

HERBERT STERN 1918-1998

Herbert Stern passed away on January 1, following a lingering illness. He leaves his wife Ruth who was a practicing pediatrician and is a member of Oceanids. Herb was born and raised in Montreal where he attended McGill University and earned his doctorate in plant genetics. His professional pursuits took him from Montreal to Berkeley, Johannesburg, the Rockerfeller Institute in New York, the Department of Agriculture in Ottawa and the University of Illinois. He joined the Biology Department at UCSD in 1965 where he served as chairman from 1967 to 1975 and again from 1983 to 1986. He was widely respected by his faculty and by the University administration for his wise and able leadership.

During his research career at UCSD, Herb developed the lily anther as a system par excellence for the biochemical investigation of meiosis, the pair of cell divisions preparatory to pollen formation; his investigations led to many seminal discoveries of fundamental importance.

In addition to research, Herb's other passion was teaching. He was a conscientious teacher, and his door was always open to students. He was an unpretentious and straightforward person with a superb sense of humor.§
