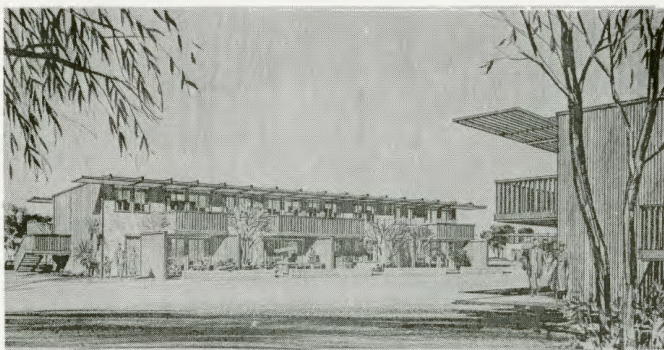

The celebration of the beginning of construction of the first buildings of the School of Science and Engineering (left) was held on May 18. President Clark Kerr presided. Governor Edmund G. Brown, Senator Hugo Fisher, Mayor Charles Dail, Chancellor Herbert F. York, and Dr. Roger Revelle also spoke.

In the audience at the celebration were The Regents, who were meeting on campus, members of the faculty and staff, and many of the persons from the community who have contributed to the establishment of the School.

These first buildings, which will cost approximately \$4 million, will be ready for occupancy in January of 1963. The bulldozers had not waited for ceremony. Work had been under way at the site for more than a week. What will be the basement of the chief building had already been partially excavated.

Later in the day, on the Scripps campus, the four new buildings erected during the past few years were dedicated to the memory of men associated with the history of the Institution. Dr. Revelle and Prof. Walter Munk spoke. Plaques naming the buildings were unveiled. Mrs. Harald U. Sverdrup dedicated Sverdrup Hall, Mrs. Francis B. Sumner dedicated Sumner Auditorium, Mrs. W. W. Hawkins



dedicated the new wing to Ritter Hall, and Mrs. J. G. Johansen dedicated the Scripps Building.

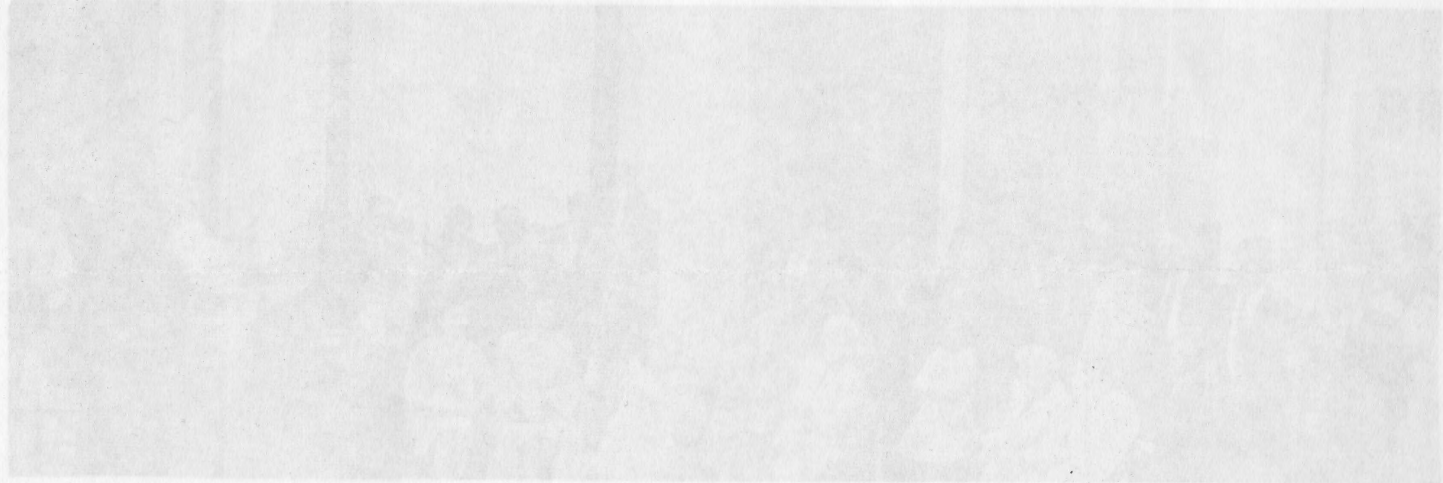
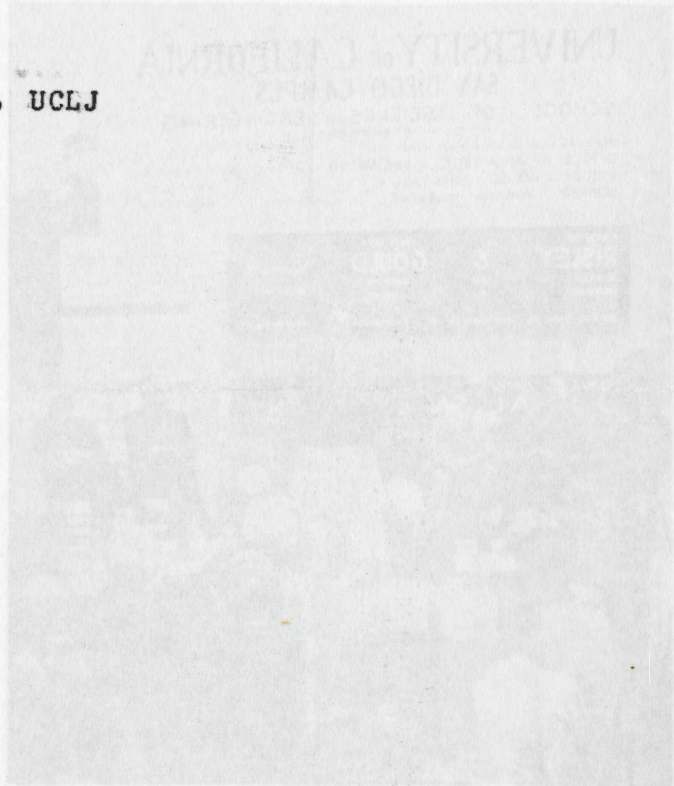
