




Sunday afternoon, December 14th, 4 PM to 7 PM


Directory Updates

BUS-EXCURSION TO THE BOWERS MUSEUM

SOUNDING BOARD SPEAKER FOR DECEMBER 4, 2003

Under Erika Torri's direction since 1991, the 104-year old Athenaeum music and art library in La Jolla, one of only 17 membership libraries in the US, has grown in stature and prestige to become one of the leading art venues in the area, especially for its collection of artists, books, a new art form. Music programs include many sold-out jazz series and Chamber Music series. When the popular Athenaeum School of the Arts had outgrown its space, Erika found a building for it. Her boundless energy and enthusiasm are obvious when viewing the Athenaeum's plans for further expansion. As she says, referring to the other 16 membership libraries, "We're not the biggest, but w', re the liveliest!" She says, "We plan to sustain our mission to embrace arts and music in a comprehensive way, with library services, classes, performances and exhibitions while continuing the lively, innovative programming that makes the Athenaeum such a unique and well-loved place."

Erika, born in Bremen, Germany, is an artist, whose miniature weavings are in museum and private collections. She is sought after as a lecturer and consultant and often serves as juror for art exhibitions.



A personal and diminutive approach to French diminutives

Some time ago, Oceanids friends Marianne Burkenroad and her husband Charles Fuchsman got me interested in the usage that various languages make of the diminutive. Since French is my native tongue, they prompted me to think of how French specifically approached the problem. As a response I wrote the following, somewhat playfully.

Not too many months after we first came to the USA, we left New York for the state of Maryland; we arrived by train in the small town of Havre de Grace at the mouth of the Susquehanna River on Thanksgiving Day. We were met at the station by a very kind gentleman who proceeded to take us to a motel on the outskirts of town. There, he left us to our own devices, wishing us the best. There was a television in the room, which, not knowing what else to do, we flicked on. We saw reflected for us on its screen, the many dinners that Americans were being sat at on that feast day, with turkeys galore and the jelly of red cranberries. With barely a cent in our hands, we nevertheless managed to acquire some Nescafe and condensed milk which we drank, lukewarm thanks to the water from the bathroom sink, as we watched on the T.V. screen, our future compatriots gorge themselves on extravagant food. It was at once amusing and strangely sad.

A few days later, as we had settled in a rented apartment, the friends who had helped us find it brought us the town newspaper in which our arrival had been dutifully recorded. We could not believe that we deserved such recognition, and yet there we were written about, in print, black on white.

It was at that very moment, as I read on, that I first encountered on American soil the word "diminutive". The article stated that a "diminutive" Frenchman and his "attractive" wife had arrived in the town of Havre de Grace, which, as the bearer of such a distinguished French name was honored to welcome them as their first French citizens. It had never occurred to me that I was "attractive" but I knew that my husband was small. In France he had appeared less so than he had since our arrival in the States where men (and women) towered over us. And even if he was small, I had never thought of him as "diminutive"; I immediately tried to translate for myself the word into French, but in vain, as in my mind a "diminutive" was only referring to a linguistic device added onto a word, in order to apply to it a nuance of smallness, attenuation or familiarity. The American word "kitchenette" immediately leapt to my mind; it had adopted the most common French diminutive suffix, namely -ette, in order to make, even in America. a kitchen smaller. Thinking further, I recalled how, in the old days, when a man courted a woman, it was said in French that he would "conte fleurette" to her (that is, literally, he would "tell her tales of small flowers", or if you prefer, in correct English, whisper sweet nothings to her.) Some etymologists claim that the English in turn anglicized the saying and made of it the verb: to flirt (in which you hear "fleurette"); the French to respond in kind, quickly readopted the verb, "to flirt", which became in French "flirter" (pronounced "fleurter", as it should be written according to French phonetics), and today in France men and women "flirtent", and no longer, alas, "content fleurette", though the expression was so charming.

Time passed and from Maryland we came to California. La Jolla was a lovely place when we first arrived, and there was no grandiloquence to it. Houses were tasteful and often small, next to the vast Pacific Ocean. I felt at ease and not overwhelmed. Only the cars remained huge, until the dawn of the Carter era, when "small" was suddenly "beautiful". Unfortunately it did not last long. Soon, everything developed into something bigger, grander, and higher. La Jolla became arrogant and showy. Now, when I take my walks, I pass by what I cannot but think of as "les palais romains", the Roman palaces with "front audacieux", of which the poet Joachim du Bellay in I6th century France wrote.

On re-reading of du Bellay's poem I was brought back to l6th century France, and I could not but remember one of the last poems written by Pierre de Ronsard, le Prince des Poëtes, before his death, as he addressed his soul, in a flurry of diminutives.

A Son Ame

Amelette Ronsardelette
Mignonnelette, doucelette,
Très chère hôtesse de mon corps,
Tu descends là bas faiblelette,
Pâle, maigrelette, seulette,
Dans le froid royaume des mors;
Toutesfois simple, sans remors
De meutre, poison, et rancune,
Méprisant faveurs et trésors
Tant enviés par la commune.
Passant, j'ai dit; suis ta fortune,
Ne trouble pas mon repos : je dors !

Here is a quick attempt at a literal translation: it is almost impossible to do a good job of it because of the many diminutives attributed to words usually never used with them.

Tiny little soul of small insignificant Ronsard Very cute, very sweet, Very dear host of my body, You are going down over there, most weak, Pale, very skinny, and most alone Into the cold kingdom of the dead; Yet, simple, without remorse Of murder, poison and rancor, Despising favors and treasures So envied by the common man. Passer-by, I say (to you); follow your fortune, Do not trouble my rest: I am sleeping.

The poem's extensive use of the diminutive -elette- is evident. To French ears it sounds absolutely childlike and extremely tender, as well as surprisingly unselfconscious from the part of such a renowned and serious poet as Ronsard. Even though the subject is somber, since Ronsard is speaking to his soul anticipating his death, the tone, thanks to the diminutives, remains light and almost playful. It emphasizes the role of diminutives in the French language as tools for obtaining nuances which could not be obtained otherwise.

With the diminutives in mind, one word arrested my attention more than any other: the word: Mignonnelette. It is worth looking at it in more details:

The radical to which -elette-is added is the noun: mignonne. Mignonne is the feminine of mignon; the first degree of diminution would have been mignonnette, adding the suffix -ette-. Mignonnelette further diminishes the word mignonnette. If you think that mignon itself is the diminutive of minet and that minet is in turn the diminutive of mine, which is the popular name of the cat in various Gallo-Roman idioms, you realize that an approximate and correct translation in English of mignonnelette would have to come down to a quintessential "kitten" or "kitty".

From all that has been said above, one common factor comes to mind. It is, maybe, the inclination for the "less", for the "small", for the "familiar", the "homey", the "sweet", the "young", the "child", that the use of the diminutives implies the most. It is this aspect which attracted me, (mixing all categories and not necessarily in that order), to Ronsard, du Bellay, and also in a certain way to La Jolla when it was a village, to my husband, to the Carter era, all children etc.

It would appear that when we dare to let down our defenses, and come to use the charming diminutives of love, affection, and care, our language is often enriched with an infinity of nuances, otherwise lost in plain straight talk.
