

Five grad students win Woodrow Wilson Fellowships

Five University of California, San Diego graduate students are among 205 graduate students from throughout the United States and Canada who have been awarded fellowships by the Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation for the 1972-73 academic year.

Woodrow Wilson Fellowships are given to students who have completed all requirements for the Ph.D. except the doctoral dissertation. The fellowships, awarded to students from 64 major universities, enable Ph.D. candidates in the humanities and social sciences to devote their full attention to dissertation research and writing.

The five UCSD winners are: Darrel S. Cohen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Cohen of Lemon Grove; Tracy R. Lewis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Lewis of Los Angeles; Aloysius P. Martinich, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Martinich of South Euclid, Ohio; Miss Raimonda Modiano, daughter of Mrs. Salomon Modiano of Bucuresti, Romania; and Mrs. Pamela L. Munro, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Lang of Riverside, California.

Cohen, a degree candidate in the field of economics, is a graduate of Helix High School and received his bachelor's degree with honors from UCSD in 1969. His proposed dissertation topic is "The Supply Price of Capital in Relation to the Monetary Effects of Fiscal Policy."

Lewis, also a degree candidate in economics, graduated from Pacific Palisades High School and received his bachelor's degree from UCSD in 1969. His proposed dissertation topic is "Economics of Ocean Fisheries."

Mattinich, a degree candidate in philosophy, graduated from St. Joseph High School in Cleveland, Ohio, and got his bachelor's degree from the University of Windsor, Ontario, in 1969. His proposed dissertation topic is "Presupposition, Referring and Existence."

Miss Modiano, a degree candidate in the field of English and American Literature, graduated from high school in Bucharest and received her bachelor's degree from the University of Bucharest in 1968. She was named the top student in English literature in the nation-wide selection of 1968 in Romania. Her proposed dissertation topic is "Visions and Revisions: An Approach to English Romanticism."

Mrs. Munro, a degree candidate in the field of linguistics, graduated from Riverside Polytechnic High School and received her bachelor's degree from Stanford University in 1969. Her proposed dissertation topic is "The Phonological System of Chemaehuevi (American Indian language spoken on the Colorado River Indian Reservation In Arizona)."

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
