## REVELLE MESMERIZED BY HYPNOTIST

Last Thursday's show in the Revelle Cafe should put an end once and for all to the rumors that Revelle students are just brainy and dull. They certainly showed another side in ninety minutes of hypnotic hijinks led by professional stage hypnotist Chuck Milligan.

Milligan, a familiar face to most UCSD students as the only motorcycle cop on campus, had no shortage of volunteers. The fifty chairs on stage were immediately filled and more had to be brought up.

"We're just here to have some fun with it tonight," said Milligan.

The act began with a twenty-minute induction period, in which the participants were instructed to relax, focus, and concentrate on their breathing. In minutes, the subjects were already relaxing to the sound of Milligan's soothing, magnetic voice, the gentle background music, and the dim lights. Soon not only participants but members of the audience were falling under his spell, slumping forward or sliding out of their chairs as they went "deeper and deeper" into sleep.

Then the lights came on and the fun began.

"Were you hypnotized?" he asks a subject.

"No... I fell asleep."



Milligan's suggestions ranged from the simple to the bizarre. Subjects slid out of their chairs in uncontrollable laughter as the room "filled" with laughing gas or began shucking clothes as the temperature "rose". Others tried to count to ten with two twos or without threes. The audience howled in delight at the subjects' reactions as they imagined themselves suddenly very well endowed physically or that they had been touched in a welcome or unwelcome manner by the person sitting next to them. More than once, over-responsive subjects had to be quickly zapped back into sleep!

Finally, Milligan demonstrated the flexibility of the human body under hypnosis by bending one girl's wrist in a 360 degree circle and by standing on the rigid body of another girl as she was propped across two chairs.

"Nobody hypnotizes you. You hypnotize yourself," said Milligan. "I'm just the guide who tells you how to get there." He added that there are three kinds of people who cannot be hypnotized - "idiots, morons, and drunks," because hypnosis requires the ability to relax and concentrate at the same time. In fact, intelligent people make better subjects. On the serious side, hypnosis has been used to cure ailments from nail-biting to alcoholism. Serious stuff aside, it makes great entertainment.

Milligan became interested in hypnosis about three years ago after attending a self-hypnosis stress reduction workshop. He worked for six months with veteran performer Jim Downs learning stage hypnosis. Milligan loves to perform and is frequently found appearing in private nightclubs, military bases, and at SDSU. He also recently appeared at Third College.

"The audience was great," said Milligan speaking of the lively crowd in the packed Revelle Cafe. "The more the audience gets into it, the more the subjects get into it."



Milligan explained that hypnosis is not a form of magic but a natural state which the mind enters twice daily upon

waking up and falling asleep. It is a state of relaxation and concentration in which the mind is open to suggestion.

## Police Chief Defends Bicycle Regulations

For part two of my report, I spoke with UCSD Chief of Police John A. Anderson about the newly-implemented policy. He showed me Section 21113 F of the California Vehicle Code, which empowers the University of California to regulate the use of bicycles, scooters, and skateboards on each of its nine campuses. And if you think that UCSD is being restrictive, you'd better be glad you're not at UCLA; Skateboards have been completely banned there for some time now. But what prompted the implementation of the new policy? No, the police are not just looking for another way to harass us, or to make money off of tickets and citations. They did it for our safety. After an increase in bicycle usage was observed, collisions and complaints began to multiply. More students were being forced to move off-campus in their sophomore and junior years, and the abundance of local housing, like that in La Jolla Colony, made it more practical to ride a bike to school, rather than spend a hundred bucks for a park-

ing permit and still have nowhere to park. Chief Anderson estimates that the number of bicycles on campus has more than quadrupled in the past few years. Aside from being concerned about the safety and well-being of all those who work, live, and study at UCSD, Chief Anderson cited liability as playing a major role in the adoption of the restrictions. Soon after last year's multi-million dollar lawsuit against UC Irvine by a student who was permanently

disabled after being hit from behind by a bicyclist, UCSD Police decided something needed to be done before it was too late. A special committee examined the problem and directed the police department to enact the now-famous Section 21113 F of the C.V.C. If you are unsure of the exact letter of the restrictions, or have other questions about the policy, please stop by the police station and pick up a copy of the pamphlet, "Bicycles and Skateboards Rules and Responsibilities."
