Jini Special Report No. 2/1961-62 - Mr. J.
Bradbury, C.F.O.

Your memorandum 67-1-3 dated 31st July,
1962 refers.

The surveying of only six miles of bridle
track in a 44 days patrol, notwithstanding the points
listed by Mr. Bradbury, does not appear satisfactory.
The required grade of 5° may be suitable for undulating
country, but in the precipitous Jini River Valley this
I consider will result in a road of enormous distance.
Where necessary steeper grades for short distances
could be surveyed. The road from Tamba-Mapananda, which
at its highest point is 9,500' ASL, has some grades of
7° and motor cycles, Bovers, Tractors and trucks have
no difficulty surmounting them.

It is hoped that the Jini Field Staff are
taking advantage of the dry season to have this survey
completed.

Camping Allowance claims were not received.



Camping allowance claim.

The above is forwarded herewith.

The above patrol was to my mind unsuccessful. In all, only about 6 miles were marked. Why so little was accomplished is due to the following reasons:-

(1) Rugged landscape - this made going very slow as the patrol often had to discard routes because a certain height could not be reached.

(2) The lack of advice from a technical officer or an experienced senior officer.

(3) The lack of an aerial survey to determine roughly the route of the track.

(4) The lack of 8 tents. Mr. Edwards needed all the tents for his lower Jimi patrol. Time was wasted in this way as there was often an hours walk to the end of the previous days work.

(5) Perhaps the most retarding factor of all was the fact that HML receives 170 inches of rain per year and the time spent at HML was in the middle of the rain season. Quite often road marking was brought to a halt before 12 o'clock by very heavy downpours.

I feel that these points might be worth noting for future officers attempting this work.

To let police mark a track is one thing, but to mark out a well graded track is something which takes time, patience and ~~INITIATIVE~~ initiative. To mark out the track from Sabihaga to Kol would take from two to five months. This would be well worthwhile time spent as this track would be able to take a jeep with widening. I feel that it would be unfair to the natives to make them build a road which may have to be altered and rerouted as progress makes a vehicular road essential.

Jimi Special Patrol Report 2/1961 - 62.

On the instructions of the O.I.C., I departed Tabibuga on the afternoon of Tuesday, 6th. March, 1962, together with Constables 2335 TABONI, 7686 IANA, 10671 MAKIBAN, 10839 SANDARI, to investigate into the possibilities of a motor cycle track constructed to link the principal establishment of the Jimi Valley area via :- Kol and Tabibuga. After reviewing the situation I commenced to mark out a gently graded track, within the bounds of 5 degrees. The following is a diary of the patrol.

Tuesday, March, 6th.

Departed Tabibuga Patrol Post at 1300 hours and arrived at MANEP Rest House at 1830 hrs. Camped overnight.

Wednesday, March, 7th.

Departed MANEP 930 hrs. and arrived OIMA Rest House at 1230. Discussed possible road sites and the aim of the Administration in building the track with various Village Official's. Camped overnight.

Thursday, March, 8th.

Departed OIMA 930 hrs. and arrived WARAMANTS 1200 hrs. Reception quite warm. Some poultry and a quantity of native foods were offered to patrol. Camped the night.

Friday, March, 9th.

Stepped the day at WARAMANTS to discuss the road with Officials and to become fully acquainted with the terrain, rock outcrops and other features which would affect the course of the proposed track.

Saturday, March, 10th.

Departed WARAMANTS 0830 hrs. and arrived Kol 1200 hrs. Reception quite good, a quantity of native foods and some poultry were offered to the patrol. The buildings were in good condition owing to a group of policemen having supervised their repair just recently.

Sunday, March, 10th.

Owing to proximity of Missions, no work was done on Sundays.

Monday, March, 12th.

Prepared surveying instruments whilst local natives and police carried out minor repairs to rest house.

Tuesday, March, 13th.

Began a pencil census check in order to ascertain the working potential and to check on whether the excels of those afraid of any work was still going on. The migrations in and out do not appear to be inconsistent with the general trend of population movements elsewhere in the Jini.

Wednesday, March, 14th.

Completed census revision which was interrupted yesterday, owing to heavy rain. Discussions were held on the purpose of the road and its advantages. The natives appeared to appreciate these advantages and seemed genuinely keen on their promotion.

Thursday, March, 15th.

Began investigations of possible routes.

Friday, March, 16th.

Walked up to the ridge above WARAMANTS. The marking of a well graded track to Kri creek is quite simple and $\frac{1}{2}$ of the distance. The main problem is climbing 450' in a short distance and at the same time keeping a good grade.

Saturday, March, 17th.

Walked through the bush on the WARAMANTS side of the Kri river with the thought in mind of following the Walma river and branching off at the junction of the Kri/Walma junction and so head to the top of the WARAMANTS/KOL, divide. I feel that perhaps this is the better route - there is a larger distance over which to climb the 450 or more feet.

Sunday, March, 18th.

Relaxed.

Monday, March, 19th.

Government workday - supervised minor works and repairs on station. The road from the airstrip to the Lutheran Mission was given the repair it badly needed. During the afternoon I investigated further possible routes for the motor - bike track.

Tuesday, March, 20th.

Departed Kol at 0900 hours and followed the Walma downstream with view of a track completely by passing the divide and going around it. Such a route would go around the back of Olna rest house and down to Waramants. Arrived Kri/Walma junction 1035. Arrived Kol 1230 hours. Continued around the point and arrived at Gobe Lutheran Mission station (a site P.O. Griffin once marked as an airstrip for the Mission). Some very tasty oranges were given to the patrol and the trees were bearing very prolifically. Perhaps this may be a very good area for citrus. Arrived WARAMANTS 4600 hours. *The route developed being to distance very much further than anticipated.*

Wednesday, 21st. March.

Departed WARAMANTS 0930 hrs. and arrived Kol 1300 hrs. Heavy rain stopped any further work.

Thursday, March, 22nd.

Investigated starting sites for track.

Friday, March, 23rd.

Began marking track from Kwi river to Kol. Completed about one third of the length.

Saturday, March, 24th.

Started marking the track from the Kol end. Work interrupted by heavy rain in afternoon.

Sunday, March, 25th.

Relaxed.

Monday, March, 26th.

Marked approximately one and a half miles of track.

Tuesday, March, 27th.

Marked only a short distance owing to the terrain.

Wednesday, March, 28th.

Marked about half mile of track. Progress slow owing to encountering thick areas of pit - pit.

Thursday, March, 29th.

Completed section of track to Kwi River.

Friday, March, 30th.

Visited Kwi Mission station to investigate possibilities of using this as a camp for further activities. Mr. Junker gave me permission to stay in one of his Mission houses not being used at the time.

Saturday, March, 31st.

Reconnaissance during the morning. Heavy rain halted further work in the afternoon.

Sunday, April, 1st.

Relaxed.

Monday, April, 2nd.

Reconnaissance work only.

Tuesday, April, 3rd.

Further investigation to ensure that there were no impassable objects on the roughly surveyed route.

Wednesday, April, 4th.

Began working on the Kol side to the river.
Completed marking almost to the river.

Thursday, April, 5th.

Crossed the river and marked out about half
mile of track.

Friday, April, 6th.

Marked a further half mile of track.

Saturday, April, 7th.

Marked another five hundred yards of track but
was unable to climb the height expected and ran into a sheer
rock face about thirty feet up from where I got to. I had
expected to go over the top of this cliff.

Sunday, April, 8th.

Relaxed.

Monday, April, 9th.

Began working from the finish of Friday's work
and was able to gain the necessary height by going back with
the "S" bend. Completed marking about 500 yards of road.

Tuesday, April, 10th.

Marked out 300 yards. A heavy shower (two inches)
interrupted the work for the day at 1200 hours.

Wednesday, April, 11th.

Completed marking the track to the top of the
Kol/Varamanta divide.

Thursday, April, 12th.

Heard a few minor disputes and sent 3 young coere
back to Tadi for U.A.A. hearing. Also an appeal for a village
official by the small group at Sal. The latter was noted in
village books for the attention of the next Officer going
through that area as patrol.

Friday, April, 13th.

Reported Tadi at 1045 hours after a talk with
village officials. Arrived Olna 1015 hours.

Saturday, April, 14th.

Reported Olna 0930 hours and arrived Magin
at 1430 hours.

Sunday, April, 15th.

Reported Magin 0715 hours and arrived Tadi
1230 hours.



PATROL REPORT No. 3 of 1961-1962.

KUNGA OKSUS DIVISION.

Wednesday, 23rd May.

Constable I/O Tauoni accompanied by Constables Pashien and Iana departed Tabibuga for Ginjaaji Rest House at 0910. Tents, rations, etc. accompanying them. Self, Senior Constable Kalembi, Constables Waingetu, Mariban, Bagepe, Sandari, Almo and Tokake, departed Tabibuga at 1400 hours for Kwio Rest House.

Arrived Jimi River Gano suspension bridge at 1630 hours. Bridge only recently repaired. Kwio natives did not turn up in force for carrying duties despite three warnings in the preceding week. Tultals Ngarin and Ki told their groves not to go to their boundary and carry cargo ~~which~~ - bride purchasing ceremony being conducted. Also, this group now reaching the culmination point of their pig-killing cycle. Patrol arrived at Kwio Rest House at 1900 hours. Senior Constable Kalembi and Constable Mariban arrived at 2000 hours carrying bag of salt. No firewood or water present.

Met Mr. and Mrs Cook, Anthropologists, who are resident at Kwio. Mr Cook had apparently told both Tultals Ngarin and Ki that I was arriving today. I was also informed that a small boy had been savaged by a bear the previous day and that he, the boy, was being concealed.

Thursday, 24th May.

Instructions issued for the a/m boy to be brought to the patrol for medical treatment. N.M.O. Kuni accompanying the patrol. Medical inspection. Officials reproached Settled dispute concerning a young girl who was being forced into marriage with a man she despised. This same girl had endeavoured to commit suicide by jumping off the cane bridge onto the Jimi River. Two males who attempted to kill her (observed by Mr Cook) interviewed. Tultal Ngarin heavily involved and appears unsuited for Tultal's job.

Friday, 25th May.

Kwlop to Togban

Departed Kwlop at 0840 hours and arrived at Togban Rest House at 0940 hours.
Rest House and Barracks in good condition. Census revision. New names recorded. Medical Inspection.

Saturday, 26th May.

Anglican Mission station inspected. Disputes heard.
Two probationary appointments made:-

WAREB-NANJIN married with two wives and two children. Does not speak Pidgin. No previous convictions. Belongs to Agika group.

KALONG EOI MARRIED WITH ONE WIFE AND four children. Does not speak Pidgin. No previous convictions. Belongs to Warebuka group.

Sunday, 27th May.

Discussions with officials. Togban people not very interested in having an Aid Post established at Togban. Land dispute Togban v Kwira - concerns pre-European times so people informed of score. This dispute may be brought to the next patrol with a more current content.

Monday, 28th May.

Departed Togban at 0820 hours and arrived at Kwira Rest House at 1100 hours.
Census of Yisinban groups from "Dega". In the 200 odd censused forty two (42) cases of scabies detected. The incidence of scabies among the children higher than among the adults. It was decided to discontinue census proceedings to allow N.M.O. Kunai to give treatments.

Tuesday, 29th May.

Census of the Tugaa group. One hundred and three (103) cases of scabies and six yaws cases detected. No complaints.
The people here are rather keen to have an Aid Post established at Kwira. This would be the only Administration Aid Post in the Kumoga Census Division. Most other groups in this division are definitely not keen on having Aid Posts established.
I suggest that future patrols to the area bring two or three A.P.O.s who can remain behind (with Police) to continue treatment. This would help combat the notion that one treatment is sufficient to cure anything. Light showers of rain during the afternoon.

Wednesday, 30th May.

Discussions. Anglican Mission school visited.
N.M.O. Kunai continued treatments.

Thursday, 31st May.

Departed Kwira at 0630 hours and arrived KARENG Rest House at 1130 hours. Road good; housing good; food adequate. N.M.O. Kunai, Constables Weirgeta and Aimo left at Kwira to continue medical treatment. The improvement being effected in "health" should prove useful propaganda for the establishment of an Aid Post here at Kwira.
Census revision.

Friday, 1st June.

Worked on census figures. Discussions.

Saturday, 2nd June.

Departed Kabeng at 0830 hours and arrived KOMPIAI Rest House at 0930 hours. Road good; housing good; reception good; food plentiful. Census revision. Village officials from Tsuwankai and Kinimbong visited the patrol. One man gaoled for two months (C.N.L.) for failing to attend census revision. Male was present when patrol arrived but disappeared shortly afterwards - found in his house one hour's walk away. This same male was sought by the last patrol for failing to attend census revision. N.M.O. Sunai's party arrived at Kabeng at 1030 hours and, in view of the reasonable standard of health of the Kabeng people, will move to Kompiai on Monday.

Sunday, 3rd June.

Compiled census figures. Worked on map.

Monday, 4th June.

Census revision Books III and IV. Forty eight new names entered in Book IV which will be rewritten in the next few days. Constable Bagape to Kabeng with prisoner. He is to collect sick people requiring hospitalisation at Tabibaga or Mount Hagen. N.M.O. Sunai's party arrived ex Kabeng at 0950 hours. Medical inspection of the Kawassi people. There is a not too well patronised Mission Aid Post here at Kompiai. Discussions. Complaints concerning disregard of Kompiai/Kabeng land boundaries by Kabeng natives. Land Boundary disputes were settled by P.O. Griffin in 1956 but the Kabeng natives are always willing to seek further adjudication in the matter in the hope that there will be a reversal of the previous decision.

Tuesday, 5th June.

Departed Kompiai at 0840 hours and arrived Tsuwankai Rest House at 1150 hours. Reception good and food adequate. Light showers of rain prevented the census being taken. N.M.O. Sunai arrived at 1730 hours accompanied by Constable Weingeta. Constable Sandari left at Kompiai to ascertain names of trespassers.

Wednesday, 6th June.

Census revision completed after considerable delays. Medical inspection. Forty people have names at both Tsuwankai and Kinimbong (c/- O.I.C. Simbai Patrol Post). Few people whose names are recorded at Tsuwankai had allegedly migrated to Kinimbong but their names were not recorded at the latter mentioned place. A note made in the Kinimbong book for the consideration of the O.I.C. Simbai. The O.I.C. Simbai had suggested (vide remarks contained in the Kabeng Rest House books) that the Tsuwankai

people assemble at Kinisbong Rest House which is four hours' walk from Tsuwankai Rest House. This would mean that the Tsuwankai people would come under the Madang District Administration. It was noted that Tsuwankai people who have land in the Kinisbong area had already migrated to that place. The people who remained at Tsuwankai expressed a desire to remain at Tsuwankai because:-

- (a) They had extensive land and gardens in the immediate vicinity of the Tsuwankai Rest House.
- (b) They live two hours' walk away from the crest of the Bismarck ranges and on the Jimi fall.

The people were informed that the expanding and "land hungry" Kawassai group would probably encroach upon Tsuwankai land if they, the Tsuwankai people, migrated out to Kinisbong.

As things stand at the moment the people who assemble at Tsuwankai Rest should remain the concern of the O.I.C. Jimi Patrol Post.

Questions concerning the group structure revealed the following:-

- Main group KINEAGA
- Three sub groups WETAKAI
- AMANGKAI
- ATIKAI
- WETAKAI s.group Provisional Puluai AINUA
- AMANGKAI s.group Tultul WUBA
- ATIKAI s.group Headmen THAKA and AIWO

Some ATIKAI people now assemble at Kinisbong. Iulua Tsuwankai, the leader of this breakaway group, was provisionally appointed Tultul by P.O. Ryan (O.I.C. JIMI) in March, 1959. It was the O.I.C. Siskai who followed Tsuwankai's appointment through. Representations made for the appointment of a Tsuwankai resident Tultul - Aihua provisionally appointed. Aihua appears to have much influence with the people and his demeanour indicates that he probably participates in all the shady deals about the place. He seems to have a grossly inflated idea of his own importance but should prove reasonable when deflated. Aihua is married with one wife (second wife died) and two children (three children died 1959, 1960, 1961). He was provisionally appointed Tultul by P.O. Ryan in 1959.

The Tultul's emblem held by WUBA of the Amangkai group was handed out by the O.I.C. Siskai. Wuba was provisionally appointed Tultul by P.O. Ryan in 1959.

Discussions. Shyness shown yesterday not too noticeable today.

Thursday, 7th June

Departed Tsuwankai at 0605 hours and arrived at Djigomp ridge at 0910 hours. Changed carriers. Dispute over boundary. The Kawassai natives claim that the boundary, Kameng Creek, lies a further 200 yards inside the Kundaga (Tsuwankai Rest House) territory. The ground in question belongs to neither the Kawassai nor Kundaga groups but to the Tonda group which assembles at Koinambi Rest House.

The Fumasi relinquished control of the ground after being routed by the Fumasi. The Fumasi are allies of the Huiyaga.

Some years ago a post was erected at Kanyo Creek but such post (which marked the Kanyasi/Huiyaga boundary) was removed the day after the patrol left (by the Huiyaga). Post was re-erected at former site and all Huiyaga informed.

The patrol continued on its way but was detained some time afterwards by Taitai Ebara of Kabung. This Taitai raised a dispute concerning a section of land known as "Tumasi". Dispute settled some years ago.

Arrived Kanyasi at 12 noon to be met by well armed group of fifty to sixty Huiyaga (Kabung Rest House) who had come to have land disputes settled. Previous decisions have been upheld and adverse to what recently stated, it seems, indicates that purchasing land is getting hard to find. The largest stands of land in the area are to be seen within the Kanyasi tribal boundary. The Huiyaga are in much the same position as the Kanyasi. A close watch will be kept on these two groups. The possibility of a "free for all" should not be overlooked. To maintain the peace in the area some form of disciplinary action should be taken against trespassers.

Inspected Anglican Mission school in the area.

Arrived Koinasi Rest House at 1815 hours. Reception good. Housing good. Food plentiful including sweetbread.

Friday, 8th June.

Census revision and Medical inspection. Three people to go to Ngan firikin grafts. All three refuse to go.

Fifty two new names recorded.

Saturday, 9th June.

Departed Koinasi Rest House at 0800 hours and arrived Pint Creek at 0830 hours. Changed Carriers.

Departed Pint Creek at 0930 hours arriving Huiyaga Rest House at 1030 hours.

Census revision and Medical check.

Comments that Huiyaga services at Dabagai Rest House were disappointing the estate, but Huiyaga/Kanyasi land boundaries were heard and later found to be correct.

The warning given to the Huiyaga in November, 1961, has apparently been ignored.

Sunday, 10th June.

Re-wrote Fumasi Book IV and completed census figures for Huiyaga.

One large pig brought to the patrol by Headman HUIY of the Arega group. A request was made that HUIY be made a Taitai as his group has no "brass".

All informed that the present number of Officials were quite, quite adequate..

Monday, 11th June.

M.M.C. Kuni, Constables Aimo and Soingetu arrived at 0900 hours. Medical inspection.

The Kirguzan people have, perhaps, the best pigs and Best House in the Chit Valley.
Some napping done.

Tuesday, 15th June.

Departed Kirguzan Best House at 0900 hours and arrived at the Adkashid/Kushaga cart at 1100 hours. Some discussion concerning trespass by the Kirguzan natives.

Reported at 1150 hours and arrived at the newly constructed Bohopal Best House at 1200 hours.

Light afternoon showers of rain.

Wednesday, 15th June.

Census revision and medical inspection. Fifty nine new names recorded.

New village 5/2 for the BAKA, BAKA/KHONG sub group issued.

One wife, YIP-BHAKH given two months I.L.L. for concealing an unnecessarily crippled child. The child was discovered when a Constable was dispatched to check on a female adult who had allegedly given birth to a child the day before. The house in which the child was located was only 15 minutes walk from the local school. Thirteen people whose names had not been previously recorded were found hiding nearby.

One male BAK-BHAKH given I.L.L. for not seeking medical treatment for his thirteen year old son, who had a very large T.U. on his leg. The boy had lost the use of the leg which had "withered". When I passed through the area in November, 1954, BAK informed me that his son had died. Medical treatment is readily obtainable at the local Kirguzan station. Dr. J. H. Smith had earlier suggested that a leg cast be established at Bohopal but the idea was not favorably received.

YIPH-BHAKH who is married with two wives and six children provisionally appointed Inham. The last Inham for this group died in 1958. Remarks placed on the fact that the appointment was only provisional as I have no doubts as to the suitability of this man. He is the unanimous choice of the people but would be a "stand-in" for some more influential person who has as far remained anonymous. YIPH is a member of the BAKA/KHONG sub group.

QUNH-YIPH, married with one wife and no children provisionally appointed Inham for the KHONG group.

Thursday, 14th June.

Medical treatment continued by H.M.O. Kuzi. Inspected the Anglican Mission and was rather impressed by the Russian teacher, Karen Taylor. Eight new names recorded for inclusion in the next census medical revision.

Friday, 15th June.

Departed Bohopal Best House at 0835 hours and arrived

at Kankashang Rest House at 1215 hours.
Constable Tokala to Patrol Post with prisoners and people
requiring hospital treatment in Nagam.
Census revision completed in four hours.
Sub group names ascertained.
Sankashang book withdrawn and two new ones issued.
Medical inspection.

Saturday, 15th June.

Completed census books and figures.
Worked on map.

Sunday, 17th June.

Departed for Sankashang Rest House at 0830 hours and arrived there
at 1030 hours. Reception good. Found adequate
including one pig. Rest house recently rebuilt under
supervision.
Census revision and medical inspection.
Kankashang asked the accompanied patrol to assist
the Sankashang natives fed.
Hospital Orderly TAI arrived at 1530 hours.

Monday, 18th June.

Discussions.
It was pleasing to note that these people have lost
some of the shyness they displayed on my earlier visit.
Medical treatment continued.
Re-carried last section of Kankashang to Sankashang track
in order to bypass unnecessary ascent and descent.
Sankashang people to complete this 200 yard section of track
within the next eight months.

Tuesday, 19th June.

Departed Sankashang at 0830 hours with Kankashang carriers
arrived Winkhaji Rest House at 1215 hours and met by
Constable I/O Tsoni, Gomo and other Sankashang and Lam.
Census revision completed. One Winkhaji boat to be
requisitioned owing to addition of new names and the initial
census of a new group.
Medical inspection by M.M.O. Hwai and Hospital Orderly
TAI.
Kankashang carriers paid for their services.
Obtained information on unorganized groups near Winkhaji and
Tsonkhiap. Word sent to Tsonkhiap people to repair
their canoe bridges over the Jial River.
Constable Tokala arrived at Tabilva at 1415 hours.

Wednesday, 20th June.

Completed census books and figures.
Police drilled and practice shot held.
One middle aged woman brought to the patrol (as requested)
and found to have pneumonia very badly. She could
not have survived a further three days. Treatment
started.

Heavy rain during the night.

Thursday, 21st June.

Patrol cargo packed in order to ascertain the number
of permanent carriers required for the Lower Jial trip.

Further medical treatment given. Pneumonia case responding well.

Friday, 22nd June.

Constables BAMBEN and IAWA to the Menjin area to to obtain carriers.

Constable I/O Naunni and Constable Maribon to Tisanki with tents and rations for Police and interpreters. They will await the return of Constables Bamben and Iawa and carriers and then proceed to Teaulap Rest House to await us.

N.M.C. Kumi and Hospital Orderly Tai together with Constables Waingeta and Bagape left at Ginginji. Kumi instructed to remain until pneumonia case cured.

Self with Senior Constable Kaleski, Constables Sandari Aino, and Tokaka, to Gondoban Rest House in 2 hours 5 minutes.

Census revision commenced. Obtained further information on vaccinated group west of Waica.

Saturday, 23rd June.

Census completed. No complaints.
Sisnai Policeman arrived to inform us that the O.I.C. Sisnai was on patrol.

Sunday, 24th June.

Departed Gondoban Rest House at 0830 hours and proceeded along the graded Gondoban-Waica track for twelve minutes then left same and ascended a ridge track which would bring the patrol to the crest of the Bismarck range.

N.M.C. Kumi's party arrived at Gondoban at 0940 hours. (Sisnai man met on track told to assemble for medical inspection. (I found out later that no women or children assembled for medical inspection.)

At 1030 hours the patrol, having already crossed the crest of the Bismarcks, linked up with the recently built Sisnai-Maburuf track. A few Sisnai natives met the patrol to assist the Gondoban and Waica carriers. Arrived Sisnai Patrol Post at 1300 hours. Pitched tents next to Sisnai Aid Post. Sisnai Police helpful.

Monday, 25th June.

Contacted Madang R.T.C.
Departed Sisnai Patrol Post at 1030 hours and followed graded track for 3/4 hour then the patrol followed a rough and overgrown native track and then a creek bed for some distance. Reached the top of the Sisnai Jini Divide at 1240 hours. Then followed a very long rough descent down steep inclines to the Gondoban-Waica road which was reached at 1410 hours. Arrived Waica Rest house at 1510 hours. Most of the Sisnai males met on the track refused to assist the patrol's carriers who have, on various occasions, assisted the Sisnai people with road work. Met two headmen from Tearap, a previously unvisited (by either P.O. or Native Police) site situated approximately 3 to 4 miles west of Waica. It is interesting to note that the Waica and Tearap people

have, of their own accord, built a fairly well graded track between Waian and Tuarap. A few sections have yet to be completed.

Did some mapping.

Tuesday, 26th June.

Census revision and Medical inspection.

One female child who was reported dead was later found in parents' house. Several other people sighted by police disappeared as the police came into view. (These people have yet to attend a census revision.)

Wednesday, 27th June.

Departed Waian Rest House at 0840 hours and arrived at Tuarap census ground at 1055 hours. This site will have to be levelled at a later date to enable the construction of a Rest House and etc..

N.M.O. Hurwi's party arrived at 1230 hours accompanied by Waian people who require further medical treatment.

Food adequate including one pig.

Rough census commenced at 1400 hours. Medical inspection. During the evening the names were transferred to three population Village books (269 people in all). People most co-operative.

Thursday, 28th June.

People informed that a Lalua would be appointed when the following conditions were completed:-

WAIAN to TUARAP and TUARAP to KAIMENT CREEK
Roadwaters.

Two provisional Taltals appointed:-

AMA TUBURAP, aged 54 years. Married with wife and no kids. Does not speak Pidgin. Sibeng group.

KURUMAI-KOORAI, aged 42 years. Married with two wives and six children. Does not speak Pidgin. Tau group.

Census revision conducted today to give people an idea of what is required. Thirty two more people arrived to make the initial total 269.

The people on the western side of the Kaiment Creek speak a different 'language' to the Tuarap people- very few Tuarap people can converse with the people who reside on the other side of the Kaiment. It is claimed that these people far outnumber the Tuarap people (This supports information obtained at Sibai.). Gardens and houses on the other side of the Kaiment viewed through 30x50 binoculars.

The two provisional Taltals who have never been outside their area (not even to Sibai Patrol Post) will accompany the Patrol to Mount Nager and thence Tahibuga. Two young Tuarap lads also to accompany the patrol as trainee interpreters.

Plans very bad here so will endeavour to forward an A.P.C. with the Police who come here at a later date to build the Rest House, etc..

A Taitai from Teandap arrived at 1825 hours to inform me that Constable 1/C Tansani's party arrived. Taitai informed that I will arrive at Teandap on the morrow..

Friday, 29th June.

Departed Teerap at 0610 hours and travelled over rough track to reach Teandap at 1500 hours.
Difficulty experienced in obtaining sufficient Teerap carriers (no permanent carriers with petrol).
Only sixteen Teandap males turned up to carry cargo after having been warned yesterday by Constable 1/C Tansani.
Forty Four males (44) capable of carrying cargo arrived at the Rest House at between 1030 and 1150 hours.
Road to Tihunki overgrown.
One male and his family failed to turn up for work after being informed by the Taitai that their presence was required. The male refused to attend and was backed up his refusal by shooting an arrow at the Taitai who made a hasty departure. The male threatened to kill the Taitai if he came back. A Policeman was despatched to arrest the man but he and his family could not be located. They live two days walk from Teandap Rest House and in an almost inaccessible area - no tracks. A note was made in the village book for the notice of the next patrol patrol to Teandap.

Food purchased for the permanent carrier line.

Saturday, 30th June.

At Teandap. Natives cleaning their section of the Teandap/Tihunki track.

Sunday, 1st July.

Departed Teerap at 0940 hours and arrived Tihunki at 1250 hours.

Medical examination of the Tihunki people indicates that these people are not taking full advantage of the Aid Post here.

Monday, 2nd July.

Carriers accompanied by Constables Iann and Weingeta departed for Sissai to collect rations for carriers.

Other police and remaining carriers working on new Rest House.

Medical treatment continued.

Tuesday, 3rd July.

Drawing map. Work as yesterday.

Wednesday, 4th July.

Work as yesterday. Wild pig shot by Kelambi.
Rations arrived ex Sissai at 1800 hours.

Thursday, 5th July.

Thursday, 5th July.

Constables Iama, Bagapo, Tokake and Sandari forwarded to station.

Carriers working on Rest House.

Friday, 6th July.

Departed Tisbuki at 0820 hours and arrived Singany Coffee Coconut plot at 1345 hours. Arrived Nanjia Rest House at 1750 hours (9 hours 10 minutes). This time includes numerous halts.

Saturday, 7th July.

Medical inspection. Large number of people require treatment - Aid Post not over patronised although the A.P.O. is a local native and married to a Nanjia woman.

Sunday, 8th July.

Departed Nanjia at 0840 hours and arrived at Kurunga at 12 noon. Re-wrote old village book. Medical inspection. Tents pitched as there is no Rest House here yet.

Monday, 9th July.

Departed Kurunga at 0905 hours and arrived at Falg Rest House at 1135 hours. Carriers arrived at 12 noon. The newly constructed patrol track is quite good. Interim census amendments in pencil. A.P.O. Rala who has established an Aid Post here in the last three months is doing a good job - the Aid Post is well patronised. Food plentiful.

Tuesday, 10th July.

Departed Falg at 0855 hours and travelled over newly constructed patrol track to reach Rodigna Rest House at 1100 hours. The new track has reduced the walking time by one hour. Medical inspection and treatment.

Wednesday, 11th July.

Departed Rodigna at 0900 hours and arrived at Raggk Rest House/Mission Station at 1100 hours. The Tibugga/Aniabillik/Digmbu group (c/- Headman GN) and the Tibugga/Aniabillik/Wanabo group (c/- Headman Frank and Gora) live in the vicinity of Raggk although they are censused at Anbugga Rest House in the North West Wahgi Census Division. This means that the people have to walk from five to six hours to reach their census ground. The people have requested that they be censused from Jimi Patrol Post. These people have been included (together with the main body of Tibugga people who live in the Wahgi valley) in the proposed North West Wahgi Council area. It appears that these people are using their Wahgi friends' land to plant coffee. The Wahgi resident Tibugga groups have no objections to this but they could raise objections in a few years time when land is short and when individualism increases.

Thursday, 12th July.

Departed Raggk at 0830 hours and arrived at another Mission station at 1100 hours. Medical inspection of the

Wolgi people who live in the area. Departed at
12 noon and crossed the crest of the Sepik Wabgi Divide at
1255 hours. Arrived at Kotna Lutheran Mission
Station at 1400 hours. Slept Kotna.

Friday, 18th June

Carriers and Patrol Cargo forwarded to Namja via Mala.

Police and self to Mount Hagen per three tonner.

Most of the above schools were established in 1959 or thereafter. The staff at Kwop do not get much co-operation (not the Laminas Mission also) from the Kwop people. In addition the staff are always on a "walkabout". The co-operation of the other teachers is a great deal upon their personalities. I was most impressed with the Kwop and Makopai teachers. English is being taught in all the schools. I was that ten miles around the above schools. The National Orderly, Apelles (Standard 6 student), was very keen to give treatment but I gathered that the people were not taking pills. The Kwop people are inclined to give Appendix B). The people are inclined to hide sick people from the patrol as I found out.
