NOTES

Jean Zeiger Cunningham is a member of the Oakland Symphony Orchestra and has participated in most first performances in the Bay Area that have required the services of a flutist. - Milton Williams teaches voice in Burlingame and performs also as a jazz bassist. -Dwight Peltzer, faculty member of the San Francisco Conservatory of Music, will be appearing in March as guest artist at several new music festivals in the east, including the University of Illinois Festival of Contemporary Arts.

Of the six composers represented on this program, three are Bay Area residents. - Pauline Oliveros recently returned from Europe where, in Holland, at the Gaudemus Festival, she was awarded first prize for her "Sound Patterns for Mixed Chorus." - Salvatore Martirano is a Ford Foundation Composer in Residence at the Berkeley Public Schools. His "O,O,O,O, That Shakespeherian Rag" for chorus and instrumental ensemble is planned for a later concert. - Loren Rush is a member of the faculty of the San Francisco Conservatory of Music. "Mandala Music" will be performed at the University of Illinois Festival of Contemporary Arts in March.

"Mandala Music" is more a musician's erector set than it is composed music. The material for construction, or improvisation, is presented as groups of pitches, some with given durations. The geometry of the mandala indicates to the performers the relationship of any "moment" to the whole of the improvisation, involving them in situations in which they are performing either as soloists or supporting other soloists, dominant or equal members of the ensemble, or performing in free solo or group cadenzas.

ERICKSON VARESE WEBERN MOZART MARTIRANO

HALL OF FLOWERSGOLDEN GATE PARKSAN FRANCISCOMONDAY, MAY 13, 1963

"Octandre" by the French-American composer Varèse was written in 1924. This short work, considered by the composer as his first major composition, is in three continuous movements; Assez lent; Très vif et nerveux; and Grave.

Salvatore Martirano is currently Ford Foundation Composer in Residence at the Berkeley Public Schools. The "Octet," in one movement, was first performed in April at Berkeley High School as part of a concert of music for public school ensembles written by Mr. Martirano during the year.

The "Concerto, op. 24" by the Viennese Anton Webern (1883-1945) was completed in 1934, in three movements: Somewhat lively; Very slow; and Very rapid.

The Mozart sonata, K. 454, was written in 1784. The movements are: Largo-Allegro; Andante; Allegretto.

Robert Erickson's "Concerto for Piano and Seven Instruments" (1963) received its first performance in March at the Contemporary Arts Festival of the University of Illinois and the Chicago meeting of the Music Teachers' National Association. Dwight Peltzer was soloist on both occasions. This will be the first West Coast performance. The composer offers the following remarks about the Piano Concerto: "My piano concerto is in three continuous movements. The first and second are linked by an improvised cadenza for piano alone; the second and third, by an improvised group cadenza followed by another for piano and percussion. I have also used improvisation in the composed movements of the concerto. Here the players either play written-out music or improvise according to various directions. At times the directions are rather specific and at others the player is guite free of specific directions. I first became interested in improvised music some years ago, partly through listening to the music of children and partly as a result of hearing the group improvisations of several of my composer-students. I employed it for the first time in my Chamber Concerto, composed in 1959-60. I value improvisation for its directness and vital expressive impact. These gualities are precious to me and worth the obvious risks inherent in any extemporized expression. Therefore, I have tried to work improvised materials into the concerto in such a way that they fuse with written-out materials. As the composer, I would be pleased if the listener were unable to tell where (except for the cadenzas) the written music leaves off and improvisation begins."

These concerts are presented as a cooperative venture of KPFA and Performer's Choice, a loosely knit organization of musicians dedicated to the principal that the performer himself must take a stand on what he presents and personally assume responsibility for the quality of that performance.
