


THE MULTICULTURAL LGBT LITERARY FOUNDATION

The Multicultural LGBT Literary Foundation began in November 2012 as a community book club that was started in order to celebrate and preserve the literature and art of LGBT people of color. This small community project thrived, and we quickly recognized the need for an arts organization that was dedicated to these artists. The Foundation was formally incorporated in July of 2013, eight months after the first book club. Since then, the Foundation has managed to do some amazing work! Our ReadOut program brings writers from as far away as New York, and as close as L.A., for readings, signings, workshops, and book launches. The Foundation curates several literary festivals each year, the largest of which is titled "Expressions of Pride," where patrons can peruse and purchase over 300 titles by LGBT authors of color. Our Words of Wisdom program provides a local high school with a multicultural LGBT library every year. And our Patchwork Project is an online database that provides biographies, photos, and full bibliographies of hundreds of writers from the past and present. The Multicultural LGBT Literary Foundation is a volunteer run, 501(c)(3) organization and all donations are tax deductible. NOËL ALUMIT

Noël Alumit was born in Baguio City, in the Philippines, and grew up in Historic Filipinotown, Los Angeles. He earned his Bachelor of Fine Arts in Drama from the University of Southern California and is working toward his Masters in Divinity at the University of the West. He received an Emerging Voices Fellowship from PEN Center USA West and a Community Access Scholarship to UCLA's Writers Extension, studying fiction and the personal essay form.

His first novel, Letters to Montgomery Clift, received many awards

including the Stonewall Book Award (American Library Association), Violet Quill Award (Insight Out Books), the Global Filipino Literary Award (Our Own Voice) and the Gold Seal (ForeWord Magazine). His second novel, Talking to the Moon, received support from literary figures like James Ellroy (LA Confidential, The Black Dahlia) and Susan Straight (National Book Award Nominee). Noël Alumit and Talking to the Moon were chosen as "LA Weekly's Pick of the Week." Talking to the Moon went on to become a Los Angeles Times Bestseller.

Noël is most proud of his work in HIV/AIDS. He has been involved in AIDS activism for over twenty years and most of his work was with the Asian Pacific AIDS Intervention Team. Noël was honored with the James Duggins Award, a prize that recognizes talented mid-career gay writers. Noël resides in Los Angeles.



GHALIB SHIRAZ DHALLA

Ghalib Shiraz Dhalla was born in Mombasa, Kenya and is the author of the critically-acclaimed novel, Ode to Lata, hailed by The Los Angeles Times as "an accomplishment" and The Library Journal as "brilliant." The novel created milestones as the first South Asian gay novel ever to be reviewed by The Los Angeles Times Book Review and to be excerpted by Genre Magazine. It was also the first account of the South Asian gay experience from an author from the

African continent. His second novel, The Two Krishnas, also received positive reviews and delved even deeper into the experiences of Indians living in the diaspora.

A passionate activist, Dhalla co-founded the South Asian program for the Asian Pacific AIDS Intervention Team (APAIT) which provides prevention, health and social services, community leadership, and advocacy to over 10,000 individuals in Southern California. He is also one of the founding members of SATRANG, a support group for LGBT and "questioning" South Asians in Los Angeles.

OUR ACCOMPLISHMENTS OVER THE PAST 12 MONTHS:

ReadOut has brought 15 writers and artists to San Diego, most of whom had never read or performed in our city before. Among these writers were the award winning and trailblazing Michael Nava, Carla Trujillo, Chrystos, and the One Book, One San Diego winner Lysley Tenorio.

Literary Festivals and Books Sold: In the last 12 months, our organization has sold over 800 individual books to San Diegans. Every single one of those books was by an LGBT author of color or LGBT Jewish author. When one considers that we do not have a store nor do we do online sales, it means that these 800 books were sold at our events and literary festivals which means we average about 50-75 books per hour when we are operating. This is an accomplishment that is not being seen anywhere else in the country. We can and San Diegans want to keep our literature alive.

Lives Touched: Through our events, we have made contact with over 350 individuals, most of whom were self-identified LGBT people of color.

Words of Wisdom: We were able to donate over 40 new books by LGBT people of color to Castle Park High School in Chula Vista, a school that is predominantly Asian American and Latino/a. These books ranged from LGBT of color classics to new releases, young adult to advanced fiction, and served to bolster self-esteem in LGBT youth. In addition, we were able to donate roughly 30 LGBT and multicultural children's books to the Center's Family Matters Program.

Patchwork Project: For the last year our team has spent over 120 hours doing research for an LGBT author of color online database. We are nearing the end of that journey. Thus far we have completed bibliographies for over 200 writers, we have collected photos for each author, and we have collected or written biographies for close to 100 authors. The online database is set to debut in the spring of 2015 and will serve as the world's first and only database for LGBT writers of color.
