Taste and Distinction: Sentimental Constructions of Art and Artists in Mid-Nineteenth Century America is the topic of a lecture to be presented at 3:30 p.m. April 22 at the University of California, San Diego. The lecture is free and open to the public.

Rachel Klein, associate professor in the UCSD Department of History, will explore the growing popularity of art exhibitions in the mid-nineteenth century United States through an analysis of art and artists as they were depicted in women's literature.
