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ECONOMIC COLUMNIST ROBERT KUTTNER TO SPEAK AT UCSD APRIL 2

Robert Kuttner, economic columnist for Business Week, The New Republic, and the Boston Globe will give a free public lecture April 2 at 4 p.m. at the University of California, San Diego. The lecture, which is on "What is the National Interest? The United States and the Global Economy," will be held in Room 003 of UCSD's Cognitive Science Building.

Kuttner, the author of several books, including "The End of Laissez-Faire" (Knopf, 1991), which deals with the politics of global economic interdependence, is considered to be one of the most prominent voices for national, progressive economic policy. A national staff writer for The Washington Post, he has been a chief investigator for the U.S. Senate Committee on Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs, as well as executive director for President Carter's National Commission on Neighborhoods.

A prolific writer and lecturer, Kuttner's work appears frequently in a variety of publications, including the Atlantic Monthly, Harvard Business Review, New York Times Book Review and Dissent magazine. He also serves as co-editor of "The American Prospect," a quarterly journal of politics and policy.

Kuttner will be spending the week of March 30 at UCSD as a Regents' Lecturer in the political science department. In addition to the public lecture, he will meet with faculty and students, and will give a talk to the UCSD Economics Roundtable. Although the public lecture is free, parking permits are required on the UCSD campus and can be purchased for \$2 at the information pavilions on Northview Drive and Gilman Drive.

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
