

 - Current non-UCSD PCP is a friend and is gay- at UCSD I felt like I was just a number

 - 27 Responses 5 = Negative (19%) 3 = Positive (11%)
 - treated for warts many years ago and the physician was condescending, unpleasant and visibly uncomfortable
 - Intake form was geared toward heterosexuals- was so uncomfortable, felt like they had to disclose their sexual orientation
 - Non-PCP physicians assume symptoms HIV-related and think AIDS (not HIV +); PCP does not do this
 - One physician thought every symptom was HIV-related, even though tested HIV (-); felt this was internalized homophobia so found another PCP
 - Physicians assumed HIV symptoms and therefore AIDS
 - 3 positive responses feel they have received far better care related to being LGBT
- 7. What recommendations would you make to improve health care for LGBT's? 24 Responses
 - Make a list of LGBT (-friendly) physicians available
 - Provide a more welcoming environment for non-White/non-heterosexual people by having posters, photos artwork that speak of diversity, fairness, respect and tolerance
 - Remove the sexual orientation question from the intake forms
 - Improve medical record privacy
 - Standardize medical record charting terminology and limit entries to only medically relevant descriptors
 - More LGBT curricula for medical students and nurses; should also be made part of clinical interviewing course
 - Make a list of LGBT (-friendly) physicians available

- Mandatory cultural sensitivity (including LGBT info) for all physicians, medical students, and nurses
- Physicians somehow advertise the fact they are LGBT (-friendly)
- Would be nice to know which physicians are LGBT (-friendly)
- Intake forms should be culturally sensitive- sexual orientation question should precede "are you married?"; "are you taking birth control?', etc.
- Physicians should not assume all patients are heterosexual
- Physicians should be better informed on Lesbian health care
- Physicians should be more sensitive about HIV issues and not assume all Gay men have AIDS
- Physicians should be concerned with patient's mental health not just physical health
- Come out to your PCP
- Come out to your PCP- if they have a problem then switch
- Medical record charting should have standardized terminology and only medically relevant information

WHEREAS the University of California, San Diego has a diverse campus community of students, faculty and staff, who comprise a wide spectrum of ancestry, ethnicity, and nationality; of political, philosophical and religious belief; of ability and age; and of sexual orientation and gender identity.

San Diego Pride Parade Info. Come join Chancellor Dynes as he joins our contingent, the first time ever a UCSD Chancellor has marched with us.

When:

Saturday, July 25. The parade will start at 12 noon. Participants walking with the "UCSD Umbrella Group" (Continent #48) should be present no later than 11am.

Where to Assemble

The whole Parade staging area is on Normal Street in Hillcrest starting from The Lesbian and Gay Center (3916 Normal Street) and going up to the intersection of Normal Street and Polk. The assembly area for the UCSD Group is very near the intersection of Normal and Polk. Located on the street island in that area will be the "Contingent Check-In."

Education groups have been clustered together. Behind our group will be Gay, Lesbian, and Straight Education Network (GLSEN) and behind them will be the San Diego Unified School District (which is suppose to include a big yellow school bus).

How do I get to Hillcrest?

HWY 163 intersects the Hillcrest community. From HWY 163 take the University Avenue exit. Normal street is east of that exit. (HWY 163 intersects HWY 8 just north of Hillcrest.)

Where do I park?

Here are a couple of options:

1. Park in the Uptown shopping complex that includes the Safeway store with its underground parking located on University Avenue near HWY 163. (You will probably find everyone else there too.)

2. Park on any street and pay the meter...bring lots of quarters (not a recommended option).

3. Go to the Old Navy Hospital located on Park Blvd near President's Way; park in their lot and take the free shuttle to Normal Street (highly recommended). Shuttles will also be available to take you back from the Festival area after the Parade to the Navy Hospital parking lot with a stop at the Auto Museum in Balboa Park.

What is the Parade Route?

The Parade will start from The Center near the intersection of University Avenue and Normal Street and will head west on University. A Reviewing Stand will be located on University and Tenth Street. The Parade will turn left on 6th Avenue and head south to Balboa Park. The Parade will end at Ivy Street where participants will be guided into Balboa Park to disassemble and migrate on to the Festival area. Cars will be directed into the Park via Balboa Drive where they will park and be stripped of signs, decorations, etc. before exiting out onto 6th Avenue and Quince Street.

Should I bring anything?

Water will be provided by the UCSDMC Nutrition Dept.

Sensible walking shoes.

Sun protection (sunscreen, hats, **rainbow umbrellas,** etc.) Umbrella hats will be given to those wishing to wear them.

Some rules of the Parade

The Pride Parade is considered one of SD's best parades because it is conducted in a very safe and sane but fun manner. Safe and Sane Practices: **Scantly clad attire is OK but nudity and simulated sex acts are illegal and will get you a night in jail.

**No projectile objects may be thrown from a Contingent (beads, frisbees, candy, spurts of water or other fluids, pins, cards, etc.) Members of a Contingent may hand distribute toys, information, goodies, etc. **Do not engage with any protestors.

**Be aware of Parade Safety Monitors who will be walking with Parade groups and attempting to keep everyone moving in a safe and timely manner. **Stay together and avoid gaps between groups. The Parade looks great when there are NO GAPS.

CHANCELLOR DYNES TO LEAD UCSD IN 1998 PRIDE PARADE

Saturday, July 25, 12 noon - 3 p.m. University Avenue, Hillcrest

The 24th annual Pride Parade will be held Saturday, July 25, 1998, starting at 12 noon on University Avenue in the Hillcrest community. The theme of this year's parade is "Unity Through Diversity: It Begins With Us!" Leading the UCSD contingent under the "UCSD Umbrella Group" banner will be Chancellor Robert Dynes who will be joined by faculty, staff, students, friends, families. The UCSD contingent will include a Shaefer Ambulance and will be joined by UCSD Medical Center's Owen Clinic.

The parade staging area will occur on Normal Street between University Avenue and Polk Street. The parade will begin at the Lesbian and Gay Men's Community Center (3916 Normal Street - near the DMV) and proceed west on University Avenue, then turn south on 6th Avenue (near HWY 163) and terminate at the entrance to Balboa Park where a festival will occur.

A distinguished panel of pride sponsors and local dignitaries will join the emcees in selecting honorees in several categories. UCSD will be eligible for the following awards:

Best Use of 1998 Theme "Unity Through Diversity: It Begins With Us!" Best Community Organization Unit P-FLAG Award (Selected by P-Flag)

Those wishing to attend the parade either as participants or observers are encouraged to park in the Old Navy Hospital parking lot on Park Blvd. A free shuttle will be available to transport people to University Avenue and Normal Street; and upon the completion of the parade, the shuttle will make runs from the festival back to the Navy Hospital parking lot with one stop at the Auto Museum in Balboa Park. It is advisable to bring water, to consider some form of sun protection (lotion, hats, etc.), and to wear good walking shoes.

This year will mark the fifth year the University has participated in this community event. The Campus/Medical Center Pride Parade Committee invites the campus community--the colleges, graduate schools, student organizations, faculty and staff--to participate with the UCSD contingent and/ or observe one of San Diego's largest and best parades. 
