I fully appreciate your letter of September 30th. It is interesting, to say the least.

We were not satisfied with the decision of the Railroad Commission. We bought the Cuyamaca system for \$150,000 in cash, property that cost \$1,500,000. We put \$500,000 or \$600,000 into it, giving five years of our time, and then it is somewhat annoying to have the Railroad Commission find out what it cost us, add 8% to our investment and then tell us we must take it, and thereby give us a valuation of \$745,000 for property that we are sure is worth one and one-half to two million dollars, but, like fools, we had signed a contract to abide by their decision, and if the La Mesa District lives up to their part of the contract we will live up to ours.

Three things intervene to delay or prevent the transfer of the property to the district: One is that the district has failed to include within the boundaries of the district 2500 acres of land which they agreed to take in; another is a suit which brings up a constitutional question as to the validity of the district itself; and the third is they have not yet secured the approval of Dillon, Thompson & Clay to the bonds.

I agree with you absolutely that the State Bond Commission

should approve the bonds.

Your letter will be placed on file, and the matter taken up with ou just as soon as we know that we are going to get the bonds. Any further suggestions from you will be appreciated. Is it not a fact that he Hodesto Irrigation District 6% bonds were purchased by you at 90%?

Dear friend Fletcher:-

From various notices which I have seen published, I assume that you and Mr. Salmons are not only friendly to, but are active in behalf of those interested in the development of the Warner Ranch reservoir enterprise.

As you and Mr. Salmons both personally know, for a great many years I have given freely of my time and money to the interedts of that great enterprise and that it is very largely due to the labor and money I have devoted thereto that the enterprise has been kept intact, so that it can now be handled so advantageously.

I have no doubt from the high reputation of the gentlemen, who, I understand, are now interested in the enterprise, that, in closing negotiations, I will be fairly and justly treated, and while I write this letter in my own name, I also include Mr. F. P. McCray, who is Chief Engineer for Miller & Lux of San Fransisco, and who, as our Chief Engineer, at all times has most liberally co-operated with me with his time and money in our joint efforts to keep the enterprise intact.

I now write and address this letter to you that those interested may fully understand the circumstances which have led up to the present negotiations and conditions, should you see fit to call their attention thereto.

The negotiations of this enterprise, with much of our data, were turned over to C. W. Gates, of the firm of Vail & Gates, with an agreement under which, ommitting details, it was contemplated that a stock company

would be organized and bonds issued to the extent of \$2,000,000.00 with the proceeds of which to acquire rights and develope the enterprise and also carrying with the bonds three fourths (3/4) of the stock of the Company. Mr. McCray and I were to receive the other one fourth (1/4) of the stock and also receive back the money we had paid out in the interest of the enterprise, thus placing all on the same equitable basis. It being understood, of course, that the proceeds of the \$2,000,000.00 of the bonds of the company would cover the expenses of money paid out by Vail & Cates and their associates and also McCray and myself, and, in addition, develope the enterprise as then contemplated. That all this can be done, with a proper and conservative management, I have no doubt, and at the same time insure a good dividend upon the stock. McCray was to receive back \$15,000.00 and I was to be paid \$48,000.00, the amounts we had then respectively advanced.

Very soon Mr. Gates invited the attention of Messrs. Kerckhoff and Balch to the enterprise and then Mr. Gates, McCray and myself had an interview with them when their attention was called to the various data and the terms of the agreement, as above outlined. Since then negotiations have continued up to the present time.

An earth dam 100 feet high, under the conditions as they exist at Warnwr's Ranch and all things considered, would, in my humble opinion, be the conservative course to pursue. Such a dam would impound over 13,000 miner's inches of water and upon a most conservative basis would afford a continuous supply for four years, of 3,000 miner's inches daily. These 3,000 miner's inches would generate about 10,000 practical horse power at the proposed power station and, according to my information, \$40. per HP. would be a conservative estimate of the value thereof, and should yield an income of \$400,000.00 annually.

You know that the San Diego Flume Co. sells water at \$800. cash and \$60. annual rental per miner's inch. The Sweetwater Co received much more, and under its contract with the City, the Southern California Mountain Water Co., at 4 cents per 1,000 gallons, receives an annual income of 5% upon a valuation of \$3,750. per miner's inch.

From this you can see that the Flume Co, sells water at the lowest price of any company here and you know that company only delivers water to Ranchers "now and then " and because of first selling all the water possible to the City at 4 cents per 1,000 gallons, the Rancher's supply was more "then" than "now".

The Warner's Rabch enterprise could give a continuous supply, hence the Flume Co. prices would seem reasonable. At such prices the water rights on 3,000 miner's inches would give \$2,400,000. and an annual income of \$180,000. for water rentals. Thus for the 10,000 H P and 3,000 miner's inches for irrigation, assetts covering the \$2,000,000. company bonds would be amply provided for and an annual income of \$580,000. be derived from the power and water.

If desired to settle up the country rapidly, by selling water very cheap, the \$800. cash for the water right could be thrown off, and \$60. per inch rental only charged. Then the income would still be \$580,000. from power and water.

If \$280,000. per year were set aside for operating expenses, interest on bonds, and sinking fund, even then an annual dividend of 10% could be paid upon \$3,000,000. capital stock.

But with a dam 100 feet high I have no doubt, not the slightest, that a yearly continuous supply of six thousand miner's inches could be always realized. Such supply would double the income above outlined.

In the future, when deemed advisable, by increasing the height of dam,

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a much greater annual supply aan be relied upon. I give the above figures only to show that the stock can be made very valuable.

As this enterprise has been my life's work since I have been in California, I had always hooed to be connected with its management, but I now conclude that this is not to be, therefore, notwithstanding my absolute confidence in the great present and future value of the stock, it is possible that it would be better for McCray and myself, as well as for those in control of the Company, for us to get back the money we have each advanced, and also get some reasonably fair compensation for our stock interest, at a price to be agreed upon, and then for us to step dewn and out.

Whether I retain a stock interest or not, I wish for the Company the most abundant success and prosperity and which I know it will have, besides doing a world of good for this community and the co-operative enterprises of those in control.
