Dear Doctor Szilard:

Thank you for your letter dated July 17. I will be delighted to be of some help to you, unfortunately, also in this country the specialities containing nitrofurantoin are extremely expensive, while the bulk product is very cheap, (this is one of the misteries of our business).

I think that the best thing to do would be to send you every 2 or 3 weeks a small plastic bag containing 20 gr. of pure sub= stance, from which you could prepare your= self a 100mg dose. This would not represent any difficulty for us and it would be so cheap that I would not have to charge you for anything. On the other hand it would be rather difficult for us to prepa= re a small amount of tablets and it would also take some time due to the summer vacation at our plant.

Please tell me if this would be all right for you and I would send the product at once in a normal mail envelope.

Please let me know about your health.

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

Dear Dr. Szilard:

I delayed my answer to your letter, due to your trip in California, and the visit in Milan of Frank Delaney. I discussed with him our present situation with regard to the law suit, and to the disqualification of D.S.A. While in my letter to you I expressed my opinion that at that moment it was useless to discuss with Mr. Delaney our possible arrangement, on a second thought I discussed this matter with him as, an arragement between us was becoming rather complicated.

Your suggestion to incorporate in a letter the paragraph, "If on the basis of these arguments...." makes the whole agreement unclear; I would prefer that you discuss it directly with Mr. Delaney.

With regard to the suggestion of making an arragement with a law firm in Washington, I think this is not very practical at the moment, when so little can be done, as Mr. Delaney will explain to you.

I think that the most important thing to do right now, would be to obtain the opinion of some experts as to the feasibility of developing, in a reasonable amount of time, a high producing strain.

I gave to Mr. Delaney some tablets for you.

Dear Visconti:

I am writing to thank you for transmitting to me through Frank Delaney, whom I saw in New York, the pills which you made for me. I was sorry to hear from Mr. Delaney that things have not worked out the way he hoped they would!

You probably have seen the attached "literature". I forget how it got to me but I believe it was sent to my wife along with the usual junk which is mailed to doctors in this country.

This particular piece of literature set me wondering whether you ought not to change your tactics and instead of being on the defensive, go over to the attack. If you told your story in a magazine article and if you could, without running afoul of the libel laws and other laws which might be relevant, tell not only what happened to you but also why it happened it could make an exciting story and, moreover, it might do some good from the public point of view and it might also do some good from your own point of view.

The above is just my own off-the-cuff opinion and you had better check with your legal advisors before making any moves.
