TO THE PRESIDENT AND MEMBERS OF THE STATE SENATE OF CALIFORNIA.

Your Committee appointed and authorized by Senate Resolution No. 104 to investigate the question of coercion, intimidation, also supposedly fraudulent telegrams sent March 26 and 27 last by certain individuals and unions from San Diego to the Legislators representing San Diego County; Senator Fletcher, Assemblymen Daley, Stream and Richie report as follows:-

We held two public meetings, one in San Diego Friday afternoon and evening, May 16, also one in Sacramento Wednesday afternoon, May 21 last. We subpoensed approximately 138 members of different unions in San Diego whose names were attached to certain telegrams sent. 78 individuals, union members, testified. 28 subpoensed were unknown at the address given on the telegrams received, and the deputy reported they could not be found in the directory, telephone or otherwise. 32 were out of town on vacation, or could not be located within a 48 hour notice. All witnesses were put under oath.

The Superintendent of the Western Union Telegraph Company at San Diego, Mr. Topham, and his Assistant, Mr. Parker testified that within the 24 hour period May 26 and 27 last telegrams were sent by them to the four Legislators, above mentioned, on five forms of wording at a cost of charged to and paid for by the Federated Trades & Labor Council on orders of Mr. K. G. Bitter of the Council who furnished to the Western Union Telegraph Company the five forms, marked exhibits 2,3,4,5, and 6. From time to time Mr. Bitter sent lists of names and their street address which was on each telegram, to be signed to each telegram, copies of each to be sent to the four Legislators; Also what numbered form of telegram to use in each case. The Labor Leader, a weekly labor paper, printed on April 2 on its front page that 6800 telegrams were sent by union members on the 26th and 27th of March last to the San Diego County Representatives protesting the passage of SB 877 known as the "Hot Cargo" and secondary "Boycott" bill. Also SB 975 and other bills. These telegrams were received two days after Senate Bill 877 and 975 had passed the State Senate.

On March 27th Senator Fletcher, Mrs. Daley and Mr. Stream each received the same telegrams from James A. Thompson, Business Representative, International Union of Operating Engineers Local 526, via Postal Telegraph Company, reading as follows:-

"Membership of Local 526 Stationary Engineers voted unanimously at special meeting tonight to detail our membership to go into the district and work for defeat of any Senator or Assemblyman who votes for Assembly Bill No. 1545, Senate Bills Nos. 180, 877, 974, 975, 976, 560. We urgently request your vote against these vicious anti-labor bills."

Mr. Chuming and his Assistant, Mr. , Manager and Assistant Manager of the Postal Telegraph Company, under oath, testified that the last mentioned telegrams were sent on orders of James A. Thompson, also the telegrams were charged to and paid for by the International Union of Operating Engineers Local 526.

Of the 78 union members who testified before your Committee last Friday, 3 stated they had given authority to allow the placing of their names on the telegrams to each of the 4 State Representatives from San Diego. Five stated the officials of the Union said they thought they had the right to send such individual telegrams and sign their names when for the good of the Union, even without their knowledge or consent in advance, irrespective of what was included in the telegram. Sixty-eight union members stated they had no knowledge of, nor had ever given their consent to allow the use of their names in relation to the telegrams sent. Many union men, under oath and by written communication, now officially in the records, protested and resented the use of their names very forcefully. Three communications received, out of many, will give you an idea how they feel. (3 statements.)

The testimony shows that out of approximately 1400 who sent the 6000 or more telegrams a postcard from them in reply shows that only 102 knew the telegrams were sent and approved before being sent, while over 150 completely denied ever having knowledge of or authorizing the sending of said telegrams. Over 1000 refused to answer a communication, although by so doing they were notified no reply would be interpreted as "no knowledge or consent to send said telegrams." Messrs. Pierce and Bitter offered to testify voluntarily, but as the testimony given showed they were possibly involved, the Committee took under advisement the question of allowing these two gentlemen to testify under oath until we could consult our legal counsel as to the possibility of these gentlemen claiming immunity afterward. Mr. Fred Wood, our legal counsel, upheld our action in San Diego in refusing to allow them to testify. Our letter to Mr. Wood of May 19, and his official opinion as of that date, is herewith attached, and made an official record thereof.

At the hearing in Sacramento, May 21, Messrs. Daley, Stream and Richie acknowledged having received approximately 4000 telegrams on the 27th of March last. These telegrams were similar in form to those received by Senator Fletcher.

CONCLUSION:

Based on the opinions of our Legislative Counsel herewith attached, your Committee are of the opinion that three laws have been violated; coercion, intimidation and forgery. We attach copy of the original transcript of testimony taken of both meetings; also copies of exhibits, and recommend that the original report and exhibits be kept with the Secretary of the State Senate for safe keeping.

We are of the opinion that those in authority should check as to whether a law has been violated by the Telegraph Companies in the receiving and sending of these telegrams. We recommend legislation that will put teeth in the present laws which will give notice to both capital and labor of the futility of trying to influence Legislators for or against legislation and by such methods will deter the repetition of such misleading lobbying and worse. We recommend the adoption of this report; also that a copy of the testimony and exhibits be placed by the Secretary of the Senate in the hands of the Attorney General of California, and the District Attorney and Grand Jury of the County of San Diego.

Senator Ed Fletcher and Assemblymen Daley and Stream were subjected to heavy telegraphic barrages of almost identically worded messages from San Diego organizations due to their votes on the Anti-Sabotage, "Hot Cargo," and Secondary Boycott bills; also in opposition to unemployment payroll tax amendments. Senator Fletcher received 1328 night and day wires on these bills and the total wires sent to the San Diego delegation were estimated to have cost the senders in that city at least \$5000 in tolls. Thousands of telegrams were also sent to other Senators and Assemblymen and the telegraphic costs running into many thousands of dollars paid out of organization coffers show how well supplied they must be under the new dispensation that allows heavy mandatory dues to be collected from workers. Senator Fletcher; rugged California pioneer real estate operator, announced that he is checking into the matter further.

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SENATOR FLETCHER: The Committee will come to order. secretary will call the roll.

THE SECRETARY: Senator Bigger.

SENATOR BIGGAR: Here.

THE SECRETARY: Senator Carter.

SENATOR FLETCHER: The Committee are all present. First we will introduce Senate Resolution Number 104, passed on May 8th, 1941, and it will be known as Exhibit Mumber 1.

At this time I wish to explain that the object of this committee being here teday is to find out the names of the people who have sent the telegrams, the many telegrams, of March 26th and 27th to the legislators of San Diego County and to find the authenticity of those names, and who paid for the telegrams. I might further explain that in committee it was understood and agreed that our activities would be limited fust to the investigation of those facts, and it was so stated on the floor of the Senate, and our entire plan is for the committee to put the questions themselves

and investigate and find out what the facts are and submit to the Senate of California for such action as they may see fit, if any. If there is no objection, it is understood that that is the scope of our work today. Any objection? SEMATOR CARTER: Hope.

SENATOR PLETCHER: We will call the first witness, Mr. Topham, who is, as I understand, superintendent of the Western Union Telegraph Company. Mr. Topham.

DAVSON TOPHAM.

called and sworn by Senator Fletcher, Chairman, testifies as follows:

BY SENATOR FLETCHER:

- What is your name, please?
- Davson Topham.
- What is your connection with the Western Union Telegraph Company?
 - A I am superintendent.
- Are you familiar with the number of telegrams that vere sent through the Western Union Telegraph Company on the 26th and 27th of March to the four legislators representing San Diego County?
 - A Yes, sir.
 - How many telegrams did you send?
- Do you want those on separate days or both days together?

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Combine them both together, the 26th and 27th. SENATOR CARTER: Of March.

SENATOR PLETCHER: Yes, the 26th and 27th of March, 1941.

There was a total of 5,280 messages, or 1,320 each to the four representatives, Assemblyvoman Jeanette Daley, Assemblyman Paul Richie, Assemblyman Charles Stream and Senator Ed Fletcher.

BY SENATOR PLETCHER:

Q What was the cost of sending those telegrams, if you have that record?

A Yes, sir.

What was the total amount?

\$4,252.62.

Q Did they pay you in each for the sending of those tolegrams?

A Mo, sir.

Who paid for those telegrams?

San Diego Building Trades Council.

By cash or check?

By check.

Q Were they all individual telegrams, or not? All vorded the same, or all different?

A There were five different texts.

Pive different texts or forms?

Or forms.

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Q Only?

Only.

Can you give me a copy of form -- We will call them Form Rumber 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5, please. Do you have thom?

Yes, I have them with me.

May I have a copy?

Yes, sir.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Mr. Reporter, there is no need of your copying each of these telegrams, but I will call Jeanette Daley Form Number 1. Exhibit 2, Miss May, is it? Exhibit Number 2? Before I do that, I will read the telegram, but it is not necessary for you, Mr. Reporter, to copy it.

(Senator Fletcher reading.)

SENATOR FLETCHER: That is Exhibit Humber 2.

SENATOR CARTER: Who was that addressed to, Jeanstte

Daley?

SENATOR FLETCHER: What is that?

Was that addressed to Jeanette Daley?

SENATOR FLETCHER: All of these are addressed to

Jeanette Daley, Paul Richie, Charles Stream, and Ed Flotcher.

We were asked if that could be done and we told 26 them no.

EMMET HEALY

Who asked you that?

I don't know, Senator. That was asked of my assistant, and I don't know who it was.

Then what happened?

Well, then we were told that as the signatures to these various telegrams were received they would telephone us that they were ready and we would send a messenger boy down to pick them up. That was done at frequent intervals during both days.

Q So you had faith in the genuineness of them?

There was nothing that aroused any suspicions, Senator, that they might not be authentic.

Q Besides these five forms of telegrams, you have not included any other individual telegrams that might have been sent those two days?

A Yes, sir; I have seven others; individual telegrams.

SEHATOR FLETCHER: I believe that is all the questions I have to ask. Does any member of the committee want to ask any question?

SENATOR CARTER: Just to clerify those forms. May I see them, please?

SHEATOR FLETCHER: That should be 2. 3. 4. 5. and 6. Senator.

SEMATOR CARTER: You, I understand.

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Q Mr. Topham, these five forms were sent, that is, copies of each one was sent to each individual representative from San Diego County, that is, the Assemblymen and the Senator?

A I don't believe I quite understand that question.

of these telegrams sent to each Assemblyman and the Senator from this district?

A Yes, sir.

Q So that they all received a like number of copies of each form?

A Yes.

Q And they were addressed to them individually?

A Individually, yes, and so delivered.

SEMATOR BIGGAR: I would like to ask a question.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Senator Biggar.

BY SENATOR BIGGAR:

Q The same signatures appeared on all of these telegrams sent to each individual member of the legislature?

A The same signatures?

Q Yes.

A No, sir; different signatures; that is, the same signatures to each of the Assemblymen and Senator.

Q That is what I meant to say.

A Yes, sir.

Q There was a copy of each telegram signed by the same individual sent to each individual member of the legis-lature?

A That is correct.

Q I see.

A In other words, each individual sent four telegrams.

Q That is the point. And those forms were identical in each instance?

A Yes.

Q Now, these other telegrens that you have here, were they directed to all four of the representatives?

A No; one is directed to Senator Ed Fletcher alone, one to Assemblywoman Jeanette Daley. And these, you understand, all have different signatures.

Q Yes.

A And one to Assemblyman Charles Stream and Assemblyman Paul Richie and another one to Senator Ed Fletcher.

Q Those were just individual separate telegrams, but not sent in duplicate?

A No; these were individual telegrams, though I had noticed here that one signature sent the same telegram to Assemblywoman Jennette Daley, Assemblyman Charles Stream, and Assemblyman Paul Richie. Those were sent by the same man.

BEHATOR BIGGAR: You might have those telegrams read.

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SENATOR CARTER: Do you mind if I ask some questions on that phase of it? BY SENATOR CARTER: Where were those telegrams written, if you know? These ones we are speaking about now? Q Yes. They were received over the telephone, each one of them. More they received from the same source or different sources, if you know? A Let's sec. There was three from the same source and two from different sources. Q How were the messages that were delivered to you prepared? In what form? On the forms which you have delivered to the committee here? A Each signature was typewritten. They were on form blanks of the Western Union Telegraph Company, were they? A Yes, sir. And the messages were typewritten? A Yes, sir. And the address was typewritten? Yos, sir. BY SENATOR FLETCHER: Who gave you the wording of the five forms? The Individual, Senator. It was given to us by

the Building Trades Council. I don't know whether there veseny individual, or who it was turned that over. Q You did not create any of those five forms of telegrams? A No, sir. They were given to you by the Labor Council? A Yes. BY SENATOR BIGGAR: Q Did I understand you to say that the signatures on these forms were typewritten? A Correct Not individually signed? Ho. All in typewriting? All in typewriting. Was that true of these extra messages that you have here also? A They are always typewritten, because they are

received over the telephone, and that is the only way they could be received.

Q Do you have any way of identifying the individual who gave his name? Do you have any way of checking back to know that the individual who is supposed to have signed that telegram was the person who was sending it?

The once sent over the telephone?

Yes.

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A Well, we verified the subscriber. We ask whether they are the subscriber to the telephone, and if they are that is sufficient evidence for us.

BY SENATOR FLETCHER:

Q In this case all of these names were furnished you by the representative of the Labor Council?

A Correct.

Q These 5,280 telegrams?

A Yes, sir.

Q And they also furnished you with the wording of the five forms?

A Correct, yes.

Q Will it be necessary to subpose your assistant, or can you have him down here soon, that we may ask him to discuss this matter with us?

A You wish him this afternoon?

Q Yes.

A Yes, I can arrange that,

SENATOR PLETCHER: Are there any other questions? BY SENATOR CARTER:

Q You have the original forms that were delivered to your office with you, have you not?

A Yes, here they are, right here.

SEMATOR CARTER: Mr. Chairman, don't you think it would be a good idea to have those original forms put into the record, so we will have them? We could take them and

have copies made of them and returned.

BY SENATOR FLETCHER:

Q You don't object to that, do you?

A Those are the exact copies you have there.

SEMATOR CARTER: But they are not the copies of the names. What I am interested in is the form in which the telegraphic message came to you. I want to see that and I would like to have it in the record.

THE WITHESS: I see. In other words, copies of these signatures?

SENATOR CARTER: Yes. I would like to see the exact form in which the telegraphic message came to your office from the Central Labor Council, if that is where it came from -- or the Building Trades Council, or whatever it is.

SEMATOR FLETCHER: Senator Carter, I have thirteen hundred or fourteen hundred telegrams already that I can deliver to you, and I can get the rest of them.

SENATOR CARTER: No; what I want to do is to know the exact form in which they came to him. I know you have all the telegrams that you received, but what we are searching into now is the manner in which they were sent, and the forms that you gave us are entirely satisfactory.

SHEATOR FLETCHER: Mr. Topham has under oath testified that Exhibits 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 are correct.

SENATOR CARTER: I have no doubt of that. I have no doubt of that, except that there are individuals who are

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supposed to have sent these telegrams and it seems to me we should be interested in their names and know how the names were submitted.

SEMATOR FLETCHER: That is why we are getting it from the assistant superintendent, as he was the one that had the personal contact. Is that right?

THE WITHESS: That is right.

SHEATOR FLETCHER: And you did not?

THE WITHESS: I did not.

BY SEMATOR CARTER:

Q You have the records here?

A I have the records here.

BY SEMATOR PLETCHER:

Q You have no objections, have you, to leaving them here?

A Well, of course, these records are legally required

Q Will you make a certified copy and deliver them to me, so we will have them in the record?

A We can make a copy, but we cannot certify to them. We are not permitted under our rules and regulatins to certify to any copy, but these can be left to make copies of.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Thank you. I will guarantee to deliver the originals back to you. Thank you very much. May I have them?

THE VITHESS: Yos, sir.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Nies May, will you see that copies are made and the originals delivered to the Western Union?

SENATOR CARTER: Perhaps, Senator, we could have him identify those copies, either in group or individually, as it may be.

BY SENATOR CARTER:

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Q I notice there are some in a little different form than others, aren't there?

A They all have the same forms.

BY SENATOR PLETCHER:

Q The five forms?

A There is no difference besides that. They all have the same forms. As these signatures were procured by solicitation on their part they were delivered to us and we released the massages.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Senator Carter, Senator Biggar has made a suggestion here that I would like to have you consider.

SHEATOR BIGGAR: We have examined them and we might have a copy made of each of the forms.

SENATOR CARTER: Yes, that is the thing.

SENATOR BIGGAR: You don't want a copy made of each of them?

SHEATOR CARTER: No; all I want to know is the form in which they were received. I will ask a question of

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Mr. Topham.

BY SENATOR CARTER:

graphic messages that were sent to the Assemblymen and the Senator of the San Diego district?

A Yes, sir.

SHATOR FLETCHER: There are five such forms, Senator Bigger.

SENATOR BIGGAR: Yes.

SENATOR CARTER: They are in five separate lots.

SENATOR FLETCHER: We can have copies of these made and have a complete record, if Senator Carter desires.

SEMATOR CARTER: I am not so interested in that as I am in seeing just how the form is prepared.

EX SEMATOR CARTER:

Q Well, now, just to clarify this thing in my own mind, take for instance your first message here, which is composed of one short form telegraph message with the message on it --

A Yos.

q -- and then a long form with a series of typewritten names with addresses --

A Yes.

q — would your record show to whom this telegram
was sent and from whom the message was received?

A All the telegrams were sent to the five people,

the four Assemblymen and the Senator, all of these.

Q And individual messages were delivered to each of the five members in the Senate and the Assembly, with each signature that is designated here?

A Yes. You understand, they were not delivered in this form. They were individual messages.

SENATOR CARTER: I understand.

BY SENATOR BIGGAR:

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Q This paper that we are looking at now is not the identical paper that was left from which you sent the messages?

A Yes.

Q Were they individual messages like this?

A No, but, as I explained, they were delivered as individual messages in this form. Every one was a separate telegram delivered at Sagramento.

Q But not at your office?

A Ho, sir.

Q This is the identical paper that was left in your office from which you sent the individual messages?

A Yes, sir.

BY SENATOR FLETCHER:

Q Let us put it another vay: Here is Form Number 2, and there is a list of names which you were ordered to send Form Number 2 to.

A That is correct.

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A Yes.

BY SEMATOR CARTER:

Q Now, I notice that you have five forms that are prepared in the manner in which I have described.

A Yes.

Q And then you have a series of names?

A Yes.

Q You have them here designated "List 6", and then "List 7", "list 8", "List 9", "List 10", "List 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 21, 21, 22." I don't see any list on this one. Well, that would be 23, if it were marked; and 2%. Now, what doethose lists represent?

A They represent the different lists that were brought in by messenger when we were called up to pick up the lists, and as the lists came in we numbered them.

Q I notice the lists are on the long form telegraph sheet.

A Yes.

vritten, with the last name first and the given name aftervards, with the appropriate initial, with the address of that person, and with the typewritten motation, on List 6, "Please sent telegram number 5 signed by the following people"? Now, how were these additional lists received? Were they received subsequent to the time you received the original list? Is that the way they were handled?

A Yes. As we understood, as the names were secured and the list was sent -- We sent a messenger uptown to pick the list up and then the telegrams were transmitted.

Q There is no telegraphic message affixed to these lists from Number 6 to Number 24, inclusive?

A No. We had it like that, and we had the message, of course, in our office, and that, of course, was the message we sent. They are numbered as shown in the copy.

Q In other words, you had a numbered message to which these signatures were affixed?

A That is correct.

Q Now, who prepared these lists, if you know?

A Well, I don't know. All I know is that they were picked up at the Building Trades Council by our own messenger boys.

Q In this form?

A In that form, yes.

Q Now, I notice there are some pencilled notations on these, which I could not attempt to describe. There is List 6, in red. That is your figure?

A Yes, that is our figure.

Q And then there is "B 1766-1837". I don't know what that word is there. Do those figures represent anything to you?

May I see it a little closer, please?

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Q Yes.

Thank you. I never figured this thing out. Oh, they represent the numbers of the telegrams as sent by our operators in the traffic department.

Q I see. And then the "T 12.26". I guess that is "M. P. "?

And the cost of the telegrem was charged to the telephone number of the Operating Engineers, Local 526, of San Diego?

A Yes, sir.

Did you bring with you or do you have the message -not the message, but the form from which this message was sent?

Yes, I have it.

May I see it, please? I want to see the signature here.

SENATOR FLETCHER: That is perfectly proper.

BY SENATOR CARTER:

How, I notice that there are two different hands on this form. The words "Jeanette Daley, Secramento, California," "Paul Richie," and "Senator Ed Fletcher," are written in darker pencil. Do you know how that was filled in?

A Yes, I do. I noticed that myself and I spoke to theoperator that handled it and he said when this message was filed the sender instructed him to add and send it to

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all four, which he filled in the remaining three at his direction.

Q In other words, the words, the date, and the Sacramento, California," and, "Jeanette Daley," "Paul Richie," and, "Senator Ed Fletcher," are written in by the operator?

A Yes.

And then the man who wrote the message wrote the other part of the telegram?

A Yes.

SENATOR CARTER: Do you desire to see it? SHEATOR BIGGAR: Yes, Senator Carter. SENATOR FLETCHER: Go ahead, Senator Bigger.

SENATOR BIGGAR: I was just checking up on it.

SENATOR CARTER: That is all.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Will the night operator be available? THE WITHESS: He will be here at 4:50.

SHATOR PLETCHER: Will you have him here at 8:00 o'clock tonight, just to identify the man who left the message?

THE WITHESS: Yes, I will.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Any further questions, gentlemen?

SENATOR CARTER: No.

You may be excused. You are entitled to your witness fee.

THE WITHESS: No. thank you.

SENATOR CARTER: Has this got an exhibit number?

SENATOR FLETCHER: You; Sumbor 7.

At this time, for the benefit of the Committee, I am going to introduce Exhibit Mumber 8, but it will not be necessary for the reporter to transcribe it.

(Senator Flatcher reading.)

SENATOR FLETCHER: At this time, Mr. Parker, are you here from the Western Union? MR. PARKER: Yes, sir.

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HAROLD E. PARKER,

called and sworn by Senator Pletcher, Chairman, testifies as follows:

BY SEEATOR FLETCHER:

Q What is your name?

Harold E. Parker.

What is your position?

Assistant superintendent, Western Union Telegraph Company.

Mr. Parker, did you write the five forms of telegrams that have been introduced in evidence here?

A No. sir.

Who did?

A The office of the secretary of the San Diego Building Trades Council wrote the first five messages submitted and thereafter we sent them from those by prearrangement.

Q As the lists were presented to you?

Yes, sir.

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A There was an inquiry made of me as to whether or not I could have that done.

Q Who made that inquiry of you?

A Mr. Bitter.

Q What was your answer?

A Absolutely not; it would be contrary to our rules.

Q And after that what happened?

A Then Mr. Bitter and I discussed at length over the telephone the method of filing, as to whether or not we would accept signatures as they were submitted, sending them under the various numbered texts which had previously been offered and which I had agreed to accept.

Q Your superintendent explained that to us. Have you anything further that you wish to add voluntarily in connection with the matter?

A No. I think not.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Does the Committee wish to ask any question of the witness?

SEMATOR CARTER: Just one question.

BY SENATOR CARTER:

Q As you best remember, what was the inquiry that Mr. Bitter made of you?

A Regarding the telephoning for signatures?

Yes.

A He at first discussed with me the method of transmission, speed and so forth, the importance of it, and that it was necessary to get this large number of messages to Sacramento quickly, and then he said, "Now, there is one other thing I would like to ask you. Can you have someone telephone and secure authority for these signatures for us?" I said, "Absolutely not; it is against our rules." And he said, "O. K., that's that." And then we went into the matter of rates, and so forth.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Any other questions?

SENATOR CARTER: Yes.

BY SENATOR CARTER:

Q Was this conversation you had with Mr. Bitter over the phone or personally?

A Over the telephone.

BY SENATOR PLETCHER:

Q At all times?

A At all times. I had not met Mr. Bitter prior to that time. I say I had the conversation with Mr. Bitter because he said it was Mr. Bitter, and I believe it was Mr. Bitter.

BY SENATOR CARTER:

Q Well, the conversation was over the phone?

Yes.

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Q	And that is the sum and substance of it?

SENATOR CARTER: Very well, if you are sure you identified it.

BY SENATOR FLETCHER:

Q Reverend, can we excuse you just for a few moments,

A Well, yes, because that is taking away my right to express my own opinion, and I just don't go for that. In other words, if I want to say something, I want to say it myself; I don't want someone else.

REV. A. L. MITCHELL: Mr. Chairman, might I make a statement in regard to telegrems?

SENATOR FLETCHER: We will find your telegram later on.

REV. A. L. MITCHELL: Yes, sir. I want to state that I sent no telegram, phone message, or letter to you in regard to this matter. It is absolutely fraudulent.

SENATOR PLETCHER: And you came here of your own volition?

REV. A. L. MITCHELL: Yes; at least I had a subpoona last night.

SHEATOR FLETCHER: Well, we have the papers here. Will the members of the Committee permit me to introduce the telegram that I received from him at a later date, as soon as we find it?

SENATOR CARTER: The telegram which you received from the Western Union Telegraph Company is perfectly satisfactory with me.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Thank you.

REV. A. L. MITCHELL: I made no such statement at all.

SENATOR CARTER: And on March 26th or March 27th, or

at any time did you ever send a telegram through the Western

Union to Senator Pletcher?

REV. A. L. MITCHELL: No, sir, I did not.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Coming voluntarily, you are certainly entitled to the witness fee.

REV. A. L. MITCHELL; Thank you. I don't wish it. SHEATOR FLETCHER: Thank you.

SENATOR FLETCHER: James S. Scott.

JAMES S. SCOTT,

called and sworn by Senator Flotcher, Chairman, testifies as follows:

BY SERATOR FLETCHER:

Q Your name is James S. Scott, and you live at 733
Bush Street?

A Yes, sir.

Q Mr. Scott, did you send me a telegram on the 27th of March?

A Ho, sir.

Did you authorise it sent?

A Mo, sir.

Q You did not either send it or authorize it sent?

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Q Are you a member of any union?

A Yes, sir; Carpenters 1296.

Q Carpenters Union, 1296? Have you any statements you care to make?

A No. The union is authorized to speak as a body, but I didn't know they were authorized to send a telegram like that.

SENATOR PLETCHER: Thank you. Any questions? SENATOR BIGGAR: Yes.

BY SENATOR FLETCHER:

- Your name is John Boshme? Is that correct?
- A John Bookse.
- Q 4518 Fortieth Street?
- Yes, sir.
- Q Did you send me that telegram on the 27th of March?
- A Ho, sir.
- Q Did you authorize it sent?
- A No, sir.
- Q Are you a member of the union?
- A I have my application in to the Teamsters Union and I put my application in about four months ago, after they caused me to lose my job that I was on.
 - Q What caused you to lose your job?
- A I was working at the Modern Furniture and they were going to close the shop up there and they had me campaigning up there.
 - Q Campaigning?
- A Yes; they wanted me to talk the fellows into joining the union, which I did.
- Q We are off the subject. That is out of our sphere. We are simply limited to these questions and enswers, so anything of that kind we will strike from the record.

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A Well. I am on their books. name, I imagine. I never did hear from them in regard to a job.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Any questions, gentlemen? Thank you. BY SENATOR CARTER:

That was your address on March 27th, 1941?

BY SENATOR PLETCHER:

- Q Did you send me that telegram on the 27th of March?
- I did not, sir.
- Did you authorise it sent?
- I did not.
- Are you a member of any union?
- Carpenters, Local 1296.

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Carpenters, Local 1296? Eave you any statement you care to make? I don't think so. SENATOR FLETCHER: Any questions? BY SENATOR CARTER: You lived at 4651 Terrace Avenue on March 26th and 27th? Yes, I did. I lived there nearly thirty years. SENATOR FLETCHER: You are excused. You may get your 200. I wish to introduce as Exhibit 19 telegram I received from Edwin M. Parker, Terrace Drive, while I was in Sacramento, with the usual wording. SENATOR FLETCHER: H. J. Loudormilk. H. J. LOUDERHILE, called and sworn by Senator Fletcher, Chairman, testifies as follows: BY SERATOR PLETCHER!

- Q Is that address right, 4570 Pacific Highway?
- That is correct.
- Q Mr. Loudermilk, did you send me that telegram on the 27th day of March?

A CANADA

- No, sir.
- Q Did you authorise it?

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Are you a member of any union?

A. Ho.

Yes: Carpenters and Joiners, 1295.

I have your communication before me, but I would like to ask you if you care to make any statement.

A I don't know any statement is necessary, only you have my whole-hearted cooperation in this thing. I think somebody is exercising an authority that they are not legally entitled to.

SENATOR FLETCHER: I thank you very much for taking the public interest you are in matters that are vital.

THE WITHESS: I had my business with Seth Millington. SEEATOR FLETCHER: Thank you very much. You will get your usual fee and ten cents a mile.

SENATOR CARTER: And that is Exhibit 20? THE SECRETARY: 20.

SENATOR FLETCHER: To the members of the Committee, I wish to introduce telegram I received from H. J. Loudermilk, 4570 Pacific Highway, San Digo, on the 27th of March, while in Sacramento, and ask it be Exhibit Mumber 20.

SENATOR PLETCHER: Mr. A. L. Pierson.

A. L. PIERSON,

called and sworn by Senator Fletcher, Chairman, testifies as follows:

BY SENATOR FLETCHER:

Q Mr. Pierson, did you send me a telegram on March 27th, last?

A No. sir.

Did you authorize the sending of any telegram?

Q ... Are you a member of some union?

1296, Carpenters Union.

Q 1296?

Yes, sir.

SENATOR FLETCHER: I ask at this time that the Committee allow me to introduce the original telegram that I received at a later date. That telegram is in Sacramento, along with twelve hundred more that I did not bring down.

THE WITHESS: I would have liked to have seen it.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Any questions?

BY SENATOR CARTER:

What is your address?

SENATOR BIGGAR: I suggest to the Chairman that in those instances where he does not have the message that he

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received at Sacramento, if the copy that the telegraph company received, purporting to be sent by the witness, were accepted here, that should suffice so far as the proof and identification of the message in question.

SENATOR FLETCHER: You are excused, and thank you so much for coming.

SENATOR BIGGAR: I think the witness ought to identify the telegram.

SEMATOR PLETCHER: How can be identify it if he never

SENATOR CARTER: He has testified that he never sent

SENATOR FLETCHER: Yes. That is right.

SEMATOR BIGGAR: Oh.

SERATOR CARTER: Let the record speak for itself.

SEMATOR FLETCHER: Is Mr. Fred Larson here?

I want to read into the record --

SERATOR CARTER: Senator Fletcher, do you want to Introduce those records of the telegraph company as a group exhibit, so that we might use thom?

SENATOR PLETCHER: Yes. Exhibit Number 20.

SENATOR CARTER: Well, whatever the next exhibit number is.

SEEATOR PLETCHER: What is it?

THE SECRETARY: 21.

SEMATOR PLETCHER: We will introduce copies of the

Western Union furnished us by the superintendent, Mr. Topham,
and made Exhibits, the originals to be returned.

Is Mr. Pierson here?

SENATOR CARTER: He has already been here.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Mr. Lerson is not here. Mr. Pred

Larson?

Is there anyone here who was subposessed that has not been called?

How at this time I want to introduce in evidence the following telegram received from Richard Stern on March 27th, and this is the original telegram. His address supposedly was 751 Robinson Street, San Diego. I sak that it be made Exhibit Number 22. I wrote to Mr. Stern asking him if he had sent me a telegram and did he pay for it. I wish to make this exhibit Exhibit Number 22. Is it 22? What is the next one?

THE SECRETARY: This will be 23.

SEMATOR FLETCHER: And I wish to introduce his letter in reply, as follows:

(Senator Fletcher reading.)

SHEATOR CARTER: Senator Fletcher, I doubt if that testimony is strictly admissible. We can take it for what it is worth.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Yes.

SHATOR CARTER: But I doubt much as to the weight of that, since Mr. Stern himself isn't here. The factthat

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you received those letters, we are willing to concede all of those facts, but I doubt --

SENATOR FLETCHER: These are the original documents, Senator Carter.

SHEATOR CARTER: Yes, I agree with you. They are doouments that were received by you.

SENATOR FLETCHER: What is the pleasure of the Committee? SEMATOR BIGGAR: Is Mr. Stern available? Is he here? SENATOR PLETCHER: No; he is in Los Angeles.

SEEATOR BIGGAR: We are satisfied that everything you have presented there is authentic.

SEMATOR CARTER: As to what you received, there is no question about it.

SEMATOR FLETCHER: I will only put it in as having received it, with your permission.

SENATOR CARTER: We will give it the weight it is entitled to; that is about all.

SENATOR FLETCHER: I wish to introduce as Exhibit 24 telegram from A. B. Beck, 218 Payne Street, San Diego.

(Senator Flatcher reading.)

SENATOR FLETCHER: He enswered back. We searched the town high and low and can't locate him.

(Senator Fletcher reading.)

SEMATOR PLETCHER: That will be exhibit 25.

Here is another telegrem dated the 27th of March, one of the form telegrams, signed by Guilford Hough, Box 358,

Lincoln Acres, Mational City. We could not locate him. We have done everything we could. SENATOR CARTER: That is 26. SENATOR PLETCHER: And he wrote and answered as follows (Senator Fletcher reading.) SEMATOR FLETCHER: That will be Exhibit 27. SENATOR CARTER: Does he give his address there? THE SECRETARY: Box 358, Lincoln Acres. SENATOR FLETCHER: We have done our best to locate him and could not. Here is a telegram that I received from R. J. Jones,

830 25th Street, San Diego, on the 27th of March, one of the form telegrams, and his reply is as follows -- I ask that the telegram be made Exhibit 28. And his reply, Exhibit 29, as follows:

(Senator Flatcher reading.)

SENATOR FLETCHER: And one more from Nick Schaeffer, which I ask be made an exhibit.

(Senator Fletcher reading.)

SEEATOR PLETCHER: Exhibit 30.

SENATOR BIGGAR: Mr. Chairman, for the benefit of the record, I would like to ask if an attempt was made to serve summons on these gentlemen that are not appearing and whose signatures are contested?

SHEATOR FLETCHER: Every one of them.

SENATOR BIGGAR: They were not to be found?

EMMET HEALY

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SENATOR FLETCHER: They were not to be found.

SEMATOR BIGGAR: And does the officer who attempted to serve the summons offereny explanation in his mind as to why he could not serve the summonses?

SEMATOR FLETCHER: We have affidavits.

SENATOR CARTER: There is a return that you are unable to find them?

SENATOR FLETCHER: Yes.

SENATOR BIGGAR: I just wanted to check on that.

SENATOR FLETCHER: There is one who is not here who
we served, Fred E. Larson. Is he here now? He is one man
who has not answered the summons.

At this time -- I don't know as I want to take up your time -- but I have a large list of returned letters to persons who could not be located, in answer to telegrams that I have received. Some are living; some even went to Long Beach, to Anaheim, to Bakersfield, and everywhere else. There are many names of people unknown, also.

SENATOR CARTER: Do you want to introduce those with the fake telegrams, or do you want to wait and we will continue our hearing up in Secremento and we will put those in?

SENATOR FLETCHER: I would rather find them, if possible. One more telegram I received from M. E. Staffen, 910 A Avenue, Mational City. We tried to locate the party to serve him, and could not, so I am introducing his letter

that he enswered to me.

SEMATOR CARTER: Have you the telegram that was sent to

SENATOR PLETCHER: One of the form telegrams that I received on March 27th.

SENATOR CARTER: You haven't that here?

SENATOR FLETCHER: I haven't that here, but I will get it from the Western Union. But I will introduce as Exhibit 31 his reply.

(Senator Fletcher reading.)

SENATOR FLETCHER: One more from J. S. Pierce. I received this telegram from him on March 27th while in Sagramento, one of the forms, five form telegrams that have been referred to heretofore. I would like to have this introduced as Exhibit Number 52, and, as Exhibit Number 53, his answer in reply. I am introducing this for the reason that we have made a search and here is the report.

SHEATOR CARTER: J. S. Plerce?

I just want to remark that the nine years I have been here I voted for you each time you were on the ticket and you are my servent and I expect you to do what I ask you to do, and I expect these men in the local to do what I ask them to do, and if they see semething that shouldn't be done --

- A There was something about sending telegrams, but I wasn't aware that my mane was to be used individually in he telegram.
 - Q You didn't know that your name was to be used

individually?

- A I did not.
- Q You are a member of what union?
- A 1296.
- Q Do you know of any by-law of 1296 that gives any authority to send private telegrams like this without your knowledge and consent?

A We elect our officers and they take an oath to serve us to the best of their ability, even as you are elected to serve us to the best of your ability.

BY SENATOR BIGGAR:

Q Would you feel that Senator Fletcher would have the right to send a telegram without your knowing and signing your name?

A I think there was a little misunderstanding. I think they oversepped their authority when the telegrams were sent not collectively. They should have been sent collectively representing our local, with all the men's names on it, instead of putting them out with the men's name on them individually.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Anything further, gentlemen?

I wish to introduce a telegram from Clyde O. King, 330

West Date Street, San Diego, which I received on the 26th

of March, the standard form of telegram. What number?

THE SECRETARY: 77.

SENATOR FLETCHER: At this time I want to introduce in

BY SENATOR CARTER:

What is your address?

37332 Florida Street.

BY SENATOR FLETCHER:

Were you subpostated to be here today?

Yes, sir.

Have you at any time ever sent me a telegram?

Not directly.

Or authorised a telegram sent me?

Not directly. I told the man at the union when it was spoken about being a bunch of telegrams sent, that it was all right with me if it was for the betterment of the union.

SENATOR PLETCHER: I have not your telegrem here, but I would like the privilege of introducing it later.

THE WITNESS: I will say this, too, that I also signed a card that I had not signed a telegram directly and had not authorized it directly.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Well, you didn't put the word "directly" in. I have your card here. That is all.

SENATOR CARTER: Do you want to reserve an exhibit number for the Shropshire telegram?

Ho.

Did you know it was sent at the time?

No.

Do you belong to any union?

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What union?

1296.

Of your own knowledge, have you ever given authority to a member of your lodge or your union to send a private telegram like this?

d Do lon know of sul len or sul pl-jen that Aill Bine right, to send a telegram like this?

A No, I do not.

Have you any comments to make on this telegram?

Ho.

SENATOR PLETCHER: Any questions? Thank you very much. I wish to introduce telegram from T. J. Sheppard, 1027 43rd Street, San Diego, which I received on March 27th in Sacramento, one of the standard forms.

SENATOR FLETCHER: P. C. Shorrod?

P. C. SHERROD,

called and sworn by Senator Fletcher, Chairman, testifies as follows:

BY SENATOR FLETCHER:

Q P. C. Sherrod, 600 West Market.

5027 Lotus Street, Ocean Beach.

Oh, you have moved now, have you?

Yes, sir, I have.

Did you send me this telegram?

I did not.

Did you authorize anyone to send it for you?

Did you know it was sent at the time?

Ho.

Do you belong to a union?

I do.

What is the number?

1296

Do you know of any officer who has the right to send a telegram and sign yourname to it without your knowledge?

A Well, I believe it is the business agent's duty to look after the welfare of the local.

Q Please answer my question. Do you know of anything the by-laws which gives him the right to sign your name to a telegram without your knowledge and consent?

A No, I do not.

Did you not write to me and say, "I did not send this telegram and I did not pay for it"?

A That is right.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Any questions, gentlemen?

THE WITNESS: Well, if we had known what the telegram was at the time I certainly would have given himpermission to use my name.

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SENATOR FLETCHER: That isn't the issue tonight. I am through.

BY SEMATOR CARTER:

Q Where did you reside on March 26th and 27th?

A 600 West Market.

SENATOR FLETCHER: That is all. Thank you. Your fee is there.

At this time I wish to introduce telegram from Preson C. Sharrod, 600 West Market Street, San Diege, who sent me the telegram on the 27th of March, 1941, which I received, standard form of telegram.

SENATOR CARTER: What is that exhibit number? THE SECRETARY: 82.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Frank Sandos?

FRAME SANDOZ,

called and sworn by Senator Fletcher, Chairman, testifies as follows:

BY SEMATOR FLETCHER:

Q Frank Sandos, 3052 K Street. Mr. Sandos, did you send me that telegram?

A No, I did not, because I haven't sent you any telegram.

Q Did you authorise it?

A No, sir.

THE SECRETARY: 83.

SEMATOR FLETCHER: Mr. Edwin A. Leonard?

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EDWIN A. LEONARD,

called and sworn by Senator Fletcher, Chairman, testifies as follows:

BY SENATOR FLETCHER:

Q Edwin A. Leonard, 1268 16th Street, San Diego. Is that right?

A That is right.

Q Is that the telegrem that you sent me?

A I didn't send you any telegram.

Q You did not? Did you authorise it be sent?

A I did not.

Q Did you know it was being sent at the time?

A Ho.

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Q Do you belong to a union?

A I do: 1296, Carpenters.

q 1296, Carpenters? Do you know of any by-law that gives the right to any officer of 1296 to send a telegram such as this without your knowledge and consent?

A I don't positively know it, but it is my understanding that they have that privilege. I have never read it in the by-lews, but I understand they have that privilege.

Q Has this thing ever been done before, to your knowledge?

A No, it has never been done, to my knowledge.

SEMATOR FLETCHER: I ask that this telegrem be introduced. Exhibit number what? THE SECRETARY: 84

called and sworn by Senator Fletcher, Chairman, testifies as follows:

BY SENATOR FLETCHER:

A No, sir.

Q Did you know it was ever sent?

A No, sir.

Q Did you authorize it?

A Mo, sir.

Are you a member of the union?

Q Is there any by-law or law to your knowledge that allows an officer of 1296 to send a telegram like this without your authority?

A Hot that I know of.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Any questions, gentlemen? BY SENATOR CARTER:

- Did you send me that telegram?
- A I never did.
- Did you authorize it?
- No, sir.
 - Did you know it was sent?
 - Mo, sir.
 - Do you belong to a union?

Yes, sir.

What number, please?

1296.

Do you know of any by-law or any authority of any official of 1296 that has authority, without your knowledge and consent, to send a telegrem like this?

A No. sir.

Have you any further comments to make?

A No, sir. I don't believe they have the authority.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Any other question? Thank you very much.

I ask that this telegram be introduced. Exhibit what? SENATOR CARTER: Let me get this straight.

- Q When this telegrem was sent did you live on Lincoln Avenue?

Q Would you have authorized the sending of such a telegram?

A Well, if I had known the details. I didn't know what it was all about until afterwards.

SENATOR CARTER: All right.

SENATOR FLETCHER: I wish to introduce the telegram from Charles S. White, sent to me on March 27th, at Sacramento, as Exhibit 87.

SHEATOR CARTER: Are there any other individuals who

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have been subposensed who have not been called? Well, one of you stand up at a time, please, and come forward and announce your name.

MR. BECK: My name is Alfred B. Buck, 218 Payne Street.

SENATOR FLETCHER: I know you are on my list. Here it
is; Alfred B. Beck. In order to expedite matters, Mr.

Beck, you take the oath.

ALFRED B. BECK,

called and sworn by Senator Fletcher, Chairman, testifies as follows:

BY SENATOR FLETCHER:

- Q Did you ever send me a telegrem in March, 1941?
- A Ho, sir.
- Q You never authorized your name to any telegram?
- A Not to my knowledge, I haven't. I do belong to a union and I did go and join that union under protest at the time, so, if so, it was under protest anyway.
 - Q You joined the union under protest?
- A I did, because it was a "have-to" case of making a living for my family.

SEMATOR FLETCHER: Sit down, my friend, just a moment.

I want to find you a telegram and a card. I know there is a telegram from you.

SENATOR CARTER: What I would suggest, Senator Flotcher, is that you ask the usual questions and reserve an exhibit

number for the telegram. BY SENATOR PLETCHER:

- Q What union do you belong to?
- A I belong to Chauffeurs and Teamsters Union. I couldn't tell you exactly the union.
- Q Do you know of any by-laws or have you ever signed any agreement or approved the sending of telegrams such as this, without your knowledge and consent?

A Not that I know of.

SENATOR FLETCHER: May we reserve the right and have it known as Eth ibit Number -- what?

THE SECRETARY: 88.

SENATOR PLETCHER: I will produce the telegram, because I know that I have it. Any questions? I thank you. There is the financial man. He is right here. I will read it into the record later on.

SENATOR FLETCHER: What is the next man that we subposensed?

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W. W. RUSSELL, called and sworn by Senator Fletcher, Chairman, testifies as follows: BY SENATOR FLETCHER: Q William W. Russell, 3414 Wile Street? A Yes, sir. Q Did you send me that telegram, Mr. Russell? A Mo, sir. Q Did you know it was sent? No, sir. Did you ever authorize it? No, sir. Do you belong to a union? A Yes, sir. What number? Mo, sir, none whatsoever. Q Do you have anything further to say? Ho, sir. SENATOR FLETCHER: Any questions?

SENATOR CARTER: Hone.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Thank you. At this time I wish to introduce a telegram from William W. Russell, 3414 Hile Street, San Diego, to me, which I received in Sacramento on March 27th, a standard form, and ask that it be made an exhibit -- what? THE SECRETARY: 89. SENATOR FLETCHER: And your name? MR. BONATUS: John Bonatus. JOHN BONATUS, called and sworn by Senator Fletcher, Chairman, testifies as follows: SENATOR FLETCHER: I know we have that telegram. I 14 will not look for it now, to save time. BY SENATOR FLETCHER: Q What is your address? 3620 Mile Street. You received a subposna? Yes. You received a card from me, did you not? BY SERATOR FLETCHER:

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Q Did I write you a letter acknowledging receipt of a telegram from you?

A A card.

Q And what was your answer?

A "No," to all three charges.

Q Have you ever sent me a telegram or authorized one

A Hever at no time.

Q Are you a member of the union?

A I was a member of the union until June 1st.

Q What union, please?

A 1296. Beg your pardon; April 1st.

Q Do you know of any by-law or of any legal right of any officer of 1296 to send a private telegram under your signature, without your knowledge or consent?

A I do not, most emphatically.

Q Have you anything further to say on the subject?

A No; it would be too big a subject. Let's say

Q What was your address, Mr. Staffen?

called and sworn by Senator Fletcher, Chairman, testifies as follows:

SENATOR CARTER: Let us get the address now.

SENATOR FLETCHER: 4937 Niegara.

THE WITHESS: That is right.

BY SENATOR PLETCHER:

- Q Mr. O'Brien, did you ever send me any telegram at any time?
 - A Ho, sir.
 - Q Did you ever authorise a telegram to be sent?
 - A No, sir.
 - 2 Did you ever know of any telegram being sent?
 - A Not until I was informed by you.
 - In your letter to me of April 14th -- I appreciate

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the splendid letter. I will not introduce it in evidence. But I would like to ask you if you belong to a union?

- A Yes.
- Q What is the number?
- A Ironworkers, Number 229; Ironworkers.
- Q I want to ask this question: Have you ever given legal authority or do you know of any officer who has the legal authority through the by-levs to send a private telegram under your own signature and no one olse, without your knowledge and consent?

A There is no such law.

SHEATOR FLETCHER: At this time I ask, as Exhibit Humber -- what?

THE SECRETARY: 97.

SENATOR PLETCHER: -- That my tolegrem that was received from J. J. O'brien, 4937 Hiagara Street, be made Exhibit Eumber 97, being the standard form. Thank you. I guess that is all. I hope it is all. The Committee will now go into executive session.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Mr. Bitter, the Chairman rules that there shall go into the record your voluntary offer to testify. But this is not a court. We do not feel that we have the right to go outside the scope of our resolution, 104, which was passed, and the question of immunity is involved, and for that reason we will not take the

responsibility of allowing you to testify now, but as soon as we can get to our legal counsel in Sacremento we will take it up. I will say this, that if it is the legal opinion of our legal counsel that you can be heard, we will be glad to subpoens you, at our own expense, and have you come to Sacramento and testify at a hearing that we will hold there. We appreciate the kind offer of your voluntary offer of testimony tonight, but the ruling of the chair is that we cannot hear you tonight.

MR. BITTER: Well, I just wanted to say and just 11 reiterate that we had already informed you in Sacramento that we sent the telegrams, and that is all I was going to say anyvay.

SENATOR FLETCHER: All right. Thank you, my friend. I thank you very much.

MR. PIERCE: May I also have in the record that I appear as secretary of the Son Diego Central Labor Council and made the same offer to appear and was refused?

SHEATOR FLETCHER: What is your name?

MR. PIERCE: Edward F. Pierce.

SENATOR FLETCHER: Edward F. Pierce. It is so recorded

Is there anything further?

SERATOR CARTER: No, I have nothing further.

SENATOR BIGGAR: No.

SHEATOR FLETCHER: The Committee stands adjourned.
