### PEACE ACTIVIST TO DELIVER CLARK DISTINGUISHED LECTURE

Sociologist, author and peace activist Elise Boulding, a professor emerita from Dartmouth College, will deliver the 1986 Clark Distinguished Lecture at the University of California, San Diego.

Boulding will speak on "The Cultural Roots of Violence and Peace" at the UCSD International Center on April 10 at 7:30 p.m. The public is invited and admission is free. However, all attendees must have a ticket which should be obtained in advance from the International Center or the UCSD box office.

Boulding's appearance is co-sponsored by the Institute on Global Conflict and Cooperation and the International Center. A reception for Professor Boulding will follow her talk, sponsored by the Friends of the International Center.

Boulding, a former chair of the sociology department at Dartmouth, has undertaken numerous transnational and comparative cross-national studies on conflict and peace, development, family life, and women in society.

She is a member of the governing board of the United Nations University, a member of the international jury of the UNESCO Prize for Peace Education, and a former member of the U.S. Commission for UNESCO.

Boulding currently serves as a member of the board of the National Peace Institute Foundation and as editor of the International Peace Research Newsletter.

Among her books are "The Underside of History: A View of Women Through Time," "Women in the Twentieth Century World," and the "Handbook of International Data on Women."

The Clark Distinguished International Lecture Series honors a former Dean of International Education at UCSD, Phyllis Clark, and her late husband, Colonel Milton Clark. The lectureship was established by their three daughters and is maintained by donations.
