



In *The Science Question in Feminism* (1986), philosopher of science Sandra Harding explores a set of critiques raised by feminists about the methods, epistemologies, and political ethics of modern science. Rather than ask, 'what is to be done about the situation of women in science?' Harding wants to ask, 'is it possible to use for emancipatory ends' sciences that are apparently so intimately involved in Western, bourgeois and masculine projects?' (9). Harding explores the critiques raised by feminist empiricism, feminist standpoint theory, and feminist postmodernism. She concludes that any emancipatory science will, by definition, unify around 'historically conscious political and ethical commitments' to be more or less successfully negotiated (250). Harding explicitly refrains from trying to resolve those epistemological and ethical tensions that she examines in the course of her essay; rather, Harding suggests that it is precisely these tensions that are themselves 'valuable' and in need of deliberate debate.

Importantly, Harding should not be read as anti-science. She is *not* suggesting that systematic inquiry itself is problematic. Harding's critique of modern science aims to emancipate its potential, not assign it to an historical dustbin (10). Harding, borrowing from Quine, suggests that modern science is flawed in part because of its adherence to the dogmas of reductionism and dualism. Reductionists hold that all knowledge can be reduced to logical statements or unmediated empirical experience. Dualists allow that some analytic knowledge claims are true by definition and so are ahistorical and universally-binding (36). Both dogmas fail to recognize the importance – indeed the centrality – of ethically-driven pragmatism as the only real arbiter of truth and objectivity (ibid). The argument, to be clear, is not that branches of science are simply in need of feminist alternatives. Rather, Harding's argument demands that we recognize the inherently social – and therefore pragmatic, historical, ethical, and fungible – nature of all practices of inquiry, both empirical and logical (52).

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> Though the focal concern of her essay surrounds the relationship of science to feminism, Harding makes clear that her work is interrelated with issues of race, class, sexuality, ecology etc. While she contends that 'feminist criticisms appear to touch especially raw nerves' her essay frequently speaks to issues of social and political emancipation in a broad sense (16).

These activists had the vision to dream of a recruitment and retention center at UCSD - so that ALL students would have access to higher education, as well as the resources to help them succeed once they get here.


SPACES wishes to acknowledge ALL of the people we know - and don't know - that have contributed to the development of our center. Our dream of a student-run recruitment and retention center is finally being realized, and that dream would not have been possible without YOU. So from the bottom of our hearts - THANKS!

As far as more recent history goes - in the spring of 2003 the \$39/per student, per quarter University Centers Expansion Referendum was proposed by the Associated Students (1). Through protest and struggle student activists ensured there was a home for the student-run recruitment and retention center (now called SPACES), as well as a new SAAC Lounge and a permanent space for the Cross-Cultural Center.

In the spring of 2007 student activists once again banded together to demand that the university prioritize student retention and access to higher education. The result of these efforts culminated in the \$7/per student, per quarter PULSE Referendum (Promoting Understanding and Learning through Service and Education).

With 22% of the campus voting, 56% of the students said YES to PULSE (2) and established guarantee funding for SIAPS and ASP as well as mandated the creation of a new center - SPACES - that would serve as a support organization for student initiated access and retention programs and services.

We stand here today in recognition and gratitude to all the lives that this center has been built upon. Thank You.
