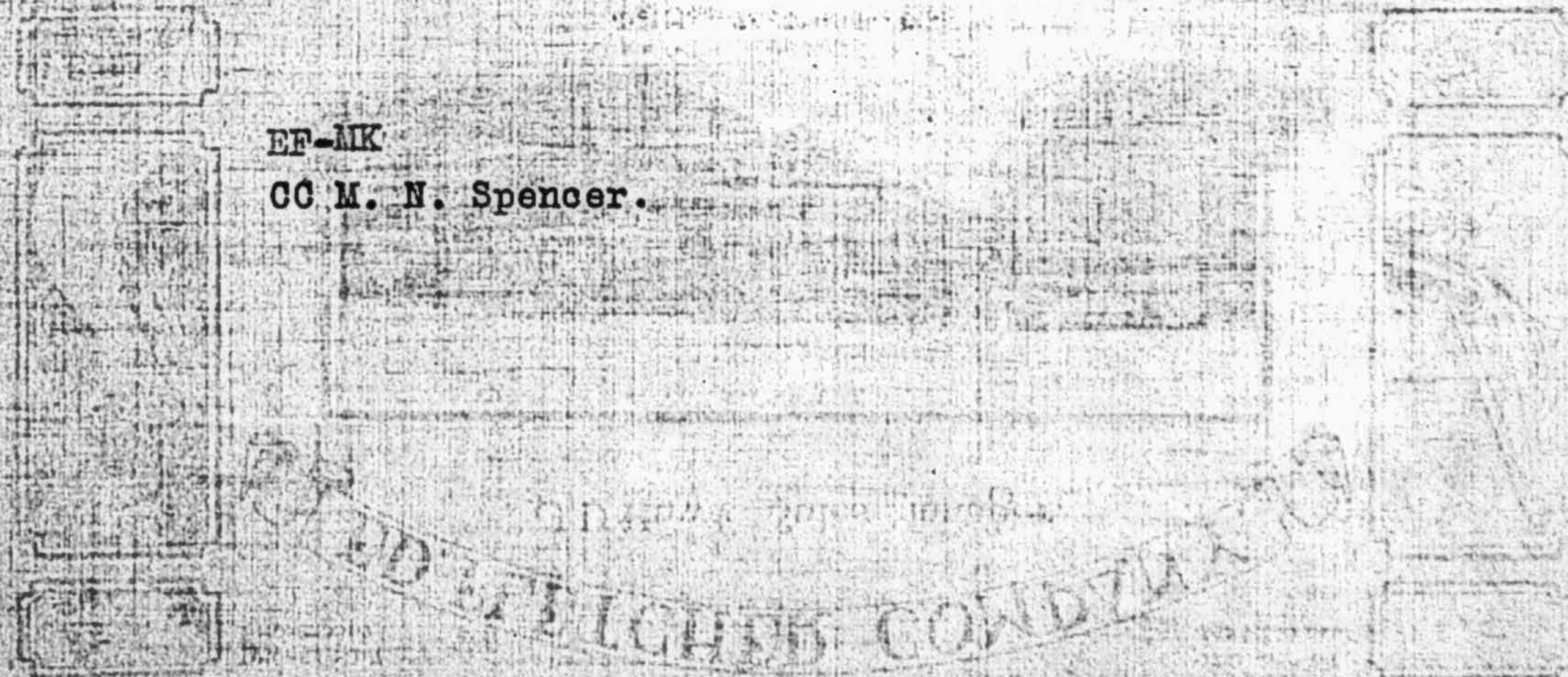
Dear Sir:

DEAR SIR:

I HAVE ALWAYS ADMIRED THE INTENSE COMPETITIVE SPIRIT EVIDENCED BY EACH OF YOUR ENTIRE FAMILY - - ENGENDERED BY THE STRONG CHARACTER SO THOROUGHLY INHERITED FROM YOUR FOREBEARERS. I AM EVEN MORE THOROUGHLY IMPRESSED BY THE SPORTSMANSHIP AND ENERGY WHICH HAS CARRIED EACH OF YOUR SONS TO HIGH HONORS IN WHATEVER FIELD OF ENDEAVOR HE HAS CHOSEN.

NATURALLY DIFFERENCES IN OPINION ARISE WHEN "TWO STRONG MEN STAND FACE TO FACE", AND IT IS THE RESOLUTION OF SUCH DIFFERENCES WHICH MAKES FOR PROGRESS AND CHARACTER.

I THOROUGHLY BELIEVE THAT BOTH CHARLIE AND WIG ARE CONVINCED THAT EACH IS RIGHT AND HAVE VALID ARGUMENTS TO PROVE IT. I UNDERSTAND THEY HAD A WORKING AGREEMENT ON ALL IMIG MANOR INSURANCE WHICH WAS NOT WRITTEN IN CHARLIE'S AGENCY. THE TECHNICAL ASPECTS OF THE HANDLING OF THE POLICIES IN QUESTION WAS CONFUSED AT BOTH ENDS.

I AM CERTAINLY NOT QUALIFIED TO ACT AS ARBITER IN THE MATTER. I BELIEVE CHARLIE HAD A RIGHT TO BELIEVE THAT THOSE WHOM HE DELEGATED TO HANDLE HIS AFFAIRS WHILE HE WAS AWAY WOULD DO SO TO THE BEST OF THEIR ABILITY AND IN GOOD FAITH. ANY ERRORS OR FAILURES COULD NOT BE CONSTRUED AS EVIDENCE OF BAD FAITH. ANY EFFORT TO CORRECT THEM THEN OR NOW MUST BE JUDGED IN THE LIGHT OF THE SAME COMPETITIVE SPIRIT AND HIGH SPORTSMANSHIP WHICH I MENTIONED IN MY FIRST PARAGRAPHS, FOR THE MONETARY CONSIDERATION INVOLVED IS TOO PALTRY A SUM TO FORM THE BASIS OF A RIFT BETWEEN TWO SUCH WONDERFUL FELLOWS.

I BELIEVE FROM YOUR LETTER THAT THE FACTS AS PRESENTED ARE ALL TRUE. THE RENEWAL OF THE POLICIES WAS NOT ORDERED BEFORE EXPIRATION. WHEN THE ORDER WAS TELEPHONED BY WIG IT WAS WRITTEN IN COMPANIES CHARLIE REPRESENTED AND MAILED TO WIG. OUR CLERICAL HELP MAILED THE BILLS FOR THE PREMIUM TO WIG AND HE PAID THEM TO US, LESS COMMISSION.

WHY THE HOME FEDERAL WOULD PAY THESE PREMIUMS TO WIG WHEN IT WAS AWARE THAT THESE WERE CHARLIE'S EXPIRATIONS POSES ANOTHER POSSIBILITY OF CLERICAL ERROR.

Friend Ervast:

Enclosed find map, and Miss May will give you two more, furnishing you the necessary information regarding the water system at Fletcher Hills.

From Well No. 1 to the tank it is extra heavy 6 inch O. D. casing, tested out and guaranteed under a 500 pound pressure. The balance of the system is heavy OD casing 5 1/2 inch. No. 1 well is the one you tested.

No. 2 well is down 510 feet but has never been tested excepting that it was operated by a portable engine and produced about 100 gallons a minute for two or three hours. The Cuyamaca Packing Company well is shown on the map and we have also marked the location of the proposed well No. 3 and proposed well No. 4, if it ever becomes necessary to develop more water.

Regarding well No. 1 you know it tested out about 220 gallons a minute, and I am satisfied that with a little more draw down it will be materially increased. The water from well No. 1 alone, 220 gallons a minute, continual flow, will take care of roughly 1500 people as I recollect it, but you have your own data.

In addition to these four wells the Colorado River pipe line from San Vicente Dam to Murray Dam goes right thru the property. Our man marked it the "El Monte Pipe line", but it brings water from San Vicente into the city. As to its capacity you can get that information from Pyle or Rhoads.

As you will see by the map there is a difference in elevation between Well No. 1 and the tank of approximately 139 feet. Well No. 1 is approximately 411 feet.

This property adjoins the City of El Cajon on the South and on the East and La Mesa Irrigation District on the West. Before you close your report I would like to see it on Wednesday while agreeable. Enclosed herewith find log of Well No. 2.

I have always in the past cooperated with the Govern-
ment and I want to now, and the Ed Fletcher Company as well. All we are
asking is an opportunity to, in the Court of Claims protect ourselves for
any and all damages and loss as well as when the property is vacated. We are
only getting a nominal rental. Your possession was given under a lease
to the CCC Camp and we are deprived of operating and selling, in the mean-
time, a considerable amount of property.

I was glad to have the opportunity of discussing misunderstandings with
you and wish to apologize for not handling the situation in the proper
way, through my ignorance.

Re the taking of pictures, I stayed on the State Highway and thought I
had a perfect right to take pictures of our own property from the State
Highway, but being United States Government property in your possession,
you inform me I have not that right. If you want the pictures that I
took I will return them to you.

Re the episode in connection with sowing of grain. We have planted that
property for ten or fifteen years and when the Army took possession we
had permission to farm our tillable lands, most of it in writing and one
lot, I think it is Lot 19, verbally. We harvested the crops there in
1943 and 1944. I attach hereto a copy of the letter from Col. O. E.
Trechter, which is explanatory. We felt that the land should be harvested
for the growing of food stuffs as a war measure, as the lands were not
used by the Army and that was the attitude taken by Col. Trechter.

You mentioned one thing that in all fairness I feel should be explained, i.e.
that the land was plowed at night and inferred that it was done to circum-
vent you. The facts are the property was leased by Messrs. Ed Fletcher, Jr.,
Forest Hawley and Dr. John Steen. They let the contract for the plowing to
others who were planting the 3000 or 4000 acre ranch just to the west. As
a special consideration to these three men the work was done, mostly at
night on overtime by the contractor who was doing this other plowing. I am
sure there was no intent to put one over on you. Most of the California
equipment is equipt for night operation as well as day and this is a case
in point.

Re the cutting of the trees episode. The neighbors telephoned to my son,
Ed Jr. who is not an officer of the Ed Fletcher Company but owns 10% of
the stock. On his own initiative and without my knowledge he went over
there and protested. He planted those trees with his own hands and has a
special interest in them. I feel your explanation is the correct one, that
the government has a perfect right to do what it wants with property that
is under its control and that claim should be made for damages. Ed Jr. was
wrong and I apologize for that as well.
