UCSD TO HOLD CONFERENCE MAY 15 ON WOMEN OF COLOR IN POLITICS

A conference on the background, progress and impact of women of color in electoral politics, featuring elected officials, political organizers, and political scientists, will be held May 15 at the University of California, San Diego from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.

A Politics of Difference: Women of Color in Electoral Politics, is being sponsored by UCSD's Ethnic Studies Department and the UCSD Women's Center, as well as UC Mexus. The conference is free and open to the public, and will be held in the Robinson Auditorium at the Graduate School of International Relations and Pacific Studies.

The all-day conference will begin with keynote speaker, Leticia Quesada, president of the Los Angeles Board of Education and the first Latina to be elected to the board, and will continue with four panel discussions.

The first panel discussion, Where We Are and Where We Came From: Profile of Women of Color Elected Officials, will take place from 10-11:30 a.m. From 11:30 a.m.-1:00 p.m., the second panel, Making the Decision to Run: The Politics of Gender, Race and Class, will be held. Panel three, Breaking Barriers of Money and Campaigning, will last from 3-4:30 p.m, and the day's final panel, Does it Make a Difference? The Impact of Women of Color Elected Officials on Policy and Community, will take place from 4:30-6 p.m.
