1. INTRODUCTION:

Because of the short tile allowed for this retrol, due to other staif commitments, we were only able to complete part of the East Gogodala Census Division. By the end of the petrol 11 villages in the Census Division had been visited, this does not include 4 villages

the Gensus Division had been visited, this does not include twillages of the Bituri Census Division. In all these villages as much time as possible was given to explaining the work of the Local Government System, with emphasis placed on the activities of the Gogodala Council. As the patrol progres it became evident that the people knew very little about the work of Local Government Councils. This position will be mentioned later in the report.

S. MANTIVE APPAIES.

(a) Native Situation.

The native situation throughout the patral was satisfactory. Villages were generally clean and well kept. In most villages new and better houses were under construction, while at Pedeva and Pagona complete new villages are being built. At both these villages, the people were given advice on how to set out the village, so as to limit the dangers of fire spreading and engulfing

Throughout the patrol the Gogodala people confirmed the views of other officers as to their laziness. There seems no real effort by these people to improve in any way. This could possibly be due to apathy and lack of incentives.

(b) Local Government.

Due to staff shortages at Balimo, there has been theaded Local Government Patrol since October 1959. In this This perhaps explains, to some extent, the general lack of The the formation of the second an extended follow up patrol to rectify this position. the patrol

this position. A Local Government Survey was carried out in the following five villages of the Situri Census Division, Adurn, Tirlo, Baramura, Lewada and Dewara. Also a survey was carried out at Pagona (north bank Fly Kiver Village) in the Last Gogodala Census Division. All six villages seam to mave good potential, and should, if accepted become definite assets to the Coincil. Mr.Gleland will give a detaile tesult of the surveys carried out in all six villages in his report.

(c) Economic Fotential.

The natives of the East Gogodala area have very few resources from which they can gain economic advancement. Copra is the major plantation crop throughout the area. Although due to the lack of incentives to earn money, the copra in the area is not being fully exploited. The natives in the Porth tank fly region are faced with the problem of getting their and copra to Daru or Balimo. At the present time most if the copra is taken to Daru by cance, however this results in large quantities of copra being rulned by high seas and winds. The patrol was approached with this problem by all villages along the North bank fly River. Although as yet, no satisfactory answer to this problem has been found, it is hoped the new read from Balimo to Wasca will provide a solution.

solution. Where copie is not proving successful the actives are being encouraged to grow coffee. Throughout the patrol five coffee plots were inspected, four are shound pleasing results, one due to poor soil and lack of attention is becoming everyows with weeds. Although the coffee has not been planted long, results so far tend to point to coffee beaming a major crop in this next few years. The latives were given every bit of encouragment (s) contine to look after their plots, it is suggested that an officer of the bept of Agriculture visits they villages and explains to the natives, the right methods of cultivation and care for their coffee in these early right methods of cultivation and care for their coffee in these early In all villages were coffee is being grown, land registration was explained to the natives, and it is hoped to introduce a form of land registration for coffee in the near future.

(d) Judicial.

A few minor complaints were brought to the notice of the patrol. These, mainly conserned with husbands away at work who were not supporting their wifes and families in the villages, were all noted. When the patrol returned to the station letters were sent out to various District Officers esking them to contact the people concern-

ec. One major complaint was heard by the patrol, that being a land dispute between Waliams and Abersgerics villages. It appears that this has been a long standing dispute between the two villages and also between the Gogodala and Kiwai people. It is hoped that the two respective Concils can meet and reach a decision on this dispute.

(e) Finance and Taxation.

(1) Finance.

There were no financial matters dealt with by the patrol. (2) Taxation.

(2) Taxation. A total of f138/300. was collected for Concil Tax. However there are still a further 145 people to pay the start of viliages people paid their tax quite cheerfully, ever though most do not know what the morey is to be use for. In Segat as, Olona and kuba, an average of only four people paid tax. The rest of the tarable males were given exemptions due to unavoidable particultured plotuits, impossible for these people to earn money from agricultured plotuits, to hear that two of the villages, Kuba and Gagatans, incend to move to new sites in the near future, this will no doubt enhance prospects for earning more from agriculture and maxt year the percentage of people able to pay tax should increase. Throughout the patrol many exemptions were given by the Tax Tribunal due to unavoidable hardships.

4. AGRICULTURE AND LIVESTOCH

(a) Native Agriculture.

(a) Native Agriculture. All villages in this area have natives gardens. How-every vily three gardens were inspected, those at Waligi, Olona and Du, a, the gardens were in good order and well kept. The natives of the area take great price in their gardens. As already mentioned coffee is fast becoming an important crop throughout the area and I was pleased to see the natives taking taking interest in this new crop. However interest is lacking in Copre, mainly due to low prices and difficulty in transportation, because of this very little Copra is being produced in the area.

(b) Subsistence Crops.

Food crops grown are normal for this area. They include, Taro, sweet potato, pawpaw, bananas, etc. All these crops are grown in native gardens.

5. FORESTRY.

The villages of Balimo and Waligi are exploiting the timber in the area and have now experienced pitsaw teams, who are producing good class timber to sell to both the Government and Council.

FORESTRY. (CONT.)

In the large rain-forest regions along the Pedeya Creek there are good stands of timber, of all variaties.

6. MEDICAL AND HELLTH.

(a) General. The health of the natives throughout the patrol appeared to be generally good, with few difference evident to the laymons eye. As no Medical personnel accompanied the patrol a detailed medical report is not available. However Mr. F. Aisir, AMAC. recently did a patrol through the area and the results were very satisfactory.

Only one village visited had an Aid Post, this was at Ouwaba. The N.M.O. at Duwaba is to be highly commended, as he has rept this village very clean and tidy, and he has also introduced canitation to the villagers.

(c) Sanitation and Hygiene. The absence of sanitation in the area is very conspic-uous. Only one village visited had latrines for the use of the people uous. Only one village visited had latrines for the use of the people this was at Duwaba, and even here they are not proving successful due to the high water table. It has been found that pit latrines are unsuccessful throughout the area because of this high water table, which covers the whole area. So until a more suitable form of X sanitation can be found, the people of the area have no other alternative than to use the bush.

7. EDUCATION.

Most of the villages visited had local village schools, at which all the younger children attended. These schools are all in charge of Mission Pastors from the U.F.M. Mission. The majority of theolder children in the area attend schools at Balimo (Missionand

theoider childred in the area attend schools at Barrao (Histonand Government) and Teopopo (government). At Wallama a complaint was received from the village school at Teopopo. This was looked into when the patrol returned to Ealimo and it appears the reason for the children being sent home, was due to staff shortages at the school.

8. VILLAGES AND VILLAGE OFFICIALS.

Most villages visited were clean and tidy, in all a pleasant sight to see. New houses were under construction, and the general lay out of villages was 2.00. In all the villages provided

very satisfactory picture. (b) Village Officials.

(b) Village Officials. All villages visited except those of the Bituri Census Division, have Local Government Councilors. All Councilors appearate do and a good job, although actions on the conclust appearate do not have the full some app not laders in their villages, and do not have the full backing of the village people. It became clear to me that the present electrol divisions will have to be reviewed before the next elections as villages have become larger, and where one Councilor Locks after two or more villages, the job is becoming to difficult for one man to handle. This mobiles particully to Maliama and Kawiagu where it take sometimes two of three hours to go from one village to the other by cance, this is due to rough weather on the Fly River.

2. ROADS AND WATERWAYS.

As this patrol was carried out in the wet season, all tracks were inundated with water and walking conditions were then

tracks were inundated with water and walking conditions were the fore adverse. (a) Waterways. The Pedeya, navigable only by cance, was flowing very swiftly, and there was a great quantity of water in the creek. Cance travel up the creek at this time of the year is therefore very slow.

10. CENSUS AND VITAL STATISTICS.

(a) General.

Inall villages the Census taking was achieved without incident. The village people people co-operated fully with the efficer carring out the Census. (b) Vital Statistics.

All vital statistics will be forwarded with Mr. Glelards report. They will show a large number of able bodied wen in the will villages, as there has been no recruiting in this area for a number of years.

11. MISSIONS.

The Mission in this area is the Unevangelised Field Mission. The U.F.M. has done a considerable amount of work through-out the area. They run large schools at Balimo and Wasua, togother with all village schools. The Mission headquarters at Wasua were visited, this is situated on the North Bank of the Fly River and is mainly concerned with administration work. They are 20 Buropeans at Wasua. The other Mission station is at Balimo, this is a large centre with a school and hospital for the use of the mative people.

12. CARTOGRAPHY.

A map will be forwarded with Mr. Clelands report.

13. CONCLUSION.

Although the patrol was limited in time it gave ze valuable experience, as this was my first patrol in the Territory. It has given as greater knowledge on how to handle the natives of the area. The patrol achieved all its aims.

This Patrol was completed on the 12th June, 1961 and the report arrived here on the 9th October, 1961 - hardly good enough.

The staff position in the Hillar has been very good for some time in the past and the Sub District is not that big.

You could consider having observerfree All at Council meetings which might well be conincted at the main population centres. There is nothing like seeing what goes on.

The Council newspaper could well be used to note progress, if any, to the people.

Training classes should have been carried out initially directly after the first elections. In fact, annual Tax Payers meetings ought to be neld throughout the area and so would allow the opportunity to foster constructive criticism.

Committee systems are only introduced when the people have a good ides of the function of area administration. This report indicates they have not yet reached that stage.

Patrol Reports are not vehicles for executive action. Please submit your recommeniation regarding electoral re-distribution if you so decide.

There are other areas with less aconomic potential than that of Boliss.

I am pleased to note that Mr. O'Connor is maintaining his standard of work and reporting, but I regret that his lete submission makes it of but academic interest.

Mr.0'Connor has written a lucid report on mineteen days conscientiously carried out patrolling.

<u>Native Affairs</u>: The situation as found by Mr.0'Connor is not I think uncommon in the first years of a Council. It has clearly been aggravated by lack of contact. However, with Mr.0'Connor now on full-time Council supervision, the position has already improved immensely.

<u>Economic Development:</u> The Co-operative store, although long moded is still non-operative. However, definite plans have now been made to visit villages and explain the system and collect contributions. I hope to have enough capital to start the enterprise within a month from now.

Mr.0'Connor has already been advised by the District Agricultural Officer, that bambogs are most unsuitable coffee shade.

<u>Gensus</u>: Mr.O'Connor himself censused Kanalia on a subsequent visit to the North Bonk. He has included the Kenaila figures in the figures for the Division.

Texation: Prosecutions for failure to pay tex are still proceeding - about 80 men having been gaoled already. Late this year, the Council will contact all absentees by circular letter in an endeayour to increase its income.

Mative Labour: The present system of close co-operation between British New Guines D.velopment Company and this office is at last keeping the numbers of absentees per village down to a reasonable level.

The objects of this patrol are as follows:

2. Compilation of statistics on absentee labourers as per the pro forma I will explain to you.

3. Compilation of a Council Tax Register on the new sheets. Include all women who are eligible for exemption under Regulations 86 and 86A of the Native Local Government Council Regulations. For each village, calculate the tex potential. Taham ToLitur will assist you in this.

4. Compilation of a register of Shotguns showing the name of owner, make of gun and number, condition of gun and when the S.A.P. is due.

5. Explanation in simple terms of the economics of price rise and fall on world markets, and that falling prices should be an incentive to greater production.

6. Explanation of the broad meaning of "development" and how it must proceed slowly, according to facilities Gogodala Council is a relatively poor one, so cannot hope to emulate the efforts of some of the Councils in other parts. The way to rapid development lies in vastly increased cash drop production.

7. Encouragement by every means possible the production of more copra. This years production has been less than one twentieth of the production for the first six months of 1960. Those vil ages with leaking druns in Hot Air Driers should be encouraged to use them still. If their copra is graded "smoke", they will culy lose 3/6 on an everage bag.. They have been told many times that leaking drums are no excuse for non-production.

8. Clarification of duties of each Village Committees. Take a record of their names and try 's get the real leaders into it. The committees should also include at least one woman.

9; Clarification of the KAKAP-MURUNI electorate. These two villages have different origins. You may find it necessary to recomment that the electorate be split into two parts.

10. Clarification of any complaints and enquiries which may arise from village to village.

11. Investigation (poliminary only) of a site on the South Bank of the Aramia River for the new Aketa school.

12. Make mention in sach village of the Land Registration scheme as evolved in the Higaturu Council area (see Local Government Bulletin No. 12). It would be very wise to introduct a similar scheme for all future coffee and cocorut plantings.

Please arrange your patrol programme so that you will be here for the Council meeting of 7th June.

Your patrol will be accompanied by the Council Tax team who will collect tax in each village. Assist them whenswir peakible.

The sconomics of write rise and fell and the small difference in price between hot air and smake corrwere explained but, I think, did not fell on receptive ears. The fact remains that there was no inclination to produce cours of any kind for any price. If 25 a bag was offered, I doubt very much if it would stimulate much production.

While on the subject of copra, it was been that many trees, otherwise mature, were not bearing at did well. Leaves were yel owed and it is felt that some remedial action is necessary. Considerable thinning of palms is also necessary. It was a pity that the District Agricultural Officer was not able to accompany the patrel as originally planned. There seems to be plenty of work in the area for a trained Agricultural Officer.

On the subject of coffee, there is little to record. Some villages have planted coffee. Others are planting to do so. Another, MATAP, made a plea for coffee. An inspection of their capabilities should be carried cut by the Council Agricultural Assistant.

Several large clumps of bamboos were noticed on high ground near KOTALE. It occurred to me that, properly thinned out, these could provide a suitable shade for coffice. Perhaps the District lightcultural Officer could com ent on this.

Grocodile skins provide a very hucrafive source of income for villages farmer u river. At present at the end of the wet season, businers is alar but many villages, perticularly halaf and inflWA, are making active preparations for the season with the aid and encouragement of Mr. Graig of Daru, who has maniped to buy said and gurchase all their skins. Mr. Graig, who also operates a store on his bact, is providing an incertive for these up river people to go into business in a big way and I would not be aurprised to see a consider the smount of money flowing into the area. The entineigs m is something that has to be seen to be believed. In FIKIWA, it is unique in my experience.

In accordance with pars. 3 of the patrol instructions, the potential for each village was calculated. This size gives some indication of the abounts outstanding and the amounts due from industored labourers. The results of this survey vill be found in Appendix "C".

ROADS, BRIDGAS AND WATERWAYS.

The principal means of travel on the patrol was by outboard motor powered double cance. The main waterway we the framic fiver which is of considerable size. Addons to wany villages is by mail, weed that et onannels. However, travelsing by this means is fast and outs confortable.

The rears from Salimo to AUGONO and TAL are, at precent, under construction. There is little difficulty involved apart from the shortage of labour.

Inter-viilinge tracks, is so par as they exist. are clean and well kept. As, the primary mode of the ver is wy dense, these tracks are rerely used.

The Anzani ' outboard motor performed very well giving little treads. Howver, this whit is ageing and definite signs of were are appearing. It is suggested that the engine be given a thorough overhout as does as possible.

HEALTH AND HYGINME.

I personal discussed this matter with the Medical Assistant and he incomed we that an Orderly is the toke posted to ALI. It is also proposed that one of the Council's first wells should be installed at ALI. This will have the two-old effect of improving the village water supply and assuring the people that the Council has not forgetten them.

The hygicale cituation in all villages was adequate without being outstandingly good. Villages consist mainly of a long house with latrines on the outstris. Fisl and TAI have changed their traditional housing pattern and the people now occess challer houses. These are rarely as well constructed as the long houses and certainly do not give the protection against mosquitces. Most long houses are in rather decrepit state but pleas are usual y in head for rebuilding, and, in some cases, actual progress has been made. Tillages ware cuite clean and it appears that village cleaning is a regular weekly practice under Council Bules.

MISSICHS.

The only minimum in the eres is the Usavengelised Field Mission at AWABA. At this at then, there is a European starf of four with more caming in the nermal future. The Mission, besides carrying on its normal religious functions, conducts a large school, a small but busy hospital and shult encention classes for women. These services are all very popular and the majority of the 600 children attending Mistinn school are at AUEA.

The station itself is in a plasmant position on a high bank of the Arasia River. It has been considerably improved and Eurther building of a memipermanent inture is being carried out to house the extra European stark. It is hoped to commence teacher training at AWARA very shortly.

EDUCATION.

As will be seen in the consus figures, the equilibran position is very satisfactory. Over 600 children at end mis for schools at Balino and Awaba whence some areduate to Administration schools at Balino and AKETA. Fore than 100 children attand Administration schools. Some 60 of these are at AKETA, the rest at Balino.

Under the accelerated education programme, the Balino school is to be considerably expended and it is boyed that the AKETA actool will also be included. Without any doubt, the demand for education facilities is considerable sithough difficulties have been experienced in obtaining the cooperation of parents.

With regard to the new site for the AKETA school, two sites were examined on the South bank of the armin River, one one each side of the DADI dreek. Both of these are considered suitable. They will provide space for playing fields to well as for class rooms and dormitories. However, they will limit the size of the school. Co the other hand, the AKETA people are telking of moving and, if ther do so, the existing site, with the playing field on the adjoining rigge, would probably be more cuitable.

CENSUS.

Particularly noticeable is the emeant not paid by absented isbourers estimated at over 0750 for this concus division alone. MARIVIS LABOUR.

In as ordence with perc. 2 of your instructions, statistics of to absentee isbourers were complete in addition to those shown in the Village Population Resistor.

Apart Trons faw villages, the labour position is dute good. The exceptions are TAI, DEGGSO, DAIL ARETA and PISI all of which have more than 50% of able bodied nen obsent. The extreme case is TAI with 90% ebsent. It is impossible for a village to carry of the three young men and holt a dogen old ones. Borearline cases are KOTALS, FILIWA, ISAGU, and ADISA all with more than 40% ebsent.

It seems a pity that such gross overrecruiting is permissible. I cannot be convinced that recruits who would recruit to that extent have any respect or consideration for the people they claim to benefit.

CONCLUSIONAL

Although the patrol was interrapted twice and we limited to a fixed time by other circumstances, I am quite activited with the result. As I will be taking over the Council shortly, it gave a valuable instant into the observators and attitudes of the people. I attempted to stimulate copre production as well as intervations even aritican of the Council. As for chulte, only time will show.

All objects of the patrol were accomplished.




