JOHAN GALTUNG SPEAKS ON ROOTS OF U.S. FOREIGN POLICY AT UCSD INTERNATIONAL CENTER

Visiting lecturer Johan Galtung will speak "On the Roots of U.S. Foreign Policy" Monday, April 20, at 7:30 p.m. at the University of California, San Diego International Center.

The lecture is part of the Clark Lecture Series and is cosponsored by the UCSD International Center and the University of California Institute on Global Conflict and Cooperation. The purpose of the Clark Lecture Series is to bring internationally renowned scholars to UCSD to speak on issues such as world peace, global cooperation and foreign policies.

Galtung is a visiting fellow in the Department of International Studies, Princeton University. He established and directed for several years the International Peace Research Institute in Oslo. He is the founder of the Journal of Peace Research, past director of the Inter-University Center, Dubrovnik, and project coordinator for the United Nations University in Geneva.

Galtung is a consultant to UNESCO and the World Health Organization and has held visiting professorships throughout the world, including Chile, West Germany, Uganda and India. He has authored over 400 publications.

Admission to the lecture and a reception for Galtung hosted by the Friends of the International Center is free, but an admission ticket will be necessary.
