

UCSD Medical Center Receives American Heart Association Achievement Award

Award Recognizes Excellence in Prevention of Cardiovascular Disease and Stroke

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UCSD Medical Center recently received the American Heart Association's "Get with the Guidelines" Coronary Artery Disease Annual Performance Achievement Award. The award recognizes UCSD Medical Center's success for implementing a higher standard of care for all patients hospitalized with coronary artery disease.

To receive the award, UCSD Medical Center consistently complied for 12 consecutive months with the requirements of the American Heart Association program. Under the program, patients are started on aggressive risk reduction therapies such as cholesterol lowering drugs, aspirin, ACE inhibitors and beta-blockers in the hospital, and receive smoking cessation and weight management counseling and referrals for cardiac rehabilitation before they are discharged.

"The American Heart Association applauds UCSD Medical Center for its success in implementing the appropriate standards of care and protocols to reduce the number of events in coronary patients," said Gray Ellrodt, M.D., of the American Heart Association. "UCSD Medical Center is well above the national average in terms of implementing these life-saving treatments."
