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UCSD FIESTA DE LA GENTE May 23-24

For many years several people of the UCSD community have been concerned about the gap between the San Diego community and the University of California at San Diego. These communities frequently interact when involved in touchy political or social issues, but seldom does the University attempt to involve the public in a fun activity at UCSD. Finally a campus group decided the time had come!

The idea was generated by a student suggesting a campus-wide Mardi Gras and was tossed around first transformed into an Old-Fashioned Renaissance Fair, and then suddenly the realization that this would lend itself to San Diego's 200th Anniversary if it ran along a fiesta theme. Realizing that the public should be invited, we dedicated the name to all of San Diego, its visitors, and the University by naming it "Fiesta de la Gente, " translated to mean "Celebration of/for the People."

We sincerely hope that this may serve as an opportunity to have a fun, pleasurable and lively afternoon, as well as to create better bonds of understanding between the University and the community.

OCEANID EXHIBITS

Spring breezes are expected through the pleasant grassy spaces near Revelle Plaza on Saturday May 24, from one until five, when the OCEANIDS will present as their contribution to "Fiesta de la Gente" an annual art show to be called "Variodades Kineticas". In the past entries have generally included only ceramics and paintings to be displayed and/or sold. To more fully involve all the campus community (students and all employee families are eligible) three new juried classes were made with particular emphasis on providing an opportunity for people to create in a varied number of ways works to be displayed out-of-doors.

The three new classes which should be especially enhanced by breezes, space and trees are as follows: (1) Kites (2) Banners (3) Structural Sculpture.

The non-juried classes will be "Gallery of Images" for people within the university community who have paintings, collages, or prints to display/sell and "Marketplace" for display/sale of ceramics and other crafts. The latter class is also open to those who have demonstrations of craft skills to present.

FOUR AT UCSD WIN GUGGENHEIMS

Four professors at UCSD have been awarded Guggenheim Fellowships. They are Sacvan Bercovitch and Frederic R. Jameson, both of the Department of Literature; Richard H. Popkin, Philosophy; and Per F. Scholander, Scripps Institution of Oceanography.

The 1969 Guggenheim awards, which went to some 270 scholars and persons associated with the creative arts, totaled over two million dollars. Of the 66 colleges and universities represented on the fellowship list, UCSD is the smallest and youngest.

Established nearly a half century ago, the John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation makes its grants to persons who have demonstrated outstanding ability or potential in areas of scholarly research or the creative arts.

VICE CHANCELLOR JOHNSON

Herman D. Johnson, serving as Acting Vice Chancellor - Administration for the UCSD for the past seven months, has been named Vice Chancellor - Business and Finance, by the University Board of Regents.

Johnson, former Budget and Accounting Officer for UCSD, was named assistant to then Vice Chancellor Robert H. Biron in March 1966, with direct responsibility for budget development, accounting operations, and research contract and grant administration. He was named Acting Vice Chancellor to fill thevacancy left by Biron who resigned June 30, 1968.

UCSD Chancellor William J. McGill called Johnson a "very fine, technically competent member of the administrative team." He said that since UCSD has an annual operating budget of \$70 to \$75 million it is "mandatory that we have a man of Johnson's caliber to ensure fiscal integrity and build good relations with the business community. "

MAY LUNCHEON AND MEMBERSHIP MEETING

UNIVERSITY EXTENSION URBAN CENTER

The problems of San Diego's 160,000 minority persons are various and great. To use the resources of UCSD in solving them, University Extension's Urban Affairs Department established an Urban Center to bring to the people a variety of services and educational opportunities which have been difficult to offer before. The Urban Center, located at 3004 Imperial Avenue, San Diego, was opened March 29.

University Extension is working with the following groups: Economic Opportunity Commission, Neighborhood House, Head Start, MAYA, Citizens Interracial Committee, Citizens United for Racial Equality, Urban Coalition, Linda Vista Service Center, Urban League, Self Help Through Neighborhood Leadership, Model Cities, Western Behavioral Sciences Institute, Department of City Planning, American Institute of Architects, Chicano Federation, San Diego Housing, area schools and colleges and other community action groups.

Some of the programs of the new Center are:

I. A Study Center offering special courses in consumer education, small business administration, child growth and development, nutrition and a continuation of the Educational Opportunity Program. Volunteer teachers and students from San Diego city schools and colleges will supplement the University Extension staff.

II. A Design Center, staffed by volunteer members of the American Institute of Architects, Department of City Planning, landscape architects and San Diego Housing, to offer ghetto residents information on the hows and whys of changing their physical environment and give free training in drafting. They advise citizens what to expect from the city, landlord and mortgage holder.

III. The Center serves as meeting place for community groups, college and university faculty and other involved group representatives to discuss community problems.

IV. A Community Crisis Center to provide, with the help of area churches, lawyers, doctors and various community groups, emergency food, clothing, legal/ medical counseling and transportation for the San Diego community. This is being done in cooperation with the San Diego State College School of Social Work.

V. The Educational Opportunities Careers Program will train southeast San Diego students for careers in social welfare organizations.

VI. Oficina de Asuntos Mexico Americanos de San Diego -- a proposed Urban Center in the southernmost part of San Diego where there is a large population of Mexican-Americans.

Some future programs of the Center are now in the planning stage: English as a second language, political awareness and leadership, tutorial programs and "High Potentials," a program to use Mexican-American teachers and students to teach special courses in Mexican and Mexican-American history.

PEOPLE TO PEOPLE PREPARING FOR VISIT

On May 5, faculty and students from the Escuela Superior de Ciencias Marinas, Universidad Autonoma de Baja California will observe their Cinco de Maya holiday visit at SIO and Fisheries-Oceanography. The wives will be entertained by People to People and Mrs. Nierenberg will serve coffee to start the day. At this time an honorary membership in OCEANIDS will be presented by Rosalie Weinberger, president of OCEANIDS. From there, the women will visit the Museum of Man's special exhibit on Mexican Art prepared with the Mexican Council on Tourism, then will tour Old Town which will have been reconstructed to resemble its appearance 200 years ago.

A meal is being planned to include the visitors and local persons interested in the exchange program. Sam Hinton will entertain. An added feature at the end of the scientific day will be a soccer game between teams of the respective schools.

UCSD AND THE "MEET THE SCIENTIST" PROGRAM

One of San Diego's most successful "Town and Gown" projects is the "Meet the Scientist" lecture series sponored by the Greater San Diego Industry-Education Council. The program originated in 1958 with the Scripps Institution of Oceanography and General Atomics furnishing the lecturers. This series for students in junior, senior high and junior colleges is designed to bring the young people in contact with the many scientists and mathematicians working in the area, and to close the gap between the related subject matter in the school texts and the current working knowledge. The speakers donate their services and the Associates for Contemporary San Diego act as coordinator and handle the details necessary for arranging the presentation of the lectures.

Mrs. William A. Nierenberg has chaired the committee handling this responsibility and reports that Two Hundred and Twenty Six "Meet the Scientist Lectures" have been scheduled for the schools this year. Nineteen sources in San Diego have supplied the speakers.

Our campus has been most cooperative and a vote of appreciation is in order to all members of our UCSD family who have participated in this program in the past. PROGRAM UCSD FIESTA DE LA GENTE May 23-24



Bonfire:

The burning of "El Viejo Prejuicio" will take place at 7:30, Friday, May 23, in a cleared area east of the Gym. The Fiesta Queen, the girl winner of the Beauty and the Beast contest, will light the bonfire structure at 7:30, P.M., thus signifying the beginning of the Fiesta de la Gente. There will possibly be, at the time of the burning of the bonfire, a presentation by a drama group in line with the theme of the bonfire, prejudice. Basically, the idea is to burn the huge structure, which is to be built at a "Happening" the preceding week, to symbolize the burning of one's frustrations and prejudice, thus ensuring a worthwhile Fiesta experience for all. The University Folk Dancers will lead a Mexican Ring dance around the fire. Only the general UCSD community is invited to this activity. After the bonfire has burned to completion, approximately 1 hour, there will be a plaza dance in the Revelle Plaza. Plaza Dance:

This campus-wide event is to begin about 8:30 in the Revelle Plaza. We plan to have both a Mexican band and a local rock group supplying music. Decorations include a huge pinata to be broken by the students. Saturday, May 24

Today is the Fiesta to which all of San Diego is most cordially invited. The carnival activities begin at 1:00 P.M. with the opening of a multitude of booths on the Revelle Plaza. There will be food booths, game booths, and cultural exhibits. Authentic Mexican foods will be supplied by Old Town's famous Casa Blanca; enchiladas, tacos, tamales, tostados, Spanish rice and other popular dishes. Our UCSD Coffee Hut is providing a booth which will sell Mexican candies (cajetas), sweetbread (pan dulces) and the traditional corn (maiz) on the cob. There will also be a great variety of game booths for the youth and the more daring adults. Traditional booth games of Mexico such as the Peso Pitch, the Heel Toss, Bolero, and Aros, as well as traditional Californian games such as Balloon Darts, Fish Pond and a Dunking Booth will be central attractions. Cultural exhibits include a special photographic study of Mexican faces, and many other art displays to be sponsored by OCEANIDS, which include ceramics, paintings, sculptures and banners.

Other unusual features include venders: pretty senoritas will sell you a fresh carantion and pin it on you with a kiss. Men will be strolling weighted down by hundreds of sombreros, or floating around trying to keep their feet on the ground while selling colorful baloons. All articles must, of course, be purchased with real pesos so we will have an exchange booth where dollars may be changed for pesos.

At 1:00 there will be a Mariachi Performance by the famous Oscar Amezcua, and Mariachis will be constantly strolling the plaza all afternoon, playing your favorite Mexican tunes upon request (if you can speak Spanish!)

At 2:00 Estudiantina de la Paz, a children's singing group from Tijuana will perform. The official welcoming ceremony will take place at 3:00, with dignitaries from Tijuana, San Diego and the University to speak briefly. The ceremony will end with the release of hundreds of balloons, and an official pinata breaking.

Ballet Folklorico will perform at 4:00.

The grand performance to culminate the day's lively activities will be a concert by the Baja Marimba band. Tickets will be sold previous to the date of performance. Oscar Amezcua, Magic Violin and Ballet Folklorico, will supplement this evening performance which promises fantastic entertainment to appeal to all age levels. The concert will be held at the UCSD Gymnasium, and should be over by 10:30. Interesting Tidbits:

On May 17, at 8:30 P.M., at the site of the bonfire, students and friends will meet and be given paint, paint brushes, chicken wire, hammers, nails, paper mache materials, wood, boxes, paper and other pertinent building materials, as well as old posts, stairs, and anything else deemed worth of being burned in the bonfire. The foundation for the bonfire will have been built that afternoon by Mrs. Forbes and the rest of the bonfire committee. Hopefully, many people will show up that night to complete the bonfire structure. Student initiative and creativity will determine if the structure is to be successfully symbolic. Also, at the "Happening" free cokes and coffee will be provided for the workers, and it is hoped that a band can be obtained to add to the excitement.

The day before the Fiesta a group of administrators and students will travel down to Tijuana in several cars, to buy thousands of interesting little booth prizes, hundreds of sombreros, pinatas, candy and sweetbread, and to buy \$2000.00 worth of pesos to be used in the Fiesta to add to the authenticity.

All game and food booths will be decorated according to the Fiesta theme and a prize shall be offered for the most original design. All booth workers will be costumed in traditional Mexican dress.

OCEANIDS will also sponsor a kite contest for that afternoon.

A group of bilingual UCSD girls will serve as hostesses for the community as well as the entertaining groups from Mexico.

Invitations to the dignitaries to appear in the official ceremony will be written in the old Spanish style, on parchment scrolls.

The week will be proclaimed by Mayor Curran as "UCSD Fiesta de la Gente Week."

Even the UCSD policemen have offered to get into the spirit of the celebration by wearing Mexican Federal uniforms.

CONTEMPORARY ISSUES PROBES "The Inner City School Project" by Barbara James

Dr. Ernest Hartzog, who has recently been appointed principal of Lincoln High School, effective in September, will speak to the Contemporary Issues Discussion Group Wed., May 14, 1969, 7:45 p.m. Dr. Hartzog's topic will be San Diego's Inner City Project. This program, begun last July, involves 7 schools, 5 at the elementary level and a junior and a senior high school within Southeast San Diego. Nearly 6,000 Black and Mexican American students are included and participation in this program allows these schools to receive \$750,000 in federal funds to supplement the regular district funds.

The goal of this project is to create an "exemplary educational program for 'inner city' students" with emphasis on parental involvement in these schools where this has not previously existed.

Even if you are not a regular member of our discussion group, join us to learn more about this important educational innovation.
