

Would it be possible for the structure atop Mt. Soledad to be used by all veteran groups and more? How about this?



There could be a delightful celebration on summer solstice, or even winter solstice!

I visualize the pole standing unadorned most of the time and only changed on special occasions. There would have to be some rules. For example, the number of days for any particular group should probably be limited, so that no specific symbol stayed up constantly. The rent should be high enough to cover the cost of cleaning up and providing crowd control. But maybe by this small change to the upright pole all veterans and their families could indeed use the space legally.

The Trip to the Getty Villa

After an eight-year hiatus the Getty Villa (the Old Getty) in Malibu has reopened, and we are taking a bus trip to visit Saturday, March 25, 2006. The Getty Villa houses one of the finest collections of Roman, Greek and Etruscan antiquities. The center-piece of the 1200-item collection is the renowned Lansdowne Herakles, larger-then-life statue of the Greek god that is believed to date about 125 A.D. Michelangelo' drawing "Holy Family with the Infant Baptist" is a recent acquisition displayed.

The original villa was constructed in the 1970's to resemble the Villa dei Papiri, a first-century Roman country home that is believed to have been the residence of Julius Caesar's father-in-law which once overlooked the Bay of Naples near Pompeii. (The first-century home was buried in ashes during an eruption of the volcano Vesuvius, but its floor plan was used to reconstruct this transplanted edifice.) Oil billionaire J. Paul Getty built it to be his home but never lived long enough to live in it. After he died, it became an art museum with a \$2 billion endowment. It is now one of the wealthiest museums in the world. There are 40 exquisite gallery rooms embellished with marble and gold and filled with striking collections of paintings, sculpture, etchings, drawings, illuminated manuscripts, antiquities, and even photography. Some of the oldest items date back as far as 2500 B.C. On the upper level there are paintings by masters Cezanne, Renoir, Degas, Monet, Goya, Rembrandt, Raphael, Rubens, Gainsborough and VanGogh.

The Getty Villa has just finished a \$127 million renovation done by the architects Jorge Silvetti and Rodolifo Machado. The renovations have been designed to shake the senses. A 450-seat amphitheater has been added, windows installed, walkways, and skylights added. And we are going, but we are allowed only one bus. Reservations will be on a first-come basis. The cost is \$40. As usual, a continental breakfast will be served on the way up. And an audio tour will be included in the cost. Our nip of Sherry is for the trip home.

We will leave at 6:00 a.m. sharp from the UTC parking lot off Nobel Drive by the tire center. At 6:20 a.m. there will be a second pickup in the north-bound park-and-ride at Interstate 5 and La Costa exit for those who live in north county.

ICSD Oceanids Newcomers Desert Trip to the Anza Borrego State Park

Overnight Camping at Agua Caliente

Friday, March 31 - Sunday, April 2, 2006

Agua Caliente is located in the Carrizo Valley region of Anza-Borrego Desert State Park. It is best known for its heated springs, which have long attracted visitors eager to soak in their soothing therapeutic mineral waters. (Be sure to bring your bathing suits!) Spectacular vistas and miles of trails that meander through the park's canyons and across its hillsides are additional attractions.

Centuries ago, the Kumeyaay Indians were initially attracted to the springs at what we now call Agua Caliente ("hot water" in Spanish). Spanish explorers, miners, then pioneers, soldiers and prospectors eventually made their way here as well. The seismic activity that long ago shaped the Tierra Blanca Mountains to the west and created the fault that runs beneath the park also enabled water to come to the surface and form the park's natural springs. A wide variety of wildlife is attracted to the springs, including foxes, coyotes, bobcats and mountain lions; wildflowers and succulents might not bloom abundantly this year as we have not had much rain this year. But the outing will be worthwhile nevertheless.

The easiest way to get there is to take Hwy. 8 out to S-2 (Exit Ocotillo). Go north for approximately 26 miles. Or you can take 78 to S-2 and go south for approximately 20 miles. The camp sites will be available starting at noon on Friday.

On Saturday morning, Carole Ziegler will lead a hike at 10 a.m. She will also give a talk in the evening entitled, "60 million years in 60 minutes". A telescope to view the stars and planets away from city lights will be available. We will sing around the campfire, so bring your musical instruments and voices.

Please call Carole at 619-297-0798 if you wish to go camping so that she will know to look for you. She has reserved 8 camp sites. She can also answer any questions you may have regarding camping. You may also reserve a camping spot for just one night. Some camping equipment may be available for loan--again please ask Carole.

COSTS: \$5/adult and \$3/child under 12 years to camp. Please pay Carole when you arrive at the camp site. Be sure to bring mittens/gloves, sweatshirts and jackets as evenings in the desert are apt to be chilly.

Desert Day Outing

Sunday, April 2

Meet at the parking lot behind the UCSD International Center at 8 a.m. for carpooling and a map. Please let us know if you have space in your car for more passengers!

We will drive to Borrego Palm Canyon and go to the Visitors Center to look at their exhibits. We will meet the campers for lunch. Afterwards, we will search for desert flowers and cacti.

Bring a picnic lunch and water. Wear light-colored clothes for hiking (long pants and long-sleeved shirt is advisable), sturdy shoes, socks and a hat. Sunscreen is a good idea.

Give your driver \$5.00 for gas money if you carpool.

In case of rain, the event will be cancelled.
