Dear Sir,

As you are aware a convention of irrigation districts was held in Sacramento January 5th. The object of the convention was to suggest needed legislation. The convention was composed of many of the most prominent irrigationists in the State. The advice of several of the largest bond buying firms in the world was asked upon the subjects in hand some of which have had representatives here. It is their opinion that with the assistance of the proposed legislation, Irrigation Bonds will be sold with much less difficulty.

You were also informed by a circular issued by the executive committee appointed by the convention of the nature of some of the proposed amendments. The object of this letter is to inform you of the progress being made. We have introduced nine bills in all; four of them may be hereafter combined in one. Of the nine bills four have been favorably reported by the Assembly committee, three by Senate committee, while one has passed the Assembly.

Aside from advancing needed legislation, it was equally or more necessary that a committee be sustained here to prevent harmful laws being passed by those desiring to destroy the system.

Our fears of such an effort have been amply realized. Miller and Luz and other well known enemies have maintained four lawyers here to oppose our measures and advocate dangerous bills. They have introduced several bills, that if they are allowed to become

laws, will dangerously impair if not virtually destroy the Wright system. One of the opposition measures has already found its way to the files of the Senate. In the circular sent out by our committee all districts and persons interested were asked, 1st, to contribute money to pay the expenses of the committee engaged in these labours. 2nd, to use your influence upon your representatives in the Legislature in the interest of the cause. As to the first of these, there have been practically no responses. Those of the committee who have remained here, have been compelled to pay their own expenses. Our opponents are full handed and are waging a battle against which we are in a poor condition to contend. The question seems simply to be;—Are the Irrigation districts, and persons interested therein going to sit idly by and see the system in which millions have been invested, and from which tens of millions are expected in the future, hampered and perhaps destroyed, by a few land kings, for such a paltry sum as is necessary to maintain a committee here to explain to the mountain and city members of the Legislature, who are not familiar with irrigation matters, and upon whom our enemies labour, that our system is not a failure, but must go on? I sincerely desire that you will consider this matter at your meeting on Tuesday, and respond if possible to the urgencies of the situation.

It is difficult to procure printed copies of the bills, since the State only prints a limited number, but if money comes to the committee sufficient to pay type-writing expenses and you desire copies of any or all bills I will have them sent you. All money should be

sent to C.O. Wright, at Modesto, and notification of the same sent to L.M. Holt, Rialto, Cal. For our success so far attained in our own measures, and in retarding the work of the enemy, we are especially indebted to the faithful labours of Senator Seymore of San Barnedone, and Assemblyman Carlson of San Diego, Chairman of the respective committees in irrigation, and also to Assemblyman Casterline of San Diego.

Trusting you will give these matters your serious consideration.

First—The Governor of each State and Territory to appoint two delegates from each Congressional District and four delegates at large from their respective States and Territories.

Second—Each County Court to appoint two delegates.

Third—Each university or college where irrigation engineering is taught to appoint two delegates.

Fourth—Each Chamber of Commerce to appoint two delegates.

Fifth—Each agricultural or horticultural association to appoint two delegates for each 100 members or fraction thereof.

Sixth—Each corporation formed for the purpose of promoting irrigation to appoint one delegate.

Seventh—The Mayor of each incorporated city having 2,500 or more population, and the chief officer of each State Agricultural or other industrial school to be entitled to seats, with authority to appoint substitutes.

Eighth—The Governor of each State and Territory, members of the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States, members of the American Society of Irrigation Engineers, delegates from foreign countries properly accredited, and foreign irrigation engineers, and the permanent officers and the standing committees of the Salt Lake City Irrigation Congress to be entitled to seats.

The Hon. Walter Q. Gresham, Secretary of State, has requested the diplomatic officers of the United States to ask the Governments to which they are accredited to be represented by duly appointed delegates.

In accordance with the resolution of the committee, I have the honor to request that you appoint the number of delegates you are entitled to appoint under the call, and to respectfully urge that care be taken to appoint delegates who will attend.
