H. E. VAN SURDAM

Noted Young Tenor Will Be Heard at Tent City, Beginning August 14

H. E. Van Surdam, the tenor, who is already well known to many patrons of music in Coronado and San Diego, has been secured by Director Pallma to fill an engagement with the Coronado Tent City band, his initial appearance to be



August 14. For some time past Mr. Van Surdam has been conductor of the El Paso Symphony orchestra, and also has had charge of the music of the Texas Grand theatre, the Crawford theatre, and the Hotel Paso del Norte, of that city.

The musical column of the El Paso Times of August 1 has the following: "H. E. Van Surdam, born and educated in America, studied piano at the Troy Conservatory of Music, clarinet with E. S. Thornton and Tony Quitsow, and voice under Hugh Allan, Oscar Saenger, Miss Cora Remington and Italo Picchi. He will leave this week to fill a three-week s engagement on the Pacific coast—one week at the Hotel del Coronado and two weeks at Coronado Tent City with the famous Tent City band, under the direction of Frank Pallma. He was with this band as clarinetist during the seasons of 1906, 1907 and 1909.

"Mr. Van Surdam has traveled over the entire country, from coast to coast, with concert bands, and is well known in artistic circles here; in fact, he may be said to be the musical life of El Paso. He is the organizer and leader of the El Paso Symphony orchestra, and recently procured for the music lovers of our city a rare treat in the recital given by Hugh Allan."

Referring to Mr. Van Surdam's singing on the occasion above mentioned, the Times said: "Mr. Van Surdam exhibited a tenor voice of great purity of tone and is to be congratulated upon his easy delivery."


