Landscaping is but one of the series of changes, either planned or in progress, that is transforming the campus.

The Regents have purchased three acres south of the present property line. This will make possible a landscaped transition between residences and buildings as well as additional car parking.

The City of San Diego is now making plans to remodel the present narrow and difficult entrance to the campus. Work should start within a few weeks.

The most immediately evident change, however, comes from the fact that the older buildings have now been painted the same warm sand color that appears on the new buildings, giving unity to the appearance of the campus.

As for developments on the upper campus: bids will be opened soon on the construction of the first new buildings of the School of Science and Engineering. And the Governor's budget contains provisions for equipping these buildings and starting two more.

Dr. Wooster will make his headquarters at UNESCO in Paris. He leaves La Jolla this month.

HONORS

George Feher, Professor of Physics, School of Science and Engineering, was presented the 1960 American Physical Society Prize, sponsored by Hughes Aircraft Company. The prize is awarded annually for work performed and published by a person while under the age of 33.

Walter Kohn, Professor of Physics, School of Science and Engineering, was named the 1961 winner of the Oliver E. Buckley Solid-State Physics Prize of the American Physical Society.

Elbert H. Ahlstrom, Research Associate, Scripps Institution of Oceanography, received an award from the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service for the best scientific paper published by a staff member during 1960. Winner of the only other prize offered was a member of Ahlstrom's staff of the La Jolla Laboratory, Frederick H. Berry.

Dr. Bonner will give one of our Faculty Lectures at Sherwood Hall, La Jolla, late in February.

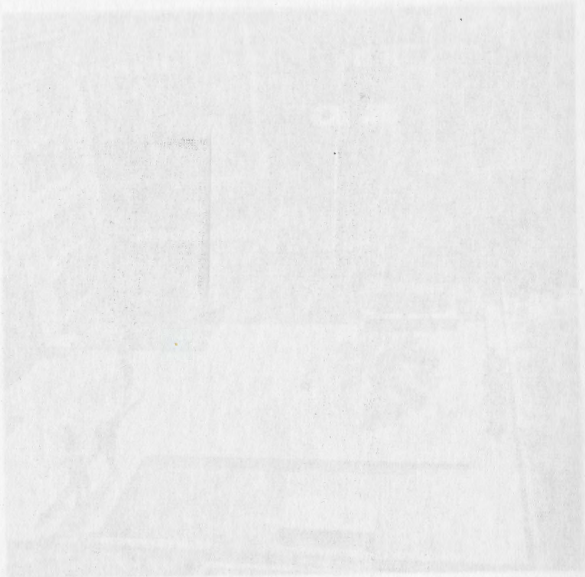


SONG PROGRAM SCHEDULED
