DAY AT THE BAY: MISSION BAY AQUATIC CENTER

Spend a day at the UCSD water sports facility in Mission Bay, on Saturday, September 19 from 10am to 3pm. Students from all 4 colleges are invited to an orientation at the facility, featuring mini-courses in sailing, windsurfing, canoeing and kayaking, boat displays, a ski show, rowing center tours, and a complete introduction to all the Aquatic Center programs. Take a swim, play some volleyball, or enter the canoe races. Pizza, salad and soda will be sold and free transportation will be provided. If you would like a free ride on the bus, just meet in front of the Bookstore beginning at 9:30 a.m. Busses will leave every half hour until 12 noon. The last bus will return students to campus at 3 pm. Also, if you have a car and would like to give other students a ride, meet in front of the Bookstore anytime between 9:30am and noon. The Aquatic Center is located on Santa Clara Point next to Mission Bay. Maps are available in the Provost Office. This is your opportunity to become acquainted with the variety of sports programs offered at the Center such as sailing, watersking, conoeing, kayaking, scuba diving, windsurfing, rowing, and surfing. Bring your swimsuit and just enjoy the water.

COLLEGES TO COMPETE

On Friday of Welcome Week, following the BBQ, all four colleges will compete in the 3rd annual UCSD Un-Olympic Games. Competition will consist of entertaining events like tug-of-war, egg toss, and pie eating contests. No grades will be given, but they will appear on your transcript based solely on attendance at all three sessions. Some spaces are still available, and waiting lists are established for others. Some will begin as early as September 21st, so if you want to get in one, ADD it to your schedule through the regular Drop/Add process during the first week of classes. - A. EXPERIMENTAL FRONTIERS IN GRAVITY RESEARCH.

 (Present experimental studies of gravity include a search for gravity waves, measurements of small departures from Newton's law of gravitation constant, G. In addition gravity measurements are important in determining the properties of the earth and in prospecting for oil and other minerals). Prof. Goodkind Starts Sept.22, 2 PM Revelle Provost Ofc.
- B. FRUITS, NUTS AND BOLOGNE...ARE WE WHAT WE EAT? (Exploring the notion of food and health. Some insights into the physics and metaphysics of what we eat. Fad diets, megavitamin therapies, weight loss, and food and culture will be examined). Prof. Saltman.

 - (The nature and methods of computer music will be discussed both from a technological and from an aesthetic point of view.

- G. ASTRONOMY.

 (An informal talk followed by slides and pictures, and then a tour of the labs in the Center for Astrophysics and Space Sciences. One week a visit to 3rd floor labs for the Space Telescope, stars, galaxies, and quasars. Next, 4th floor labs for X-ray astronomy, and finally, 2nd floor labs for the planets).

- H. APPLYING THE LASER: NUCLEAR FUSION TO

 EARTHQUAKE PREDICTION.

 (This seminar concerns several applications of lasers from their use in measurements of strains in the crust of the earth which might lead to earthquakes to their use in producing controlled thermonuclear fusion as an energy source). Prof. Lovberg.

 (Life in the ocean requires oxygen and nutrients, which must be mixed from above and below, respectively.

 Oceanographers have widely different opinions on how the mixing takes placed based on different interpretations of the same evidence. It will be argued that the mixing is due to rare patches of turbulence). Prof. Gibson.
