Dear Mr. Leisure:

Mr. Quinn spent a few days in Washington last week and before leaving he agreed with me that I should bring you up to date on the project of selling the Ward tract of redwood timber land. As you know I have been advising and gooperating with Mr. Quinn since early in March 1951.

In view of the fact that Mr. Quinn has through an agent of the syndicate been negotiating for the sale of this property to the Federal Government under the latter's existing program to acquire forestry land for National forest purposes, I want to describe to you in detail the present status of the matter in order that you and those interested in the sale of the property may have full knowledge of what has been done and what is expected to be done in the future looking to the successful culmination of the sale.

A syndicate was formed to adquire all of the property described in the Fentriss Hill cruise from the heirs for \$1,220,000.00, such acquisition by the Syndicate to be dependent upon the sale of the property to the Federal Government.

The benefits favoring the Syndicate method of handling the transaction are obviously manifest to you as a lawyer. It will facilitate the transfer of title, the division of the proceeds of sale and among other advantages, place the control of the sale of the property in one person, the Syndicate manager, rather than having the numerous interests of all the heirs endeavoring to effect any sale of the property.

The syndicate agreement has been deposited with two trustees, Oliver W. Birckhead and Martin D. Ryan both of whom are officers of the Peoples National Bank & Trust Company of White Plains, Westchester County New York but who are acting as trustees in their individual capacity and not as officers of the bank.

Arrangements have been made by the Syndicate through Mr. Birckhead with Mr. Conrad, Vice President of Chase National Bank of New York City wherein the bank will act as escrew

agent when, as and if the Syndicate desires, for the purpose of facilitating the depositing of the proper deed to the Ward property prepared in blank which Col. Fletcher has agreed would be prepared by him, and the advancing of the money necessary to clear the taxes demanded by the California tax authorities.

It is impossible to state at this time the price which will be agreed upon by the Federal Government in the event of their purchasing the Ward property. The representative of the Syndicate has been authorized to tender the Ward property at a price of not less than \$1,500,000.00 and not more than \$5,000,000.00.

For comparative purposes the following facts have been ascertained:

The original cost of the Ward property from date of acquisition 27 years ago plus carrying charges represented by taxes and interest reflect a valuation approximating \$4.00 per thousand feet of marketable timber represented in the Fentriss Hill Cruise as amounting to 2,734,554,000 feet.

The Bureau of Internal Revenue fixed a valuation for Federal inheritance tax purposes upon the interest of one of the heirs, Mrs. Pay, amounting to \$2.00 per thousand timber feet.

The most outstanding recent evidence of present day value is reflected in an invitation for bids made by the Federal Government for the purchase and cutting of timber on an adjoining tract of land wherein it was stated that no bid would be accepted for less than \$1.50 per thousand feet. This invitation was made public in May of 1934 for bids to be submitted not later than June 18, 1934.

The Ward property, and other adjoining property which is under option to Col. Ed Fletcher, comprises one of the three California tracts which have been recommended by the Forestry Service for acquisition through the National Forest Reservation Commission. The price that the Government will pay for the property so recommended ordinarily would be an average price per acre or per thousand timber feet for the entire tract.

The Syndicate is particularly desirous of selling the Ward property independently of the adjoining property because the Ward property is much more valuable per acre or per thousand timber feet than the adjoining property and the sale value

of the Ward property should not be penalized through the inclusion of this adjoining property of much lesser known value, in the sale of the entire property. Neither would it be equitable under the present circumstances to permit Col. Fletcher to secure a price for the adjoining property much in excess of its real value by including it along with the Ward property of much higher value.

Col. Fletcher has by written agreement, agreed to cooperate with Mr. Quinn toward consummating the sale of the Ward property. Mr. Quinn, in turn, has agreed to compensate Col. Fletcher to the extent that the latter will receive \$100,000.00 out of the sale of the Ward property by agreeing to pay Fletcher the difference between the amount Fletcher is able to reduce the present California texes against the property and the amount \$100,000.00. A copy of the agreement between Mr. Quinn and Col. Fletcher is in my files and available for verification by you.

It is the opinion of the Syndicate that the Government should be interested in the property. The interests of the Syndicate are being looked after by Mr. Basil O'Connor of New York who reports that the purchase is being considered. we hope favorably by the Government, but that the negotiations necessarily have to be handled in the usual manner and that ordinary procedure is being followed as is done in all such cases. We understand that the Government will not act before the latter part of November.

The Syndicate hopes to make a profit in the transaction which, of course, will depend upon the price the Government eventually pays for the property and the expenses of the Syndicate.

My dear Mr. Leisure:-

I acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 18th and contents noted. Answering same will say: I did my part in getting the option and have done everything that Mr. Quinn has asked me to do. Enclosed find copy of letter I had written Mr. Quinn before receiving his telegram. I also enclose a copy of his telegram and my answer in reply. I repeat, it is hard for me to accurately analyse the situation, Hr. Quinn's position is changing from time to time. Both by letter, and verbally, Mr. Quinn said that he would not be interested at all if the property was not sold by the first of July. In fact he said he had no further interest in it if he could not put over the deal working from the top down. He failed. He has now been given another opportunity and his option on the 16,000 acres expires on March 1st. Again his claim is that he was working from the top down. My work has alwys been from the bottom up through the forest service with whom I have had personal contact for twenty years. I was the first one to take the matter up with the Forest Service, not alone in California but in Washington, with a definite proposition and have letters to that effect.

From every indication Quinn has failed to make good working from the top down.

I was amused to find out from Quinn's telegram that he had not even put in an offer and would not until the 26th of Fabruary though he has had a full two months in which to get the approval of, and sell to the commission, the 16,000 acres, and so far has failed. He must get a letter from the Commission or from the Secretary of Agriculture that they will purchase the property and at the price agreed, before March let or his option expires.

Assuming that he does not make that sale, and assuming that the matter is left wholly in the hands of the Forest Service and their representative in San Francisco, to take options and eventually buy the Ward holdings through my sources of contact with the Ferest Service, wherein does Quipp have any claim to fit in the picutre.

So far I have felt, and told you all, that I had no faith in Mr. Quinn's ability to sell to the higher ups independent of the forest service as he claims, and I could see a danger of not being able to sellat all the ward holdings when an excessive price is being asked for the property, knowing full well the conditions in California as I do. Only time will tell shether Mr. Quine has hurt our cause or not. I certainly humbly apologise if Mr. Quinn is sufcessful in making his sale through the channels he claims being able so to do.

If, on the other hand, as I have already stated. the regional forester in California will do the buying, take the options, and make the recommendations, where, I say, does Mr. Quinn come in, and why should he have any consideration?

I made a price of 40¢ a thousand for redwood and 20¢ for other standing timber. That was made nearly a year ago and that option expired some months ago. There was nothing to hinder Mr. Quinn's making the sale if he could, and I have in no way, shape or form, by word, or by act, opposed the sale of the estate property while Mr. Quinn has had it under option; In fact, I have not written a letter to Washington to either the Secretary of Agriculture or any member of the Forest Service in order that Mr. Quinn could have every opportunity possible to put over his deal. Mr. Quinn has not asked for a thing that I have not done.

After the first of March I shall take up negotiations again with the Forest Service in San Francisco. It seems to me you have fulfilled every obligation possible to Mr. Quinn that you were morally obligated so to do.

I am writing this full letter of explanation so that you may get my point of view, and in return please be as frank and show me what Mr. Quinn has done that ever warrants him to be taken into consideration at all after the First of March. or where he can be of any service in helping me, through channels, to seel this property to the Government.

by automobile Wednesday, February 27th. The Logislature opens March 4th and my address will be the State Capitol.

I have not a feeling in the world against Er. Quinn only the most friendly. I did not make good in selling the property in the first place but I have kept at it. Quinn has had two opportunities and failed. I want to be convinced that he can be of any assistance in the sale of this property before I make any new committments.

I know you will take this letter in the spirit it is written. I am sure we understand each other; I am most friendly and want you to write me in the same spirit.

As far as commission is concerned, write and tell me what you think is right. We will have no trouble getting together on that score.

I may have some definite information for you and the other Easton heirs in the near future. I have no definite information today, but I am still maintaining what I have always maintained, that no redwood timber will ever be bought by the Covernment in Washington except through regular channels where I have been working all the time. We will be most fortunate, in my opinion, if the Forest Service is not offended by making an independent offer over its head, to the Commission.

Maybe I am entirely wrong and heaven knows from a financial standpoint it is better for me to have Quinn put over the deal if I can. We took the risk; I gave my consent and have cooperated for no other reason on earth than to see the ward heirs pulling together as one unit rather than working at cross purposes. That is the reason I stepped out of the picture last September regarding the 16,000 acres, and for no other reason.

Please let me hear from you by telegraph if you have anything to suggest, on receipt of this air mail letter next Monday morning.

Your letter of December 11th to Ward-Day et al. directed to Orchard Lake, Michigan, has been forwarded to me here. In replying would say that owing to re-investment opportunities at this time, I would sell my one-half interest in this tract cheap for cash and I think the owners of the other half interest (who are relatives of mine) would likewise do so.

I selected this tract a quarter of a century ago from some half dozen timber tracts that my cruiser from Michigan examined at that time. I would say that we were then logging a large tract of pine in Michigan of 400 million feet under peculiarly happy conditions for cheap operation and it was a similarity of conditions for operating this tract at Alice Lake, along with the fine quality and stand of timber on it that induced me to purchase the same. The cruise was not a close estimate as to varieties, but my cruiser was very competent, having cruised and afterwards (as logging superintendent) logged our pine for many years, thus giving opportunities for proving his cruise. I have every confidence it will cut out the amount of his cruise. He was particularly pleased with the cedar on the west side of Alice Lake and with the quality, size, and tallness of the hemlock trees on the tract in general. His estimate on the 12,500 acres or thereabouts is as follows:

Hemlock greatly predominates in the latter three species.

By building a saw mill at Alice Lake to saw this timber, several advantages will accrue. The log haul is shortened over hauling logs to Quatsino Sound, as the logs can be dumped into the lake at many points and towed in booms to the saw mill where they can be kept in fresh water, immune from torredos. A narrow gauge railroad a few miles long will suffice to carry the lumber from the mill to Quatsino

Sound where it can be loaded on vessels for any port in the world.

An inclosed map shows the similarity of our Michigan operation. The circle in the center of the tract shown on the Michigan map was the approximate location of the pine timber as the timber outside the circle was generally hardwood. Circle No. 1 shows the location of the saw mill while the Circle No. 2 shows location of our dock on an arm of Lake Michigan from whence a railroad we built ran some thirty miles inland to the saw mill. We were importuned to build our mill at the lake port by townspeople there, but we shortened up our log haul greatly by placing it in the heart of the timber and saved much cost thereby, as we could ship the produce in lumber out of eight or ten carloads of logs down to the lake port on a single flat car, thus saving a great amount of traffic in the longer haul of loaded cars to a mill at the lake port (had it been built there), as well as the return of empty cars to the pinery. Our plan of operation worked out to perfection in saving costs and the similarity of this Alice Lake tract offers a similar opportunity.

I am inclosing a map of Alice Lake, prepared by the British Columbia Water Rights Department of Lands, and some photographs oriented thereon by numbered arrows, which photographs altho taken by the Water Engineers for another purpose, incidentally show the environment of the timber. By them one can get a comparison of the difference between logging from the water's edge and scaling the mountains of the Olympian Peninsula in Washington for timber, the privilege for which they have been so excited about at Gray's Harbor and Puget Sound of late.

I am inclosing a map of the western end of Vancouver Island, showing Alice and Kathleen Lakes and vicinity with the tract colored red thereon. You will notice a red line running from the East Arm of Quatsino Sound to Alice Lake and again from Alice Lake to Kathleen Lake. This I understand is a road for transporting supplies by truck to a copper mine, they ferrying the supplies across both Alice and Kathleen Lakes. This road I expect provides a good opportunity to get an idea of the timber handily.

I am also inclosing copy of a letter from Wm. R. Teen, a friend of one of the owners, giving the results of an investigation of the tract by him. I have met officials of the Department of Lands in Victoria who were familiar with the tract and they confirmed my cruiser's good opinion of it. Quite possibly by inquiring of officials of the Land Department, there, you might be able to interview some officials who have seen this timber.



First installment of Taxes due the First day of November, and becomes delinquent on the Fifth day of December.

Second Installment of Taxes due the Twentieth day of January, and becomes delinquent on the Twentieth day of April.

The County Board of Equalization meets to equalize County Assessments on the First Monday in July.

The Tax Rate is fixed by the Board of Supervisors on or before the First day of September.

Write to the County Auditor for estimate on cost of redeeming delinquent property sold to the State.

Write to the County Tax Collector for statement of State and County Taxes.

ORIGINAL ROLL:

- 10 per cent added to delinquent First Installment.
- 5 per cent added to delinquent First Installment (Additional)
- 5 per cent added to delinquent Second Installment.
- 50 cts. added for costs for each piece of property extended on Roll.

PROPERTY SOLD TO THE STATE: All penalties on the Delinquent Roll for the year. Interest on Taxes at rate of 7 per cent per annum.

Graduated penalties on redemptions as follows: If redeemed within 1 year from date of sale, 10 per cent is added; 2 years, 20 per cent; 3 years, 30 per cent; 4 years, 40 per cent; 5 years, 50 per cent. If not redeemed within five years from date of sale the property is sold immediately by auction to the highest bidder, and the highest bid must not be less than the total amount of all taxes, penalties and costs against the property, and if not sold at auction at the appointed time, it is then deeded to the State.

Bunker Says:

He agrees 100 per cent to what Story of the Timber says about inaccessible mountain timber. Says fir on west slope of Canada Range is 40 per cent rotten. Says greater part of Washington sawmills have been running on logs bought of loggers having no timber of their own and these loggers are nearly at the end of their rope for logging shows as there is not one billion feet of old growth fir left for them. Says big fir in sugar and yellow pine is poorest fir of all and will never come out after pine is removed and railroads taken up.

Says China great potential market for lumber with \$6.00 vessel freight. Says freight is \$9.00 to Boston. Thinks R. R.s will milk mountain timber dry but that salt water timber is in for great profits before long. Says there is practically no fir above the 2500-foot level in western Washington as timber is practically all hemlock above that line.

Conversation between Col.Fletcher & Mr. Thompson

- Col. F. Hello, that you Thompson
- Mr. T. Yes, Colonel
- I got an airmail special delivery letter from A.K. Wilson in which he states that I had given him the price of \$200,000 for Parcel A and he wanted to know what the terms of paying the additional \$50,000 were. I did not give him a price, as I do not have the authority, but he asked me what we were getting for it from the Forest Service.

 Mr. Edwards of your office was here yesterday and he said that Wilson had been to see you.
- Mr. T. Yes.
- Col. F. What was he trying to drive at?
- Mr. T. What he was trying to do was that he would give us a right of way if we would drop the deal.
- Col. F. What did you tell him.
- If did not tell him anything. I did not make any definite statement to him. I did say that that was one of our principal reasons in the acquisition was the right of way and we had heard that he was expecting to hold the government up for the use of a right of way and that we were going right ahead with the exchange and that I thought we had better than a 50-50 chance to acquire it otherwise we would not have gone to all that time and expense. ——That was somewhat of a bluff but I made it strong and it evidently worked
- Col. F That is why he called me up.
- Mr. T. What we want is the right of way with the protective strip which you could turn over to us and we would be very happy.
- Col. F I will see what I can do and you will hear from me very soon again.

CONVE SATION BETWEEN JOHN EDWARDS AND COL. FLETCHER

-Col. Fletcher--Let me ask you this--if we get down to just a right of way what is the width. Is it 132 feet.
 - Mr. Edwards--What I told Lawrence Fletcher was this--it was a substantial reduction in requirements and this is what it was: An easement 200 feet wide. The property owner retains the title to everything on the land and the easement is only for road purposes but in this particular case the trees on the right of way could be retained by either Ward or Wilson and in any event they could cut the trees where the road would be built
- Col. Fletcher -- Are you abandoning any idea of a park?

- Mr. Edwards--Well, yes. The strip between the construction area and the oustide of the 200 feet they could take out 40% and leave 60% and on a strip 50 feet on the outside of the 200 feet they could make it 60% to take out and 40% leave. That was what I told Lawrence.
- Col. Fletcher-Let me ask you this-beggars can't be choosers. You will take a deed to the land say, no matter what shape it is in if you get it for nothing?
- Mr. Edwards -- Well, you see I am not so sure if we could get a right of way all down through the Sage Land.
- Col. Fletcher: Wes, put I have Holters assurance that he will give the right of way
- Mr. Edwards -- But there are strings attached to that.
- Col. Fletcher--What are the strings? As far as Sage is concerned Ed Holder is perfectly willing to go ahead.
- Mr. Edwards—Yes, but he has retained to himself the right of way across that land as and when the road is built. In other words somebody has to build the road and we can't build a road without a right of way and Wilson therefor would have to agree to that.
- Col. Fletcher--As a last resort I am going to take a businessman's chance and get some kind of a right of way--the best I can.
- Mr. Edwards-I would like to make this one statement-we will go just as far as we possibly can but we are not as free in the business way as a business man, in other words we have certain restrictions, as to what we can accept and that is a legislative requirement. In other words there are some things we just can't accept.
- Col. Fletcher--You can accept a right of way 132 feet wide if it is a clean cut deal--
- Mr. Edwards -- It would't buy us anything to accept just a right of way.
- Col. Fletcher-You took it from #101 a certain distance and stopped and you can do it again.

- Mr. Edwards—Then there was money available to build a road and at the present time there is no money.
- Col. Fletcher-Had you thought of this? Of the U.S. Forest Service immediately signing a condemnation suit for a right of way and the minute you file that law suit and condemnation suit I can go to Wilson and Sage and get them to give an acquittance without consideration.
- Mr. Edwards-That is possible but this is one of the problems. We have to go to Washington and get a clearance before we can file a condemnation suit.
- Col. Fletcher-How long would it take?
- Mr. Edwards--We would have to explain to them why we want it and where the money is available and there is no money at the present time and they wouldn't authorize it.
- Col. Fletcher--If we gave you written assurance that it wouldn't cost you anything.
- Mr. Edwards—We would have to have this--that somebody would build the road after we got the right of way.
- Col. Fletcher" I have the pledge both of Wilson and Arrow Mill Company that each would pay for half, but don't give me away.
- Mr.Edwards-If he had assurance that that road would be built and we were certain and it was tied up in an iron clad agreement our dondemnation suit might have some merit with Washington but I am sure we won't get anywhere without the money being available-we have to have the money topay for it or have the assurance that it won't cost us anything.
- Col. Fletcher--I will go to work on that. Give my regards to Thompson and tell him all about our conversation and also Barnum.
- Mr. Edwards--Thanks very much for calling.

Edwards: My thought is this and is simply a suggestion but it may be somewhat embarrassing to you personally but there are some values—the thought is this—if you could get hold of Wilson and tell him you don't believe the suit is good and possible the whole thing could be straightened out by his granting a right of way to the government and making it possible through the proper legal papers for Ward to concur in the sale to Wilson and for Wilson to give a right of way 132 feet wide, plus any additional width necessary for cut and fill. He might be willing to entertain that. Tell him that Ward is willing to do that because of the samll payments. Wilson might make the payments \$50,000 instead of \$25,000 as the first payment on that contract.

TEMPORARY MODIFICATION OF AIRPORT RATING REGULATIONS

In order to assist airports in meeting present economic conditions, the following temporary modifications have been made in the provisions of Sections 7 (c) and 7 (d) of the Airport Rating Regulations dealing with boundary lights and obstruction lights respectively:

As an additional means of reducing lighting costs in cases where the utmost economy is necessary, the provisions of these sections have been temporarily modified to permit the use of an approved automatic battery-operated Flashing Neon Light in a self-contained unit, suitable in respect to color range and light intensity for boundary and obstruction markings, to be used at airports and air fields, up to and including the Class "D" rating, or to mark isolated obstructions where electric currents or funds for wired lighting are not available. This light may also be used in buoys for marking lanes for night water landings.

One such system has been tested and is now available for limited uses, 100 milliampere red boundary light, 200 milliampere green boundary entrance light, 200 milliampere red obstruction light. The foregoing lights, while not having the power to produce visibility at a distance equal to the incandescent lights, it is believed that the distance of visibility is satisfactory for airports having or desiring at least a "D" rating.

Other systems will be tested for approval from time to time for similar use.

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THIS AGREEMENT made this day of April, 1934 between the undersigned, being the owners of the timberland described herein, (hereinafter called the Principals), and JOHN J. The Principals do hereby authorize and appoint the Agent as their agent to bargain and sell those tracts of timberland commonly known as the "Ward Estate", situate in the Counties of Humboldt and Del Norte, State of California, to which they plus commissions and the costs of sale.

The Principals agree to convey title to said timberlands, free and elear of all unpaid taxes, tax liens, and assessments, to such purchaser as the Agent may secure under the terms contained herein.

The term of this agency shall be except that it may be cancelled prior thereto by the Principals for their representative giving the Agent notice of cancellation in writing, or by a sale of the timberlands described herein to a purchaser not secured by the Agent.

It is intended that the Agency hereby created shall not be exclusive and that the Principals shall be free to employ such other agents in connection with the sale of the aforesaid timberlands as they may deem desirable.

This agreement may be executed in several counterparts, each of which shall be considered an original and all collectively but one instrument.

QUINN, of the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, party of the second part.

- 3. If this option is exercised, it shall be exercised by the said party of the second part making a written acceptance of the same, addressed to Col. Frederick S. Strong, Orchard Lake, Michigan, and George S. Leisure, 90 Broad Street, New York, N. Y., within the period of this option.
- 4. The purchase price of said tract of timberland shall be One million, two hundred and twenty thousand (\$1,220,000.) dollars.
- 5. This option may be exercised by the payment of the aforesaid purchase price in cash, legal tender of the United States, to Mr. Strong and Mr. Leisure, as above described,

or by receipt in writing of a letter from a satisfactory Covernment agency, agreeing to purchase the above referred to property within six months of the date of the exercise of said option.

6. In the event this option is so exercised, each of the parties of the first part agrees to convey his right, title and interest to said timberland, above referred to, to the party of the second part and the parties of the first part collectively within one, months thereafter shall deliver to the party of the second part, abstracts of title evidencing title subject to existing tax liens, which said taxes the parties of the first part agree to pay.

In the event that the option is exercised before June 15, 1934, as herein provided for, within thirty days prior Mo the time that delivery of title is demanded, payment shall be made by the purchaser in sufficient amount not exceeding \$150,000, to cover the taxes, and it is further provided that if this sale is not consummated prior to the time that the 1935 taxes become due and owing, the parties of the first part shall not be liable for the taxes for the fiscal year ending June 80,

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
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
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
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
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
