

IGCC and California Seminar on International Security and Foreign Policy have been awarded a \$300,000 grant from the Rockefeller Foundation

The Institute on Global Conflict and Cooperation, a Multicampus Research Unit headquartered at the University of California, San Diego, and the California Seminar on International Security and Foreign Policy of Santa Monica have been awarded a \$300,000 grant from the Rockefeller Foundation.

The funding is for a joint research program that will focus on global trends in arms transfers, Pacific Basin studies, and security with fewer nuclear weapons. It will be used for studies in three different topic areas: security in Europe with fewer nuclear weapons, trends in arms sales, and security in North East Asia.

The California Seminar is sponsored by the Rand Corp. and the California Institute of Technology, and has served as a forum to broaden the geographical debate on American foreign policy and national security issues, and to synthesize views held by professionals from the business, government and industrial communities who have had experience solving international problems.

IGCC brings together faculty and students from all of the campuses of the University of California to work in a multi-disciplinary way on issues relating to conflict and international cooperation. The collaboration between IGCC and the Rand Corp. will enable experts from industry, non-profit organizations and universities to work together in an unprecedented way.
