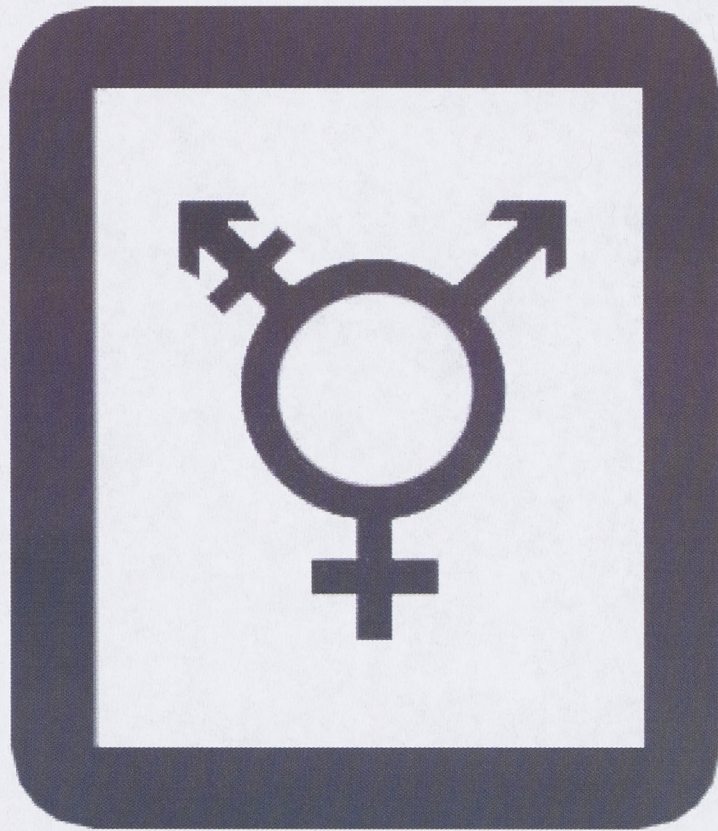
This course offers a survey of materials on Chinese lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and gender-nonconforming literature, cinema, culture, and critical theory from contemporary China, Taiwan, Hong Kong and beyond. All materials will be available in English (i.e. translations of fiction, film with subtitles, and academic writing in English), although Chinese-speaking students may choose to read/view in the original language. This is a discussion- and writing-oriented course in which we will explore a diverse sampling of materials related to Chinese queer cultures. The course is open to all students, but will be of particular interest to students with backgrounds in literature, cinema, Chinese studies, critical gender studies, and popular culture studies.

FILM SCREENING OF TOILET TRAINING

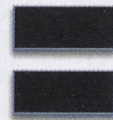
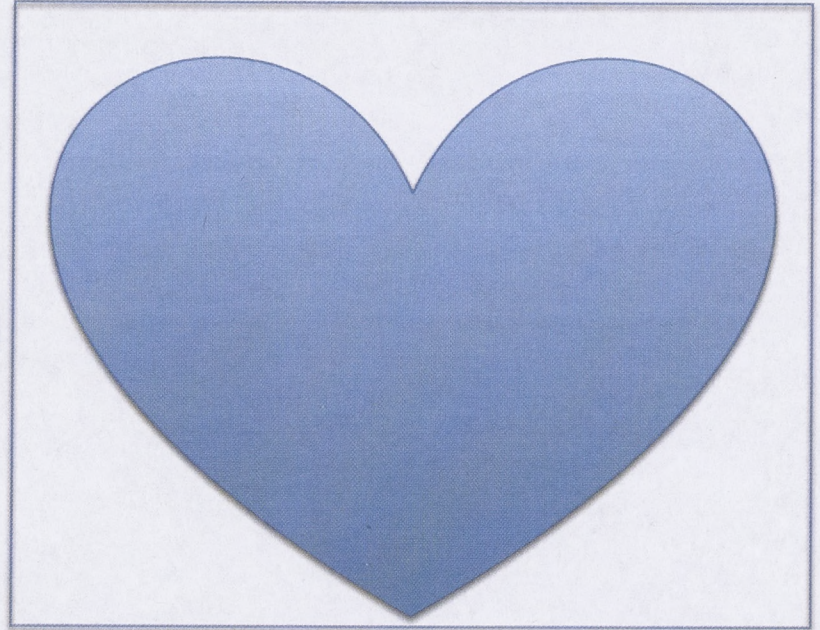

"Toilet Training is a documentary video and collaboration between transgender videomaker Tara Mateik and the Sylvia Rivera Law Project, an organization dedicated to ending poverty and gender identity discrimination. The video addresses the persistent discrimination, harassment, and violence that people who transgress gender norms face in gender segregated bathrooms.

Using the stories of people who have been harassed, arrested or beaten for trying to use bathrooms, Toilet Training focuses on bathroom access in public space, in schools, and at work."

Police Policy and Pepper spray

Universitywide Police Policies And Administrative Procedures:¹

§812: Chemical agents are weapons used to minimize the potential for injury to officers, offenders, or other persons. They should be used only in situations where such force reasonably appears justified and necessary.^{1,2}

Protesters did not threaten 'potential injury' to police or anyone else²

Pepper spray threatened potential injury to protesters

Effects of Pepper Spray (Oleoresin Capsicum)

- Skin: burning pain, swelling, redness, blistering (rare)²
- Respiration: burning throat, inability to breath, inability to speak, respiratory arrest (rare)²
- Eyes: severe burning pain, inflammation, involuntary blinking²

Oleoresin Capsicum (OC) is a cayenne pepper oil extract used in aerosol 'pepper sprays' manufactured for police crowd control.¹

"There is no real scientific basis for the claim that OC sprays are relatively safe"^{2,3}

UC Davis Police Chief Annette Spicuzza justified this assault because protesters made it difficult for police to walk through.¹

Impeding movement is not a threat of potential injury. Pepper spray is a threat of potential injury.

President Yudof has called for "a thorough, far-reaching and urgent assessment of campus police procedures involving use of force."²

Violence perpetrated against peaceful protesters creates an atmosphere of terror, and represses those who would otherwise speak out. Violence against peaceful protesters is violence against dissent and against the spirit of free expression

We do not simply need an assessment of police procedures, we need abolition of police violence and an end to repression of free speech

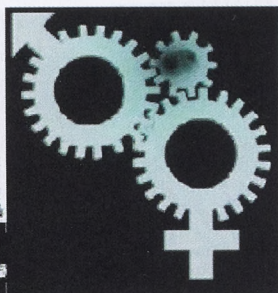
