## Philip Sloan, student, gets fellowship

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Philip Sloan, a graduate student in Philosophy at the University of California, San Diego, has been awarded a Josiah Macy, Jr. Foundation fellowship for his Ph.D. dissertation work in the History of Biology.

The fellowship will support Sloan for one year while he conducts his research in the Department of Philosophy at UCSD under the direction of Dr. Piero Ariotti, Assistant Professor of Philosophy. Sloan's dissertation topic is "The Historical Development of the Concept of Species in Biology."

Dr. John Z. Bowers, president of the Josiah Macy, Jr. Foundation, announced that more than \$1.5 million in grants had been awarded during the first half of 1967. He said the grants represent the Foundation's interest in several major fields in medicine and health. These include human resources for medicine; obstetrics and human reproduction; pediatrics in developing countries, principally the Western Hemisphere; and the history of medicine and the biological sciences.

Sloan's fellowship is one of 12 in this latter category. He is a former resident of Salt Lake City, Utah, and is in his third year of graduate study at UCSD.
