# THE BILL OTTERSON BIOTECH LETTER DECEMBER 14, 1992 NUMBER 36

### WARD VALLEY

- January 1, 1993 is now upon us, and the "unthinkable" is about to happen. From that date on, California will have no viable solution for Universities, research institutions, hospitals and biomedical companies to dispose of their Low-level Radioactive Waste. Consultants Carolyn McGraw and Bill Beckman have spoken with the Chancellor of UCSD to alert him and to request him intervention with elected officials. At the request of Carolyn McGraw, Congressmen Ron Packard and Duncan Hunter have each contacted Secretary Lujan urging the immediate transfer of the Ward Valley land to the State Department of Health Services.
- 2. No word yet on the lawsuit. No action yet on the land transfer.
- 3. The *Union-Tribune Editorial* on Sunday, by Nancy Schoeffler, entitled "Radioactive delay," closed with" The failure to meet the deadline on a disposal site threatens to expose California business and health concerns to higher costs and liability, and to curtail important medical research and treatment."

## MOST INNOVATIVE NEW PRODUCTS AWARDS LUNCHEON

4. In what may have been the year's largest grouping of "high-techies" and their service providers in San Diego, 650 people turned out to see the Most Innovative New Product Awards ceremony and hear guest speaker San Diego Gas & Electric Chairman Tom Page. Winner in the biotechnology/biomedical category was Kim Blickenstaff, President and CEO, BioSite Diagnostics, with its Triage Panel for detection of up to 7 illegal drugs within 10 minutes.

A special award, called the "Techno-Genesis Award," went to General Atomics for "creating a fertile environment for science, its application of science to the betterment of mankind, and contribution to San Diego's economy." Accepting for the company was CONNECT Steering Committee Member, and General Atomics Vice Chairman Linden Blue.

A letter of congratulations for the event was received from Governor Pete Wilson, a strong supporter of CONNECT, stating, "As a Proud San Diegan, I am delighted to continue to support and praise UCSD's CONNECT Program and its cooperation with San Diego's thriving business and industry communities."

Mayor Susan Golding in her first week of her new term, dropped in to remind us of her pledge to make San Diego "the first great city of the 21st Century." "I hope this government will be known for the kind of innovation present here today," she added. Other elected officials included, Chula Vista Mayor Tim Nader, San Diego Deputy Mayor Tom Behr, City Concilmember Ron Roberts, Cynthia Vicknair from Councilmember Judy McCarthy's Office, City Councilmember George Stevens, and Biotech Ombudsman Kurt Chilcott.

## MANUFACTURING IN SAN DIEGO

5. The recently released California Business Roundtable Survey reported that both businessmen and voters found that chief concerns continue to be Health Care Costs, the

Workers' Compensation System, Liability Laws, State Business Taxes, and the Business Permitting Process.

- 6. CONNECT Volunteer and former CFO of a Fortune 500 company, **Joel Sollender**, has recently compiled an updated valuation of San Diego's publicly-traded companies. He hopes to be able to use this to validate industry claims that employment by this industry in San Diego could reach 50,000 by the end of the century (if San Diego can keep manufacturing here.)
- 7. Based upon a recommendation by **Don Grimm**, **Chairman** of *Hybritech*, a study of what high-tech industries need in infrastructure development and training to support manufacturing in San Diego is under consideration by CONNECT.

## CALIFORNIA CLEAN AIR ACT

8. The San Diego Air Pollution Control District has scheduled a workshop to discuss the San Diego proposed Rule 1302 trip reduction plan. The Greater San Diego Chamber of Commerce has issued an ALERT! requesting companies to attend the Worshop and comment on the Plan, which affects all companies in San Diego with 60 or more employees.

APCD Director Ralph Sommerville is operating under strict rules under the California Clean Air Act. Raytheon's Manager of Environmental Health & Safety, Ollis Hill, suggested that if companies find the rules too onerous, it may be necessary for local California Assembly and State Senate members to take the issue to Sacramento to urge delay of the rules until after a California economic recovery.

## GENETICALLY ENGINEERED FOODS

- 9. UCSD biologists Julian Schroder and Daniel Schachtman published in *Science* their discovery of the gene in plants which controls the intake of potassium. This could eventually lead to the development of salt-tolerant grains, fruits and vegetables capable of growing in salty soils, like San Diego County and Baja California.
- 10. CONNECT Volunteer and former Nissan Design CFO Lou Shoemaker is "point man" on the Genetically Engineered Food issue. He will be working with CONNECT Sponsor Burson Marstellar, a national public relations firm, to block Jeremy Rifkin's threatened boycott of restaurants serving genetically engineered foods. Rifkin's opponents call him "a sixties- style activist in the nineties world."

## PAST WEEK

11. **Mayor Susan Golding** took office this week. In her acceptance speech she promised to help build San Diego into a "showcase...for the nation." She vowed to make San Diego "the most business-friendly city" in the nation. "For too long, we've viewed business development and environmental protection as mortal enemies," she said.

In an interview with the *Union-Tribune* Editorial Board, published Sunday, she said, "If you create a change of attitude toward business in San Diego and send a clear message...things will be different." Golding will "move immediately on the development of a contract on water for manufacturing entities that use water in processing; I want these companies to know that they will have water--guaranteed. For example, the biomedical industry...would shut down...(without guaranteed water). With 70 percent of our water

being used for outdoor irrigation,...we let manufacturers know they are not going to have to worry about water availability." (Previously the Mayor sat on the regional Water Board.)

12. 1993 San Diego Technology Financial Forum President Jim Forester of Silicon Valley Bank; Tom Darcy of Price Waterhouse; Jed Harris of Imperial Bank; Bob Weaver of Deloitte and Touche; Doug Obenshain of Ernst & Young; Craig Andrews of Brobeck, Phleger and Harrison; and Wain Fishburn and Fred Muto of Cooley, Godward, Castro, Huddleson and Tatum, travelled to Menlo Park to help host a SDTFF reception at the Sundeck Restaurant with Bryna Kranzler, Forum Director Charleen Boyl and me.

On the following day we called on Mayfield Fund, Matrix Partners, Institutional Venture Partners, Sequoia Capital, Asset Management Associates, and Merrill, Pickard, Anderson and Eyre to give them special invitations to the Forum on February 10 and 11. We learned that as much money flowed into venture capital up to mid-1992 as in all of 1991. The larger, successful funds have had little trouble raising funds and are still planning investments in start-ups. Favored industries include biomedical, devices, communications, software (not start-ups) and electronics.

- 13. The Meet the Researcher seminar Friday was more than a technical discussion of the work done by **Dr. Thomas Edgington** in his Scripps Research Institute lab and the commercialization of that research at Corvas International. It was an entire lesson in how you start a research-based biomedical company, from idea genesis to IPO, told by the people who did it!
- 14. Julie Meyer Wright was appointed Secretary, Trade and Commerce Agency, a newly created position by Governor Pete Wilson. Julie has been a CONNECT admirerer for some time.

### **OTHER**

- 15. CONNECT Steering Committee member and co-founder, Dr. Lea Rudee, has stepped down from the position of Dean of the School of Engineering after serving twelve years, to pursue his interests in teaching and research. His research is in materials and conductivity.
- 16. The Biomedical Industry Council (BIC), the only lobbying group in the State for this industry, is seeking membership renewals and new memberships now. Membership for biomedical companies ranges from \$500 to \$5000, depending on number of employees. Associate Memberships are \$1000.
- 17. EDC, BIC, and CONNECT are investigating the feasibility of establishing a biomedical incubator facility on City land in Eastgate. Nicknamed BioNest, the facility would provide lab and office space on a short-term lease to biomedical start-ups with little credit.
- 18. The Salk Institute and UCSD announced a collaboration in which Salk researchers may teach classes at UCSD, and some UCSD graduate students may study in previously unavailable Salk labs.

#### **UPCOMING**

- 19. The NIH Office for Protection from Research Risks (OPRR), Division of Animal Welfare, is continuing to sponsor a series of workshops on implementing the Public Health Service Policy on Humane Care and Use of Laboratory Animals. Scripps Research Institute and The Salk Institute will co-sponsor an event, Science and Animals: Addressing Contemporary Issues" at the Sheraton Grande Torrey Pines, Jan. 21 and 22, 1993.
- 20. The World Trade Association, in conjunction with the U.S. District Export Counci,l is

forming an "International Biotech Roundtable" breakfast group. The group has two focal points: to have biotech industry members discuss obstacles in promoting their products globally, and to give feed-back to the World Trade Council regarding the industry's needs. The first meeting will be held on Friday, December 18, from 7:30-9:00 a.m. at SamSon's in La Jolla. Please send a representative if possible.
