



CONFERENCE BACKGROUND

"Homosexuality and Public Life," a one-day conference sponsored by the CACLGBTI, is designed to educate the UCSD community and general public about contemporary issues affecting the lives of lesbians, gay men, bisexuals, and transgendered people, their families, colleagues, and coworkers.

A primary conference goal is to promote discourse. Members of the audience will be encouraged to participate in lively discussion on topics particularly salient to members of the lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender community. The forum will contribute to a deeper understanding of diversity, and how the actions of individuals (positive or negative) affect the broader community and society as a whole.

The conference will be presented in four panels on "Military," "Politics," "Community," and "Family." These include UCSD faculty, as well as national and local speakers from the academic, political, private, and public sectors.

Participating UCSD faculty will include Steven Epstein (Sociology), Gerald Lowell, (University Library), Thomas Allen Harris (Visual Arts), and Harry Hirsch (Political Science). This academic presence will connect the interests of the campus to the broader San Diego community. The forum is an excellent opportunity for the campus to showcase the University's commitment to open and informed discussions on some of today's most visible sociopolitical issues. UCSD TV will videotape much of the event, making the information available to all.

"Homosexuality and Public Life" takes place immediately prior to the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force "Creating Change" conference, also held in San Diego. November 12-16, 1997. NGLTF, now 24 years old, is a Washington, D.C.-based progressive organization committed to grassroots organizing, public advocacy, and policy research. Many of the speakers will deliver remarks at the "Creating Change" conference, and we encourage UCSD students, staff, and faculty to participate there as well.

The UCSD Chancellor's Office, Thurgood Marshall College Hewlett Diversity and Unity Fund, and the Political Science Department have provided generous financial support to make this conference possible.



Attorney Bridget J. Wilson, co-President of the Tom Homann Law Association, San Diego's Gay and Lesbian Bar Associate, consulting counsel for the Service-members Defense Network, speaker and author on the military's "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" policy will moderate this panel that includes the outspoken Volker Keith Meinhold, U.S. Navy, retired. In April 1980, at the age of seventeen, Keith Meinhold enlisted in the Navy and began an exemplary career. In May 1992, on national television, he acknowledged his gay status, which led the Navy to initiate discharge proceedings on the basis of his sexual orientation. He is joined by panelist Allan Bérubé, a community-based historian and author of the award-winning book Coming Out Under Fire: The History of Gay Men and Women in World War II. Bérubé has taught lesbian and gay history at UC Santa Cruz, Stanford, and Portland State University in Oregon.

POLITICS

Professor Harry Hirsch, Chair of the UCSD Political Science Department will moderate between San Diego City Council member Christine Kehoe and California 41st District Assemblywoman Sheila James Kuehl. Now in her second term in office, Christine Kehoe is the first openly gay or lesbian person elected to a major political position in San Diego. A leader in every sense of the word, Sheila Kuehl became the first lesbian to be named Speaker Pro Tem of the California Assembly. As a pioneering civil rights attorney and law professor, Ms. Kuehl authored over 40 pieces of legislation relating to children, families, women and nondiscrimination.

LUNCHTIME PRESENTATIONS

Lunchtime will present conference attendees with a variety of options for informal education.

Assistant Professor Thomas Allen Harris from the UCSD Visual Arts Department will screen his recent film VINTAGE: Families of Value. (72 min)

The Family panel has been generously sponsored by the Thurgood Marshall College Hewlett Diversity and Unity Fund. Great debate exists in the LGBT community regarding the desire to marry versus the desire to transcend traditional institutions for a new definition of family. Moderated by UCSD Thurgood Marshall Dean of Students Rafael Hernandez, discussion will address current issues related to LGBT families and gay marriage. Panelist Melinda Paras, multicultural organizational development consultant, and former executive director of NGLTF, will indicate the advantages and disadvantages of marriage to LGBT people, and recommend a strategy for the future. Lesléa Newman is the author of twenty-five books, including the controversial Heather Has Two Mommies, Out of the Closet and Nothing to Wear, A Letter to Harvey Milk and Writing from the Heart. Her literary awards include a 1997 Poetry Fellowship from the National Endowment for the Arts.

COMMUNITY

The powerful Community panel will be moderated by Karen Marshall, Executive Director of the San Diego Lesbian and Gay Men's Community Center. Tony Valenzuela, a San Diego LGBT activist will offer his assessment of youth and HIV/AIDS activist perspectives. Elias Farajaje-Jones, a Spanishspeaking African-Native American and a self-described "anarchist guerrilla theologian/AIDS terrorist/writer/ cultural critic/performance artist/ritual technician" will speak about his conclusions drawn from research on "queers" in traditional cultures, and seeking new understandings of the construction of gender and sexualities.

Our keynote speaker will be Kerry Lobel, Executive Director of the National Gay & Lesbian Task Force. Lobel is the former lead organizer of the Women's Project in Little Rock, Arkansas. She has served as an organizational consultant to 200 groups across the country, to help them clarify purposes and goals and strengthen internal structures. Lobel attended the University of California, Los Angeles, where she edited the Women's Newspaper, Together, and was active in the Women's Resource Center on campus.

A native of Tijuana, Mexico, Martín serves as the Executive Director of the National Latino/a Lesbian and Gay Organization (LLEGO). A national expert on HIV prevention among gay men of color, Martín is passionate about the political value of community organizing around HIV/AIDS prevention and treatment in Latino/a com-

A 1996 graduate of the NGLTF Youth Leadership Training Institute, Roland is a Filipino bisexual, public school teacher, writer and activist. Roland served as a statewide director of the California Asian and Pacific Islander Student Union and was a field coordinator for a group opposing Proposition 209. Roland now lives in a constant state of transgression and (r)evolution and speaks about progressive politics and mass liberation.

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

BIOGRAPHIES

KEYNOTE SPEAKER

Kerry Lobel, Executive Director, NGLTF

Kerry Lobel currently serves as Executive Director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF). Lobel is the former lead organizer of the Women's Project in Little Rock, Arkansas. While at the Women's Project, her program work focused on bias violence, women and AIDS, women in prison, and domestic violence. She was also responsible for fundraising and financial planning for the organization.

Lobel has served as an organizational consultant to 200 groups around the country helping them clarify purposes and goals and strengthen internal structures. Prior to moving to Arkansas, Lobel served as executive director of the Southern California Coalition on Battered Women from 1979 to 1984. She was the founding chair of the Commission on the Status of Women in Santa Monica and the chair of the Ocean Park Community Organization.

Lobel is editor of Naming the Violence: Speaking Out About Lesbian Battering; co-author of "Lesbian Teens in Abusive Relationships" in Dating Violence: Young Women in Danger; and co-author HIV, AIDS, and Reproductive Health: A Peer Trainers' Manual. She served as chair of the

National Coalition Against Domestic Violence, is a board member of National Network on Women in Prison, and was a board member of the Ryan White Center, a direct service agency for people with AIDS in Arkansas.

Lobel attended the University of California, Los Angeles, where she edited the women's newspaper, "Together," and was active in the Women's Resource Center on campus.

MILITARY PANEL

Bridget J. Wilson, attorney

Rosenstein, Wilson & Dean, San Diego

Bridget J. Wilson graduated from Creighton University and the University of San Diego School of Law. Her practice includes personal injury, general civil litigation, military law, and Social Security Disability.

She is a frequent speaker and author on the military's "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" policy, published in the Clark Boardman Callaghan practice manual *Sexual Orientation and the Law*. She has successfully represented and advised numerous clients in military cases, at administrative proceedings and courtsmartial, and before the discharge and review corrections board.

She is the co-President of the Tom Homann Law Association, San Diego's Gay and Lesbian Bar Association, and consulting counsel for the Servicemembers Defense Network.

Allan Bérubé, author, lecturer

Author of the 1990 award-winning book *Coming Out Under Fire: The History of Gay Men and Women in World War II*, Bérubé is one of the leading historians in the United States. His book earned critical acclaim in reviews ranging from the mainstream press (*The New York Times, Washington Post, New Yorker*) to academic journals and the gay press.

A community-based historian since 1979, Bérubé has created and produced four documentary slide presentations on lesbian and gay history, has written numerous articles, and has spoken at over one hundred universities, academic conferences, community groups, and labor union events in the United States and Canada. Since 1991 he has taught courses on Lesbian and Gay History at the University of California, Santa Cruz; Stanford University; and Portland State University in Oregon.

In 1994 Bérubé was awarded the Rockefeller Residency Fellowship in the Humanities by the Center For Lesbian and Gay Studies at the Graduate Center of the City University of New York for his work on a history of the Marine Cooks and Stewards Union from the Depression to the Cold War. He is currently writing a book on this union's history.

Volker Keith Meinhold, retired Navy

In April 1980, at the age of seventeen, Keith Meinhold enlisted in the Navy and began an exemplary career. During his years of service, Meinhold rose through the ranks to become, by the Navy's own admission, one of its very best. He was respected and praised by his superiors and subordinates alike. By May 1992 he was rated in the top ten percent of all Navy instructors.

On May 19, 1992, Meinhold acknowledged his gay status on ABC's World News Tonight. Immediately after the broadcast, the Navy initiated discharge proceedings on the basis of his sexual orientation. Meinhold was discharged in August 1992. In October 1992 Meinhold filed a complaint in federal court, and for an injunction to return him to the Navy. On November 6, the court ordered the Navy to reinstate Meinhold. Meinhold was the first openly gay man returned to active duty. On January 29 the court granted summary judgment, in favor of Meinhold. The Navy appealed to the Ninth Circuit.

On August 31, 1994, the Ninth Circuit held that the Navy was prohibited from discharging Meinhold. Meinhold continued to serve as an openly gay man from his reinstatement in November 1992 to his retirement March 27, 1996. He was the first openly gay man to retire from active duty with full military honors. During his tenure after reinstatement, his flight crew was selected the "Most Combat Effective Aircrew in the Pacific Fleet." Meinhold was presented with a Navy Achievement Medal for his service in the Navy while an openly gay man.

Since his retirement, Meinhold has traveled the United States on speaking tours and raising funds for the Servicemembers Legal Defense Network. Meinhold continues to speak on homosexual issues as well as the military policy that excludes gays and lesbians from military service.

POLITICS PANEL

Harry N. Hirsch, Department Chair, UCSD Political Science

A Professor of Political Science and Pre-Law Advisor, Hirsch has interests in legal theory and constitutional law as well as in gay politics. He is the author of two books, *The Enigma of Felix Frankfurter* and *A Theory of Liberty: The Constitution and Minorities*. He is currently writing on first amendment issues and has recently developed a course on gay and lesbian politics. He earned his Ph.D. from Princeton University in 1978.

Sheila James Kuehl, 41st Assembly District

Sheila James Kuehl, now in her second legislative term in the California Assembly, is the first woman to be named Speaker pro Tempore of that body. She is also the first openly gay or lesbian person to be elected to the California Legislature. A former pioneering civil rights attorney and law professor, Ms. Kuehl represents the 41st Assembly District in Los Angeles County and serves on the Appropriations,

Higher Education, Human Services, Judiciary and Information Technology Committees, as well as the Joint Committee on the Arts. She also chairs the State Commission on the Status of Women, the Domestic Violence Program Advisory, and the Select Committee on Entertainment and the Arts.

During her first two-year term in the Assembly, Kuehl authored twenty-three bills that were signed into law to further protect domestic violence victims and their children, tighten child support enforcement, prohibit discrimination on the basis of gender and sexual orientation in the workplace and in education, increase the rights of crime victims, safeguard the environment, and fund after-school programs for at-risk youth. At the invitation of President Clinton, she addressed the 1996 Democratic National Convention on the issue of family violence.

Kuehl graduated from Harvard Law School in 1978, where she was the second woman in the school's history to win the Moot Court competition.

Christine Kehoe, San Diego City Councilmember

Third District Councilmember Christine Kehoe was elected to the San Diego City Council in November 1993 and re-elected in 1996. District Three includes Balboa Park, North and South Park, Golden Hill, Hillcrest, Uptown, Bankers Hill, Normal Heights, Burlingame, City Heights, Lexington Park, Mid-City, Kensington, Talmadge, and University Heights.

Kehoe is the first openly gay member of the City Council. Kehoe has been active in San Diego Politics and community affairs since 1978. She served as one of the early directors of the AIDS Assistance Fund, was the executive director of the Hillcrest Business Association, and co-chaired San Diego Lesbian and Gay Pride Parade from 1989–1992. She also served as staff member to former Councilmember John Hartley.

Since being in elected office, Kehoe has provided key leadership to fight crime and revitalize neighborhoods. In her second year in office, she introduced and won support for domestic partner health coverage benefits for city employees.

She serves as the City's representative to the San Diego Association of Governments (SANDAG), the Small Business Advisory Board, and the League of Cities. Kehoe was appointed to the California Coastal Commission to represent the San Diego Coastal Region in 1997.

Kehoe has recently announced her plans to run for a seat in the U. S. House of Representatives in the 49th District.

FAMILY PANEL

Leslea Newman, author and teacher

Leslea Newman is a Jewish lesbian author and teacher whose 25 books include Heather Has Two Mommies, A Letter to Harvey Milk, The Femme Mystique, Out of the Closet, Nothing to Wear, and Still Life with Buddy: An AIDS Reading.

In 1997, Newman received a Poetry Fellowship from the National Endowment for the Arts. She has lectured at dozens of colleges and universities including, Yale University, Harvard University, Swarthmore College, Smith College, Lewis and Clark College, The University of Judaism, Portland State University, and Amherst College.

Melinda Paras, Activist and Organizer

Melinda Paras is a Health Policy Coordinator for the Service Employees International Union (SEIU), the largest health care workers union in the United States. She is the past Executive Director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF), the oldest national advocacy organization for gay and lesbian rights

Before leaving for the NGLTF helm in Washington, Paras was a health commissioner for the City and County of San Francisco, chairing the budget committee's oversight of the \$650 million funding of San Francisco General Hospital, Laguna Honda Hospital, city health clinics, and the response effort to the AIDS epidemic.

Paras is formerly the Director of Multicultural Affairs and Deputy Director of the Shanti Project, a large AIDS service provider in San Francisco, where she directed efforts to make AIDS services accessible to the poor, IV drug users, women and children, and transgendered people. In addition, she headed the electoral campaign among San Francisco voters to defend the city's pioneer domestic partners legislation.

Paras has a long history in progressive organizing work, dating back to her participation in the underground movement against the Marcos government in the Philippines, which caused her arrest and imprisonment under martial law. She helped to found the Union of Democratic Filipinos (KDP), a national progressive organization of Filipinos with 14 chapters across the United States. KDP coordinated community organizing against the Marcos government and against discrimination, working with Filipino students and youth, cannery workers, office workers, and hospital workers. Paras was also a leader of the national movement to overturn the Bakke decision, the first major Supreme Court case on affirmative action.

LUNCHTIME FACULTY BROWN BAG LUNCH • Women's Center

Steven Epstein, Assistant Professor, UCSD Sociology Department

Steven Epstein received his B.A. from Harvard College (Social Studies) and his Ph.D. from U.C. Berkeley (Sociology). He spent a year as a postdoctoral fellow in the Science Studies Program at UCSD before joining the Sociology Department faculty.

His book, Impure Science: AIDS, Activism, and the Politics of Knowledge

(1996), is a study of the politicized production of knowledge in the AIDS epidemic in the U.S. This work reflects his interest in the construction of expertise, the democratization of science, and the resolution of medical controversies. He has also published articles on the sociology of sexuality and gay identity. His areas of interest include social theory (classical and contemporary), sociology of medicine, sociology of science, social movements, sexuality, and lesbian/gay studies.

LUNCHTIME FILM VINTAGE * Families of Value , Price Center Theater

Thomas Allen Harris, Assistant Professor, Visual Arts Department VINTAGE * Families of Value is a feature-length documentary film that explores three African-American families through the eyes of lesbian and gay siblings. Since its world premiere at the Toronto International Film Festival, VINTAGE * Families of Value has garnered numerous awards, including "Best Documentary" at the Atlanta International Film Festival and a Golden Gate Award at the San Francisco International Film Festival.

Thomas Allen Harris is a film/video/performance artist and writer who joined the department as a new faculty member in 1994. He graduated from Harvard College in 1984 with a degree in biology and was a Rubinstein Fellow at the Whitney Museum of American Art–Independent Study Program in 1991–92.

Harris began his career producing documentaries and public affairs shows for WNET and WNYC, New York's public television stations. His documentaries *Crises: Who Will Do Science?* and *Urban Education* aired nationally on public television in 1989. In 1990 he was twice nominated for Emmy Awards for his work as a staff producer on the public affairs show *The Eleventh Hour*.

Harris' experimental works *Splash* (1991), *Black Body* (1992), *Heaven, Earth & Hell* (1993) and *VINTAGE * Families of Value* have shown in international festivals. Harris is a recipient of numerous awards including the New York Foundation for the Arts Artist Fellowship, the Jerome Foundation Award, Creative Time Citywide Project, Art Matters award, New York State Council of the Arts' distribution award and the Paul Robeson Fund award. Most recently, he received the National Endowment for the Arts Independent Film and Videomaker Award to complete VINTAGE: Families of Value.

Harris has just completed production in Brazil, Burkina Faso and Paris for *That's My Face/ E Minha Cara*, a mythopoetic film that explores the influence of African belief systems and Western construction of sex and race on contemporary African diasporic identities.

COMMUNITY PANEL

Karen Marshall, L.C.S.W.

Karen Marshall is Executive Director of the San Diego Lesbian and Gay Men's Community Center. She has worked at The Center for the past ten years, serving as Executive Director for the past four years. She has a Master's Degree in Social Work and is a Licensed Clinical Social Worker. She is involved in community building as well as making San Diego a safer place for lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people through her work with law enforcement, community organizations, and politicians. Marshall in a Co-Chair of the local host committee for the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force Creating Change Conference.

Elias Farajaje-Jones, Queer Activist

Elias Farajaje-Jones is a Spanish-speaking afrikan native-american and an anarchist guerilla theologian/AIDS terrorist/writer/cultural critic/performance artist/ritual technician. A two-spirit/queer-identified bisexual man, his research includes "queers" in traditional cultures. He seeks new understanding of the construction of gender and sexualities. He is the author of *Zion: A Study of the Significance of Afrika for Three Black Religious Movements* and co-editor of *African Creative Expressions of the Divine: African Religions in Diaspora.*

Tony Valenzuela, Community Activist

Tony Valenzuela is a long-time LGBT community activist and writer. An alumnus of UCSD, Tony was president of the student Lesbian, Gay, and Bisexual Association. After graduation he accepted a position as Administrative Director of the San Diego Lesbian and Gay Men's Community Center. He helped organize the Hillcrest community against a rash of hate crimes that took the life of 17-year-old John Wear. These efforts resulted in the formation of a Hillcrest Citizens Patrol. Valenzuela came out as HIV positive in 1995 in a column he wrote for the *San Diego Gay and Lesbian Times* that initiated an important community dialogue around the challenging prevention issues facing young gay men.

Valenzuela was Co-Chair of LGBT VOICES '96 (Voters Organized in Coalition for the Elections). This year he is a Co-Chair of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force Creating Change local host committee. He is organizing a National Sex Panic Summit in conjunction with the conference November 13, 1997.
