

"As interim director, Dr. Berger brought vision and a high level of energy to Scripps Institution of Oceanography, and I am confident that he will do the same for the CalSpace Institute," said Chancellor Dynes.

CASS APPOINTS NEW ASSOCIATE DIRECTOR

Dr. James L. Matteson, husband of Oceanid Laura R. Norris, was recently appointed Associate Director of Operations for the Center for Astrophysics and Space Sciences (CASS). Dr. Matteson earned his Ph.D. at UCSD in 1971 and is a Research Physicist. His specialty is X-Ray and Gamma-Ray Astronomy. His thesis was about the black hole — Cygnus X-1, the X-ray source in the constellation Cygnus.

Dr. Matteson is an experimental research physicist and some of his experiments have been on Apollo and the Space Shuttle. He is currently working on INTEGRAL (International Gamma-Ray Astrophysics Laboratory) which will be launched into space in 2002.

SIO OCEANOGRAPHER WINS PRESTIGIOUS HUNTSMAN AWARD

The "Huntsman" annually recognizes excellence in research and those who have made a significant influence on the course of marine scientific thought. Awarded by the Bedford Institute of Oceanography in Canada, the 1997 winner is UCSD's Scripps Institution of Oceanography professor Russ Davis.

Davis has made significant contributions to the development of observational and theoretical tools for the exploration of the large-scale ocean circulation. He joined SIO in

CASS ASTROPHYSICISTS STUNNED BY "STARBURST GALAXY"

The astronomy team probing activities of a pair of colliding galaxies has been startled to discover a resulting nest of extremely powerful supernova explosions — the most powerful ever observed!

Harding Smith, professor of physics at the Center for Astrophysics & Space Sciences (CASS) at UCSD says, "...I was stunned.... within the group of people working on star formation and infrared emission of galaxies, this is a startling result..."

For about a decade, astrophysicists have been debating the amount of energy released when galaxies collide. These so-called "ultraluminous infrared galaxies" were first discovered during NASA's Infrared Astronomical Satellite mission. Two of these massive stars are exploding each year in the merging galaxy known as ARP 220. Due to the dense clouds of dust and gas from these collisions, astronomers tuned into radio waves capable of passing through the thick dust without obstruction.

The images acquired reveal about a dozen extremely powerful supernovae exploding in the vicinity of one of the nuclei. Results support the "starburst" model over the quasar theory, and now there is some wonder if there might exist two separate classes of intensely lit galaxies, or if there might be some evolutionary relationship between the two.

Since supernovae normally produce more energy in one explosion than our sun will generate in its lifetime the energy produces such a glow that it outshines an entire galaxy of hundreds of billions of stars.

Future observations will follow and should be enhanced by a new infrared camera and spectrometer developed at UCSD for the Keck telescope.





FRIENDS OF THE LA JOLLA SYMPHONY AND CHORUS




