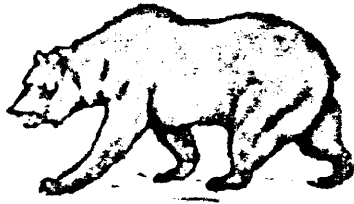

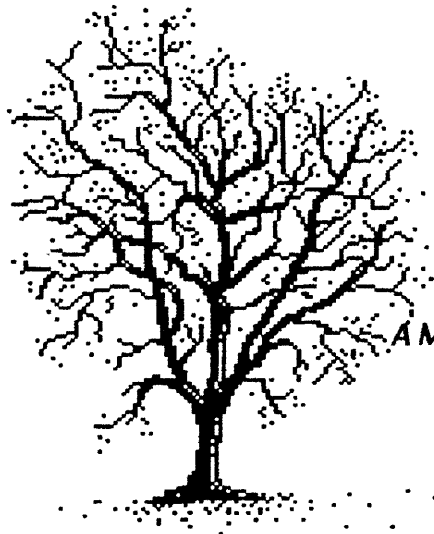

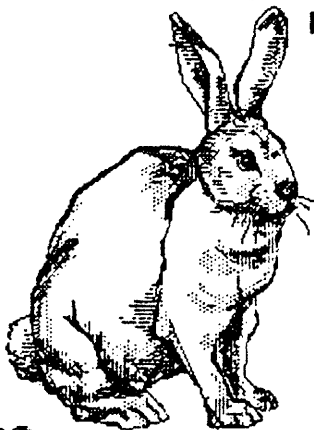

This year the Oceanids' Newsletter "Bear Facts" celebrates its 40th birthday.

The first issue under the editorship of Carol Schultz was printed in October of 1962 and mailed to all women associated with the university, also distributed to all students and staff.

The upper campus of the university, the "new" campus was established in 1960 as the "University of California at La Jolla". A year later the name was changed to "University of California at San Diego". The lower campus, the Department of Oceanography, had been founded as an independent biological research station in 1903. It became a part of the University of California in 1912 as the "Scripps Institution for Biological Research (from 1925 onfor Oceanography)" or "Scripps" in short.

The Oceanids grew out of a young wives club which was organized in 1946 and set up as an organization on the Scripps campus in 1952. Since the ocean played such an important role for the institution they called themselves Oceanids (O-cé-a-nids) for the ocean nymphs in Greek mythology who were the daughters of Oceanus and Tethys.

The following is an excerpt of a letter from the Oceanids president, Helen Raitt, which was published in the first issue of Bear Facts:

America is cluttered with organizations. The women on this campus feel that there is no point to carrying on an organization unless it has a service to render. Our group, the Women's Campus Club, "The Oceanids" has been told it is needed.

At the moment, UCSD is a campus in transition, and so our needs for services are different from those of many other institutions. [...] More newcomers will be arriving than ever before. There are numerous ways in which our organization is helping, and can help, in meeting the exciting challenge of building a new university.

Our organization also provides a means for bringing all women of the campus together for friendly participation in the above services as well as in more purely social activities. [...] There are a number of acitivity groups which provide outlets for a variety of interests.....

**Participants with Healthy Eyes Needed for Eye Research
(Volunteers paid \$10.00 per hour)**

The Shiley Eye Center at UCSD is conducting a research study concerning the effects of aging and glaucoma on vision. We are testing individuals with healthy eyes (volunteers with glasses or contacts are accepted) ages 50 or older. Participants will receive a complete ophthalmological eye exam at no cost. Testing includes: color vision, peripheral vision, motion perception, contrast sensitivity and resolution ability. In addition, photographs and laser images of the eye will be taken. There are no known risks and the entire evaluation is easy and comfortable.

Testing requires two visits for approximately 5 hours and volunteers will be compensated with \$10.00 per hour. If you or someone you know would like to volunteer, call Tess Acera for more information at (858) 822-1643. Your cooperation may provide early diagnosis and better care to patients with glaucoma.

TRAVEL MUSINGS

I am a traveler. I come from a small country [The Netherlands; Ed.]. If you start in the center of my country and travel in any direction for less than two hours, you find yourself in a different one. The people will speak a different language, have different customs, even their food will taste different. So I learned to speak many languages early, in order to understand these people and enjoy the differences.

During my childhood, my parents liked to vacation in small villages along the Mediterranean in southern France. Two years ago, I rendezvoused with my sister in one of these villages, and we took our own children on a tour of our childhood past. The villages had changed. High-rise hotels occupied spots where we had camped or picnicked. Noisy video arcades had invaded formerly peaceful squares. But our favorite café was still there, the tree in front of the terrace just giving more shade. On this hot afternoon, the cicadas (cicadas) were droning their song, and the new owners served us the same refreshing lemon sherbet we had years ago.

So things had changed, yet stayed the same. There was the smell of the Mediterranean. The hot sun and a slight breeze that brought fragrances of parasol pines, eucalyptus trees, wild rosemary and camomille. There were the throngs of vacationers spread out on the beaches, splashing in the water or sailing. A different set of old men played "jeu de bouille" in the shade of the trees. My sister and I reminisced while our children explored on their rollerblades, creating their own memories.

That summer I also wanted to visit some islands off the Adriatic coast of what was known as Yugoslavia. We had planned to take the ferry from Ancona, Italy to Zadar, where we would meet my father. But the ferry was not taking passengers, only bringing in refugees. It took weeks before I contacted my father, who had sailed his boat to safer waters, after the marina he was in was being shelled. So in Yugoslavia the change was severe and possibly irreversible. My father thinks no one will vacation there again during his lifetime. His memories of sunny, peaceful summers passed there over the last thirty years, were wiped out by hatred. The good friends, with whom he spent happy times in the ancient towns along the coast, have become each other's enemy.

What prompted me to write this? I now live in San Diego, California. This sunny morning, when I opened the window and took in the fragrance of the flowering mimosa tree in my garden, I was transported to other places and other times. Agatha Christy once wrote: "One cannot, ever, go back to the places which exist in memory." What I can do though, since people and places are so inconstant, is to travel within.

I can find happiness in the fact that there is a flowering mimosa tree near my window, and that I can stroll on a beach along the Pacific, while watching dolphins dance through the surf. I can photograph the flowering orange and blue Bird-of-Paradise and brilliant magenta Bougainvillea, purple and pink sunrises, deep orange sunsets, right in my own backyard. I am a traveler, but these days I do not have to go far.



California, San Diego in particular, has many things to entice a traveler. Besides visiting all the well-known attractions like the Zoo, the Wild Animal Park, Sea World and the new Stephen Birch Aquarium in La Jolla, one can do many enjoyable things.

I like to bike along the coast and have favorite hangouts for lunch or a coffee in Del Mar and Carlsbad. It is fun to take the ferry across the bay to Coronado and have lunch in one of the restaurants with a view over the bay and the city. One can picnic on one of the grassy areas on Shelter Island and observe a sailing race.

Pacific Beach is great for people watching and to have a close-up look from the pier of the surfers pirouetting through the waves. Downtown Encinitas makes you time-travel to the sixties; tie dye was never out of style here. There are paths along the lagoons that bring you close to exotic waterfowl. There are gardens and parks conducive to meditation.

One can have a wonderful vacation each day of the year.
