General Council Curfew Not to be Acknowledged

Wednesday the Revelle College General Council gave the administration and dorm students a letter which stated new visiting rules and regulations for the dorm students.

These new visiting hours did not agree with the hours set up by the Chancellor and therefore the administration will not recognize them. From the conferences with the General Council and the

administration, brought on by the letter, a committee, the Dorm Rules and Regulations Committee, has been set up and should be in operation immediately.

Sitting on this committee will be two faculty members, two members from the administration, and four students. It will be the duty of this committee to go over rules set up by the General

Council and barter with the General Council over these rules if need be.

Also coming out of the meetings with the administration is a list of realistic significant reasons why the visiting hours will not be acceptable to the administration.

This list of reasons must be made, presented, and accepted to and by the General Council by Saturday at 5:00.

If this list of reasons is not acceptable to the General Council then more discussion must start again.

Today at 3:00 in the Humanities-Library there will be an open meeting of the General Council, with faculty and admission present, to discuss what else can be done and what else will be done.

Galbraith and Aide File Resignations with Board

Chancellor John S. Galbraith and Robert H. Biron, vice chancellor for business and finance, handed in their resignations at the last meeting of the Board of Regents last week in San Francisco.

In a joint statement the two men said their resignations were "dictated by our belief that there are serious deficiencies in the relationship of the administration of this campus with the University-wide administration..."

Chancellor Galbraith refused to comment on his resignation, other than the joint statement, because it is under investigation now by the Board of Regents.

Biron said he turned in his resignation because Galbraith and he were a team.

At the Board of Regents

meeting next month, March 25, it will be determined whether or not the two resignations will be accepted.

If Galbraith's resignation is accepted he has expressed a wish to go back to instructing history at Los Angeles.

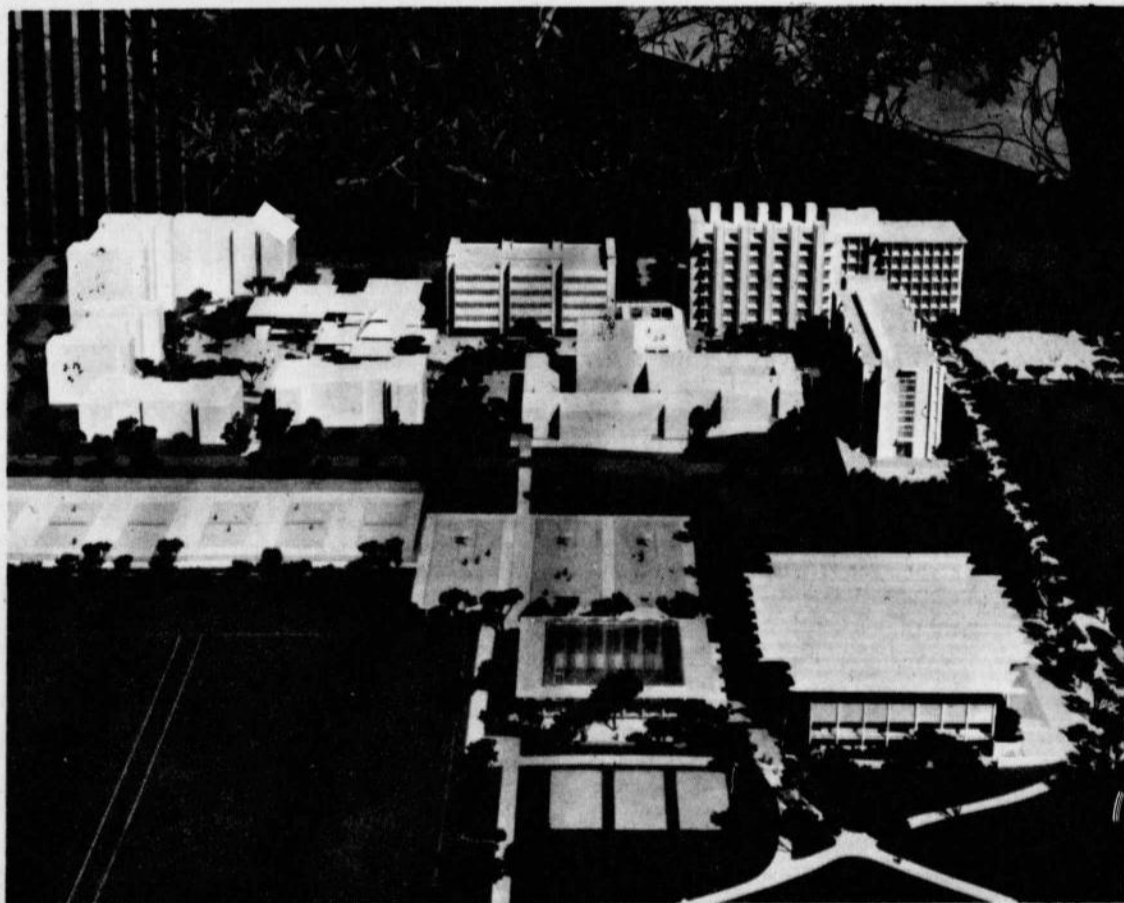
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Next College Construction Starts Soon

Construction of Second College is scheduled to begin in September of 1966. It will be a fine arts and behavioral science school.

Building 2A, to be built first, will be a seven-story concrete laboratory and classroom building for the physical sciences. It will also house the Department of Mathematics and the Computer Center. Building 2B will be a five-story reinforced concrete structure with undergraduate and graduate biology classrooms and biology research space, general assignment classrooms and the Second College administrative offices.

Building 2C will be another five-story concrete structure with full basement and will house undergraduate and graduate classrooms and laboratories for psychology and linguistics.

As seen from the seventh floor of Building B, the large structure in the foreground will be the gymnasium with a covered swimming pool to its left. Directly behind the gym will be Building 2B with Building 2A behind 2B. To the left of 2A will lie Building 2C with a building corresponding to Revelle College's Central Facilities. The residence halls will be on the western edge of the campus on North Torrey Pines Road.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

There are three major issues in which this campus now finds itself in the center of; they are, 1. the General Council's attempt at self-legislation by breaking with the administration, 2. the resignation of Chancellor Gal-

braith and his aide Robert Biron, and 3. the Cisneros-Bains affair.

1. The General Council's letter to all dorm students and administrators centered around new visiting hours, but visiting hours are a very small thing when you look at the outcome of the letter from a long range point of view. The central issue that the General Council wanted to bring up was that they wanted a hand in the legislation of rules for the dorms, they got this yesterday (see page 1).

Out of this letter a system of communications has been started which will benefit this campus greatly. Also out of this latter a respect, both of students by administra-

tors and of administrators by students, has been gained.

2. The resignation of Chancellor John Galbraith has been called a power move by many people, this I do not think is true. You do not make a power move which might endanger the rest of your life. Galbraith will not give his reasons for his resignation but this is understandable since the resignations are being examined.

3. The Cisneros-Bains affair is an attempt to bring to light the fact that no San Diego or La Jolla paper will take it upon themselves to present the facts. This is the meat of the problem, should a news media be able to be stifled by the police?

The issue of SANDSCRIPT for February 11, 1966, carried an article by Lon Hall ("Igor Siehnichts") in which the suggestion was made that students interested in transferring to the Second College contact the provost of that college right away. Since then a number of students have come in to gather more information. This letter may save others a long walk to Camp Matthews.

We have carefully considered the many problems related to admitting juniors as transfers from Revelle when we open in the fall of 1967. (We could not take students before that.) We have concluded that we shall not admit any transfers in 1967. In that year only incoming freshmen can affiliate with

The Second College. Revelle College students will be welcome to take Second College courses for which they are eligible, and it may be that they can pursue a major in The Second College while retaining their affiliation with Revelle. We are still developing the curriculum for 1967-1968, and it is too early to say just what will be available to Revelle students.

Thus it would be a mistake for students now in Revelle to look forward to shifting their affiliation to The Second College in 1967.

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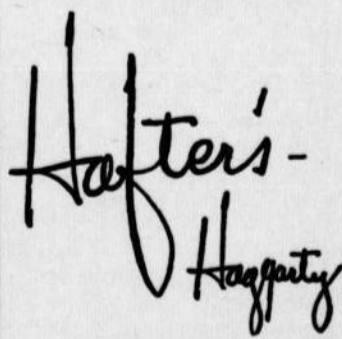

Students Drop Winter Courses

February 11 was the date set by the administration as the last day on which students could drop courses without losing credit or receiving a failing grade. The following are the statistics of lower division class changes, as issued by the Provost's office.

- Humanities (both 2 and 5), 7 drops
Physical Science, 62 drops, (this includes 60 drops from Freshman Phys. Sci. 1 and 2 drops from Sophomore Chem.)
Math, 22 drops, 2 adds, (4 students dropped to lower level math. These are not included here)
Language Workshop, 23 drops, 8 adds. (This high number of drops is attributed to the fact that students taking workshops are not receiving credit for their work, but that they are receiving grades.)

Academic Senate Behind Galbraith

STATEMENT OF FACULTY POSITION ON THE OFFERED RESIGNATION OF CHANCELLOR GALBRAITH.

The University of California at San Diego was founded with one central objective - to create a truly great and unique institution of learning. The State of California wholeheartedly supported this conception. In a few years, there has emerged a small community of outstanding scholars and teachers vindicating the hopes of those who were already here and of those who came solely because of the promise of this unique opportunity.

Difficulties experienced in the continuing pursuit of this central objective have led Chancellor Galbraith to offer his resignation.

The Faculty has the highest confidence in Chancellor Galbraith and affirms that the interests of this Campus, the University, and the State will be best served by his continuation in office. Continuity of the present leadership at UCSD is vital to consolidate our accomplishments and to achieve our aims for the future.

New Vessels to be Dedicated At Triple Ceremony March 11

Two new ocean-going research vessels and a new Scripps Marine Facility will be dedicated in a triple ceremony Friday, March 11, by officials of the University of California, San Diego's Scripps Institution of Oceanography.

Dr. William A. Nierenberg, director of Scripps Institution, said the three-fold dedication will center on the research vessel Thomas Wash-

ington; the floating biological laboratory, Alpha Helix; and the six-acre, \$1 million ship-operating facility. The ceremonies will take place at the Marine Facility, located on the San Diego Bay side of Point Loma, at the foot of Rosecrans Street. Described as one of the world's finest shore bases for supporting oceanographic research, the Marine Facility (continued on page 4)

Martin (2), B. Thurston-Rogers, W. Raffke, A. Reid, I. Rothmuller, and D. Wohlleben. The win enabled the team to climb into a tie for first place in the league.

On Sunday, January 30, the team had lost a thriller to the Pan American soccer club by a score of 5 to 4.

Galbraith Issues Policy Statement

Chancellor Galbraith recently released a statement that outlined the basic guiding principles the University of California, San Diego would follow in regards to sports.

The specific goals of the athletic program follow:

1. Complement and supplement the goals of education

at UCSD.

2. Place the welfare of the participant above any other consideration. The game exists for the participant.

3. Provide opportunities for all students to participate in competitive sports under game conditions.

4. Finance the intercollegiate athletic program from institutional funds and compete only with those schools that finance their teams in a similar manner. No admission charges shall be levied for home games and seating preference shall be given to students, staff, and general public in that order.

5. Refrain from special financial inducements to members of intercollegiate athletic teams.

6. Schedule athletic contests only with institutions that exercise complete institutional control over their athletic programs and whose programs are normally financed in the same manner as other aspects of the curriculum.

The UCSD tennis team goes against UC Riverside on the Camp Matthews courts tomorrow at 11:00 a.m. Riverside led the Tritons by only two points in last week's All-Cal tournament.

At that tournament, freshman doubles team, Jim Otvos and Jim Hoffman, gathered the only two points that counted toward team scores. They defeated the Riverside second doubles (6-1, 4-6, 6-1) to put UCSD on the scoring column.

San Diego's second doubles, Charles Burman and Chris Frymann, went on to win the championship of the B flight doubles. They took matches from teams from Riverside and Davis to reach the top position.

Bruce Allen, a freshman just recently able to come out for the team, lost his singles match to a very strong Berkeley opponent, who went on to the quarterfinals before being defeated.

Jim Otvos was the outstand-

ing UCSD entry. Although he was defeated in A flight by Irvine's number two player and in B flight by Irvine's number one, the matches were very close and Jim's stroking was excellent. He shows a great deal of promise.

The Tritons as a whole played well and their individual opponents all went on to the upper brackets of the tournament.

Chris Frymann and Jim Otvos have been the most reliably strong competitors and with Charles Buman provide a great deal of depth to the team.

Top-ranked Bob Brown has been unable to play in the last two matches, but his return to action should provide the impetus needed for a winning team.
