Ponchak Jumps From Gridiron To Rostrum

With almost a touch of daintiness, he wields a light baton, directing his men through the measures of musical numbers ranging from the most difficult classics to roaring renditions of "Tiger Rag."

If Bandmaster J. G. Ponchak displays an additional bit of enthusiasm when members of the Naval Training station band swing into a medley of football songs, it readily is understandable. Those tunes bring back memories of the days when he was called "Hunke" Ponchak.

The husky chief petty officer, a veteran of more than 20 years in the navy, was a public figure long before he began receiving recognition in the entertainment field as bandmaster. Back in the 1920's he was known wherever service football was played, for "Hunke" still is listed among the greats in fleet grid competition.

PLAYED 12 YEARS

Particularly, are his football feats recalled in San Diego and San Pedro, because it was on the west coast that he performed with the championship Submarine Divisions teams of years gone by. Ponchak began playing with navy teams when he enlisted in 1920, and for 12 seasons he roamed the gridirons of both the Atlantic and Pacific coasts.

The 200-pound musician played for the Newport, R.I., Training station, for the U.S.S. Camden, for the Hospital Corps Training school at Mare Island, and, finally, 1925, for the Submarines. He was with the Subs when they won championships in 1925 and 1926, then returned to Newport to captain and quarterback that outfit to victory in eliminations for the coveted President's Cup, emblematic of grid supremacy in the navy.

HAMILTON'S TEAMMATE

That was during the season of 1928, and playing in the same backfield was the sensational Tom Hamilton, just out of the Naval academy, who later was to coach the West Coast Navy, and subsequently, be called back as pach at Annapolis.

The hard-hitting Ponchak, a veritable powerhouse, provided the offensive power for the championship Sub elevens of 1929, 1930 and 1931. In 1932, when Hamilton, then a lieutenant, organized the West Coast Navy aggregation, Ponchak was one of the first to respond, but the years of hard competition had taken their toll, and injuries final forced him to lay the aside.
