Sunday, April 30, will see the return of the Revelle Renaissance Faire, held in conjunction with the UCSD Open House. Every year the Faire is brought together by a committee consisting of members of the Dean's and Resident Dean's staff and a large group of dedicated students. Traditionally held on the South Lawn of the Humanities Library (now Galbraith Hall), this year the Faire will be held on the lawn in the Warren Quad, located behind the Political Science Building (MAAC 412). According Assistant College Dean Yolanda Garcia, who is head of the committee, "the new location is a big plus because it puts the Faire close to the Price Center, which is the main focus of the Open House.'

This year's Open House 1989: Look at Us Now will highlight the opening of the Price Center, and Yolanda predicts that the Faire will benefit from the large number of people who will pass through to see the new center.

A variety of exciting entertainment is planned for the crowds including Elizabethan and Shakespearean improvisation, magic shows, bands, renaissance singers, mime and puppetry, which will visitors. Also returning to the Faire will be the student organized Troupe of Spontaneity with its comical renaissance improvisations, and the rousing Society for Creative Anachronism, which will present re-enactments of renaissance jousting. Visitors to the Faire can have their fortunes told, faces painted and experience other renaissance activities including the popular dunk booth. Student organizations will have booths selling food from around the world, but for a good taste of this century there will be "ye olde In 'N' Out burgers" sponsored by the Graduate committee. If you wish to purchase a keepsake of the Faire there will be 40 artisans and craftsmen selling renaissance articles and Renaissance Faire T-shirts.

The new location has created some new logistical hurdles that the committee has had to work hard to overcome. Due to the smaller size of the Warren Quad, last year's exhibition by the Archery Club and the Petting Zoo will not be able

to be accomodated. One operations committee member added, "For the past eight years the Faire has been held on the lawn of the Humanities Library, and every year we have been able to simply build upon the previous year's Faire. It's tough to try to squeeze a growing Faire into the Warren Quad. But the committee has put in lots of extra time and effort to do the job right." Yolanda agrees, and feels that the Faire will be better than ever because a major drawback of the old location is solved at the Warren Quad. "It was always hard to give the Faire definable boundaries, to give it a coherent look. The new area is enclosed, making it easier to develop the renaissance atmosphere."

Of course, many other organizations will be holding events, so be sure to leave enough time for them all. This year's Open House promises to be one of the busiest and best ever for UCSD.


Price Center, Pub **Produce Protests**

The closing of the Triton Pub and the opening of the Price Center and Round Table Pizza have created the majority of controversy on campus this year. The culmination was last week, when demonstrations argued both against the closing of the Pub and against the building of a "shopping mall" at the expense of academic concerns. Editorials in The Guardian complain that the one academic feature of the Price Center, the movie theater-turned-lecture hall, should not be located next to a beer-serving establish-

Each of these arguments is largely unfounded. What is "lost" in the closing of the Pub is nothing that the students cannot re-create with the new Round Table. What made the Triton Pub a fun place was not the building, or the food, or the stage. It was the students who visited it, who made it a party place on Friday Afternoons, a place to sit and relax, to enjoy a drink with friends at the end of a busy week. All of this will occur in the new Round Table Pub, once the current patrons convince the whiners of its benefits.

As for the construction of what The Koala terms "Maynard's Mall," the Price Center contributes a much-needed feeling of vitality to the otherwise cold, concrete wasteland of the Muir and Warren campuses. Obviously, there is no pleasing some people. The Price Center is alive, a warm and inviting haven put in the center of of the academic reservedness of the rest of campus. The Price Center needed to be built, and the alloca-



tion of money by Chancellor Atkinson (under the provision that the theater be used as a much-needed lecture hall during the day) was a significant financial contribution to its construction. Academic needs are thus filled directly in this way, and indirectly via the wealth of services offered to students.

The location of the new Pub, close to the Price Center Auditorium and to Central Library, will not have the disaterous effect that some predict. Noise from bands on the Pub's patio will not be heard in the well-soundproofed library. If the roar of F-14 jets cannot be heard, no band will be able to distract any dedicated studiers. As for serving alcohol adjacent to a lecture hall, proximity does not create problems. No connection or association exists to damage the image of UCSD or its students. We are all able to differentiate between our academic and social lives, and the two need not overlap into conflict.

The Price Center is a meeting place for the entire university, a place where students can sit and eat with their professors in a comfortable and relaxed atmosphere. I spend much of my time there. and my only regret concerning the Price Center is that I will be graduating in June and must therefore enjoy it as much as possible for the next two months. Fortunately, there is much to enjoy.

It then becomes the decision of the couple as to what to do with the relationship. Lets look at a number of scenarios and the particular problems they create. Education Abroad / Taking a Year Off

From School

The difficult decision to be made depends largely on the stage in which the relationship currently is. A longer, more developed relationship may be harder to suddenly end than one which is still in its beginning stages. Also, it depends on how strong the feelings between the couple are. If the length of time of the separation is known and defined, as in the case of a semester or academic year abroad, both the time apart and the reunion can be factored into the decision. Is the relationship strong enough to survive a year's temptations on both sides? Are you both wil-

tion, or is one of you in favor of an "open relationship," with the agreement to try it again once reunited? Or is it better to end the relationship now? All of these questions need to be asked, and the best way to survive this decision is to keep open the lines of communication and be honest with your feelings. Only this way will you mutually arrive at a satisfactory answer. Whatever the answer, some ground rules may be needed in the beginning of the separation in order to protect the interests at hand. It cannot be stressed too much that what is most important is to communicate your true feelings and arrive at a mutually satisfactory arrangement, especially if there is the intent to resume a relationship at a later

"We Care": Family Business Moves into Price Center

One of the first and finest features of the new Price Center is the culinary charm of Chung King Loh restaurant. But this is no ordinary Chinese restaurant; Chung King Loh of Solana Beach has won critical acclaim from just about every critic in town. The L.A. Times, The San Diego Union and Tribune, San Diego Magazine and California Magazine have all repeatedly written of the delicacies available. San Diego Magazine even rates it as San Diego's finest Chinese restaurant. Dating back to its opening in 1976, Chung King Loh has basked in this success that no other Chinese Restaurant in San Diego has found. What is it that makes Chung King Loh so special?

To hear co-owner Molly Lee tell the story, it's easy to understand how she earned her nickname, "Auntie Molly." The restaurant grew out of cooking for her extended family and two other families. The group was cooking so much al-

ready that the extra step of opening a restaurant seemed easy. And back in 1976, says Molly, "There were not many Chinese restaurants in San Diego, and only one or two good ones. So once we opened, business was just great." Coincident with the success, however, was the realization of just how much effort it takes to maintain the quality necessary for genuine success. The fact that Molly's family is large certainly helped in having a number of dedicated workers for the restaurant. A true family operation from the very beginning, Chung King Loh continues to be run the same as when they were cooking just for the family. "It's a real family-oriented environment," explains Molly. Auntie Molly extends her motherly feelings toward her customers, and so the portions served may not always be of premeasured amounts. "It depends on how hungry they look; Sometimes experience says 'more' for this person or 'less' for this one. We don't want to see food wasted and thrown away. If you are really hungry, ask for a little more."

This concept of family under which Molly runs Chung King Loh extends to

"you should excuse us while we do this," asks Molly, "but we don't want to waste money [on a training program].

Molly gives much of the credit for Chung King Loh's place in the Price Center to her daughter, Third College Junior Tina Lee. Molly recalls how it was that she first heard about the Price Center: "We would always receive junk mail from malls looking for restaurants, but I was always afraid to open a new one." When she received a request from UCSD, however, she knew that it would be different. She knew many faculty, staff, and students from the university.
