Mr. Tebbetts, of the Exchange Hotel, and Dr. Painter, Dep'y Post Master, will please accept our thanks for files of San Francisco papers. We are also under obligations to Chas. R. Johnson, Esq., for late New York papers.

Bvt. Capt. N. Lyon, in charge of the Quarter Master's Depot, at this post, has furnished us with a highly interesting sketch of his recent trip to the Gila and Colorado, in search of a new route for the transportation of Subsistence Stores for the troops stationed at that point. We shall publish it next week.

We have received a communication from our esteemed friend, Judge Herashty, which we shall try to find room for as soon as possible.

The steamer *Conside* will leave this day for San Francisco. Capt. Theodore Green goes up in her as pilot.

**ANOTHER CUBAN EXPEDITION.**—It would appear from the following, which we cut from the *New York Tribune* of 26th April, that the administration have commenced making asses of themselves again, as in the affair of the late Cuban expedition. The Spanish government have spies in all the principal sea ports of the Atlantic States, and no vessel can be fitted out and dispatched on a trading expedition, whose destination is not generally known, without being reported at Washington, and a search ordered by the government before the vessel can proceed to sea.

Suppose, for instance, that the stock of Potatoes in New York market was limited, and some old "codger," anticipating a rise in price, should fit out a clipper schooner with casks, boxes &c. to go to *Nova Scotia* for a cargo of the favorite esculent of the sons of the Emerald Isle. Just as the vessel is ready to sail one of these Spanish spies comes prowling about, and seeing the empty casks and boxes on deck, his imagination immediately fills the former with desperate, blood-thirsty yankees, bound on the charitable errand of freeing poor oppressed Cuba from the Spanish yoke, and the latter mceily stowed with muskets and ammunition! Away he flies to the U. S. Marshal, (who may also be in the employ of some of these Spanish emissaries,) and reports another Cuban expedition on foot. The result is, the vessel is stopped, and although potatoes *is rizer*, the dander of the proprietor of the expedition *is rizer*.

But seriously, Cuba is bound to gain her independence, and all that the administration may do, either legally or illegally cannot prevent it. And it will be before two years:

**THE ALLEGED CUBAN EXPEDITION.**—The *Cleopatra* lies at the south side of pier foot of North Moore-st. She is a large boat, about 14 years old, and was employed as a Sound boat, to which she proved herself well adapted. She has a large quantity of coal on board, (we understand 250 tons were ordered,) occupying the forward cabin and hold, boiler rooms, and a quantity piled on the forward deck. She has also on board a great number of large empty casks, which now stand on end, the whole capable of containing probably some 7,000 gallons of water. She looks rough, and not newly painted, nor has any thing been done to her to give her any different appearance from an ordinary sound or river boat. The water casks, &c., we understand, were ordered by Capt. Wilson, who claims to command her. She was alleged to be bound to Galveston, Texas. There were some sugar boxes &c. on board, such as fire-arms are usually packed in, but on examining them they were found to contain hams and other articles. No fire-arms or munitions of war have been found on board. The U. S. Marshal has not taken possession of her, but she has been ordered, until further directions, not to leave the port, and a watch has been set near her to prevent her leaving, should she attempt to do so. The engineers and crew are on board, the latter sweeping decks and working about as usual.

**THE MAIL STEAMERS.**—It is a great inconvenience to the people here that we can calculate on no particular day for the arrival of the U. S. Mail Steamers from Panama, and unless our post master makes up his mails two days in advance, there is an even chance of their being left. This was the case last Friday, when the *Panama* arrived two days before her usual time. The only remedy we have is to petition the department to allow an extra mail to be sent by the steamer *Ohio*, which boat makes a trip every two weeks between here and San Francisco, touching at all the ports along the coast. This is not now permitted in consequence of recent instructions from the Post Master General.

Bvt. Capt. Harcastle, Corps of Topographical Engineers, in charge of the Boundary Commission on the Pacific, is now about finishing the work on this end of the line. All the monuments designating the boundary between this point and the Gila River, have been placed, and Capt H. is now erecting the splendid white marble monument at the initial point. A great portion of the most laborious and active duty connected with this work has devolved upon this accomplished officer and he has acquitted himself in a manner alike creditable to himself and the profession which he adorns.

## PLEASANT ROUTE TO AND FROM CALIFORNIA.—

We see by an advertisement in a Mexican paper that an Express Line has been established through *Mexico* for the transportation of passengers, which goes through from *Acapulco* to *Vera Cruz* in 18 days. The greater part of the distance is covered by waggons—the balance on horses or mules. Fare through, 45\$.

Passengers who take their tickets to go from one to the other of the ports, will be allowed to remain as long as they like in Mexico, either to rest, or to see the city. To persons returning to the Atlantic States, from California, at this season of the year, when the roads across the *Isthmus* are in such a horrid condition, this route is decidedly preferable, besides the advantage of traveling through one of the most beautiful and picturesque countries on the face of the globe. The supreme government of Mexico have not only established a guard upon this road, but have allowed this company to completely arm all the persons in their employ.

For persons going to any of the Southern States, who are obliged to land at New Orleans, this route is not only the most *expeditious*, but decidedly the *cheapest*. There is a semi-monthly line of steamers running regularly from *Vera Cruz* to New Orleans, besides an English steamer running up and down the coast which will take passengers to *Chagres* to meet the steamers bound to Havana and New York.

We have conversed with several gentlemen who came through *Mexico* by this route, and they are unanimous in proclaiming it the most delightful route they ever traveled.

The Monterey correspondent of the *Alta*, says, "the geographical position of Monterey, her noble harbor," &c., &c. This is the first time we ever heard of an *open bay* being called a harbor. Monterey is, without doubt, the most picturesque town in all California, but the idea that it is a harbor, is certainly laughable. There is but one harbor on the Pacific Coast between San Francisco and Acapulco, in Mexico, and that is San Diego; and it is the only point in that whole extent of coast where a large commercial town can be built up.

### Whig State Convention.

The Whig State Convention assembled at San Francisco, have made the following nominations: For Governor—Maj. P. B. Reading, For Lt. Governor—D. P. Baldwin. For Congress—E. J. C. Kewen, B. F. Moore. The San Francisco *Herald* containing the other nominations, was taken from our table before we had copied the names. We will give them next week.

We observe a card in the *Oregon Spectator* signed by nine married and single ladies—passengers on the steamer *Columbia*, from San Francisco to Oregon, in which they "avail themselves of the occasion to express their admiration of the professional skill of Capt. Leroy"—and they further say that they "witnessed with satisfaction the precision and vigilance with which the machinery has been worked," &c., &c. We should not be surprised, after this, to see cards published by the lady passengers on our Panama steamers, certifying to the build and rig of the ships—setting forth their peculiar models in reference to sailing qualities, mode of fastening &c., and perhaps stating whether the ship has a *clean run*, *round stern*, or *high transom*, and perhaps go into an investigation as to whether she has any barnacles on her bottom.

This fashion of publishing a card to the captain of every steamer, in which one crosses a bay without running aground or being blown up, is absurd and silly in the extreme, and we hope to see sensible captains object to having any such testimonials addressed to them through the public prints. The system has got to be a perfect humbug, and any one who has traveled much in the United States knows how these things are gotten up. The prime cost of most of these cards, is usually a dozen bottles of champagne at dinner, the day before the ship's arrival in port.

We are just informed by a gentleman from Los Angeles, that Irving and his party, who were supposed to have committed several depredations about Los Angeles, and of whom the sheriff of that county was in pursuit, have been killed by the Indians in the neighborhood of "Cahoon Pass," near the Rancho del Chino. It is believed that their conduct at the Rancho de the Lugos, caused the attack on the part of these Rancho Indians.

It is supposed that there were eleven of the party besides Irving.

The steamer *Conside*, Appleby, arrived at this port on Wednesday, 28th ult., from Havre, via Panama and Acapulco, having been out 270 days. She has a large freight of merchandise, consigned to V. Marziou & Co., San Francisco, and will proceed on her voyage as soon as they can get coal on board. The captain, John Duncan, died on the 27th of April—soon after leaving Acapulco. The vessel is in command of the mate.

The report of this vessel, in our last number, was incorrect in several essential particulars.

WM. LYON MACKENZIE, who took the lead in the attempted revolution in Canada in 1837-8—was charged with high treason, and had to leave the Province, has returned there and has been elected to represent the county of Haldeman in the Parliament of the United Provinces of Canada. Mackenzie was once before elected to the Canadian Parliament, but was expelled from his seat. This was before the rebellion.

**MORE BANKS.**—Eight new Banks are projected in New York, which, if they all get into operation, will increase the banking capital of the city about \$7,000,000.

**NEW STEAMER.**—A propeller, of thirteen hundred tons burthen, is in process of construction, to run between Charleston, S. C. and Liverpool. She is to be followed by others of the same class.

James Allen, who was reported as killed in the Squatter war at Sacramento City, is now living at home, in Ray county in this State. At the time of the desperate fight between the squatters and the sheriff's posse in his house there, in which the sheriff and several others perished, Allen's son was killed, Mrs. Allen fainted away on her sick bed and never came to, and Allen escaped from the house with one arm mutilated, and several shots in his body. He was traced to the river by his blood and supposed to have perished there. But after extraordinary adventures and incredible sufferings, he finally got out of the country, abandoning his property and negroes.

This intelligence will be quite astounding to many persons in California, who had numbered Mr. Allen with the dead.—*St. Louis Rep.*

**THE UNITED STATES SENATE.**—But three vacancies now exist in this body, one each in Connecticut, California and Tennessee, all of the class of 1857. The terms of 22 Senators expire in 1853; 19 in 1855; and 21 terms are vacated in 1857. The Whigs have 22 Senators; regular Free Soilers 3; regular Opposition 20; Secession or "Southern Rights" ditto, 8; Locos who were elected from Whig States, or made Whig pledges, &c., 4. Besides this, Whitcomb of Indiana, and Shields of Illinois, were elected by the Free Soil balance of power over the Locos. They have since generally acted with the Locos, having disregarded their pledges to adhere to the Free Soil organization. This political analysis (including the vacancies) makes up the entire Senate, consisting of 62 members.—*N. Y. Tribune.*

**GEORGIA.**—The Hon. A. H. Stephens declines running as the "Union" candidate for Governor, and names Hon. Howell Cobb as the proper man.
