The company was funded by Daniel Singer, who retired from the group last year. He was replaced by Reed Martin, a writer and performer. Jess Borgeson and Adam Long round out the trio.

Long, who plays the female roles, dons a huge wig for "Romeo and Juliet." In "Titus Andronucus," heads roll. Literally. "The Two Noble Kinsmen" becomes "The Chernobyl Kinsmen," with tongue-in-cheek. Props and fullspeed action choreography make up a good deal of the trio's material. Original music is by Adam Long, costumes and props are by Sa Thomson. Additional writing is by Dan McLaughlin, Mark Sellin, David Springhorn, Jack Tate and Sa Thomson.
