

14. In addition to the above duties of the patrol leader, complaints were raised by villagers during informal discussions and meetings. Complaints were raised about their council neglecting the people even during the tax collection. Other complaints were also raised about the Department of Agriculture, Stock and Fisheries regarding their produce of Cocoa, Coffee and other garden products especially in the village of Engefa, Usual betelnut and few pig complaints were also raised. However, some minor complaints were solved and discussed at the spot. The major complaints about the council and their produce were left to their councillors to bring those matters up in their next council meeting. The patrol leader

advised these people that if any matter comes up regarding their village matters this should be taken to their councillor who can then take them to the council meetings. Complaints which rose and couldn't be solved by the writer eg. complaints about their Ferrymen's duties which were the main complaints in the villages of Piunga and Aneiaka were told to be taken to the Assistant District Commissioner's attention in Bereina. However most minor complaints were solved by the writer.

15. In conclusion³ must say that the patrol was welcomed warmly in most villages and as my first patrol without an experienced Officer's guidance I enjoyed the patrol.

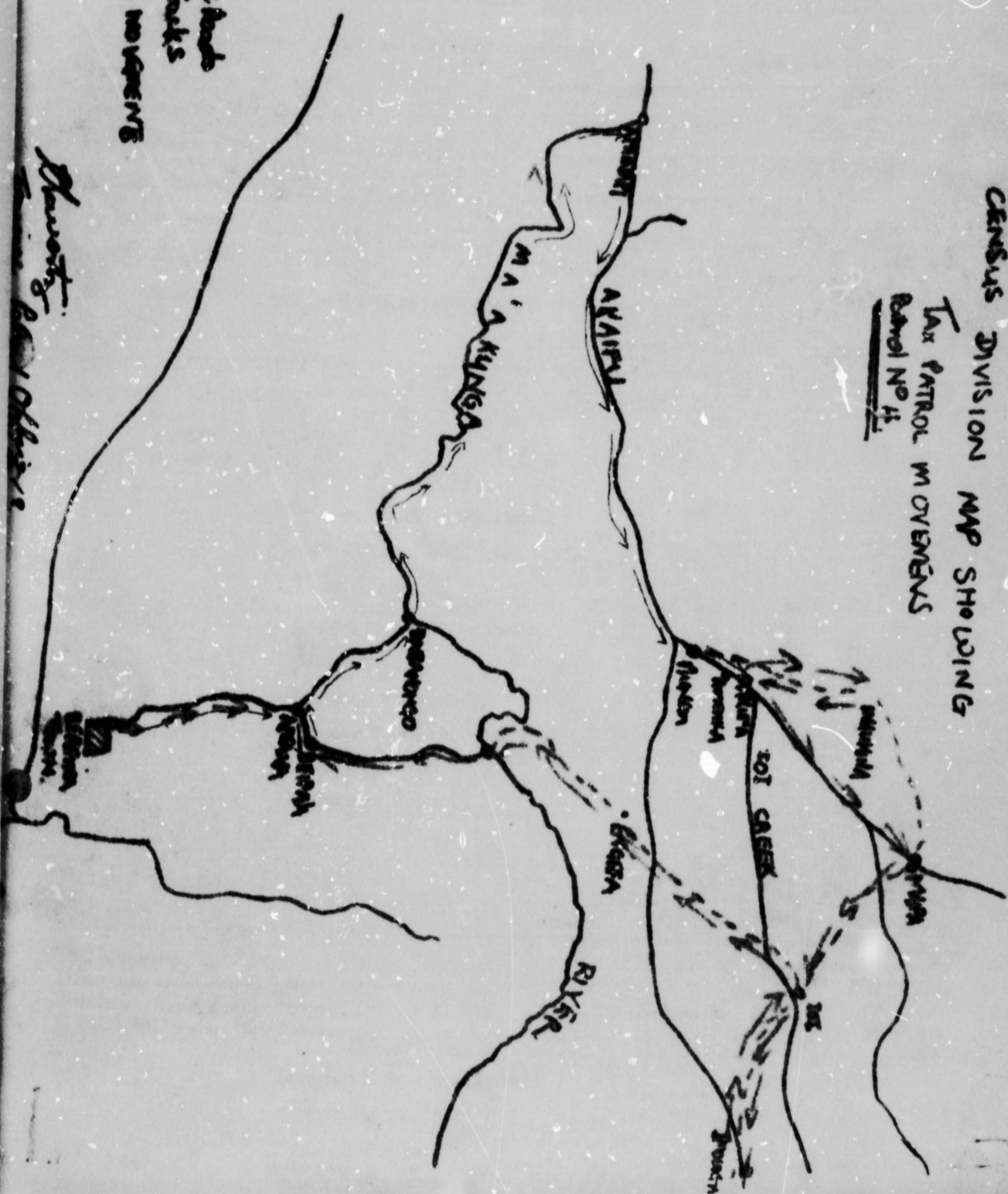





SITUATION REPORT NO. 1.

1. The Writ for the General Elections of the Kairuku Local Government Council was issued for polling to take place between 1st August and 1st September.
2. Patrol Officer A. Hayward was to conduct elections in the Waimo, Kivori and Paitana area, Assistant District Officer, B. Taverner the Mara and Kabadi areas and the writer the remainder.
3. Because Mr Taverner became ill during his patrol and was forced to return to Bereina, the writer took his place, and conducted elections at all wards in the Mara and Kabadi areas, a total of 11 wards. Notice of the elections had been sent to all villages some weeks prior to polling to ensure that all villages were aware of the elections.
4. As is usual in the Kairuku Council area preselection of candidates at village level took place prior to the visit by the patrol. This preselection resulted in several wards and only one candidate nominated. Thus voting in these areas was unnecessary.
5. Hisiu, the largest ward visited by this patrol, attracted five candidates, including the two previous ~~candidates~~ ^{councillors}. Neither of these was re-elected.
6. Of the four villages where polling was necessary the voting average was only 30 o/o. In most cases people available to vote did so.
7. Since the writers last visit to the Kabadi area the Hiritano Highway has been virtually completed as far as the Arca River and the Kabadi people are making full use of the easy access to Port Moresby. The Kabadi villagers were conspicuous by the absence of many of the villagers who were making brief trips to town. Hisiu villagers too, find it easier to get to Moresby by road rather than canoe or plane.
8. In addition to conducting the elections the writer also informed the people of the by-election to be held for the Kairuku-Hiri Electorate of the House of Assembly.
9. Numerous minor disputes were reported to the writer and these were amiably settled at village level.
10. The re-opening of the coast road from Arapokina to Delana and onto Hisiu has made patrolling and visits to the villages in this area of the Sub District a much easier and more efficient task. The trip to Kabdi which used to take several days by canoe and foot can now be made in a few hours by vehicle. The writer used a small motor bike which was most useful.
11. The elections were conducted in all villages required and as always the people were helpful and considerate.

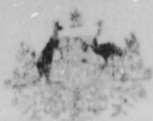



1. As verbally discussed you are to depart on the 13th of September on a patrol of the Kuni Census Division. During the course of the patrol please attend to the following.
2. Recompile the census registers for the area. As you know due to the establishment of the Bakoiudu and Kubuna resettlement schemes the majority of the villages in the Kuni Census Division have been deserted with the inhabitants now permanently resident in settlements within the re-settlement areas.
3. Where this has occurred it is suggested that registers be compiled in respect of each L.G. Council ward eg. "Bakoiudu Resettlement Ward 1" etc. It is not known whether or not if in resettling an actual name has been given to the areas encompassed by each set of ward boundaries. If so it may be preferable to have these recorded rather than for example ward 1 ward 2 etc.
4. Also you are to assist the Local Government Office by conducting the elections for the Kuni Local Government Council. Please liaise with Mr. J. Jansen the Councils Administrative Adviser concerning the relevant details.

Apart from the Kuni Local Government Council Elections, the patrol was one of routine census revision, the re-writing of the old census books. When time permitted general administration duties were carried out.


The patrol was conducted in the Kuni Census Division of the Kairoku Sub-district. The division is situated generally North East of Bereina and covers a hilly area of approximately 300 square miles dominated by the Mount Cameron Range of mountains on its North-East side. Until recently the people were scattered throughout the area in small hamlets, now, however, with the most full scale operations of the Bakoindu and Kubuna Resettlement schemes most of the hamlets have been deserted with the population moving into the resettlement blocks. There will be a separate report in the form of an administrative situation report on this subject.

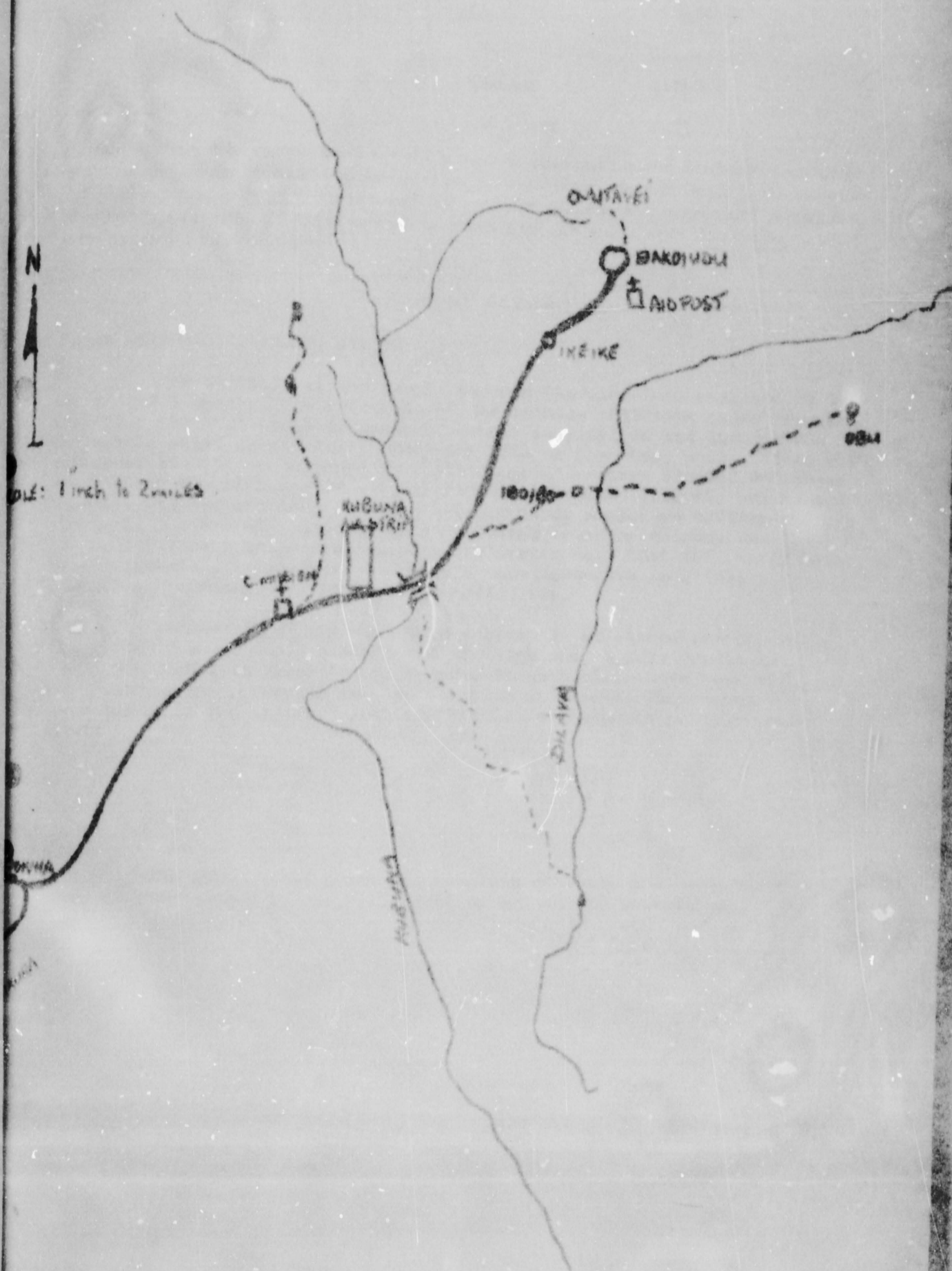
There was very little reaction to the patrol by the people. The Council's Administrative Advisor, Mr. J. Jansen first notified the councillors of the patrol during the August meeting of the Council. At this meeting he advised that there need only be the councillors, ward committee men and perhaps village head men present for the census, the idea being that these men would know the whereabouts of their constituents. Unfortunately the elected heads and village heads of the various clans did not have the knowledge with which Mr. Jansen credited them. Consequent census patrols to the area may find small numbers of people not included in the new books as a result of this.

Because of the lack of time general administration was at a minimum and only entailed the arbitrary settlement of three minor disputes at Bakoindu. Apart from these incidents the people were quite apathetic towards the patrol.

With reference to paragraph 5. of the instructions and paragraph 3 above, discussions could not be held with the people re. political, economic, social etc. developments in the area.

There were no N.M.F.A.s held at the Sub-district Office and hence no payments effected.

Subject: COUNCIL ELECTIONS, VILLAGE DIRECTORY.

1. The attitude of the people towards the elections appeared to be one of total apathy. The writer is of the opinion that this stems from the fact that the Luni Local Government Council is still in its infancy and the people still do not fully grasp the idea of the "how, when, where, why" aspect of it. It so happened that all councillors were elected unopposed and all but two of these were councillors re-instated from the previous council. The two new councillors elected replace a sick councillor and one who is at present in Australia on a Teachers' Training course. Had these two councillors been present then the writer is sure that they would have been re-instated. It would appear that a more intensive political education programme for this area is called for.

2. The people of the Luni were previously scattered throughout the division in 22 small hamlets and now with the rapidly developing Lujana and Dakoialu Resettlement schemes these hamlets have been all but deserted in preference for the Resettlement blocks. The recommended amendments to the Village Directory are listed below in alphabetical order:

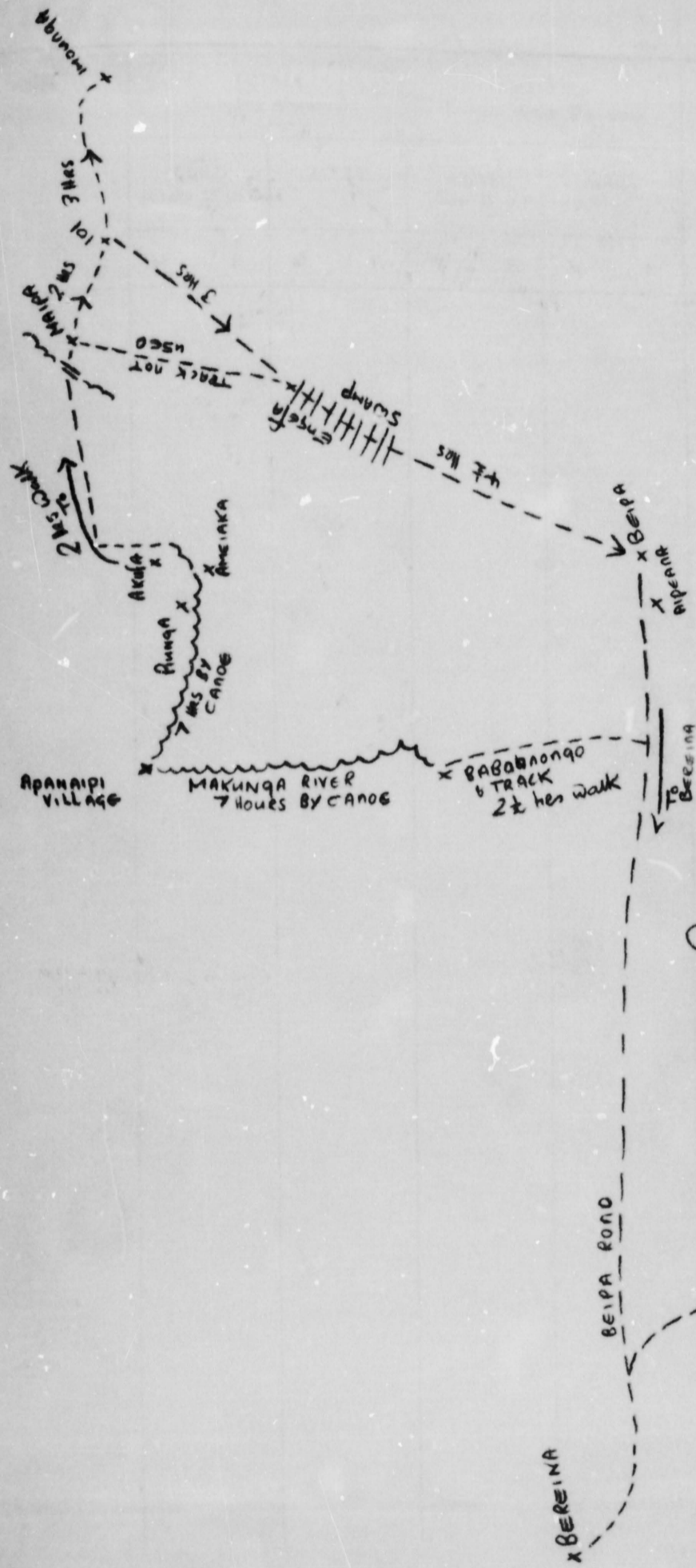


