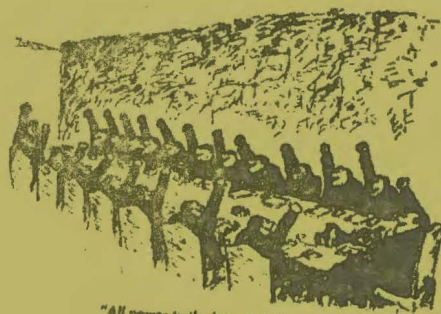

## AT SAN JOSE 1200 came

Anyone publicly demonstrating, i.e., rallying, holding a clenched fist, or picket sign, within a 1 mile radius of the court while court is in session will be arrested on a misdemeanor. Such is the stage for the Angela Davis trial. In a speech at the rally at San Jose, Franklin Alexander decried, "Suspension of free speech is a prerequisite for fascism in Amerika." Fascism became a reality to the crowd as Fania Jordan pointed out 'Big Brother' with the tv cameras and armed militia posed on the rooftops ready for another Attica. To insure correct court behavior, court visitors must be screened 3 times, pass thru the gauntlet of metal detectors, skin search and the like, are given numbers, then are filmed with number in hand.

## Third World Tutors NEEDED...

Last year a course was started by a group of Blacks Chicanos, Asian Americans, and Native Americans. The tutoring is done at San Diego High School and there is a minimum time commitment of four hours a week at San Diego High and two hours a week at a Monday class from 3-5:00. Guest lecturers will be featured at the Monday class speaking on such topics as Cultural Identity, Bi-lingual Education, Learning Skills, and Ethnic Resources that are available to high school teachers (which they don't utilize). There is a very great need for Minority tutors in San Diego High School. During the Spring Quarter the course will be offered as an URS 198 as well as a Contemporary Issues 198. ## ADMISSIONS Report

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For those of you who may be interested, Admissions Committee reports 363 candidates have been admitted for Fall '72. Out of this total Blacks total 135 or 37.19%, and Chicanos total 102 or 28.09%. In the "Others" camp, 11 or 3.03% Native Americans; 21 or 5.78% Asian Americans; and 94 or 25.89% Whites have been admitted, bringing the total number of "Others" up to 126 or 34.70%.

If quotas are applied, the Black quota is over by 3.86%; the Chicano quota is under by 5.24%; and the "Others" are over by 1.37%.

From these figures, it becomes increasingly apparent that recruitment of Native American and Asian American students reflects the interest of Third College to increase the number of NA's & AA's which would then not justify recruitment of Native American or Asian American faculty FTE's.

## Tc COMMUNICATIONS MAN —

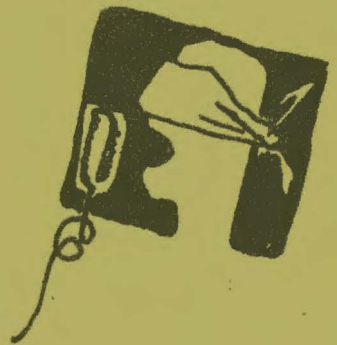
Oscar Gandy is a new faculty member to the Communications Department at Third College. He is currently teaching an introductory course in Communications, and a television production sequence. Oscar chose to come to Third College instead of Stanford to complete his doctoral work in Public Affairs Communication. One of his main goals is to "turn minority students on" to Communications. more closely. The population distribution of the Chicanos in Texas is different from California, but in no way does it diminish the potential effect that RUP could have on political elements in California. The difference lies in the fact that the RUP would take a different turn in California. In southwest Texas, complete control of political offices will eventually result whereas in California, the organized vote could be used to extract concession from the major parties.

However, the supposed differences between Texas and California Democratic Party are imagined than real. The Democratic Party seems to have taken the Chicano vote for granted. In Los Angeles County between 90 to 92% of the Spanish surnamed are registered Democratic voters. No attempt has been successful thus far in changing the voting pattern of the Chicano, the Romo for Governor campaign, under the Peace and Freedom Party-endorsed by MAPA, was an attempt to reverse the "secure" Chicano vote. Romo failed, unable to "win over" 1% of the votes cast. One can assume that Chicanos are sure Democratic voters; for that reason the Democrats have not "delivered" for the Chicanos. The opportunities to deliver have been there but they have been passed over.

The failure of the Democratic Party to provide Chicanos with adequate political representation is the best example of a lack of responsiveness. In 1960 and again in 1966 the Democrats were in control of the legislature (Senate redistricting in accordance to the 1965 Supreme Court decision of 1 man, 1 vote). In both cases the Chicano concentrations were high.



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In my interview with him, Oscar stated, "Communications is a way of looking at the world, I want to try to give students some tools that they can apply to a variety of situations." He would like to give students an opportunity to communicate using electronic media.

when it is organized and deliverable can be gin to search for alliance with other Third World peoples perhaps with groups with similar economic problems and goals.

If RUP is to be successful in California, the movement needs to move cautiously during the planning stages. Great polarization now exists in the ranks of the movement; some speculate that because of a lack of ideology, direction, and economic base, the movement is beginning to turn into a fad. The in-fighting has so has so bitterly divided La Raza must be avoided at great cost, perhaps by compromise or else the Party will fail.

RUP needs to be organized around issues that have the broadest sense - to include all Chicanos who are interested in the future of their people. The Party should not represent the ideology of any one group; there should be no monopoly of ideas dealing with the Party. The goal is to unite the Chicanos, and it can only be done if at the beginning, philosophical discussions on ideology are avoided altogether. The Party should make specific recommendations on particular issues.

There is little doubt that if the Chicano vote can be organized as a powerful political force would develop in California politics. Potentially the RUP could have a hand in the results of statewide, possibly nationwide elections.



# LA RAZA UNIDA PARTY IN CALIFORNIA

In this paper I plan to give a historical perspective of the Raza Unida Party; to analyze in a theoretic sense the feasibility of a Raza Unida Party in the United States particularly in the State of California by means of the experiences of La Raza Unida (in California and elsewhere) cognizant of the realities of California politics and the divergence of philosophical thinking and political awareness among the Chicanos in this state.

Focus will specifically be on the County of Los Angeles, keeping in mind a statewide view; for if the Party is to become a successful reality, it must be a coordinated statewide effort.

There are three arguments used out front by the Democratic Party and others to discourage the development of Raza Unida in California: 1) La Raza Unida in southwest Texas has the clear advantage of numbers; 2) the Democratic Party in Texas is a more racist and inflexible Party than that in California; no ethnic political party has truly succeeded in electing candidates to office in the United States.

Each of these arguments needs to be examined

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Los Angeles City has around 400,000 Chicanos 20% of the total population, but does not have a Chicano Councilman out of the 15. The County of Los Angeles has over 1,000,000 Chicanos, but has no Chicano County Commissioner and the State of California with nearly 3,000,000 Chicanos, 15% of the population, has two Chicano Assemblymen out of 80 (neither of the Chicano Assemblymen has illustrated its great inflexibility and an outright discrimination in dealing with the Mexican.

It was apparent that despite a strong and forceful statewide effort, that in 1971 the Democratic legislature would protect incumbent Democrats in the Chicano gerrymandered districts. Before the US Commission of Civil Rights State Advisory hearing in January 1971 in Sacramento, Jess Unruh called the Chicano "politically naive" and "unaware of political realities" when asked if the legislature would move to redistrict against incumbent Democrats.

In the past, because of residency requirements, literacy tests and English proficiency, a very small percentage of eligible voters were registered to vote. The Chicano has been an important political force and the Democrats have never had to be responsive to Chicano needs.

The third argument deals with a misjudgment of RUP concepts for the Party is not an end in itself. The value of nationalism both on the cultural and language levels are well recognized as excellent tools to unite Mexican people. The Chicano vote

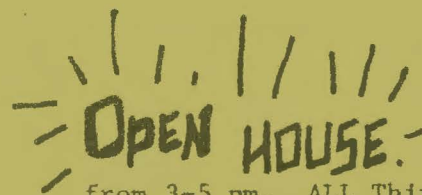
## FOOD COOP
