




The Pine Hills Loop

Trip Par Excellence



D INE Hills Lodge, one of the county's pretiest mountain resorts, is located 68 miles east of San Diego in the Cuyamaca mountains, Leaving Third and Plaza the big Safety Coach passes through the business district to winding Pershing Drive, thence to the village of La Mesa and on to the bounteous grape country surrounding El Cajon. Traveling through miles of bearing vineyards, we continue on the paved Imperial Valley highway to the base of the picturesque Cuyamaca range. Here we branch off of the beaten paths and start our climb of forty miles over perfect granite roads to the very summit, through clouds, mile high to San Diego's most scenic mountain resort, Pine Hills Lodge. Enroute we skirt the edges of Lake Cuyamaca, truly a fisherman's paradise with its rainbow and steelhead trout filled waters while on its edges and now water-filled by the lake, is the famous old Stonewall gold mine, where three million dollars in gold was removed during the gold rush of '49. On we go climbing through gigantic pine trees past other mines






now in operation to the very edge of the mountains where we pause for a glimpse of the barren desert, reaching away in its sandy wastes to the Salton Sea 45 miles distant, vet quite plainly visable. Continuing on our way we enter the famous old mining town of Julian, now however, given over to the production of the nationally famous Julian apples and here starts the last lap of our climb to beautiful Pine Hills. On arriving we take deep breaths of the invigorating mountain air, perfumed with the fragrance of pine needles and wild lilac and wonder if really in all the world there is another spot like this. Glancing around us we see pretty little double log cottages nestling 'neath the pines, rustic yet modern in every re-





spect; above us we are surprised to see houses built in the trees, cozy and unique, while just ahead is the Big Lodge itself. We rush over nature's playground in rapture until summoned into the big dining room to satisfy our barefoot boy appetities on a bounteous, yet daintily prepared, meal of fresh, wholesome food, lunch some will run to the swimming pool, some to the tennis courts, or maybe some will dance. Others will want to get out into the pines again, those giants whose branches seem to touch the very heavens, possibly some will not be satisfied to merely walk beneath the trees with their velvety carpet of needles, but will want a saddle-pony whereby they can cover more of the picturesque bridle paths-who







knows just what will appeal most to each individual. Finally with regret we learn it is time to wend our way homeward. Then we realize that we still have a treat in store for us in the nature of beautiful views, unsurpassed in their immensity and scope of country. Broad, fertile valleys stretching away in vast panorama from the base of rugged rock cliffs thousands of feet directly beneath us. Going on through cattle ranches we wonder what now could be of interest and we are in Ramona, that pretty little back-country village given over to poultry farming. We see thousands and tens of thousands of chickens, but we can't tarry long so reluctantly pass on over the winding San Pasqual grade to the famous old battlefield. Here



we stop for a glimpse of monument and drive on to the shores of beautiful lake Hodges, over the lake we pass on its scenic bridge up over the Poway grade and down into Old Town, past Ramona's Marriage Place and into the city and
