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The following proposals are excerpted from the conciliatory letter by the Provost, addressed to the Third College Community, dated April 24, 1972:

- Third College will have a Board of Directors as described broadly in the present By-Laws. The Board will make decisions by unanimous agreement. In matters in which unanimous agreement cannot be reached, no action will be taken.
- 2) The Provost commits himself to work with the Board in a spirit of cooperation, good faith and mutual confidence.
- 3) A special committee consisting of students and faculty members would be established to develop proposals for governance in Third College which would be consistent with strong student-faculty participation and the unique responsibilities of the Provost to Third College.
- 4) In order to provide added communication between the Provost and the Third College community, the Provost will hold "Information-Rap Sessions" on Wednesday afternoons from 4:30 to 6:00 pm.
- 5) The Faculty-Staff Body and the student groups are requested to return representatives to the Board of Directors and the Standing Committees and to work with the Provost in trying to make the arrangement described above workable and effective.

The proposed governance arrangement, although not ideal, has served the college quite well in the past and provides a good mechanism for our working together. Although there is a diversity of opinions in Third College, we should have considerably more areas of mutual agreement than disagreement. We therefore should be more than able to work together on behalf of Third College.

e position of the Third College Provost, in regards to the vernance of the college, is contradictory to the ideals upon which mumba-Zapata College was founded. As a result of this inconsisincy, the rights of self determination and self-governance of icanos, and other Third World Peoples within this institution, are questionably being denied. Numerous efforts have been made to netiate with the provost a position that would be consistent with e ideological foundations of the college. Such attempts have eved futile. The correspondence received on April 24, 1972 by the ird College community clearly demonstrated that the provost is unponsive to the needs of his constituency. The memo simply iterates the provost's previous position.

these reasons, the members of MECHA reject the statement of April and hereby, withdraw all support for the provost of Third College. have lost all confidence in his ability to unite the community and direct Third College in a progressive manner. Therefore, in order insure the success of the college, we find it imperative to demand the resignation of the provost.

5 556 4 On April 27, 1972 the members of the Asian American Student Alliance, White Caucus, and United Native Americans met to voice our unanimous and angry rejection of Provost Watson's statement of April 25th, 1972 concerning the governance of Third College. We the so-called "Others"

of Third College, charge that Dr. Watson's actions this year have been totally inconsistent with the ideals and spirit on which Third College was founded. We charge that our rights to self-determination within the college are being totally disregarded by Dr. Watson. We charge that the recruitment and admission of minority students and the recruitment and hiring of minority faculty is not proceeding on a fair and equal basis. We charge Dr. Watson with continued oppostion to our demand for self-determination and equal representation of each minority group on the governing board of Third College. We know that this is a serious threat to the future, the dignity, and the education of Native American, Asian American, and white students of Third College. We believe that this form of discrimination is not only disgraceful but also intolerable. We no longer have trust in Dr. Watson's willingness to take our demands and charges seriously or to substantially alter his position. For these reasons we find it necessary to demand the unconditional resignation of Dr. Watson as Provost of Third College,

Due to the seriousness and urgency of our demand, we request that an interim Provost be selected from the existing faculty of Third College. We also request a response by May 3, 1972.

During the course of the year numerous disagreements have arisen between the Provost of Third College and various groups in his college constituency. These disputes have involved prospective faculty appointments and other matters of vital importance to the college.

ie is resolve these disagreements in an equitable manner. Yet time
ind again we have found the Provost insensitive to our concerns.
iven this situation, we are forced to interpret his actions as a lack of trust in the faculty.

This general situation has resulted in a pervasive decline of sorale and a diversion of energy which needs to be put into the levelopment of courses and programs so important to the continued cowth of Third College. The condition appears to have become hronic, to the point where it seriously threatens the future f our college. The loss of morale is evident as well among the tudent body, with serious consequences for the drive and enthuiasm with which they have approached the performance of their lready difficult academic tasks.

e recent months the faculty has expressed its dissatisfaction Ith the Provost's stance in formal faculty votes and in informal unsultations, in the strongest possible terms. Yet the Provost is indicated that he has no serious intention of changing his osition. Having exhausted all avenues of reconciliation, we find

t necessary at this time to withdraw our confidence from the rovost, to call for his resignation, and to ask that he be aplaced with an Acting Provost forthwith.

U.S. CIVIL RIGHTS COMMISSION REPORT RELERSED AT THIRD

Monday May 8, Third College is sponsoring a visit by Edward Casavantes, representatives from the Civil Rights Commission. He will discuss The Excluded Student recently released report prepared by the Mexican Education Study Project. The report is one of a series which make a comprehensive assessment of the nature and extent of educational opportunities available for Chicanos in the public schools of the southwest.

The Excluded Student particularly examines the way the educational system deals with the unique linguistic and cultural background of the Chicano. It looks at: 1) some of the linguistic and cultural problems faced by Chicanos within the educational system; 2) programs used by some schools in attempting to adjust to these problems; and 3) the school's relationship to the Chicano communities they serve.

All are especially encouraged to attend the presentation Monday, May 8 from 10:00 to 12:00, Conference Room A. Copies of the report will be distributed. A discussion of the report will take place at 3:00, also, in Conference Room A.

Prof. William R. Frazer has been awarded a Guggenheim Fellowship for 1972-73. Only seven other professors have received this prestigious award.

Professor Ismith M. Khan has received a National Endowment for the Humanities Fellowship for Summer & Fall Quarters 1972. He will conduct his study on the use of language and literature in the curriculum of multi-racial societies which will take him to Trinidad, Guyana, and Jamaica.

Professor Benjamin T'sou has been granted a DHEW Grant for Summer 1972 to conduct an Intensive Chinese Language Institute at UCSD. Prof. T'sou also recently presented a paper entitled "Asymmetric Bilingualisms: A Social Linguistic Study of Cantonese Emmigrants" to the China Panel of the Association of Asian Studies at their annual meeting held in New York City. He also recently participated in an international workshop sponsored by "CETA" held in Washington, D.C.

Professor Mario Barrera has been awarded a Summer Faculty Fellowship for Summer 1972 which is supported by the UC Regents. Professor Barrera also recently presented a paper entitled "American Political Science and the Chicano" at the annual meeting of Southwestern Social Science Association held in San Antonio, Texas.

PRESUMABLY THIRD COLLEGE of the WILL DO BUSINESS AS USUAL MAYA BERKEZEY STRIKE

On April 17, pickets against the long-standing anti-union policies of the University of California administration appeared on the big UC Berkeley campus. The University does not recognize unions, unions with contracts, outside arbitration of grievances, nor has the University paid a single raise in 2 years. The issue which blew the whistle was the announcement that UC no longer intends to pay its building trades workers prevailing wage rates, but instead, will substitute maintenance pay for building tradesmen pay, a cut in pay for construction workers by 20%.

The Vietnam war goes on, and the struggle continues at the big U, but this time, the struggle rests on the shoulders of the workers maintenance men, building tradesmen, and other workers at the bottom end of the economic scale, forced to strike in solidarity against the reactionary policies of Governor Reagan and the UC administration. For 2 years, the University has denied merit increases and cost of living increases for both non-academic and academic personnel while students docilely accept increases in tuition, class sizes, and a return to the elitist notion of "University education for the economically select," despite the fact that the University has made no commitment towards improvements in higher education or open enrollment opportunities. The workers, closer to the realities of the unemployment lines, welfare, food stamps, and feeling the crunch of inflation ARE FIGHT-ING BACK.

HOBBERS UNITED

The issue is bread and butter on the table - take, for instance, the custodians. The focus of conflict has been the University reduction of work force by 75, and at the same time, increased floor space to be maintained to 3,000,000 sq ft, another University action in line with its austerity and speed-up program to save money. The custodian union (AFSCME #371), with a little over 300 pre-dominantly Black members ARE ON STRIKE.

The UC administration paints a picture of greedy, overpaid workers, bleeding the wallets of California taxpayers, and at the same time, refuses to increase wages, instituted a hiring freeze, and cutback on a number of work categories. The University claims it does not have the money to meet wage demands, but it also does not intend to give way to non-economic demands.

The screws are being put to Reagan and his merry bunch of Regents to put an end to exploitation of the working class and students. The union locals on the Berkeley campus are fighting our fight. Because of our favored position, we have not even begun to think about fighting it. A message of solidarity can be reinforcing (address messages of solidarity to AFSCME Local #371, East Bay Central Labor Council, Oakland, California), and rather than scabbing to groove on the Berkeley Jazz Festival, did you hold the picket line and support Brothers in struggle?
