Likewise Local Government Officer Amongst should have had a field day discussing local government in particular, political education in general, and assessing the dialogue gap between Councillors and their respective constituents. I should slac be interested to know in future patrol reports how many exemptions were insued (contra the previous financial year's collection), how much tax was collected (contra the previous financial year, compra the estimates), the number of taxpayers and eligible taxpayers. The Council and this office should after all maintain an analysis of this aspect of a Council's finances. Original returned herewith. I am pleased to note that whilst road work was in progress Mr. Payne discussed the road, and its benefits for the people, with villagers and workers. Of course this has to be followed up and the rationale of a width sufficient for tractor/trailer should be followed. As the road progresses, so every opportunity should be taken to use it to the villagers' advantage, and this should be seen to be so, and publicised accordingly. Sizk should be seen to be so, and publicised accordingly. Sick people to hospital, school children food each week Village to Amanab, carrying patrol equipment, carrying supplies to Aid Posts and village stores, moving produce to Amanab market, moving film unit to villages - are some of the ways in which the road will help the people, in the first instance using the Government tractor/trailer. Psychological advantages and more interested and increased physical application to road work might then follow from 'have not' villages. But let them see, not only hear about, these advantages, first. From the report comments under 'Political Education' there will be continual need to stress to workers the advantages of the road, the self help principle in the rural improvement programme, that we are stuck with this system and that the work commitment will not abate in the foreseeable future, and that any post independent desertion or isolation of these areas will to a large degree depend upon their contact with and accessibility to the outside world via this road, and that this, to a large degree, will depend upon their efforts, and particularly that of their Sub-District Councillors who in other correspondence, if I remember correctly, raised concern at possible isolation post An adequate report covering pleasing achievements. This patrol covers the period 14/8/75 to 21/8/75 being a coutine administration patrol to the Dera Census Division for the purpose of familiarisation of the area and to assist the Amanab Council in its tax collection.

The Amenab Council does not possess a Council Clerk and accordingly, tax collection is carried out by Field Staff of the Department. All tax for the Council has now been collected emploing it to compense its works programme.

Unfortunately, a comparison with the previous year is not possible as the previous Local Government Austratuated and record appropriate entries on the register and in some instances local people she had paid were not issued with rescipts.

Bridges at present are being upgraded but more substantial structures are required if the read is to be used constantly. With an allocation of \$6000 this financial year under the Rural Laprovscent Programs there should be un difficulty in constructing the read to a good standard. A submission will be made to Public Marks for a maintenance contract as soon as possible to ensure that deterioration is contained from the outset.

My comments are :-

SITUATION REPORTS

Mr Payne has adequately covered the main aspects of the patrol in the four Situation Reports. My assessments are attached herewith.

POLITICAL AWARENESS

A concerted effort will have to be made to improve the Kwomtari people's political knowledge. The main problem here is the usual shortage of qualified staff and the remotiones of the area. The situation should improve considerably when the area comes under treat Government Council, with more regular contact with the Administration through the local government council.

HEALTH

An aid post orderly is currently is doing training at Lumi and will be posted to Gurieso upon his graduation. It is hoped council medical aides, (trained at Vanima) can be made available to serve the more remote areas such as Sai bai.

LAW AND BREDER

It is pleasing to note the satisfactory Law and Order situation.

AREA STUDY.

Area Study amendments to original Area Study of Patrol Report No. 7, of 1959/70 and following amendments by Patrol NO. 11, of 1970/71. Area Study has been restructured and reorganised to follow required layout for regular updating.

A. INTRODUCTION.

a. The area consists of about 515 eq. miles (120,408 hectree) of country, maily flat, los lying and therefore frequently poorly drained. This area lies south of the Beuchi Rountaine, S.U. of the Toreclli Mountaine, East of the Amenab hills and is a northerly extension of the Sepik Plains to the acuth.

The rainfall averages between 90 to 120 inches per annum. The vegetation is typical lowlands tropical type rainforest broken by a few small infraguent kunal crassland patches.

The area is drained by river patterns flowing South From N.E. to N.U. These rivers carry wirge volumes of water and become a barrier to cross in times of flood.

b. There are mission airstrips at Utai, regularly serviced and maintained by the Catholic Mission, and the Catholic Allace, and the Catholic aircraft into strips at Guriaco and Kuschart Willages. These two strips are infrequently used and are maintained by village labour the are encouraged in their effects by low lows, passes by aircraft than the strip becomes uncervicalite, because of overgrowth.

The only other access is by wolsking tracks. These may negotiate very wet areas which slow down travel considerably. In times of prolonged dry spells the tracks can be generably pleasing to travel over if maintained.

c. The census division has been under regualr administration influence from between 1956 and 1959 when the initial census was achieved. They have had regualr patrols since, averaging one per year, and seectimes more frequent medical patrols.

The mearest resemblance of any cargo cult activity in the area is the people's belief that their anticipated incomporation within the Amenab Local Governs ant Council will naturally attract and mysteriously create businesses within the area.

8. POPULATION DISTRIBUTION TRENDS.

- (a) Village population figures are affixed to the patrol jacket. The total population noe stends at 1,424. This shows a natural increase of 5.2% since the last consue revision, or 2.1% per annum. The natural increase is low due in the main to a poor dat and lack of appreciation to seeking medical attention. Those areas regularly visited by infant welefare sisters do not as yet show any appreciative improvement in natural population increase over those areas not visited.
- (b) Administration petrols follow set patrol routes and encourage tracks connecting these villages to be maintained and up graded. The tracks vary in condition, from poor, set and swampy to good firm and dry. Travelling times also vary occording to the weather. Villagers are now enthusiastic about the possibilities of connecting the C/D to Amenab by road. They stated they still communes a preliminary survey of a road route from Utai via Mufuars, venabl, Smithi to connect to the Amenab Akraminag road proposed to communes construction in 1974/75.
- It is also noteworthy that there are now four villages bessd around the Catholke Riselom at Utai. These being Aismini, Utai, Ekse, and wurchel. Finemoi and Fas 3 villages have established workers compoin the near variantly of Utai.
- At the time of the patrol there were no land disputes causing friction to development of the Utal cattle project. This trend to contralise the population assists with the administration of the area, and localises populations to concentrate on development.
- The village of Keestari has moved back to the CFML already pile. Range villagers have also re-established their administrative comp nearby. This is partly in response to increases in station services to this airstip and partly because they polluted thomoslyes out of the previous site and bould disorders because a too common occurrence.
- (c) Generally the trend has been for absolutes absent at plantation labours on the coast to return. From an estimated 130 male shult absentess working out of the district at the last cansus the majority have returned. There are now 62 absolutes in this category, of these about 20 are longstonding absolutes who could be written off the books as algrations out.

An increase in the number of adult males in the village medu the location of certiors on easier tesk than in bygone years. It was found that villages with a population of graster than 7a could muster sufficient corriers for small patrols (15 - 20 carriers).

C. SUCIAL GROUPINGS.

The following is extracted from the original area study obtained from Amanab Patral P^- 7 of 1969/70 compiled by Rr. F.B. Donovan P.O. and updated as recuired.

a. The puople in this C/O are known locally as the Bapi's, also included in this group are some of those villages in the Rapu Canaus Division in the Green flavor area. It is a general term to describe any body who comes to the S.D.O. from East of the Bapi River.

"The area has interserried beyond its boundaries, but this inter marraiage generally follows language patterns and the groupings which extend the Administration defined boundaries."

"b. The simple femily is the functional social unit, however as aout of the villages are small there is a great deal of contact within the unit, further if we trose back for enough, we can establish a fairly good sort of family tree which indicates or suggests that generally each village unit is an extended family, a common ancestor and an overcome of the inevitable problems of same, by carriage beyond the unit. Interserrings and sister exchange characterises the shale area, Lond conversity follows the patrailment system."

"d. There are four language groups within the area, covering the seventeen willage." The includion of Fac 3 village now brings the total number of village to eighteen.

Mai. "This group smbraces five villages, those of Kuemteri, Mange, Salberi, Yomabi and Yas'uri, all of which are edjment. I am told that this group extends further and embraces awas villages in the Green Miver Magu Census Division and the Amenab Mai-Faringi Census Division. The Population of this group with in the actual Kuemteri Census Division numbers 477 persons."

Runo. "This group ombraces five villages, those of Gurieso, Maragin, Guruba, Ekas and Mufuers. Currently these villages are quite widely spread, but they form the noth eastern corner of the Muscaturi ensue Miylsion. A population of 391 persons is included in this group.

Note: "Within the Macetari four villages apeak this language, they are Utal, Alamine, Finesca and Fes 5, a regerepate population total of 293 persons. Movever this group extends to the north and includes all the villages of the Demoi Consum Division - Imenda, and some in the Pagel and Simean oddaintrailve area, most notably Sumunini, Yo, Savamui, notikem, Mori, and Funaru. The inhabitants of the Booti Consum Elvision say that their language need to simply SIMEMI, and yet these people of the same language group may they apeak NCM."

D. LEADERSHIP.

Generally has remained unchanged. The following is extracted from Amanab Patrol Report No11 of 1970/71 compiled by Nr. N.-T.-Robson A.P.O.

"(a) I do not agree that the luluais and tultule are generally speaking held in such respect; most of the officials lack personality and atthority and in one actonishing instance the hat had been given to a mantal defective. His replacement will be recommended.

Exceptional are the lulual Visi and tultul Kebo, both of Utai villags. They are the only outstanding officials, but quite good are, Road of Balberi, Yamps of Balbei and Ariza of Iteal. Root villages have in addition to the government appointed officials was known as besshois, who are the leaders of traditionally distinct groups within the village population. In several cases suchas Arapoi of Kwomtari, these man are far more impressive than the luluais and tultule of their village. Ispais of Yamabi and Gop of Yawiwi are other examples.

- (b) These can are all in aidale age, with no formal secretion. None of them is known to have a conviction. In most cases they are respected in nearby related willages, and vial and Kabo appear to have nuite wide influence in several willages near Utai. "
- (c) The pattern of luadership is showing some change, it was indicated during discussions at willage level that village meetings had laready set should "marking" who will be voted in as council member representative. Judging from some of these "appointments" there would appear to be leadership changes for the worse. The selection I recall meeting did not, in my ideals, have the characteristics a good conncillor should possess, that is, a progressive outlook, a flamboyent manner, a strong voice, and having no fears of village talk and reprisels against had enforcement of better village management proposals.
- It is expected that the eventual council members which originate from this $\epsilon/0$ will be of a similar calling to the lulusis and tultula which they are replacing.

E. LAND TENURE AND USE.

a. Land tenure and cenerehip followship patralineal sistem, thereby title is passed from Father to som, and where women have no title to land ceneration. If there is no made hear in a generation, but only females, title them passes to the eidest son of the cenere brother. It has been suggested that there is great shear to one not bearing a male child, and if such is the case, it is not uncommon for a man to remarry and to persist in trying to produce a male heir.

Land is unlimited and we can say that there is little likelyhood of any land shourtage in the near future. The population density runs at 1.2 persons per og kilometre.

b. The Catholic Mission at Utal has amission and an agricultural lease of 180 acres. This land has not yet been purchased by the administration. The patrol was questioned on the tardinous of this acutistion.

The C.M.R.L. have a mission airstrip lease at Kwomtari dating back to 1964.

Fas 3 villegers have purchased by newly exercised native castem 50 to 100 hoctree of land from the villegers at Utai. \$100 was exchanged in the transaction, their pursues from surrounding villeges will also be interested in obtaining land within easy access to the mission obtains of their over expanding authle hords.

c. The first cash crops have been established in the form of small scale popper plots, owned and operated on a communal basis, the first capp can be expected in the coming 12 months.

The introduction of cattle at Utal has been a popular move which has fired the imagination of several villagers, teams are being made available to those persons requiring sesistance. Gunerahip of cattle is on an individual basis, but in communal paddocks.

G. STANDARD OF LIVING.

Unchanged with the exception of a higher incidence of European type kitchen artifacts and spades, knives and axes.

The following is the original study extracted from Amenab Patrol Report No. 7 of 1969/70 compiled by F. B. Donovan, P.D.

a. The difficult, by our standards, conditions under which those epople live does not generally lend itself to a high standard of living. Howing isis, as it were, temporary. Rade from saterials readily available in the endless ewest the houses are built not to lest a lifetime. Water is available for drinking and washing, but it is of poor quality. As a result skin infections are commonplace. Imported artifacts are fow, where are worm everyday by the mon, while women discard traditional dress on rare occasions, such as a Consecuch, Household whensize are basic, buckets and saucepans are found in most households. Artifacts then are basic and cheap trade store lines, however they do lead to an improved way of life.

b. Swampdwallers, and as such their diet and way of life closely follows a pattern defined by the environment. Sage is limitless and as such forms the basis of the peoples diet. There is little caucau, tare and or other vegetables. Game so I was told is more than abundant, and from the amount that was offered for sale to the Patrol I well believe this. Canned foods are rare. Fish is available in the swamps and Twers. Diet then simply sage and meat with a few banance for sweets.

c. The villages that are fortunate amough to have any sort of a bell play 'kkick' with reliah. Amenab has long had a knickname as being 'kwramembu' and people from Amanab are referred to as such, similarly the people of Utai and environs, as a take from the vegotation are known as 'wail pitpit'. My fixed earrier line formed a team and we played a number of gemmes of all in secon on the airstrip at Utai. Kuramembu tried hard but foll victim to the web feet of the well pitpit and us lost all methods. Our excuse was that we had walked for two weeks and were not as fresh as were the local Utais. A nowelty, but it certainly brightened up our stey and was cause for much toktok.

Suffice to say that where there are the facilities, since there is always interest, sport is inevitable. Facilities are limited, is balls.

H. MISSIONS.

Little change was recorded since the last area study of the area. The following is extracted free Amanab Patrol Reports of the past and undated for the record.

a. "Both the Cathelic Passionist Rission and the Christian Rission of Rany Lands operate in the area, however they have their own villages of operation. The Cathelic missions operation from their airsevin/station at "Lai serve the meets of seven villages, these being Utai, Ekse, Aismine, Burubai, Fufuera, Finamoi and Fas 3. Influence extends in to the Beshi Census Civision if the Lenoida Administrative area, Free all appearances spiritual needs are neglected and the ciscion at the messent does not aven boast of a house of worthing all though plans are in the air to rectify this matter, however a tradestore operates as well as an aid post and a school? The mission also established a cattle industry in the area.

The C.M.M.L. has two airstrips in the area, one at Kussteri and the other at Gurieso village. This airsion has installed Sibis school tackers in early of the villages. Although those tackers some to be of a good calibre and are literate in pidgin language they fail to improve the village life in a practical sense. Spibitually they achieve results and their classes are attended by all age groups, and a few impressive religious buildings have been built, for exemple the one at Guriage.

b. The Catholic Mission at Utai is about 30 miles ME of Amenab. Staff for 1974 is expected to be the Father in charge, a nursing sister and one expetriated together, plus one indigenous teacher.

The C.M.M.L.mission is based at Amenab and contact is maintain of through the Sible school beachersand visits by an infant welfare sister. A small mission sponsored store is operated at Gurisso but lines carried are minimal.

c. The general attitude by the indigenous population is one of open acceptance of any mission sesistance but little gratitude is offered in roturn. The villagers around Utal are enthusiastic but irresponsible about the cattle enterprise started by the mission. A singaing still takes precedence over the selfers of the enimals. There is a little friction continuing at the higher levels of mission sanagement, between the two missions.

 a_{\star} Roads. There are no roads. Tracks of various conditions and surface bearing ratings connect all villages.

Discursions were held concerning a road link with Amenab, It was suggested that a road could be constructed following high ground from Utai to Pufwara, Yanebi, Saibai to connect with the proposed road link between Amenab and Arcamings. The numerous rivers will pose a problem to cross but in the driest times they can be forded. The river bads offer a plentiful supply of mand and gravel for road surfacing works.

b. Sea. This area is well inlend but to prove a point shallow draft vessels (less than 2°) could come up the Sepik Miver and follow the Bapl or Hordon River tributaries up into the weathern extremities of this consus division.

o. Air. There are three inverige in the area, all suitable for light aircraft of category '0' standard. They are located at Utal (1700 feet in length), Guriaso (1800) and Kepetari (2100) The latter two are used possibly once per south while the Utal strip is serviced and maintained requirely.

L. STACE OF POLITICAL DEVELOPMENT.

The following is extracted from Ameneb Patrol Report Noil of 1970/71 compiled by Mr. N.T.Robach A.P.D.

"No progress in political understanding would appear to have taken place since the last report. The only experience the people have had of democratic process has been one house of Assembly election, and none of the candidates were known in the eros. The talks which are giveb on patrol do not seem to have made any real impression, I agree that an increase in radios souldhelp, but there are still very few in the area and most of these are broken. The low level of literacy coupled with a general lack of interest would make D.I.E.S. publications of little value. However, training aids such as large charts and maps would greatly assist the talks which we give on patrol. I think the best way to improve political understanding is to ensourage the people to make trips out of their area, even if only to Amanab, to sem Local Government in action. The difficulty is to make the people feel that it is worth their effort to do so. One would expend that the large number of ex-indentured labourers would have formed a nucleum of reasonably aware people with an appetite for progress. However, this does not seem to be the case. Perhaps the the isolat on and unpromising environment is simply accepted as insvitable leading to a sort of fatal-istic attitude."

The above comments remain all too twue, partly because there has been little activity effecting the peoples line of political thought since the last parcel. It is true that they polled their votes along with the rest of us in 1972, but it was indicative that Nowone know who their present M. 18.8. was.

Radios have become more numerous and if they can be kept going long snough they may assist to broaden some individuals political

Self Government day some and went without being registered. The patral did samege to clarify this point in most instances.

It is falt that political ameroness must be improving but not at such a rate that it can be rapiatered. Independence day will have long gone does in history before these people setch up with their wore advanced counterparts.

M. THE ECONORY OF THE ARCA.

a. The only cash crop encouraged and promoted by 0,A.S.F. has been papper. All villages with the exception of Financi, survive; Fas 3, and Aicaina have eacil gardens of papper vines. Generally those have been maintained and the attention these pathetic plots have been given is at least encouraging for better things to come. The first fruits can be expected in the coming year. Production will be very low, there is estimated to be only 700 to 900 wines collectively.

The Catholic Mission at Utal Have encouraged cattle projects. The Mission has interduced cattle and have trained coupage in their husbandry. The readows receive a small mometary renumeration and at the end of their time receive a cow and eteer to start themselves off. At present there are about 30 willage camed cattle, 22 camed by Fas 3, 6 by Utal, 1 by Financi and one Muffurna. The Mission has a further 40 cattle.

B. & c. Action under those listings will remain magligible for some time. Papper plantings are too small to be significant and marketing of cattle will have its transport problems and slaughter is too ridgidly enforced by regulations for this area.

d. Missions continue to purchase from foods from the area but the quantities are reducing and no more than \$40 would be earnt from this source.

The biggest money serner for the area remains the money returned with repatriated labour estimated to be static at about \$7,000 Money sarnse locally from mission labouring remains at 600 Money earnt from carrying for patrols 150 Money marnt by the locals from crocodile skine is Artifacts may return up to Gold returned \$150 Sale of produce to markets at Asmab and the missis: 100 Miscellaneous revenue 1,200 The last figure is very high on the villages second to have the money but there is no obvious source. A good part of it possible comes through the sail from the steent labourers. Possibly the other sources have been under estimated. I agree with a per capita income of around \$2.10

F. There is no co-operatives operating in the area.

POSSIBILITIES OF EXPANDING THE ECONOMY.

a. With a pop lation density of one person per 85 heatres (210 ecres) there are no land pressures Nuch of the land tends to water logging, an estimate of 25/15 made, higher in the southern areas and lower in the northern areas of the C/O.

b. The limitations to market gardening are in the main cheap efficient transportation, absorbent markets and a little expertise.

c. Greater uses earning possibilities will open up to this t/O once they become part of the Local Government Council system. They may be smoleyed as casual council labourers or on the Akraminag to Amenab read under the Rural Improvement Programme.

d. Any cash crop which has a high selling price to weight ratio, will store well and does not require sophisticated cultural or processing method can be considered for the area. Todate pepper has been the sole D.A.S.F. contribution. Small gardens were planted out, survival wes average and now between 700 to 900 pepper wines are well established. These are spread over 14 villages, Once these gardens were antablished. D.A.S.F. appears to have neglected the project and no further expension has accurred.

Rubber would possibly do well hore, but this would be dependent on successfully establishing road communications with the coast.

Chillies, of the Birds Eye variety were encouraged on this patrol in line with present D.A.S.F. policy

Cattle around Utai have become a big thing. There are now over 70 head, approximately 3G are locally owned. There is much land in the near vacinity of Utai which lands itself to development for cattle raising. The limitation to accommanded expansion will eventually be the marketing of must, because of transportation difficulties.

Peanute can be groun, as a cash crop and also to improve the local diet. At the moment the Amanab L.S.C. is prepared to purchase passuts for about feed trials. Transportation to Amanab will be arranged by mission sirreft.

Gold is to be found in the northern section of the ./O. There is only one team active at the present time. This source of revenue could well be developed at a time when the people feel they require more money.

e. Until the inhebitants of this U/O can be educated to demand more of the worldly goods now freely available in this country there will be little incentive for the villagers to eake the effort to improve his lot at village level. Should those people case into the Amaneb L.G.C. the obligation to pay council too annually will be the first occasion when these people are committed to think about a source of revenue to meet this new committeent. This may then be expected to create a previously unprecedented demand for developmental accisance from the Government and its agencies.

G. ATTITUDE TOWARDS LOCAL GOVERNMENT.

It become apparent that the average citizen John has a very limited knowledge on the functions of Local Government. Ouring discussions held on the subject most persons indicated a sincere desire to come under local government. No-one at any time vaiced objection to the idea in principal, Generally the reason stated for the wish to become a council area was a beleif that businesses would automatically follow once council representation was established.

It was obvious to the patrol that the sabject of councils had been discussed at fair length by the wullegare prior to the conduct of the patrol, and unentances approved had been when to becoming a council area without such idea of the problems involved. The difficulties, such as communications, apathy, low income, low population denity wars all explained by the patrol but this did little to despen the enthusians for the idea.

A point was made on several occasions but appeared to have originated at Utai fillage. This was a demand for council member representation of one councillor for every village. The difficulties and associated problems to this request were explained to the villagers and a suggestion was made that they agree to the present system set it now stands and later once they have coucil representatives they can bring up any problems at a council meeting in a wory democratic server. Westly this idea was accepted, but only to overcome any stalements.

No objection was made to a supposted two dollar tax rate.

There appeared to be no change in the attitude towards the central government and the following report made by fire F_* to Conorder P.G. in Amenia Patrol Report No.7 of 69/70 are still relevant.

They some Police and other Administration wenicles, they see various officers, and mostly they take any advise given as the truth. Their attitude is more one of respect and 'haris tok' rather than participation in a democratic system. The Government is the boas and us do so the government and its afficers any, Empact rather than participation for services rather than a realisation that the somey had to come from somewhere also to provide these things, Govern halpin supellar,"

There continues to be little contact other than by patrol. Very few persons other than the Willage Officials visit the station at Amenab. Even shotgun licence recommle have been enforwarded by the elssion, this was discouraged.

Solf Government has made little impact as nothing has happened at ville age level for the people to see. The new flag of Papus New Guines was displayed for the first time and was accorded as their symbol of Government utthout and reservation.

Several villagers indicated a desire to see were of government officers and went so far as to suggest a basecomp/patrol post be established at Utni.

Interest was also given to other suggestions that their M.M.A. wisit them. This could easily be arranged by the Catholic Minston Tlying the h.M.A. from his base at Camina to Utai for a day or two.

Patrol were well received and a 98% sighting at Consus was recorded.

Fresh foods can be purchased but only sage and smoked pig meat is guaranteed available.

The Catholic Mission at Utal runs a small trade store, free mail bog, and aid post. Nost visitors to the area are velcomed marely as visitors are a rare source of enjoyment for inhabitants of this area.

All stantagically palced villages have a rest house of condition variable, but it is usual for a n immature occount to be offered as refreshment and a peace offering on arrival.

There is no demand for further facilities or services and little increase can be expected for some time.

- It would appear from comments in the patrol diary that regular Health patrols are required in this area and that possibly some of the areas most in med of health attention are those in close proximity to Amanab Station.
- Mainutrition seems a feature of the Amanab area and subsistence diet will need to be a major consideration of the proposed area development planning.
- HARREE was not visited although situated within the Census Division.
 There appears to be no reference to its census either. Flease
 advice.
- 5. Fatrol Report 'Agriculture' this makes disturbing reading but unfortunately true for much of Papua New Guinea. Rowever, with the current Hight Point Plan, emphasis on rural community development, <u>District</u> team work and initiatives rather than departmentalism, the situation has changed as you are aware with the development proposals for the Amanab Sub-District.
- I shall be pleased to be informed on any progress which follows assistance to the area in gold production, by the Mining Assistant.
- The endeavours with respect to conservation are both original and commendable.
- 8. Amanab/Green River road how are the proposals by the patrolling officer with respect to re-organizing the system of road work proceeding? Please advise.

- Education: The situation here is the last remnants of the culture clash which heralded the entry of western education to every part of Rapua New Guinea. That it is happening now in the west Sepik District is indicative of our relative 'advancement' vis-a-vis other parts of the country.

The peoples willingness to offer their services under the 'self-help' scheme indicated their desire to open up and develop their area.

2. Routine Administration

It is pleasing to note that all villages in the area are clean and tidy. The council's rules must be explained thoroughly to the people and enforced where and when necessary to ensure a general overall improvement in the area.

The spacing of residences to minimise fire hazards cannot be emphasised too much. Recently two villages, Konebasi and Kabaineri, have been burnt to the ground, due mainly to congested layout of these villages.

3. Political Education

4. Conclusion

Again Mr. Koikoi has conducted an excellent patrol. His report has been promptly submitted, is concise, informative and well written. An above average report for a Trainee Petrol Officer.

Enclosed please find the Patrol Report on the abovementioned patrol, together with Situation Report No. 1, field officer's journal and claim for camping allowance submitted by Mr G. F. Payne, Assistant District Officer.

My comments are as follows:

- Comments on the situation as regards the school are attached.
- 2. As the land in the Idam area is more fertile than other sections of the Green River area, the prospects for rice planting and other suitable cash cropping are enhanced. Access to the area will be a problem for the forseeable future in marketing produce but as an interim measure the airfield could be a contral pickup point. It is essential in the Green Haver area that follow up action be maintained on rice plantings etc. as local people are easily discouraged after making the effort and having nobody inspect and purchase the produce. Non availability of rice seed for planting is a problem for the whole Green River area and I would request your support in heaving Department of Agriculture provide supplies as a matter of urgency. Promotion of rice planting has been carried out by Mr Payne for several months now and I do not want enthusians to wain.
- 3. Maintenance of the airfield is going to be a problem. It is a private mission airfield which has not been used for quite some time now. I consider that we would have some use for the airfield in servicing the school and aidpost say once per fortraight or once a month in which case it will devolve on us to do the necessary maintenance of outting the grass. I would recommend that funds be made available to have it out on a permanent basis by perhaps three labourers. This could be supervised by the headmaster of the school and inspected every so often by the O.I.C., Green River.

It would appear that the area has some potential so consideration should be given to the situation as regards the airfield.

- 4. The case involving incest has been investigated and one person has been committed for trial before the Supreme Court.
- 5. I do not think at this stage that the census division should be included in the Green River Council due to its remoteness and subsequent difficulty in providing planned consistant development. At this stage such a proposal may place an unnecessary burden on the Council and the people of this census division. The matter should however, be reviewed in the next two years.

The patrol was well received at all villages, and unfortunately it was again mosquito time on the river and they too seemed pleased to see us.

The patrol arrived at Idam on the second day, and were lucky in being able to make the whole distance by speed boat as the Idam river has a fast filling draining action which often leaves too little water in the creek to allow movement by outboard propulsion.

The reported discontentment with the school was investigated and is reported on in situation report No. 1, attached.

It was also noted that the land appeared to be relatively productive by Green River standards, and an abundence of fresh foods were obtainable. A trial movement of fresh foods was arranged for the Green River market for the Friday pay week. The Idams were to travel to the confluence of the Idam and Sepik Rivers where it was arranged that they be met by the C.M.M.I. mission double cance and motor and bought the 12 miles downstream to the mouth of the Dio River where the tractor can meet them and bring them to the station another 10 miles distance. At the time of writing this feat had been accomplished and the Idams seemed pleased with their rewards and the station people happy to have fresh foods obtainable. It is now hoped the people of Idam are interested enough to perpetuate this market day.

The Idams also stated they were prepared to plant rice, how-ever no seed is available at the moment, and also plant chill-ies, for which they are now establishing nurseries, under the guidence of the school teacher.

The Airstrip was inspected it had a landing area of 18008 length by 100' wide. At the time of inspection it was obvious that it had not been cut for some time, the grass was 15 - 18" high and there were numerous sapplings up to 6 - 8 feet high. The reason given for its lack of attention was lack of use, only rarely did a plane ever land. It was suggested that if they showed they could produce enough dried chilli planes could be diverted to pick up the produce for movement to Vanimo. Naturally great enthusiam was demonstrated on this idea so it was stressed that a fair amount of continuous hard work was involved, which might have slowed them down a bit.

Political education subjects were discussed and the people had more thoughts on the subject than I would have expected due to their isolation in recent years.

The possibility of joining the Greek River L.G.C. was discussed but generally not favoured on the grounds of no means of making money. It was however stated that they would certainly revue the case should either the chilli gardens or rice crop offer them a reliable source of money.

A site for the proposed M.N.W. aid post to be built this financial year was inspected. The villagers were instructed to prepare the site and gather kwila stumps.

It is my opinion that despite the disadvantages of isolation this area suffers its prospects of improving village life contributing to the well being and properity of the area in general are good if the people are offered guidance and organisation.

Subject: I Down REID OF COMMENT

This school was established at the beginning of this year. The teacher/Mondmaster, Mr. Robert Mayaku has regularly reported to me problems of lack of co-operation, steeling and lastly an act of arson by persons unknown wishing to destroy the recently completed school building and the destruction of school books.

An investigation of the damage showed that approximately half of one room in a double classroom block was destroyed by a c fire before being put out by the headmaster and other citizens. Books were dumped down a toilet and in the crack.

No lead was given to who caused the trouble. The only lead given was that some Idam No. 2 women were reported as having a cross on with the Idam No. 1 people and it was rumoured that it was those women who wanted to destroy their part of the building, and stop their children going down to that village. This was not substantiated.

During discussions with the villagers no-one raised any antischool notions and they demonstrated their co-operation by quickly rebuilding the school. It was repair when the patrol inspected it. The villagers were warned that repeated performances of this nature would necessitate the closure of the school.

Since the patrol Mr. Hayaku has again advised me that someone has stolen 11 items of clothing/personal property from him.

Mr. Haysku stated that should the school be closed it and he should be re-established at Labara willage on the Septh Miver, by some co-incidence his village of birth. This attitude my cause Mr. Haysku to be a little less understanding and patient than would otherwise be the case.

To reinterate, it was found that most peole supported and wanted the school to remain. It is only the acts of a few which are causing concern and worry to Mr. Hayaku and other villagers. If Mr. Hayaku can recognise some of his stolen property on the backs of the thief I am sure we can demonst-syste that they goannt continue to act with impunity.

Enclosed please find the abovementioned Patrol Report together with claim for camping allowance.

The report is necessarily short but covers the situation adequately.

Road work is progressing well at Baribari and Biaka however approximately twelve miles of track are still to be constructed and there is only a total of approximately \$3000 left if Green River and Amanab Council votes to cover the work. Advice on the likelihood of Servoa equipment moving to Green River would be appreciated. If this plant moves to Green River in the next few months, road development will not bebrought to a helt and thus lose momentum.

Rice planting requires a lot of publicity and follow up action by staff to ensure success on individual plots. Mr Payne will be attending to this aspect of development in the next few weeks. One thing I want to avoid initially is speradic unplanned rice and chillie plantings where a few failures could dampen local people's enthusiass. Planned development maximises the prespects of success if followed up by DASF effort.

Mr Paynes's remarks on the Water Supply at Biska should be noted. Possibly you could circularise this information through the D.L.S.C. Other Councile contemplating this type of tank should be acquainted with the fact that materials deteriorate over a short period and are costly to replace as mentioned in the report.

A good patrol in which the continued efforts by Mr Fayne are achieving results and slowly overcoming the apathy previously displayed by local people.

Road work is progressing at a fairly good rate and I anticipate that a motor cycle will be able to travel between Green River and Amanab by the end of May. The 3% miles of track remaining should be completed by that time with additional labourers being engaged on both ends of the road.

Rice plantings are minimal at present but with Mr Payne at Green River for the next month, I envisage an increase in the number of growers with the object of bringing the mill into use on a more consistent basis than has been the case in the past. It is anticipated that the Hammermill to be purchased by the Amanab Council will be placed at Green River initially to process the byproducts of rice for poultry fsed. Production of this feed will enable a significant increase in poultry projects at village level.

As regards DASF extension work, I am having no success here. The officer posted here has been absent for over a month however I will try to get him across to Green River to learn and assist in the rice planting. Could DASF authorise this and subsequent movements in this sub-district to further developmental activity of an agricultural nature as envisaged by for this area.

Apathy on the part of local people to rapid change to cash economy is probably in part the result of the lack of constant effort and initiative by DASF in the past. With the increase in village projects and enthusiasm for development as shown by Mr Payne in his patrol, this problem should not be difficult to overcome.
