THE CRAFTSMEN IN SAN DIEGO

Among the many artist-craftsmen working in the San Diego area are some of the finest craftsmen in America, people who exhibit nationally as well as abroad.

One could write a book dealing with the definitions of craftsman and artist-craftsman, but for the sake of brevity, let us say that the craftsman is technically competent, even to the point of exquisite skill. The artist craftsman goes further, incorporating with his skill the rarer qualities of creativity, taste and visual excitement. He is first, last and always a designer.

His art is less a product than an experience, satisfying a need to create an expression of himself, a statement of integrity, a search for truth. For the buy 4 of his product, there is satisfaction exceeding the purpose of the piece, as in a teapot which becomes an art object rather than a receptacle for tea.

There are also many Sunday craftsmen in this area, some of whom are on a high artistic level. Their amateur status is determined by class participation, where some of the processes of their work take place under supervision. And one does not ignore the gifted student.

A good place to see the work of the last-mentioned craftsmen is at the University of California Extension School Christmas Sale, December 3 at the La Jolla Museum. Here ceramic delights and duds are on sale from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at low to reasonable prices.

The professionals of the area show in shops and galleries in La Jolla, Bird Rock, Mission Valley and San Diego. Many of these fine craftsmen belong to the respected Allied Craftsmen, which opens a sale show December 4 at Orr's Gallery in San Diego. This is a take-out show; that is, if you buy you take it with you, so if you'd like to see it complete, come opening day. This type of show is more crowded than A.C.'s usual exhibits, but

very satisfying for shopping for the stunning wood, enamels, mobiles and sculpture, ceramics, silver, weaving and photography of this outstanding group of craftsmen.

The Potters Guild, Balboa Park, offers year 'round exhibits of ceramics by artists in a co-op set up. The National Invitational Enameling Exhibition, which includes several local artists, is on view at San Diego State College till December 8.

So much more could be said, about individual craftsmen and the nature of their work. In some private studios where commissions for public buildings and other types of work are under way, the work sometimes, not always, can be seen by appointments with the artists. Classroom situations also offer opportunity to watch work in progress - again, by appointment.
